TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Odd Fellows' Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for Memorial Day.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred fifteen dollars and twenty cents (\$615.20) for Town Road Aid, to which the state will contribute two thousand four hundred sixty dollars and eighty one cents (\$2,460.81).
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for summer maintenance of roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of the highway department.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

8. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the Tax Collector to make on poll taxes after October first.

9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund agreeable to the Laws of 1943, chapter 160 and the Session Laws of 1947, chapter 8.

13. To see what action the town will take regarding permanent repairs to the Depot Road from East Candia Depot to Dearborn Hill. On petition of Harry Purslow and four-teen (14) others.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the installation of not more than twenty (20) street lights at suitable locations for the convenience of the general public at a cost of \$23.50 per light per annum and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for maintenance and improvements to cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen and superintendent of cemeteries.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for improvements to Moore's Park.

17. To see if the town will vote to observe during the month of August 1949, the 50th anniversary of Old Home Week and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for white pine blister rust control, the money to be spent in co-operation with and under the direction of the State Forestry Department.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$63.00 (1/100 of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1948 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with the 37 other communities in the region.

20. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

21. To see what action the town will take to establish a Building Zone Ordinance for the Town of Candia.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for repairs to the Fitts Museum.

23. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to close at 6 P. M. unless otherwise voted at the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equaling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing co-operation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your co-operation in this way is earnestly solicited.

During the past year women of Candia sewed 99 girls' dresses for foreign service. Two layettes were assembled for local distribution. The following garments were knit: 3 coat sweaters, 2 V neck sweaters, 18 beanjes and 6 afghan squares.

A children's clinic has been held each month, at which time medical attention and advice has been given under the direction of Dr. Herman Sander.

During July and August a water safety program was inaugurated. About 40 children enrolled and were transported to Crystal Lake for instruction and swimming. Much enthusiasm was shown by both parents and participating children. Six beginners and 10 chapter certificates were awarded.

It is hoped that this water safety program may again be carried on during the coming summer months and more young people may have the opportunity to obtain instruction in swimming and water safety.

I wish to express my appreciation to all who have assisted in both time and money to make these Red Cross activities possible during the past year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Candia:

It is with pleasure that I present to you my second annual report of your school organization and educational activities. Such recommendations as are herein suggested are made because of the increasing scarcity of teachers, the continued growth of pupil enrollment, and the steady rise in costs of books, supplies, equipment, labor, transportation, tuitions, and fuel.

May I express my thanks and appreciation to the School Board, Janitors, Teachers, Pupils and all other individuals and organizations that have helped in any way to improve the educational conditions in the schools of Candia.

After the close of the school year last June, Mr. Rittenburg left our school system. Miss Jean P. Harding of Keene and Worcester, Mass., was elected to teach in Grades 7 and 8. Miss Lois B. Hazelton was appointed principal of the school and Miss Mack and Mrs. Machacek returned to the same grades. The following is a list of the employees of the district:

The principal reason was to forecast the children of the state for future educational purposes. In studying Table II, it is interesting to note that (1) from 1947 to 1960, with the peak enrollment in 1958, there is a gain of nearly 10 million children in the schools of the country—24,500,000 to 34,200,000—; (2) peak enrollments begin in Grade 1 in 1954 and 1955 and continue for each succeeding year until 1960 when the peak comes in Grades 6, 7, and 8; (3) the growth in Grade 1 is higher during the 10-year period than the high school growth; (4) the peak of the elementary school enrollment is reached in 1957 while that of the Grand Total comes in 1958 and the high school in 1960; (5) the high school growth holds quite steady from 1947 to nearly 1958 although in one or two years it is retarded. However, there is no question of the great increase in the growth of the schools of the country in the next ten years and the taxpayers must face that fact and provide accordingly. Costs of instruction, current costs, building needs and costs, total costs, and costs within the schools themselves brought about by curriculum changes, methods of teaching, equipment needs, and the general school trends must be studied very carefully if an adequate budget is to be maintained.

Achievement tests have again been administered to all the children of your schools together with mental ability tests. Data is in the files which is proving very valuable to the teachers in their study of individuals and remedial work.

This work should be enlarged and continued. Over a period of years it should prove valuable in guiding boys and girls in their individual differences in their educational, physical, social, and emotional growth.

High School tuition is getting to be one of the most important factors in the budget. The tuition rates for the past three years have increased from \$123.69 in 1946-47 and \$138.89 in 1947-48 to \$158.74 in 1948-49. The indications for the year 1949-50 are that this tuition will reach in the proximity of \$170.00. If enrollments are on the increase as is shown in Table II, then this item in the budget must be well provided for.

To parallel the tuition increase, we must, at the same time, understand and provide for the transportation of the boys and girls of the town. This is an item which the law makes mandatory under certain conditions and according to the records means upwards to 115 boys and girls. This item should be given careful study with the thought that it might be more economical and better to have the town own its own buses. It has been proved that this is true in all cases that have so transferred school district ownership from private or contract ownership. However when the final decision is made, transportation must be continued for another year and adequate provision must be made.

Books and Supplies must be purchased for the use of the children in our schools. We do not have to look very far to know the reason for the increased costs of these items. Material and labor costs together with distributing costs have been the main factors in this situation. We are fortunate in having contacts that have made it possible to reduce to some degree these increasing costs. These items must have adequate support.

The National Education Association has set up a three-point program for a drive for education. This program is bound up closely with the teachers of the country. In the drive for more teachers for the schools it emphasizes (1) the raising of certification standards; (2) the drive to meet the shortage of elementary teachers; and (3) to improve the pre-service education of the teachers already in service with workshops and similar study. We lost a greater part of our best teachers during the war in spite of any argument to the

contrary. We are still trying to lure teachers to the profession with the promise of more money and better working conditions. Your teachers are your most important personnel except the children themselves and whatever can be done to make them contented and happy will surely reflect upon the growth and development of your children.

The following Table tries to show the salary comparisons as published by the State Department in a recent survey in the state in the towns of similar or the same equalized valuation. It is very gratifying to note that the Town of Candia for 1948-49 has been among those which believe in adequate salaries for its teachers.

Probably one of the most important items that the district must face this year is the matter of State Aid for Schools. During the past two years the District of Candia has received approximately \$700.00 each year from the State Department of Education for equalization and general aid to schools. This money was forthcoming from the amount raised by the passage of the State Aid Education Bill at the last legislature. The bill went out of existence at the close of the calendar year 1948. In order for the towns in the state to continue to receive this money, a new State Aid Bill must be passed by the present legislature. There is such a bill already in committee for the purpose of raising the money for the next two years to pay each school district. There is, however, a movement on foot in the General Court and the Governor's office to return to the old formula in paying state aid. This will mean that Candia will lose between \$3000 and \$4000 from the State. Under this old formula the governor hopes to raise considerable less money. If the towns of the state are cut a similar amount to that of Candia then the taxpayer must raise that amount to meet the estimated budget set up by the School Board of the town which means a higher tax rate.

In discussing the foregoing items and problems connected with the budget and the schools which must be met by the men and women who pay the bills, I am trying to place before you in a frank and earnest manner the most important factors which not only confront this town, but also every other town in the state. Education is the greatest problem in the United States today and the only people who can solve it are you and I and many more people like us. I most urgently evoke your attention and study.

Again may I express my appreciation for your confidence in my endeavors to make the School of Candia a living factor for a better life in the community.
