# PLANNING BOARD OPINION POLL RESULTS

Total questionnaires mailed - 475

Total number returned - 132

The Planning Board appreciates the efforts of the 28% who returned the opinion poll and their interest in the future of Candia. This report is an analysis and tabulation of the questionnaire returned by the families of our town.

96% of our residents indicated Candia is a good place to live because of its friendly people and rural atmosphere.

A majority feel that we get needed services from our town government although a few would support better fire and police protection and improved roads.

Of all the residents who answered the poll with children in school, 50% found the educational system satisfactory. 54% of our families would like to have more recreational facilities such as skating, swimming, a gym and Boys and Girls Clubs.

Again the survey indicates 50% would like to see shopping facilities in town and many would like industrial development to expand the economy and diversify job opportunities and give a slow to moderate growth to the town.

## TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:  
(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the seventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote, effective in 1973, "to approve of having two sessions for the annual town meeting in this Town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business." (This question to appear on, and be voted by, official ballot as required by R.S.A. 39:2-a.)

The following Articles to be taken up at 8:00 P.M.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$2,250.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library and Three Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$365.00) for the purchase of Books, a total of Two Thousand Six Hundred and Fifteen Dollars (\$2,615.00), for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Association.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money to be expended under the direction of the American Legion Post.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the maintenance and development of Moore Park.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the expense of the Red Phone Fire Alarm and Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for expense and maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Forty Seven Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$147.75) for renewal of membership to the New Hampshire Municipal Association.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for care and maintenance of the Town Dump or take any other action relative thereto.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Seventy Eight Dollars and Seventy Seven Cents (\$878.77) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Five Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Eight Dollars and Forty Three Cents (\$5,858.43).
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for summer roads and One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for general expense of highways.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund Association, Inc., to assist in defraying its expenses.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.
14. To see if the Town of Candia will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enlist the services of the Tax Commission of the State of New Hampshire to re-value all of the taxable property in the Town and raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) in 1972 to defray approximately one-half (1/2) the expenses associated therewith, the balance to be raised and appropriated at the 1973 Town Meeting.
15. We the undersigned, voting residents of Candia, New Hampshire, petition the Selectmen of said Town to include the following item in warrant for the annual meeting of said Town to be held in March of this year.

To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of R.S.A. 36-A to establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth therein and that the Selectmen appoint said commission within 30 days from



the date of the annual meeting and that a temporary chairman be appointed to call the first meeting of the commission.




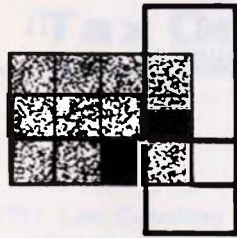

### REPORT OF THE POLICE CHIEF - 1971

Crime has been a major problem throughout the U.S. today. Its cost is measured not only in dollars, but in human misery. Each community must bear its share of the cost - Whether it be in terms of increased police budgets or unchecked lawlessness.

This past year has been a very active one for this department. The continuing rise in the crime rate, the number of investigations and subsequent violators brought before the courts have increased the work load in proportion. This department has logged 692 complaints that were answered.

There are four ways to help your police in protecting you and your community:

1 - BURGLARIES - By installing adequate locks on windows and doors - then keep your house or apartment locked, especially at night or when you are away. Notify post office, newspapers, etc., to stop services while you are away on vacation. Have a neighbor keep an eye on your place. An automatic light at night is also very valuable and helpful.

2 - LARCENY - A bulging hip pocket or an open purse invites pick-pockets to steal. If you value a bicycle, lawn mower, garden equipment, etc., lock them up, secure your property. Avoid business transactions with unattached strangers, especially those who offer confidential or secret get-rich schemes, either in person or by telephone.

3 - CRIMINAL HOMICIDE - By avoiding use of narcotics or excessive drinking and avoiding places where people generally get drunk and disorderly, or deal in or use dope. Don't drink and drive.

4 - Report any suspicious or illegal activities of any kind promptly to the police. Remain alert, don't trust your memory, jot down the facts. Help the police make positive identification and arrest, or perhaps help him prevent a criminal act.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of Candia, the Board of Selectmen, and my fellow police officers for their support and co-operation.

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency, are available for all the residents of Candia regardless of race, creed or ability to pay. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and health guidance and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out on a part-time basis according to directions by the patient's physician. Home Health Aides are available on the same basis.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held twice yearly in Manchester.

Family health guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

Seven clinics with Dr. Hermann Sander officiating were held in Candia in 1971 with an attendance of 107 children. Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, measles, rubella, polio and smallpox vaccines were given. Physical exams were also done.

423 visits, including 20 new calls, to Candia residents were made in 1971. Miss Judith Filleul, R.N. is the nurse in the area.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

### LEST WE FORGET - IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947, nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenges of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand - a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
4. Most Important - Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year - 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

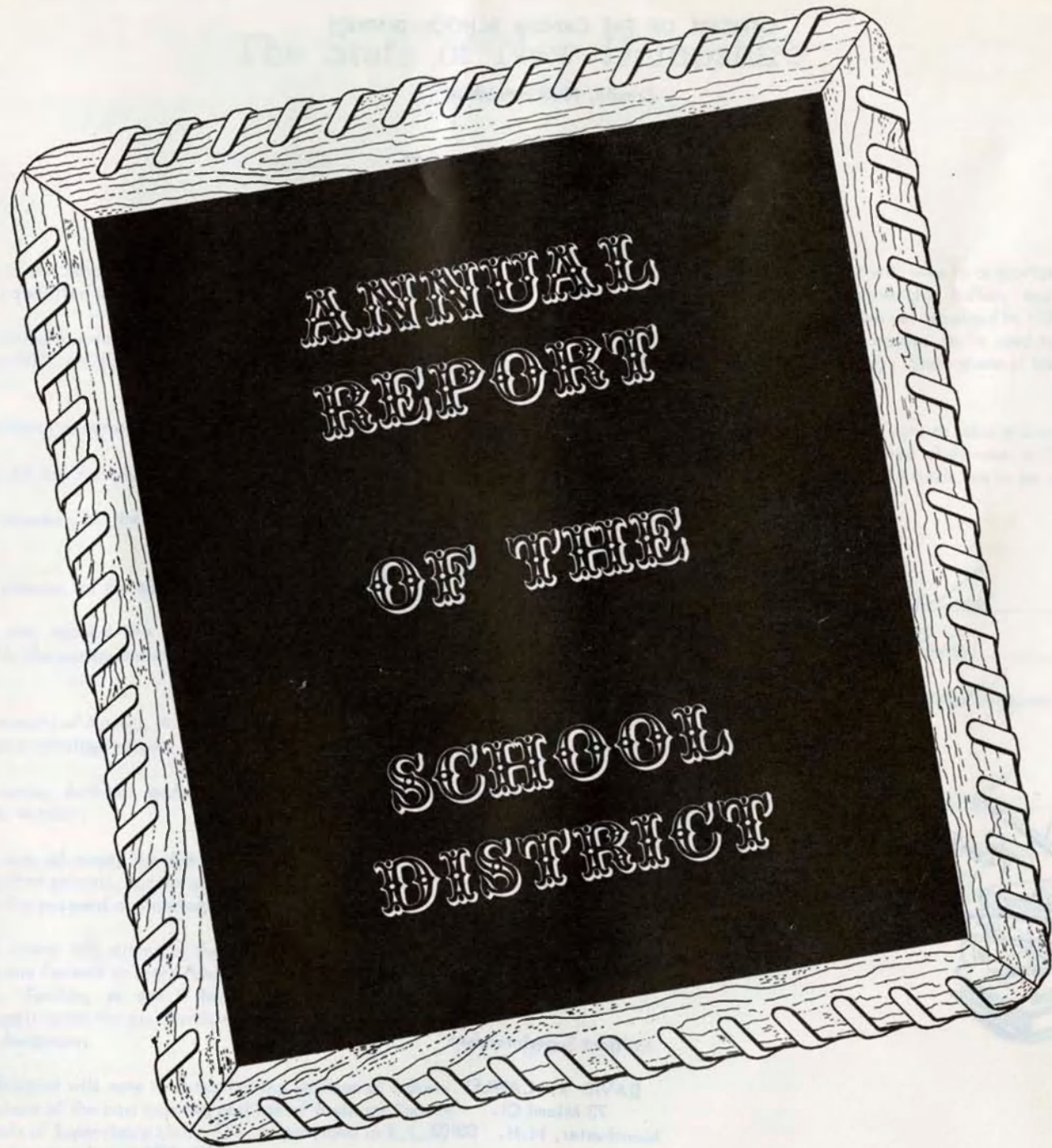

### ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is with pleasure, but also some hesitation, that I submit this brief report. Half a year "on-the-job training" is hardly enough to evaluate Union #53, its present status, its future, and its ever increasing school population.

Two areas of great concern are growth and financial assistance. Each district within the next decade will show rapid growth - in some instances, a doubling of present enrollment. We are at present studying every facet of space needs, double sessions and extended or year round schools. We must take a good hard look at all alternatives.

Although the number of teacher applicants have increased steadily in the last year, we must be selective in choosing the candidates that offer the best for our children.

Our education is fundamentally sound. The instructional program is ever improving, as the science and art of education develops. Instructional areas have been updated and show signs of continuity with our high school programs.

In closing, I would say that good education costs more money than poor, and that quality education costs the most. It is our intention to give you the best quality education possible for the amount of money spent. We can, however, always show improvement day by day. This is the basic philosophy we like to think is part of our educational belief.

## NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

(1) for a male or a spayed female - \$2.00

(2) for a female - \$5.00

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00.

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.

# BURNING REGULATIONS

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## **In Case of Fire - Phone 483-2311**

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from George W. Beane, Forest Fire Warden, Candia Tel. 483-8580.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Dept.
