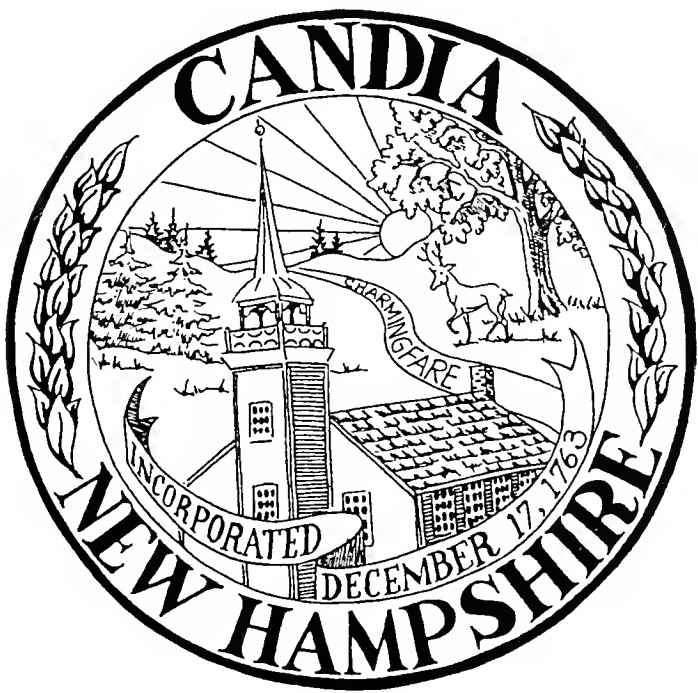

As in previous years, this Report has been color coded, with all Town matters printed on the white pages and all school matters printed on the blue pages.

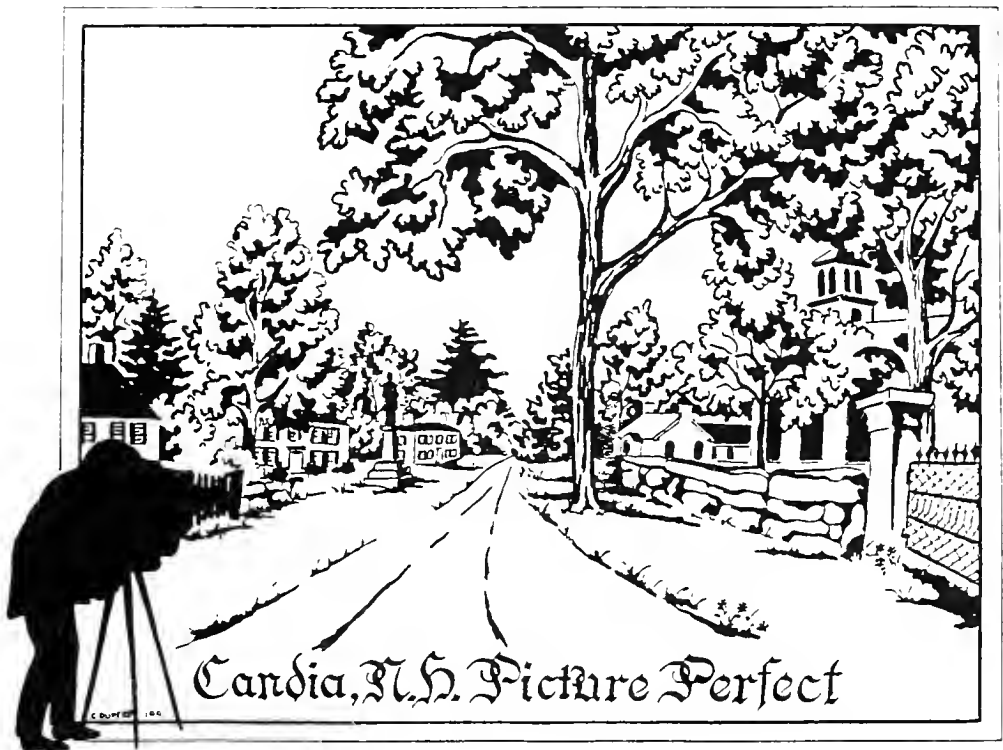

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 AM TO 7:00 PM

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia, on Tuesday, the tenth of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by official ballot.

Amendment No. 1 – To see if the Town will vote to REMOVE from Article XIII, Section 13.02. Viewing, in its entirety.

Amendment No. 2 – To see if the Town will vote to REMOVE from Article V, Section 5.02D(d-2). Radio and Telision Towers, in its entirety.

Amendment No. 3 – To see if the Town will vote to Amend under Article III, Section 3.23, definition of Height, by rewording to clarify the procedure for measuring the height of a building or structure, the proposed section to read in its entirety as follows:

“Section 3.23 Height: The vertical distance between the average finished grade at the base of a building or structure and the highest point of the roof of a building or structure.”

Amendment No. 4 – To see if the Town will vote to AMEND under Article V, Section 5.02 (c-7). Storage for coal, bottled gas, etc., to allow uses by Special Exception in the Commercial District, the proposed section to read in its entirety as follows:

“Section 5.02 (c-7)

R C I N S

Storage for coal, fuel oil, bottled gas, and similar materials, provided that such use shall not be located nearer than 300 feet to any existing or permitted dwelling and that such use shall be subject to any state or local laws relating to the storage of such materials. Fuel storage tanks shall be surrounded by a dyked area sufficient to contain stored fuel.

Amendment No. 5 – To see if the Town will vote to AMEND under Article XIV, Section 14.02F, Denial Notification Procedure, by rewording to clarify the intent of the article, which is proposed to read in its entirety as follows:

“14.02 Building Permits and Certificates of Occupancy Required: F. Denial: Notification Procedures: Where applicants are denied by the Building Inspector, the specific reasons for so doing shall be stated fully on the application and a copy returned to the applicant.”

Amendment No. 6 – To see if the Town will vote to ALLOW the Planning Board to make necessary changes in format, titles, numbering, etc., to properly incorporate these amendments into the ordinance without changing their substance or meaning.

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET ON SATURDAY, THE FOURTEENTH DAY OF MARCH NEXT AT NINE OF THE CLOCK IN THE FORENOON AT MOORE SCHOOL AUDITORIUM TO CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING ARTICLES:

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Elected Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) as provided by N.H. RSA 673:3, I. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to provide that to be employed by the Town of Candia, it shall be mandatory to either be a resident of the Town or become a resident of the Town within 90 days of such employment. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to return the Sanitary Landfill (dump) to voluntary recycling in lieu of mandatory recycling. Eliminating all fines and penalties. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the New Hampshire Municipal Budget Law, N.H. RSA, Chapter 32, and to authorize a Budget Committee composed of six at-large members to be elected by the town meeting in accordance with the provisions of N.H. RSA 32:2. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Moderator to temporarily appoint at-large members of an adopted Budget Committee for 1 year, or until the next town meeting, when all at-large members will be elected in accordance with the provisions of N.H. RSA 32:2. (By petition of the minimum number of registered voters.)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to convey whatever interest it may have in land located on South Road described as follows:

Beginning at the southerly corner of the property at a stone wall corner at the westerly sideline of South Road at land now or formerly of Wilsons, thence;

N 46-15 E, 108 feet along the westerly sideline of South Road as proposed to a point, thence;

N 52E, 76 feet along the westerly sideline of South Road as proposed to a point, thence;

N 54-30 E, 101 feet along the westerly sideline of South Road as proposed to a point, thence;

N 54 E, 101 feet along the westerly sideline of South Road as proposed to a point, thence;

N 46-15 E, 115 feet along the westerly sideline of South Road as proposed to a point at land of the Candia Congregational Church, thence;

N 52-15 W, 130 feet by land of the Candia Congregational Church to a point at a stone wall, thence;

S 37-45 W, by said stone wall 25 feet to a point, thence;

S 35-30 W, by said wall 467 feet to the stone wall corner, being the point of beginning and containing 0.7 acres, more or less, and shown on a plan entitled "Boundary Line

Agreement between Daniel Duhaime & Mary Stevens...” prepared by B.V. Pearson Associates, Inc. dated Nov. 15, 1987, and revised October 25, 1991, and recorded at the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds as plan number D-21307, and identified as part of Tax Map 405, Lot 006, as justice may require. (By request of the owner of Tax map 405, Lot 006, John Wakefield, and the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept a donation of land from Anna Concannon, said parcel being a portion of a parcel now owned by Samowitz and Klein, being more fully described as a southerly portion of parcel shown as Tax Map 409, Lot 193, said portion containing 11 acres more or less. There is no cost to the Town, except for a reduction in tax payment of about \$276. (By request of Mrs. Concannon and the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to convey to the Candia Historical Society any and all interest in the Town-owned land located on High Street and identified as Tax Map 406, Lot 199, this being the same parcel currently occupied by the structure known as the Candia Improvement Club. Said transfer to the Candia Historical Society for preservation purposes to be on such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine are in the best interests of the Town. (By request of the Board of Selectmen, the Historical Society, and the Candia Improvement Club.)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, and that such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting, as permitted by RSA 31:95e. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (**\$500.00**) to share in the cost of a property appraisal of State-owned land known by the 1991 Candia Tax Maps as Map 410, Lot 163.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars and no cents (**\$300.00**) for the support of the Rockingham County Counseling Center. (By request of the Rockingham County Counseling Center.)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars and no cents (**\$300.00**) to be paid to the Rockingham County Nutrition Program to help defray the cost of their services to the Town. (By request of the Rockingham County Nutrition Program.)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$1000.00**) for the support of the Area Homemaker Health Aide Service, Inc. (By request of the Area Homemaker Health Aide Services, Inc.)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars and no cents (**\$2,700.00**) in continuation of its support for the services of the Lamprey Health Care. (By request of the Lamprey Health Care.)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Eight Dollars and no cents (**\$2,948.00**) in continu-

ation of its support of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. (By request of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc.)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-two Dollars and no cents (**\$4,772.00**) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester and Southern New Hampshire, Inc. to defray the costs of the Agency's activities in the Town. (By request of the Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester and Southern New Hampshire, Inc.)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$2,000.00**) for the Fitts Museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. (By request of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum.)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$38,000.00**) for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Smyth Public Library. (By request of the Smyth Public Library Trustees.)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$100,000.00**) for the purpose of continuing road reconstruction on Chester Turnpike. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$50,000.00**) to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment. (By request of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Nine Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$39,000.00**) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. The monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1992. (By request of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc.)

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$8,000.00**) to Candia Rescue for the purpose of providing emergency medical services to the Town. Such funds to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue and to be disbursed to Candia Rescue by April 30, 1992. (By request of Candia Rescue.)

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$8,000.00**) to be placed in the Incinerator Maintenance Fund. (By request of the Solid Waste Committee.)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$15,000.00**) for the purpose of installing New England Telephone Centrex System and Equipment for all Town facilities. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the 1991 operating budget, surplus funds in the amount of Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-

four Dollars and no cents (**\$15,744.00**) for the purchase of a 1991 Ford Crown Victoria Police Cruiser. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars and no cents (**\$3,000.00**) for the purpose of purchasing a motor vehicle registration software package, support fee, and conversion of data for the Town Clerk's office. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars and no cents (**\$3,600.00**) for the purpose of conducting a professional audit of the Town financial records and procedures. (By request of the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred and Fifteen Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-One Dollars and no cents (**\$915,361.00**).

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the town meeting, money from the State, Federal, or other Governmental unit or a private source which become available during the fiscal year, pursuant to RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept such funds as are made available to the Candia Forest Fire Warden under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or convey by auction or advertised sealed bids, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed. Pursuant to RSA 80:42.

ARTICLE 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MINUTES

SUMMARY

On the Sixteenth of March, Nineteen Hundred Ninety One, at 9:02 A.M., Moderator A. Ronald Thomas opened the Annual Meeting of the Town of Candia, New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town of Candia will vote to ABOLISH the office of Land Use Assistant and the budget for the same office and designate said duties to their respective departments: Selectmen, Planning Board, Building Inspector. Submitted by petition of 26 registered voters. A request for a Secret Ballot was made by five registered voters. Results are as follows: YES: 75 No: 136. **ARTICLE 3 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town of Candia will vote not to expend any monies derived from any source for affiliation, membership, support, or any other reason to or for the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission or any other such planning organization. Submitted by petition of 26 registered voters. Vote was by a show of hands. **ARTICLE 4 FAILS.**

Mrs. Thomas made a motion to consider Article 30 at this time. There was no objection from the assembly to move to Article 30.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Two Dollars and no cents (\$4,772.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester and Southern New Hampshire, Inc. to defray the costs of the Agency's activities in the Town. Vote was taken by show of hands. **ARTICLE 30 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Town Building Inspector by ballot under RSA 41:2 and RSA 669:17 VIII, effective at the 1991 annual meeting, to perform all the functions of the building inspector by statute and ordinance. Submitted by petition of 56 registered voters. Barton Mayer was asked to give a legal opinion on this article and stated the statutes are specific in respect to a building inspector. RSA 673:1 III calls for the appointment of a building inspector; no town has the authority to elect a building inspector. In consideration of the legal opinion, Mr. Thomas ruled the **ARTICLE OUT OF ORDER.**

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to require that, effective immediately, only residents of the Town of Candia may serve as Building Inspector. Submitted by petition of 54 registered voters. Following discussion, the Moderator had a request for Secret Ballot. YES: 54 NO: 174. **ARTICLE 6 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to rescind all previous votes authorizing the Planning Board to review site plans under RSA 674:43 or the former statute RSA 36:19-a. The Town Clerk shall file a certificate with the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds showing this withdrawal of site plan review authority and the date of the vote. Submitted by petition of 53 registered voters. Vote was taken by Secret Ballot. YES: 62 NO: 177. **ARTICLE 7 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town of Candia will vote not to expend any monies derived from any source for Town Legal Fees in the Excess of (\$10,000.00) Ten Thousand dollars in any one Fiscal year unless such funds are requested by a special Town

meeting for that particular exceptional need. Submitted by petition of 25 registered voters. Vote was taken by a show of hands. **ARTICLE 8 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to provide tax abatements to families who chose to send their high school students to a high school that does not bill the Town for education tuition.

Following a brief discussion, Barton Mayer offered an advisory opinion: the Selectmen have the exclusive decision whether an abatement is granted. He suggested that the Town wait until the Epsom case is resolved to determine the legality of the issue.

The following amendment was proposed: The maximum abatement is a percentage of the taxes spent on high school tuition per student. A standing vote on the amendment was taken: YES: 127 NO: 72, the amendment is adopted.

Discussion on the amended Article 9 continued. The vote to move the question passes. When voted upon, **ARTICLE 9 FAILS.**

A request was made to adjourn for lunch; since there was no opposition, the meeting was adjourned until 1:00 P.M.

Following a call to order at 1:00 P.M., a request was made to have Article 36 considered at this time. There was no objection.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$2,000.00) for the repair of one (1) chimney and to buy paint and brushes to paint rear ell of museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of Fitts Museum. The following amendment was made: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Seventy Five Dollars and no cents (\$575.00) for the repair of one (1) chimney and to buy paint and brushes to paint the rear ell of the museum. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. A check in the amount of \$1,425 was offered by the Fitts Museum Foundation to the Museum for the repair of the chimney. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by show of hands on the amendment to the article. The amendment is adopted. The amended Article 36 was voted on and **ADOPTED.**

A request was made to move Article 23 to this time. There was no objection from those assembled.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Four Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$5,400.00) for the purpose of purchasing computer software and a printer for the Town Clerk's office. The following amendment to Article 23 was made: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Thousand Nine Hundred Forty (\$1,940.00) Dollars and no cents for the purpose of purchasing computer hardware and software for the Town Clerk. When put to a vote, the amendment was adopted. An amendment was then proposed to change the dollar amount to One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) and no cents. It was stated that the memory upgrade which was included in the original amended amount was unnecessary as the Computer Advisory Committee felt that a workstation with adequate memory presently located in another department could be exchanged with that of the Town Clerk. Vote on the new amendment was taken and the

amendment was adopted. There was no further discussion, and when the article, amended to \$1,500.00, was put to a vote, **ARTICLE 23 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 10. The voters of the Town of Candia respectfully request the Congress of the United States to propose an amendment of the United States Constitution, for ratification by the states, specifying that Congress and the states shall have the power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States. Submitted by petition of 27 registered voters. Following discussion, vote was taken by a show of hands. **ARTICLE 10 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent. There was no discussion on the article. Vote was taken by a show of hands. **ARTICLE 11 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Three Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$23,000.00) for the purchase of a Skid Steer Loader for the Candia Recycling Center. Motion to raise and appropriate Seventeen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$17,000.00) for the purchase of a Skid Steer Loader for the Candia Recycling Center. It was explained that the Uniloader which was used at the site, and in operation since 1979, just died and that the Solid Waste Committee plans to apply to the State for a matching grant so that the actual cost of the loader will be reduced by half. The balance would then be returned to General Revenue. Following further discussion, vote was taken by a show of hands. **ARTICLE 12 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$7,000.00) to be used for recycling and further to use these funds or part thereof for any matching grants that may become available for recycling. Following brief discussion, vote by a show of hands was taken. **ARTICLE 13 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$6,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a furnace for the Candia Recycling Center. A motion to table this article indefinitely, vote was taken to table, **ARTICLE 14 IS INDEFINITELY TABLED.**

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the incinerator. The unexpended balance to be placed in the Incinerator Maintenance Fund created at Town Meeting 1990. The article was then amended to read: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the incinerator. Such sum to be placed in the Incinerator Maintenance Fund created at Town Meeting 1990. It was explained that this is an emergency reserve fund. There was no further discussion of the amendment and when voted upon by a show of hands, the amendment was adopted. Discussion then resumed on the amended article. A standing vote was taken. YES: 103 NO: 88, **THE AMENDED ARTICLE 15 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Four Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$24,000.00) for the purpose of disposing of the

old ash that is stored above ground at the Candia Recycling Center. The article was amended to an amount of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00). The amendment, when voted on by a show of hands, was adopted. The amended Article 16 was then voted upon. **ARTICLE 16 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of disposing of the old tires that are stored above ground at the Candia Recycling Center. When voted on, **ARTICLE 17 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,800.00) for the purpose of hiring part-time help to sort trash to determine the amounts of contaminants that are not sorted from noncomplying residents' trash. The following amendment was proposed: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,800.00) for the purpose of hiring part-time help to sort trash to determine the amounts of contaminants that are not sorted from trash and such other duties as the Selectmen shall determine. The article was amended by vote with show of hands. A motion was made to Table the article indefinitely. Following a vote by show of hands, **ARTICLE 18 IS TABLED.**

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Candia Solid Waste Ordinance by adding to Article IV Violations and Fines in Section 1 the following:

6. Unauthorized removal of recyclables.

And by changing Article IV Section 2 from Selectman in charge of the Center to Board of Selectmen; and by changing Article V: Legal by changing in Section 1 Enforcement from Selectman in charge of the Center to Board of Selectmen.

There was no discussion, and when put to a vote, **ARTICLE 19 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$100,000.00) for the purpose of road reconstruction. It was stated that if this article was accepted, the hundred thousand dollars would be deducted from the general operating budget. Following discussion, a standing vote was taken: YES: 104 NO: 82. **ARTICLE 20 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Four Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$15,400) for the purpose of purchasing a police cruiser. Since a request signed by five registered voters had been received by Moderator Thomas, vote on this article was by Secret Ballot. YES: 75 NO: 122, **ARTICLE 21 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$18,500.00) for the purpose of hiring one additional full-time police officer. A vote was taken by Secret Ballot. YES: 34 NO: 162, **ARTICLE 22 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing the services of a professional accounting firm for a review of Town financial records and procedures. Following discussion, a standing vote was taken: YES: 99 NO: 65, **ARTICLE 24 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$38,000.00) for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Smyth Public Library. When put to a vote, **ARTICLE 25 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) to Candia Rescue for the purpose of providing primary emergency medical services in the Town of Candia. Said funds are to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1991. Motion to amend the article to: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) to Candia Rescue for the purpose of providing primary emergency medical services in the Town of Candia. Said funds are to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue." The amendment, when put to a vote, fails. Vote was then taken on Article 26 by show of hands. **ARTICLE 26 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Nine Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$39,000.00) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. The monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1991. Vote was by Secret Ballot; YES: 171 NO: 18, **ARTICLE 27 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town of Candia will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purposes of funding the future purchase of Fire Apparatus and Equipment. Further, to see if the Town of Candia will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$50,000.00) to be deposited in said fund. Vote was taken by Secret Ballot. YES: 89 NO:88, **ARTICLE 28 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept such funds as are made available to the Candia Forest Fire Warden, under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV. Vote by show of hands was taken, and **ARTICLE 29 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$650.00) for the support of the Rockingham Counseling Center. Vote was taken by show of hands. **ARTICLE 31 FAILS.**

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$2,600.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Lamprey Health Care. Voted upon by show of hands, **ARTICLE 32 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,500.00) for the support of the Area Homemaker Health Aide Service, Inc. Vote was taken by a show of hands and **ARTICLE 33 WAS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Dollars and no cents (\$2,870.00) in continuation of

its support of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. Vote by show of hands, ARTICLE 34 WAS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$500.00) for the support of the New Hampshire Property Taxpayer's Defense Fund. Vote was taken by show of hands. ARTICLE 35 WAS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 37. The following motion was made: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Thirty One Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars and no cents (\$1,031,737.00) to include Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$4,500.00) for Summer Recreation and Six Hundred Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$650.00) for the Rockingham County Nutrition Program." It was explained that both Candia Recreation and the Nutrition Program had inadvertently been omitted from the Warrant this year. A motion was then to change the main budget figure to Nine Hundred Thirty One Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars and no cents (\$931,737.00). It was explained that the figure had been attained by subtracting the One Hundred Thousand Dollars for Road Reconstruction, which had been included in the Warrant article. Vote was taken by a show of hands on the amendment, by which the amendment was adopted.

A new amendment was then proposed to replace the dollar amount with the sum of Eight Hundred Forty Eight Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Three Dollars and no cents (\$848,553.00). The Board of Selectmen then proposed an amended amount of Eight Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$879,000.00). Moderator Thomas declared that the assembly might wish to indicate which figure they would prefer in the amendment and a standing vote was taken for informational purposes only. 92 persons were in favor of adopting the \$879,000.00 figure; 59 voters were in favor of the \$864,000.00 amount. The amendment was then changed to Eight Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$879,000.00). A request was then received to move the question on the amendment. There was no discussion, and when the amendment was voted on, it was adopted by standing vote. Discussion then resumed on the amended Article 37. Following discussion, vote by show of hands was taken on the article, in the amount of Eight Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$879,000.00). ARTICLE 37 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to RSA 31:95-b. Vote by show of hands, ARTICLE 38 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes. Vote was by show of hands. ARTICLE 39 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year. Vote by show of hands, ARTICLE 40 IS ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or convey by auction or advertised sealed bids, any real estate acquired by the Town

through Tax Collector's Deed. Pursuant to RSA 80:42. A motion to amend the article to the following was made: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed. Pursuant to RSA 80:42. It was explained that this was an attempt to assure that no resident would have their home taken from them due to inability to pay taxes. Legal Counsel cited that RSA 80:42 was very specific, and he did not feel it was advisable for the Town to become a landlord, as it would then be held liable if any mishaps occurred. A vote was then taken on the amendment. The amendment is defeated. There was no further discussion on Article 41, and when voted upon by a show of hands, **ARTICLE 41 IS ADOPTED.**

ARTICLE 42. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Under this article, the chair accepted nominations for the following positions: Hog Reeve: Betty Thomson; Scalers of Timber: Paul and Diane LaCombe; Viewers of Fences: Ronald and Doris Plante. These positions were unanimously adopted by those assembled.

Vote to adjourn: Unanimous. The annual Town Meeting was adjourned at 7:31 P.M.

There have also been changes within the Department of Motor Vehicles, though most of these will have little impact on our registration procedures.

The most controversial piece of legislation seems to be the new Vital Records fee increase which became effective August 12, 1991. Prior to that date, the fee for a certified copy or verification of a vital record was \$3.00, on August 12, that fee increased to \$10.00. The new law is RSA 126:13 & 15, and is worded as follows: The fee is for each search conducted. The fee shall be charged whether or not the record is located. The fee includes one certified copy of the record, if located. Additional certified copies are \$10.00 each. There is presently an amendment being introduced which would reduce the additional copy fee to \$6.00. It will go before the Legislative Committee in January of 1992.

Residents continue to support the Municipal Agent Program, which enables them to obtain plates and decals here at the Town Clerk's office for passenger vehicles under 8,000 pounds or under 7,000 pounds if they are diesel vehicles. Decals only can be purchased when renewing the following: motorcycles, tractors, and trailers under 8,000 pounds. The fee continues to be \$2.00 per registration. Municipal Agents no longer process requests for 20-Day Plates, you must go to a Motor Vehicle Sub-Station. If you wish to obtain Initial Plates, in addition to Concord, you may now to the following offices: Dover Point, Manchester, Nashua, and Rochester.

We continue to have long waiting lines at the end of the month. This is not a problem unique to Candia, it occurs in all towns and Motor Vehicle Substations. You are encouraged to come in the middle of the month, if possible, and avoid the long lines. To help process your registration quickly, please consider the following suggestions: have your Resident Tax receipt and old registrations ready when doing a renewal. If paying by check, you will need one to the Town of Candia, one to the State of N.H. – M.V., and \$2.00 per registration Municipal Agent's fee. If you are transferring your plates to another vehicle, you need the registration for the vehicle you will be taking the plates from as well as either the Town Clerk's copy of the Title Application (blue paper), Title or Certificate of Origin for a vehicle less than 10 years old, or a Bill of Sale listing: model, make, year of manufacture, color, number of cylinders, body style and vehicle identification number. I would encourage people with more than four registrations to call in advance so I can prepare their registrations without causing undue delay.

A reminder that all dogs over the age of three months must be licensed by April 30 of each year. In order to license your dog, you must present the current rabies certificate. Fees for licensing are as follows: Spayed or neutered animals \$4.50, unaltered dogs \$7.00 and dogs with an owner over 65 years of age \$2.00. Candia's Leash Law took effect in 1980; dogs are not allowed to run at large.

In 1992, we will be participating in four elections; the Presidential Primary, Town

Election, State Primary and General Election. If you are not a registered voter, you may register at my office during regular office hours or with the Supervisors of the Checklist during their posted sessions. If you will be absent from town during an election or physically unable to come to the polls, please contact me to vote by absentee ballot. You must complete an application for the ballot, and as soon as the application has been received by my office and the ballots are prepared, I will mail the necessary materials to you with instructions. Please feel free to use this service since your vote does count!

I hope this information will be of help to you. If you have any further questions, please call 483-5573. My office hours are as follows: Monday: Closed, Tuesday and Thursday: 6 to 8 PM, Wednesday: 9 to 12 and 1 to 3 PM and Friday: 9 to 12 Noon.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

This past year has been one of continual intensive activity by the Board of Selectmen. It is not possible to outline all of the subject areas and individual issues that needed to be addressed as space would not permit, so this report will contain only the highlights of principal issues.

By far, the most pressing and time consuming issue for the Board of Selectmen was the restructuring of the Police Department, and hiring of a full-time police chief. The Town has been without a full-time police chief since February, 1991, and the Department was run in the interim by two separate "Officers-in-Charge", and, as of this writing, is supervised by Selectmen Gary York. Gary and Selectman Brien Brock have, for the first time in recent history, succeeded in getting police personnel records documented to the point where the Town is now fully complying with State requirements for employment of officers. This was necessary to minimize the Town's exposure to potentially disastrous financial liability claims.

The Selectmen are committed to hiring a full-time police chief who will be charged with and supported (as may be necessary) in providing the best possible level of community-sensitive, professional policing to all of the Town's residents. For those who don't believe anything happens here, it should be noted that in 1991, the Police responded to 1946 incidents (not including 475 summons and warnings).

Property reevaluation was completed in 1991 by appraisers from the State Department of Revenue Administration. The 1991 tax rate was set at \$24.60 per \$1000. The Selectmen are in the process of dealing with 142 requests for abatement which represents 9% of the total of 1600 parcels.

Many citizens believe the Board of Selectmen and School Board are responsible for setting the amount of annual expense and the tax rate. The amount the Town and School Board spends in any year is determined by the Annual School and Town Meetings in March of each year. The tax rate for every town in New Hampshire is set the following Fall by the State Department of Revenue Administration. The dollar amount to be raised from property taxes is determined by the following formula:

Total Voter Approved School & Town Expenditures	Minus	Non Property Tax Revenue such as State Aid, M.V. Fees, Licenses, etc.	=	Dollar Amount to be raised from Property Taxes
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As far as expenditures and taxes are concerned, the Selectmen are charged with operating the various Town functions and departments within the total amount approved by the voters. For 1991, the Board of Selectmen hopes to return a surplus of approximately \$18,250 from the '91 approved operating budget which will be credited against the 1992 tax rate. Moreover, the Selectmen have tried to keep the 1992 proposed budget within the rate of inflation. The proposed 1992 budget is about 4.1% higher than the 1991 approved budget.

The Town continues to make significant steps in handling solid waste. Now gone from the incinerator waste stream are most newspaper, cardboard, steel (tin) cans, aluminum

cans, and glass. Recycling, aside from obvious local and regional and environmental and energy benefits, results in lower dollar cost to Candia's taxpayers. We save three ways: 1) by hopefully extending the life of the incinerator, 2) by reducing hauling costs and tipping fees for ash, and 3) by income from the sale of recycled materials (\$8213 in 1991). The Solid Waste Committee deserves very special credit for constantly staying abreast of the ever-changing recycling market and disposal technologies. (Thanks to Janet Manter, Al Couch, Barbara Desautels, and Gary York FOR HUNDREDS OF HOURS OF VOLUNTARY SERVICE.)

The Board of Selectmen has attempted to be a kinder, gentler, yet firm enforcer of the building codes and zoning ordinances. Although several cases involving zoning violations are in active court status, a wary eye on the code enforcement portion of the legal budget has also been maintained. The report of the Building Inspector will provide more detail on 1991 construction activity.

During 1991 the Selectmen worked positively with the Planning Board to adopt minor site plan review procedures. This has been successfully accomplished and we thank the Planning Board for their work in this area. Ron Hadley, William Stergios, and Ingrid Byrd served on the minor plan review committee.

The year 1991 saw the highest percentage of dogs registered in the history of Town. Almost 99%! Through vigorous enforcement, which will continue in 1992, we hope again to make this a "wash" item in terms of cost to the town. We should all note that there is a leash law in New Hampshire and running or otherwise loose dogs cost the Town money. Unregistered dogs cannot be verified for rabies, and a major outbreak of rabies in wild animals is expected in New Hampshire by 1992 or 1993. Wild cats have also caused some problems and expense for the Town – please spay or neuter all pets (dogs and cats). Proposed State legislation, if passed in the 1992 Session, will increase fines for non-registration and encourage owners to spay-neuter pets. **Please register your dogs by April 30, 1992.**

Based on voter approval of \$100,000 in 1991, some 2600' of Chester Turnpike underwent major base reconstruction. We urge that the voters approve funds in 1992 to continue this needed work.

In January, faced with the real possibility of inability to respond to police calls, the Board voted unanimously to purchase a cruiser. We hope the voters allow this to be taken from the total 1991 operating surplus of \$34,000 so that it is not charged to the 1992 budget.

Besides the volunteers on the Solid Waste Committee, the Selectmen would also note the outstanding contributions of time and ingenuity from the Welfare Director Patti Davis, the CYAA, Paul Vallee, and numerous anonymous persons (you know who you are) who donated substantial sums of money, clothing, and food to the Welfare Department.

The year 1991 also brought Hurricane Bob. The Emergency Operation Center was fully operational. We thank Helen Wilson and Del Weeks for their readiness, as well as all of the members of the CVFD for manning the station for many volunteer hours during the storm.

In summary, the 1991 Board of Selectmen has attempted very hard to run the Town in a fiscally prudent manner, yet has tried to be fair and compassionate, to listen to *all sides* of each issue, and to keep a mind *always* on the best interests of all of the citizens of Candia.

Thank you very much for the opportunity to serve you. We hope you feel that the Board of Selectmen has been available to listen and respond to your concerns within their legal authority to act.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR/ CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

Once again another year has passed us by, this year having an increase of 20 building permits issued from last year, giving us a total of 94 permits issued compared to 74 in 1990.

Of the 94 permits issued, 9 were for new homes, 8 were for additions to existing residences, and the rest were for construction ranging from barns and garages to pools and decks.

The Building Department has come a long way in the last couple of years as far as service to Candia's citizens, quality of inspections, and most of all, it has come a long way with its record keeping.

However, this does not mean that we have reached the point where we should be yet, as there is still much needed change, starting with the fee schedule. With the present fee schedule, a total of \$4,723.94 was received in income for 1991. If the schedule is revised only, not even increased, there would have been a substantial difference. What all this means is that the fee schedule would then better support the building department, and the more revenue that is collected through the fee schedule by those utilizing the services of the department, would result in a decrease in cost to the taxpayers.

Then, there is the issue of our zoning ordinance and site plan review regulations. Both of these are in need of revision or updating to keep up with the modern day growth, in order that we are not hampering or stalling growth that is needed for the Town of Candia. As these regulations stand now, all that they seem to do is create an increase work load on the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The ZBA has had more cases this past year due to the inadequate writing of these regulations.

Therefore, in the year to come, if attention and work could be given to the needed changes in the Candia Zoning Ordinance and to the Site Plan Review Regulations, I believe that it would benefit all parties concerned and make everyone's work load easier, therefore saving time and allowing things to be done in a more timely manner.

I look forward to another enjoyable and prosperous year ahead working with and serving the people of the Town of Candia.

REPORT OF CANDIA RESCUE 1991

Candia Rescue responded to 97 requests for medical aid and provided treatment to 114 patients. 53 requests were for medical assistance and the remaining 44 were response to a motor vehicle accident. We also were on standby for the incident in Stratham this past summer. Mutual aid to other towns numbered another 5 incidents.

The townspeople of Candia have again showed tremendous support for us in the past year. It is through your support that Candia Rescue continues to provide high standards of emergency medical care.

This year has seen a greater level of training of personnel in more advanced medical treatment. Our ranks include a paramedic, two intravenous qualified EMT's and 7 defibrillator qualified EMT's.

We would also like to thank the Candia Volunteer Fire Department, Candia Police Department and Derek's Ambulance Service for their continued support in 1991. Our greatest thanks go to the people of Candia for providing the means by which we continue to serve the community.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The year of 1991 has been the first year in Candia's history to elect its Board. The transition was relatively smooth considering that the Board retained only two members. However, one new member this year was a regular attendee at last year's meetings. The Board elected three alternates to be available to participate should we have a temporary vacancy. One alternate has since resigned, leaving us with one open position.

The Town voted to revise four zoning issues of the 13 presented at Town Meeting in March. The issues were: allowing "house-keeping" changes, re-zoning by Citizen Petition, support of agriculture and provisions for economy apartments.

The Board approved 9 new residential lots in 1991 on five applications. Of those, four were from subdivisions in phased development seen by the previous Planning Board. Only one subdivision was denied (commercial). The approved lots compare with other years as follows:

The Board also reviewed and approved six applications for lot line adjustments. In two cases a lot was eliminated, the other four redefined lot lines between abutters.

The Board also worked on revising Site Plan Review, Zoning Ordinances, the process for filing applications, Rules of Procedure, and beginning of revising the Master Plan. The work load is challenging and varied. We are always interested in having new volunteers join us.

As state and federal rules change regarding planning and development, it has become an even more valuable service to the Town to have our Land Use Assistant. Our Assistant has been a strong part of this Board's maintaining a successful transition to the elected Board from the former appointed Board. Among the other responsibilities with Zoning Board and the Board of Selectman's land use issues, the Assistant has maintained a professional office for our applicants and is a source of information for our newest members.

Lastly, we ask that all people in Candia look toward the future through the planning process. We all need to participate on a daily basis in the development of our Town. The growth, type of projects, and the manner in which each is completed will be the cornerstone of the Town's future. We all ask that, as you review the items on this year's zoning ballot, that it is only one way the Planning Board hears your comments. We ask that you come to Public Hearings, and participate with the input we need to make informed, knowledgeable, and educated decisions.

REPORT OF THE SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

In 1991 the Solid Waste Committee's efforts were again concentrated on improving the routine operations of the Candia Recycling Center. After much research, including visits to facilities and on-site demonstrations, the committee recommended purchasing a New Holland loader to replace our tired 23 year old Case. Since March it has performed up to our expectations, doing tasks such as glass crushing and yard work that formerly had to be hired out. After months of tinkering and a minimum of expense, operator Earl Hardy got the old Case running again. As long as maintenance costs are low, it will be used, primarily inside. This will extend the life of the New Holland and make it available for outside recycling tasks.

After 3 frustrating years we received State approval to haul the incinerator ash to the Consumat Sanco Landfill in Bethlehem. By the end of March all of the ash stored behind the incinerator had been removed. Now the cold ash is put in a leakproof, covered bin and hauled once a month to the landfill. The ash has been tested quarterly with all components well below toxicity limits.

Due to corrosion and leaks, the entire roof of the incinerator building and one rotten beam were replaced by Creative Tectonics of Goffstown. To keep the inside air cleaner, two roof vents were added and the side of the building was repaired.

In September it was necessary to re-do some of the refractory work, under warranty, that had been done in November of 1990 by C.D. Boiler Works, and since the incinerator was scheduled to be down for a week, several other problems were also corrected. A complete refractory replacement, last done in late 1987, will be scheduled for 1993. This is a routine but costly maintenance item with 5 years the average replacement time. We are asking for another \$8,000 to be added to the incinerator Maintenance Fund. This is an emergency fund. If the refractory doesn't last through 1992, the fund money will be used to help defray this cost.

An energy audit on the incinerator and building, performed as the first step in applying for a Governor's Energy Grant, confirmed findings reported last year by Gary York that an electrical upgrade would save energy – and up to \$3,000 in propane and electric costs. The electrical work of incinerator controls and new light fixtures will be done as soon as word on the matching funds grant is received. We have requested \$8,500 in the 1992 budget to do this work. Any grant money awarded will be returned to the general fund.

The new State of NH Solid Waste Rules were enacted in July. They contain more regulations that we must follow, including payment of an annual operating fee of about \$800. Candia was represented at two of the hearings and submitted written opposition to the rules, but to no avail. The State continues to strangle us with fees and regulations that do nothing to improve solid waste disposal or increase recycling efforts. For example, at the request of the State, in June we submitted an application for a recycling permit which required many hours of preparation. To date we have had no response from them.

Fortunately, recycling continues in Candia without a permit, running smoothly and profitably, and with great support from residents. Two new items were added this year

– corrugated cardboard and tin cans. Using 1990 grant of \$5,000 from NH the Beautiful and matching town funds, we purchased an Epcor baler and increased our electrical service entrance to 200 amps to accommodate it. In March corrugated cardboard baling began. A temporary loading dock, necessary to load bales onto the trailer, was built using the donated labor and equipment of Paul Vallee, and cement blocks donated by Brox Paving Material of Hooksett and transported to the site by Bruce Stevens – a completely volunteer effort greatly appreciated by the committee. 45 bales of cardboard have been loaded into the trailer and sold. And speaking of loading, residents, with lots of help from attendant Karen Walton, stacked over 22 tons into the newspaper trailer, exceeding the 20 ton requirement for maximum marketing return.

Tin can recycling began August 1st with the great participation by residents resulting in a much higher volume of cans than was projected. In 4 months residents filled the tin can bin twice – that's 60 cubic yards of cans that did not go into the incinerator. Money has been budgeted to purchase our own collection bins to replace the current loaned ones. In July the infamous bulldozer was recycled along with our other scrap metals.

Although most of the old tire pile is gone, the burned ones are not. We contracted with Oxford Tire to remove all the tires with the understanding that the 200 plus burned ones would also be taken, but to date, they have refused to accept them. The tire pile was deeper than expected and required many hours of dirty manual labor to dig up and separate the tires from other junk and dirt. Including tires that were continually being added to the pile, we have removed a total of 5,547 tires from the site.

Our request for recycling funds from the Governor's Recycling Grant to build a swap shop was denied. We then applied to New Hampshire the Beautiful and were awarded \$2,000 which, added to the \$7,000 town funds, gives us \$9,000 to build the swap shop.

Recycling procedures at the Center were improved with the addition of 2 more tipping hoppers, covers for the glass hoppers, new stairs for the newspaper trailer and tin can collection bin, and a new loader that can "turn" the compost pile. There will be lots of great compost available in the late spring – it's free and we'll even load it for you.

Although market prices are generally lower, we recycled more of everything so our total net income was \$1,863 higher than in 1990. A complete report on last year's recycling activities can be found at the end of this report. It is of interest that, after spending thousands of dollars to remove the unmanaged "monster" scrap pile, this year the sale of scrap metal in managed piles produced a net **income** of \$2,213.70.

We appreciate the support townspeople gave us by approving all of our warrant article requests last year. The \$8,000 Incinerator Maintenance Fund was not spent. Although there were about \$6,000 in unexpected repairs, this cost was paid out of the regular budget by using money allocated for the electrical upgrade. The \$7,000 for recycling also has not been spent. As noted above, it will be used in 1992 to build Model #L-555 unloader from Chappell Tractor in Milford for \$15,900, a 300 gallon diesel fuel tank from Agway for \$441, and \$659 towards the \$725 cost of two spare tires for the loader. With the \$5,000 to remove old ash, we hauled away all the ash, 84 tons, that had been stored behind the incinerator. The \$2,500 for tire removal was used to haul away 1,985 tires, including 5 off-road tires at \$20 each and 80 truck tires at \$4 each.

The Committee has established these major goals for 1992: complete the electrical upgrade; build a swap shop so that reusable household items and toys can be recycled instead of destroyed; complete the removal of the old tire pile; reduce the cost of ash testing by working with the State and Consumat Sanco to revise our testing requirements; update and reprint the rules pamphlet; and, continue to inform and educate ourselves so that we can provide you with the most efficient and cost effective waste disposal and recycling programs.

Special thanks to Paul Vallee and Elwyn Hobbs for volunteering time and equipment.

Solid Waste Committee members are: Gary York, Selectman; Janet Manter, Chairman; Alan Couch, Barbara Desautels, and Donald Belcourt. We meet on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of every month at 7:00 pm. Our meetings are open to the public and new members are always welcome.

REPORT OF THE TOWN AUDITORS

Dear Sirs,

We have carefully examined the financial books and records of the Town of Candia for the fiscal year ending 31 December 1990, and compared them with the annual financial reports, in accordance with RSA 41:31. In our opinion, with the exception of the following items, the financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Candia at December 31, 1990 and the results of its operations for the year ended. A copy of the NH Department of Revenue Administration form MS-60 has been forwarded to the Selectmen's Office.

The beginning balance of the tax collector's "Summary of Tax Accounts" and report (MS-61) did not agree with the ending balances from the year preceding, as adjusted by our 1989 audit report. Our report of the tax collector's Accounts (MS-60 – Sheets 5 thru 8) was adjusted to compensate for the differences by increasing the "Uncollected Taxes – Prior Years" by \$6,698.72. This adjustment would be reflected as an increase in the Asset portion of the Balance Sheet on your MS-5. It is our understanding that the accounting firm reviewing the Town's financial management and accounting systems has recommended that this amount be written off as not being material and supportable. While we may, as taxpayers, take a different view of materiality than they do, we will, in our audit of the 1991 books, take this into account and adjust our records accordingly, if the figures are not supportable.

The "SCHEDULE OF CITY/TOWN PROPERTY" (Part XV – MS-5) again did not appear to reflect the increase in value that would be expected with the completion of the Town Office Building.

The report of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum inadvertently included funds that were NOT Town funds, but were the result of the efforts of volunteers supporting the activities of the museum. As auditors and as taxpayers, we were pleased to be able to review the results of these efforts, because it allows us a clearer picture of the actual costs associated with the operation of the Town. We do not, however, want there to be any confusion between monies raised by taxation and the many contributions made to the Town by public-spirited citizens and organizations. Accordingly, we have enclosed a restated report of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum separating the funds appropriated from the funds donated. The restated report agrees with the figures correctly shown on the original MS-5.

The following comments should be reviewed for possible action, either to conform to state standards or to improve the reporting of the Town's financial transactions.

1. We continue to be pleased with the progress being made in your computerized accounting system. We will be very interested, during our 1991 audit, in the results of the review by the professional accounting firm of the Town's financial management and control systems and the improvements they will be helping you implement. Hopefully, many of the problems discussed in previous audits that still exist will be eliminated. The inability to combine payments to a single vendor, across accounts, resulting in multiple payments to the same vendor in the same payment period, continues to be a fundamental weakness in the system. The establishment of a new

chart of accounts along with a different manner of coding vendors should resolve the problem. Excessive voided checks and tighter control of the stock of blank checks also continues to concern us.

2. We are pleased to see that the Board of Selectmen and the School Board are officially addressing the issue of cash flow and payment schedules. We believe that it would be prudent management to continue to focus attention on this area, both to improve the cash flow and to strengthen the financial management and reporting systems. With the current crisis in the banking system in New Hampshire, the ability of Candia to effectively manage their money will continue to be hampered by factors beyond their control. In this environment, it is increasingly important that every effort be made to maximize returns on our investments and to minimize the costs of borrowing in anticipation for taxes. We believe that the efforts of the Treasurer and the Selectmen during this particularly difficult period of time have reflected a high degree of concern and professionalism. We feel, however, that there are several additional steps that should be taken. We would again recommend that you institute a formal cash flow monitoring program that budgets the amount of cash required for payments, on at least a weekly basis, in conjunction with the School District. We would again also recommend that ALL remittances to the treasurer should be made on a more frequent basis, preferably daily. As a minimum, deposits to a Town account should be made on a daily basis, even if there are some small handling or processing costs associated with this change in present procedure.

3. The road agent's checking account no longer appears to serve any useful purpose. We again recommend that it be closed and payments be made directly to the vendors thru the normal process. It would appear that the Town would generate few, if any, additional checks, the debited accounts would remain exactly the same as they are for now for road agent transactions, the road agent would no longer have to maintain a separate set of books, and we would no longer have a concern about additional bank accounts in the name of the Town of Candia.

4. It is recommended that an effort be made to accurately determine the true value of the Town's capital assets. A cursory review of the figures related to the value of the inventory of Town property reported over the last ten years would seem to indicate that there haven't been many changes in all that time. Perhaps the newly formed computer advisory committee could recommend some simple method of storing and retrieving the data associated with the capital assets that would allow the Town to have an accurate database of the Town's capital assets that could be easily maintained.

5. We are pleased to see that the Town has formally contracted with the Candia Volunteer Fire Department and with Candia Rescue for their services. We would strongly recommend that future contracts include a dissolution clause. This would, we believe, definitively and finally, remove any concerns about the distribution of capital assets purchased with Town funds, legally owned by non-town organizations, should those organizations cease to exist.

6. We have recommended to the Trustees of Trust Funds that they develop a written set of investment goals and objectives for the various funds in their custody, defining what return on investment they hope to achieve to maximize income, maintain the purchasing power of the funds, and protect the capital in accordance with prudent

management and the law. We continue to work with them to develop the reporting tools that will allow them to more easily achieve their goals.

7. We have suggested to the Superintendent of Cemeteries that he consider the possibility, at some future date, of requesting an appropriation from the Town to supplement the income received from perpetual care funds for the upkeep of the Town Cemeteries. It is only through the dedication, resourcefulness, and availability of men such as the present Superintendent that we are able to maintain the current state of the Town Cemeteries as inexpensively as we do. Inasmuch as the Town has a legal obligation to bury anyone that dies in the Town of Candia, whether they pay perpetual care or not, it seems appropriate that the Town should have a line item in their budget for some portion of this expense. We believe it would be prudent management to address this issue before it becomes an expensive budget item.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Candia Volunteer Fire Department responded to 129 calls in 1991. These responses are broken down as follows: 29 vehicular accidents, 18 wires fires, 13 mutual aid calls, 10 fire alarm activations, 10 good intent calls, 9 smoke investigations, 8 vehicle fires, 7 brush fires, 7 structure fires, 6 chimney fires, 4 assist the public calls, 3 assist the rescue, 2 illegal burns, 1 assist the police, a haz-mat drill and 1 false alarm.

The Fire Department is proud to announce that four additional members successfully completed State of New Hampshire Firefighter Level 1 Certification in 1991. The above certification is done over and above regular Fire Department training on their own time evenings and weekends.

With monies from the Forestry Department and the Fire Department combined we refurbished 50 Tanker 3 with a new water tank, plumbing, body work and complete paint job. We felt that this refurb was prudent as this is the only piece of apparatus that carries water than can go off road for forest, brush and grass fires. The water tank was of unknown vintage and leaking beyond feasible repair. The chassis is a sound 1953 Chevrolet, which warranted keeping it for refurb. For an approximate investment of \$5,000.00 we now have a forestry tanker that should give us as many years of continued service as it already has.

REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment processed seventeen applications during 1991, more than in any recent one-year period.

Of the seventeen cases, six were variances to set-back requirements which were all granted. One appeal was for a variance to the acreage requirement which was also granted. The Board denied two appeals for use variances, and approved a special exception for expansion of the tee areas at the Candia Woods Golf Links.

Seven applications for appeal of the Building Inspector's decision were processed in 1991. Of these cases, 4 appeals were granted and 3 were denied. This is a significant number of requests for administrative appeal which demonstrates that residents are paying closer attention to the meaning of the ordinance, and are challenging the decisions and/or interpretations of the Building Inspector regarding particular areas of the ordinance.

The Board received seven requests for rehearing in 1991, an unusually high number compared to previous year's activity. Of the seven requests, 2 rehearings were granted, both which resulted in reversal of the Board's first decisions. The other 5 requests for rehearing were denied.

REPORT OF THE AREA HOMEMAKER HOME HEALTH AIDE SERVICES, INC.

Area Homemaker Home Health Aide Service respectfully requests an allocation of \$1,000 from your town budget for 1992-93. Below are the statistics which show the services provided to residents of Candia for the twelve month period ending June 30, 1991, the cost of providing those services, and the sources of funds used to pay for the services. As you can see, we have had to raise considerable dollars beyond those received from State and County allocations in order to provide services to residents of Candia. We are aware of the impact of these difficult economic times, and have managed to hold the line of the hourly rate for service, but our hours of service to Candia residents has risen steadily in recent years. We are asking you to share more equally in the cost of services to residents of your community which are not covered by State and County funds.

Our purpose is to help people remain independent in their homes with dignity and happiness as long as possible, thereby avoiding the higher costs of steady increase in the number of frail elderly and elderly living alone who will need home care support services in the years ahead. Our policy has always been to try to serve all clients as needed without a waiting list. With your assistance we shall be able to continue this practice.

Our annual CPA produced audit will soon be completed and available if you would like a copy. Please let me know if you have questions or need further information. We appreciate your continuing interest and support in our efforts to serve the residents of Candia.

REPORT OF LAMPREY HEALTH CARE

Lamprey Health Care is requesting that the Town of Candia raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700 from the 1992 general town revenues in continuation of its support for the services provided by the Health Center. Candia residents are served by both the Medical Program and the Senior Citizen Transportation Program.

The Medical Program operated by Lamprey Health Care consists of six physicians (five Family Physicians and a Pediatrician), a Certified Physician's Assistant, two Nurse Practitioners and a support staff of office nurses. A Nutritionist, a Mental Health Counselor and Community Health Workers round out the medical team. In-office care is provided at centers located in Newmarket and Raymond, and hospital care is provided at the Exeter Hospital.

Lamprey Health Care provides a preventive health program including health education, screenings for diabetes, glaucoma, cancer and hypertension, as well as nutritional counseling and prenatal classes for pregnant women. Flu clinics are provided in the service area.

Lamprey Health Care provides prenatal care to young women from Candia who would not be able to get good care elsewhere because they are uninsured or unable to pay for it.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Program continues to be heavily utilized by Candia residents. In 1991, over 135 rides will be provided to residents of your community.

The busses from this program go directly to the homes of the riders and take them to needed services, such as medical appointments, food shopping, pharmacy and occasional recreational trips.

Lamprey Health Care also operates the Info Center which provides referrals to individuals looking for social service assistance or requiring other information.

Funds appropriated from your community are combined with funds from 25 other towns to provide local match. We believe that the dollars spent keeping elderly residents of your community independent and in their homes, as well as improving the healthy lifestyles of your residents, are dollars well spent. These appropriations are a critical component of each program's success.

We appreciate the continued support of the Town of Candia and will be happy to provide any additional information which you may need. Either Priscilla Shaw or myself will be available should you have any questions.

REPORT OF PLODZIK & SANDERSON PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION

In 1991, Plodzik & Sanderson Professional Association provided the Town of Candia with an overall review of its existing financial accounting and management reporting systems, including a review of the Town's internal accounting controls. We prepared a written report highlighting weaknesses and recommending changes to improve existing systems within the Town; the report, containing our comments and recommendations, is on file with Board of Selectmen's Office.

Plodzik & Sanderson also reviewed the current computerized accounting system and related internal financial reports to determine if the new Chart of Accounts will comply with the reporting requirements of the State Department of Revenue Administration. Inasmuch as Stephen D. Plodzik and Robert E. Sanderson are former employees of the Municipal Services Division of the State Department of Revenue Administration, our firm has maintained a close relationship with the Department Director and employees and is very familiar with the reporting requirements of the State.

A review of the records of the Tax Collector was also completed and we reconciled prior year's tax accounts to conform to generally-accepted accounting principles. In addition, we provided the necessary technical assistance to assure that the Tax Collector completely understood the system.

We also reviewed the present purchasing practices of the Town and made recommendations accordingly.

In conclusion, Plodzik & Sanderson met the specifications in the Town's request for proposal, and, we in fact exceeded your request. Within your budgeted fee of \$5000, we were also able to assist in the closing of the General Fund as of December 31, 1991, and we plan to work with the Town in the preparation of the annual State Financial Report (MS-5).

REPORT OF THE ROCKINGHAM COUNSELING CENTER

As you know, Rockingham County Counseling Center provides a valuable service to many individuals in need of counseling throughout Rockingham County. The current difficult economy poses two challenges for us here at the center:

1. Since many people have lost their jobs, and some even their homes, we have seen an increase of those looking for support, and
2. As a result of the economic downturn, our county funding has been eliminated and many of our funding sources have been cut back. So, we're faced with the dual challenge of providing more services with less funding.

We come to you today with the anticipation that we will provide \$149,175 in charged counseling services during 1992, \$49,228 of that will be collected in client fees based on a sliding fee. This means we must compensate \$99,947 worth of services provided by raising funds from towns like yours. This year we are requesting \$300 from the Town of Candia for the 1992 year.

Who are our clients? Our referrals come from your schools, courts, residents, physicians and human service agencies. Every day we help physical illness, chemical dependence, parenting skills and problems with their children, and a variety of other issues. In the past year we have actually seen an increase in referrals.

In 1991 we provided 8 client visits for residents of Candia, equaling \$650 in services with a contribution of \$0 from the Town of Candia. Rockingham Counseling Center subsidized Candia's residents fees by \$650. In past years we have relied on Rockingham County as a major source of funding, however, last year we were one of four human services cut from their budget. This means that we must find additional sources to compensate this \$15,000 loss.

We ask that you seriously consider our request so that we may continue to provide the residents of your community with the professional counseling that so many need, but may not be able to afford without Rockingham Counseling Center. We appreciate your support from years past and look forward to discussing our request with you further.

REPORT OF ROCKINGHAM COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM, INC.

Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. (RCCAP) is a private, non-profit corporation. Our mission is to serve the multitude of needs of Rockingham County's low income residents by assisting them in coping with the hardships of poverty, giving them the tools to lift themselves out of poverty and seeking to eradicate the root causes of poverty.

The Greater Raymond Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCCAP which serves residents of Candia and 14 other communities, and as such acts as Candia's central resource for information regarding all available human services.

The following services were provided by Community Action to eligible residents of Candia from July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991:

67 households received Fuel Assistance, 17 households received Supplemental Fuel Assistance, 2 homes were weatherized through the Weatherization Program.

7 children and day care providers participated in the Family Day Care Program, 6 child care referrals were arranged through the Child Care Resource and Referral Program, 34 women, infants and children received help through the WIC Program, 172 food packages were provided through the Surplus Food Program.

During the past year, we received 181 calls or visits from Candia residents, many of which were crisis calls involving fuel or utility problems, the lack of food or clothing or general financial needs.

The services provided by our staff, together with the programs provided by our agency, have a direct and significant effect on Candia's welfare budget. If our services were decreased, the town would experience a resulting increase in requests for local welfare assistance.

From July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991, Community Action provided \$65,507 in services to Candia residents. We are therefore requesting the town of Candia to contribute 4.5% of this amount, or \$2,948. The town of Candia has contributed to our agency for many years, and we extend our appreciation to you for your continued support.

REPORT OF ROCKINGHAM COUNTY NUTRITION PROGRAM

Rockingham Nutrition & Meals on Wheels Program respectfully requests funds from the Town of Candia to help in providing meals and services to your elderly and handicapped residents.

Last year, we 1) fed 36 Candia residents on a regular basis, 2) served meals 250 days during the year, and 3) provided additional social services to these Candia residents.

The Nutrition Program continues to provide hot, nutritious noon meals at several local centers, and delivers the same meals to those Candia residents who are homebound. In spite of the rising costs of such deliveries, we know how important those meals and the daily check on each individual are to your rural residents, and we are doing everything within our power to assure continuation of these services.

In addition to the hot noon meal, the Nutrition Program provides:

- weekend & holiday meals for those with little or no outside support
- “blizzard bags” for severe weather conditions
- special meals to celebrate holidays and other occasions
- home visits to check on service, client’s conditions & satisfaction
- activities like singalongs, games, speakers, etc.
- service time to “visit” with the homebound and perform minor chores
- referrals to other agencies and services

The Nutrition Program requests \$800 in town support for Candia meals. The following is a breakdown of people served and how we have determined our request:

We are funded by a variety of sources which we combine to buy each meal. Meals for “Title XX” clients are partially funded by Rockingham County, whereas meals for the remaining “Title III” clients are town and agency supported.

We recognize that town budgets are very tight these days, but the need for our services among Candia’s elderly and handicapped population has grown. We have kept our per person request at \$25 again this year in recognition of the budget difficulties Candia is facing.

We have been serving Candia residents since 1979. We continue to do our best to keep our requests reasonable, our costs under control, and our service good. REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

All dues-paying members of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission are offered a wide range of services, resources and technical assistance by a professional planning staff who, from time-to-time, are assisted by specialized consultants on an as-needed basis. Under the direction of your representatives, the staff develops and carries out planning programs that require a regional perspective, as well as those which pertain more directly to your community.

Local planning assistance requests are generally received from your Planning Board and/or the Board of Selectmen. With the concurrence of the Commission, certain general studies are conducted, notifications made and training workshops held that are considered essential for all member municipalities.

Services that were performed for the Town of Candia during the past year are as follows:

1. Provided testimonies to House and Senate committees in support of HB 391 dealing with impact fees. The Planning Board was notified of the final outcome.
2. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture meetings. These meetings were attended by Candia officials.
3. Conducted a six-hour training workshop for the planning board members. The Candia Planning and Zoning boards were invited to that workshop. A few members of the Planning Board attended.
4. Provided copies of Planning and Land Use Regulations handbook at a substantially reduced cost.
5. Prepared an outline of suggested criteria for minor site plan review; met several times with the Planning Board members and reviewed the draft regulations prepared by the Sub-Committee.
6. Provided a suggested schedule for 1991-92 Zoning and Building Code amendments to be voted upon at the March town meeting.

REPORT OF THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Visiting Nurse Association has been providing the residents of Candia with a full range of home health services since 1965. The VNA Board of Trustees and staff take this opportunity to reaffirm their commitment to excellence in health care, and to the provision of services designed to ensure that being cared for at home is safe, comfortable, and convenient.

VNA Home Health & Hospice Services, Inc. is Medicare and Medicaid certified, provides intravenous and enteral therapies; skilled nursing care; physical, occupational and speech/language therapies; nutrition counseling and medical social services; certified home health aides; Hospice care for the terminally ill; and long term care for the elderly and the handicapped. Medical equipment, such as beds and wheelchairs, is also available. Payment for service includes health insurance, and private payment. Fees are explained to our patients at the first visit to the home and for those unable to pay the usual fees, adjustments are made on an individual basis.

VNA Personal Services, Inc. provides private duty nurses, home health aides, homemakers, companions, personal care assistance and child care in the home.

VNA Community Services, Inc. provides free Immunization Clinic for all age groups monthly and Free Blood Pressure screening clinics. Watch your local paper for date and place. Foot Care clinics are held monthly at our 194 Concord Street office by appointment and blood pressure checks are done weekdays from 1:30 to 4:00 pm. Occupational Health programs are provided to business and industry on site. Parent-Child Health Services include the Teenage Pregnancy Program, the Parent-Baby Venture Program for children at risk of abuse and neglect, the Child Care Connection for child care providers, and the Training Program concerned with preventing drug and alcohol use among adolescents in high schools.

VNA Child Care Center provides a full-range of state-licensed child care, tailored to each child's needs. Programs include Infant/Toddler (ages 6 weeks to 36 months); Preschool (ages 3-5); and Kindergarten (age 5). The center also provides Extended Care, which is a before and after-school program for children grades 1 through 6, and special full-day programs during some holidays, school conference days, and school vacations. The summer session provides creative, fun programming for children ages 3 to 11.

Town appropriations, grants, United Way allocation and donations are a vital part of the funds that help to defray the cost of unpaid services. Representatives of the town of Candia serving on the VNA Board of Trustees are Helen Kendall and Sharon Cholette.

VITAL RECORDS

Dear Citizens of Candia:

I am including the following information as a preface to the pages regarding the Vital Records for the past year for the Town of Candia. This is an attempt to clarify the confusion regarding the duties of the Town Clerk when recording and reporting Vital Records, (births, marriages and deaths), for the Town Report. According to the Bureau of Vital Records of the State of New Hampshire, the Town Clerk is responsible for those events which occur in his or her town.

For example, if a person, whether resident or nonresident, is pronounced dead in the Town of Candia, I must record that death, issue copies of the death certificate, and send a report of that death to the State Bureau of Vital Records. However, if the person, even if he or she has been a lifelong resident of Candia, dies in another town, then it is the responsibility of the clerk of that town to send me an informational copy of that death for my records, but the clerk in the town of occurrence is the only person who may issue certified copies in that instance.

Most times, if the death occurs outside the Town of Candia, the clerk in the town of occurrence will send me an informational copy for my records. There are times, however, when this does not occur, and unless I am informed by a family member or another person who has knowledge of that death, I am unaware of it and the name will not appear in the Town Report. It is especially difficult to receive death reports when the person has died out-of-state.

I hope this information may help you better understand the situation, and I apologize if I have omitted someone in this year's Vital Records Report. If an omission has occurred, please contact me, and I will make certain that the information is included in next year's report.

1991 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Moderator A. Ronald Thomas opened the Annual School District Meeting at the Henry W. Moore School in Candia, New Hampshire on the ninth of March, Nineteen Hundred Ninety One at 5:02 pm. A moment of silence was held in recognition of Ed Wynot, who was a former member of the Candia School Board and instrumental in the decision to construct the Memorial Gymnasium in which the meeting is being held.

The Moderator recognized Chairman of the School Board, Joan Tancrede, who then went on to thank those assembled for coming, Lorraine Briand and Tanya Soha and the volunteer program, the C.Y.A.A., P.T.O., the Playground Committee, Curriculum Committee and the Budget Committee, who set a great example of doing something positive for the children in Candia instead of just complaining. Mrs. Tancrede also wished to thank her family and the staff at Country Rainbow. A plaque was presented to Richard Robidoux as a special Thank You. Mr Robidoux is retiring from the School Board, after serving for six years in such capacities as the Long Range Planning Committee, enrollment projection, the Budget Advisory Committee, and Clerk of the Works for the last construction project, saving the taxpayers thousands of dollars. Mrs. Tancrede stated she feels Mr. Robidoux's greatest ability is to see both sides of the issue and to reach a compromise. He will be greatly missed. Mr. David Cawley was also thanked at this time. He has been our Superintendent for many years, and is retiring this year.

The ground rules of the meeting were then explained by Mr. Thomas. The following School District officers and District staff were introduced: Christine Dupere, School District Clerk, Board members Rebecca Webster, Joan Tancrede, Chairman, Steve Russell, Principal of Henry W. Moore School, Board members Michelle Swain, Richard Robidoux and Robert Claver. Also introduced was John Handfield, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Superintendent David Cawley, Robert Leslie, Candia School District Attorney, Thea Bennett, Assistant for Administrative Services and Kevin Eckerman, Administrative Assistant for Special Education.

Since there was no objection from the floor, the following non-registered persons will be allowed to speak for informational purposes: Mr. Cawley, Mr. Russell, Mr. Handfield, Mr. Leslie, Mr. Bilodeau, and Ms. Bennett.

ARTICLE 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers of the District. Rebecca Webster moved that the reports of the agents, auditors, committees, and/or officers of the District as set forth in the annual report of the District be accepted and placed on file. The motion was seconded by Richard Robidoux. There was no discussion on the article. William Byrd was recognized by the chair for purposes of an amendment: "I move that Article 1 be amended to add the following: The District directs the School Board to each year, publish and include in the bound Annual Report of the Town of Candia, a budget report which shall list previous year's expenditures and next year's proposed budget." The motion was seconded by Sue Young. There was no discussion on the amendment, and when moved to a vote by show of hands, the amendment to Article 1 is adopted. There was no discussion on the amended article. Vote was taken by show of hands, and the amended Article 1 is ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1991-92 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. Motion to accept the article was made by Michelle Swain and seconded by Joan Tancrede. There was no discussion on the article, however, Mr. Byrd was recognized for the purposes of an amendment. "I have moved that Article 2 be amended to add the following: The District directs the School Board to continue to provide all current State and Federally funded programs (including Chapter I, Chapter II and School Lunch) for the 1991-92 school fiscal year. Appropriated funds for these programs are not to be used for any other purpose." Motion was seconded by Richard Lazott. Following Mr. Byrd's explanation, discussion, and a clarification by Mr. Leslie that the amendment would only be considered as advisory to the School Board, but would have no legal effect; followed. With no further discussion, a vote on the amendment was taken by show of hands. The amendment was DEFEATED. There was no further discussion on the original article. Vote was taken by show of hands and Article 2 was ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand and 00/100 (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be expended towards the community use of school facilities at the Moore School. Motion was made by Robert Claver, seconded by Rebecca Webster. The purpose of the article, explained Mr. Claver, was to deal with the issue of community use of the facilities. Prior to last year, a similar amount was always included in the budget to pay for the expenses incurred by community organizations when they used the facilities outside of the normal operating hours of the school. Following last year's budget cuts, the money was eliminated, and a fee was imposed on organizations for use of the facilities. This year, the Board wished to bring the article before the meeting and let the townspeople decide if they wished to have the taxpayer money go for this purpose or continue to have the organizations pay a fee. There was no further discussion. A standing vote was taken: Yes: 139, No: 165. Article 3 FAILS.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Six Thousand Seven Hundred Eighteen (\$26,718.00) Dollars as a deficit appropriation for the July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991 fiscal year to cover higher than anticipated costs for special education in the amount of Twenty Three Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Six (\$23,876.00) Dollars and special education transportation in the amount of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Two (\$2,842.00) Dollars for the 1990-91 school year. Motion was made by Joan Tancrede and seconded by Richard Robidoux. Discussion followed an explanation of the article by Mrs. Tancrede. Many were opposed to deficit spending, however it was felt the Board had no choice. Several were frustrated by the increasing number of federal and state mandates, but stated we should not take these frustrations out at the local level. Following discussion, a request for Secret Ballot on Article 4 was received, signed by sixteen registered voters. Yes: 197, No: 141, Article 4 is ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 5: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Joan Tancrede made the following motion: "I move that the District raise and appropriate Three Million Eight Hundred Twenty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Thirty Three (\$3,828,433.00) Dollars for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District." The motion was seconded by Robert Claver. The members of the board explained the budget line by line, including the differences in each account, to those assembled. Following the Board's description, the following motion was made by Susan Young: "I would like to make a motion to amend Article 5 to read: To see if the District will vote to separate Article 5 into two different sections, and vote on each section as a separate line item. For each section of the article, labelled Article 5A and Article 5B, the District would appropriate a fixed amount, that could not be transferred or overexpended. The first section would be called Article 5A and would address the lines that fund "all cost items relating to the teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1991-92 school year." The second section would be called Article 5B and would address "the sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

Until this year, the procedure described in this amendment, has always been used and included in the Candia School District Warrant that is presented at the Annual School District Meeting. Failure to adopt this amendment will do two things:

- 1) Deprive the registered voters of Candia, the RIGHT to vote on the current, and all future teachers' contracts! (salaries, insurance, and other benefits)
- 2) Deprive the registered voters of Candia, the RIGHT to vote on the level of funding to be specifically spent on the "support of the schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District." (books, supplies, equipment)

The motion was seconded by William Byrd. A point of information was requested by Earl Goodno, who wished to have an opinion from Mr. Leslie, legal counsel of the District, concerning the legality of this amendment. Mr. Leslie replied if the intention is to restrict the Board on how they may spend, then it would have no legal effect. During a brief discussion, Mr. Claver explained that the warrant has only been worded this way since they have had collective bargaining in the school. The reason for this is that the legal counsel, Public Employees Labor Relations Board and all the organizations which deal with collective bargaining said that was the way it needed to be done. However, following the Sanborn Regional School case which was decided last August, if a contract is legal and binding, then the voters can approve the contract as a whole when it is initially presented to the District. Once the District agrees to that contract initially, then the contract is set for the full term of the contract. The Board felt it would not be cost effective to have the existing contract disapproved, since the contract expires at the end of next year. Instead, the Board decided to go back to the Teachers' Union and ask them if they would work with the Board to amend the current contract to reduce the salaries. As a result, the existing contract has been amended. There was no further discussion on the Amendment to Article 5, however, since a request had been

received by sixteen registered voters, vote was taken by Secret Ballot. Yes: 99, No: 252, the amendment is DEFEATED.

Discussion then resumed on Article 5. Ron Hadley moved that Article 5 be amended to replace the dollar amount with the new amount of Three Million Four Hundred Nineteen Thousand Three Hundred Thirty (\$4,193,330.00) Dollars, seconded by Diana Watts. Mr. Byrd was then recognized to speak to the amendment. A lengthy discussion then ensued, with many of those questioning where these cuts could be made. Mr. Byrd, however, did not offer a solution. A request to move the question was made by Donald Belcourt, seconded by Muriel Belcourt. Vote was again taken by Secret Ballot. Yes: 100, No: 240, the Amendment to Article 5 FAILS.

Discussion then continued on Article 5. William Byrd moved to amend Article 5 to replace the dollar amount with the new amount of Three Million Four Hundred Eighty Six Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Three (\$3,486,423.00) Dollars. The motion was seconded by Susan Young. A lengthy discussion of the new proposed amendment then followed. Many continued to question where further cuts could be made. Mr. Coleman pointed out that statistics could be used to suit any purpose, however the bottom line is our children. Both Rudy Cartier and Dick Robidoux stated our students are scholastically successful. Mabel Brock stated that the reason that the costs have become prohibitive because of legislation, and it's time to take a good hard look at our state legislature and our federal congress to see what they are enacting. It's time we changed our laws. Tommy St. Martin requested to move the question. The vote on moving the question passes. We move to a vote on the amendment to Article 5, by Secret Ballot. Yes: 102, No: 235, the Amendment to Article 5 FAILS.

Discussion continues on Article 5. Mr. Belcourt states that we have heard a lot of rhetoric and requests to move the question. Moderator Thomas rules Mr. Belcourt out of order because of insufficient debate on the article. Mr. Gaydos calls for point of order to challenge the ruling of the Moderator. A vote by show of hands is then taken. A yes vote means the Moderator is overruled; a no vote means debate continues on the article. Vote by show of hands declares the Moderator Overruled. Vote by Secret Ballot is then taken on ARTICLE 5, which reads as follows; That the District raise and appropriate Three Million, Eight Hundred Twenty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Thirty Three (\$3,828,433.00) Dollars for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Yes: 206, No: 117, Article 5 is ADOPTED.

Motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Richard Robidoux and seconded by Joan Tanerede. The School District Meeting of the Town of Candia was adjourned at 10:34 pm.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Parents & Members of the Community:

I wish to provide you with the annual Principal's Report for the 1990-91 school year.

A decline in the economy, rising unemployment and the climbing cost of living, are continuing to limit the level of educational services that can be made available to children everywhere. The community of Candia has felt these pressures just as have other towns throughout New Hampshire and the nation. The "old news" is that budget cuts have resulted in significant reductions in programs, staff, and the availability of learning materials. The "new news" is that as a result of the efforts of many citizens working together, the school district continues to work to "make the most of what we've got". The end and most important result is that children are learning!

The credit for this years accomplishments goes to many people: the citizens of the community of Candia who have volunteered over 4,000 hours of their time to support school activities, to our fine staff of teachers and support personnel who continue to go "above and beyond what's outlined in their job descriptions", and to our students, whose boundless enthusiasm and energy for learning is truly remarkable!

The challenges of the 1990-91 school year were met in many ways. Our school newsletter and local newspaper coverage was emphasized (and appreciated). We wanted to let people know about all of the good things that are happening here! In the classrooms and in the areas of curriculum, the review and updating of the Mathematics and Science curriculum was completed, our student report cards were improved and a new five year curriculum development cycle was adopted. We also worked to continue our work in the areas of children's literature, writing, and "hands-on" practical approaches to mathematics, through Literature Week, the Read-It Program and the Grandparent Volunteer Program, to name a few. The results of the California Achievement Tests administered to students in grades 4 & 8, supported the value of our efforts in these areas. Once again, our students scored at and above state levels.

Schoolwide programs continued to flourish as our Wellness Team was quite active in promoting health awareness through a variety of school and community activities. Our annual Spelling Bee and Invention Conventions were held with our student winners competing at the state level.

Our annual school concert, recycling program, Music-Art Presentation, Memorial Day Ceremony, Junior High School social activities, field days, and other established activities for students, continued through the support and efforts of many "unsung heroes". (You were probably one of them!)

In the area of Special Education, we worked to reduce the number of students who were placed outside of our school district. In classrooms, we worked to provide students who have special educational needs with services within the classroom instead of pulling them out for extra help. Within the school, the COACH Program was started. Like its name, this program was developed to link our older students as "coaches" with our younger students during recess activities. The result: everyone benefitted!

As the year draws to a close, I would like to recognize Superintendent David Cawley for his many years of service to Candia's children as he retires from service. I would also like to extend my sincere thanks to everyone who helped to make the 1990-91 school year a productive one: The Candia School Board for the countless hours that they put in to the support of the Candia School District, to the SAU office staff for their ongoing work and support of our efforts and to the Henry W. Moore School staff, students, parents and community members. Thank you.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT – 1990–91

After twenty years as Superintendent of Schools for the Candia School District this is my final report, as I retired from my position on June 30, 1991.

I leave with mixed emotions. The good friends I have known throughout the years will be remembered always. The staff at the Candia Moore School, parents, and citizens of the district have devoted their efforts which have been beneficial to the students. I would not hesitate to state without question the students have been my first priority over the years.

As we are all aware there are several factors related to a student's complete education which are constantly changing, whether due to new and/or revised federal, state, or local mandates. Future challenging adjustments will be dealt with accordingly. The variety of programs offered today certainly exceeds those available at the onset of my career. While we must consider the financial status of the entire community we do strive to maintain high quality education.

During the 1990–91 school year the Candia School District provided special education services to 104 students. Two of these students attended pre-school programs, 10 were placed in private special education programs, 4 attended public schools in other districts and 24 attended public high schools. The remaining 64 students were served at the Henry W. Moore School. Of the 24 high school students, eight graduated in June. Their plans after graduation included work, the armed services, two and four year colleges.

The Cooperative Resource Program continues to serve the educational needs of Candia's students well. During the year one student was integrated into this program from a private special education placement on a part time basis. The goal for 1991–92 is to have this student learning with his friends and neighbors full time.

The Candia School District continued to strive to meet Elementary Minimum Standards. As the school year came to a close six more standards were met, leaving eleven to be addressed.

The cycle of curriculum review continued in the school district with work being done in the areas of science and mathematics instruction. This ongoing effort will ensure that the students at the Moore School will receive a curriculum that is both relevant and up-to-date.

The Candia School Administration struggled to contain operation and maintenance costs through the 1990–91 school year. They should be commended for their great efforts.

During this very slow economy, the Candia School District continued to struggle to maintain a self-supporting School Lunch Program for 1990–91. The Program will continue to strive to provide a nutritious meal at \$1.25 each.

My wish for the future of the school would be for each and every student to achieve her/his highest aspirations. Based on past dedication and motivation from parents and teachers, I am confident their goals will be realized.

My sincere appreciation is extended to the Candia School Board, the Central Office staff, the staff at the Candia Moore School, parents, community citizens, and students who made my lengthy term as Superintendent so pleasurable and rewarding.

SCHOOL AUDITOR'S REPORT

Dear Madam,

We have carefully examined the financial books and records of the Treasurer of the Candia School District and of the Food Director for the fiscal year ending 30 June 1991, compared them with the annual financial reports, and find them correctly cast and well vouched.

In light of the current crisis in the banking system in New Hampshire, we would strongly suggest that the School District Treasurer immediately negotiate a collateralization agreement with the Cornerstone Bank to ensure the safety of any funds in excess of the FDIC protection limit of \$100,000 for the total amount of all accounts in a single institution using the same taxpayer ID number, or ensure that the cash flow requirements of the School District never cause the FDIC protection limit of \$100,000 to be exceeded, or transfer School District funds to a bank that will collateralize the funds. It is further recommended that the School District, if it has not done so previously, obtain their own taxpayer ID number, separate from the taxpayer ID number of the Town of Candia, to prevent the possibility of the combination of Town and School District funds in a single bank exceeding the FDIC protection limit.

The School District Treasurer is maintaining a manual set of books and a separate checking account to record and control the receipts and expenditures of the food service fund. We would again recommend that the SAU study the advisability of including the details of the receipts and expenditures of the food service fund in their computerized accounting system and combining the payment manifests into a single manifest. We presume that the computerized accounting system used by the SAU is sophisticated enough to be capable of maintaining multiple funds for reporting purposes while still combining payments into a single manifest. This would also allow the treasurer to eliminate the separate food service fund checking account. We are not aware of any regulation(s) that require that the actual monies associated with the individual funds be physically separated, only that the accounting of the funds be reported separately.

We are pleased to see that the School Board and the Board of Selectmen are officially addressing the issue of cash flow and payment schedules. As we have pointed out in the past, the Department of Revenue Administration considers it advisable for towns to have a cash management program to allow treasurers to maximize the return on investments and to minimize the costs of borrowing in anticipation of taxes. We continue to believe that there are significant opportunities for improvement in this area.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANDIA SCHOOL BOARD

Dear Candia Residents:

The opening of school in September 1990 saw many changes as a result of budget reductions voted at the March district meeting—health, gifted and talented, field trips, classroom aides, high school counselor, and all co-curricular activities were eliminated and reductions were made in many other areas. Despite this setback, it was rewarding to observe the continued progress of our students as well as the many citizens and parents who volunteered their time and efforts to the school.

The Candia School Board continued working on meeting the NH Minimum Standards, residency issues and complying with the recommendations of the health, fire, and building inspectors.

There are several sub-committees of the school board which involve the community, parents and staff. The curriculum committee revised report cards and updated the science and math curriculums – a major area of emphasis in education today. Middle school programs and related issues were reviewed and will be explored at length during the coming year.

The budget and finance committee reviewed SAU function, special education regulations, and the budget process.

The negotiations team was successful in reaching an agreement with the Candia Education Association which resulted in a reduction in the existing 3 year teacher's contract.

The School Board continued their work on high school issues – student placement, programs and tuition costs. The board signed a contract with Raymond enabling our Candia students to have a choice for their high school education.

The school board continued to encourage providing local programs for our special education students. The unpredictable costs of tuition, transportation in the special education field continue to place a burden on our school system.

A new scholarship program for high school students was established by Hiram and Doris Mitchell.

The March school district meeting was a true lesson in democracy and local citizen involvement. A great effort by the CARE group and other concerned parents resulted in the passage of the budget as recommended by the school board. This will result in restoring some of the programs and materials that had been eliminated.

Special thanks and goodbye to Dick Robidoux who retired from the board in March. He contributed a unique ability to listen to all opinions and seek an acceptable solution. George Bergevine was elected and his background in the special education field will be of great benefit. Goodbyes also went to David Cawley, Superintendent of Schools for SAU #15 who retired in June. The SAU Board had spent months in search of a new

superintendent for Candia, Auburn and Hooksett. Dr. George Cunningham was selected and assumed the position in July.

Sincere thanks to all the volunteers and citizens who took the time to make a difference in the education of their children of Candia. In a difficult year, you made the difference!

We urge all the citizens of Candia to get involved in their schools! These are the children that are the future!

CANDIA SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT, IN THE TOWN OF CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Candia Moore School in said District, on the seventh day of March, 1992, at five o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following articles:

- (1) To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers of the District.
- (2) To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 198:20-b providing that any school district at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific recession of such authority, the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district, money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year.
- (3) To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to deed the building known as the District #1 Schoolhouse ("Corner School") to the Candia Historical Society for preservation purposes at such time as the right and title to such property may revert to the School District upon no longer being used by the Candia Improvement Club under terms of a conveyance deed to the Candia Improvement Club recorded in the Rockingham County records on May 13, 1925. Said transfer to the Candia Historical Society for preservation purposes to be on such terms and conditions as the School Board shall determine are in the best interests of the District.
- (4) To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Three Thousand, Eight Hundred and Thirty-One Dollars (\$33,831.00) to fund an increase in teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1992-93 fiscal year. Such sum of money represents costs attributable to an increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable under the existing Collective Bargaining Agreement.
- (5) To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand and 00/100 (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be expended towards the community use of school facilities at the Moore School.
- (6) To see if the District will vote to create an expendable general trust fund under the provisions of RSA 198:20-C. to be known as the school building maintenance fund, for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the school building. Furthermore, to name the School Board as agents to expend and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) toward this purpose from the June 30, 1992, excess revenue fund balance, if any, existing on that date.
- (7) To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE BURNING REGULATIONS

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not completely covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 am and 5:00 pm unless it is raining and the Forest Fire Warden is notified and grants permission to burn in the rain.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day the burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly-constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from the Candia Forest Fire Warden or a Deputy Forest Fire Warden and you may reach them at the phone numbers listed below. Permits may be obtained between the hours of 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm on the day the burning is to be done.
