## TOWN WARRANT

---

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, New Hampshire,  
in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to  
vote in Town Affairs:*

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Odd Fellows Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Symth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred and seventeen dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$617.98) for Town Road Aid to which the State will contribute four thousand one hundred and nineteen dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$4,119.89).

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for summer maintenance for roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of the highway department.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand and five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and twenty-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$328.80), for maintenance of the "RED-

PHONE" Fire Alarm System for fiscal year. The money to be disbursed under the supervision of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

8. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the Tax Collector to make on poll taxes after October first.

9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund agreeable to the Laws of 1943, chapter 160 and the Session Laws of 1947, chapter 8.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for maintenance and improvements to cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen and superintendent of cemeteries.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for improvements to Moore's Park.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00), (1/100th of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1952 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with the 37 other communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for painting and repairs to the Fitts Museum.

17. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of



the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately twenty-four dollars (\$24.00) to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

18. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

19. We the undersigned residents, commercial users and other users of Brown Road in the town of Candia, N. H., do hereby petition the town of Candia, N. H., to install a proper asphalt top on said Brown Road and to raise and appropriate monies for same. The length of said road, which is approximately one and one-half miles long, extends from the residence of Mrs. Etta Brown to the State Highway, Route 101. There are twelve occupied dwellings on said Brown Road and seventeen children which are or will use the facilities of the town school bus.

We submit the following reasons:

1. To give the doctors access to the residents of said road.
2. To insure accessibility of the Fire Department to said road at all times.
3. To facilitate continuous function of the town school bus on said road.
4. To insure delivery of the United States Mail on said road.
5. To avoid the constant overflow of water and wash-outs at various parts of said road.
6. To make the road passable to commercial users.
7. To reduce undue expense to privately owned motor vehicles of persons who reside on said road.

On petition of Walter E. Pitman and twenty-seven (27) others.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the care, maintenance, and improvement of the town dump or take any other action relative thereto.

22. To see if the town will vote to apply the principal and accumulated interest of the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund to the cost of such new or expanded school buildings as the Candia School District may vote, and to transfer said moneys and take such other action as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of this Article, all agreeable to the Laws in such case made and provided.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to reinstall and maintain the blinking traffic light at the Candia Four Corners at the intersection of Routes 101B and 107.

24. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, by an issue of bonds, to be redeemed over a period of five years, a sum of money, not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) which is the approximate estimate of 1/3 of the cost of building a new bridge over the North branch of the Lamprey river at Candia Village. The remaining two-thirds of the cost to be paid by the State of New Hampshire.

26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the land, which was the former town hall site, at the Candia Four Corners.

27. We, the undersigned Voters of Candia, N. H., respectfully petition that the following be inserted in the Town Warrant for the town meeting in March 1953:

To see if the town will vote to order the town taxing authority to send invoices to the taxpayer who received unfair and unjust reductions on their assessments for 1953, or take any other action relative thereto.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

*To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Candia, qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Odd Fellows' Hall in said district on the 7th day of March, 1953, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the construction, equipping and furnishing of an addition or supplementary unit to the Moore School, so called, and for such purpose to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$56,000.

10. To see if the district will vote to borrow in the name and on the credit of the district by the issuance of serial bonds, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws of 1942 and any amendments, supplements or revisions thereof, a sum not exceeding \$56,000 for the purpose of constructing, equipping, and furnishing an addition to the Moore School, so-called, and to authorize the School Board to determine the terms and conditions upon which such bonds shall be issued, including the time and place of payment of principal and interest and the rate of interest, and to do whatever may be necessary to the issuance of such bonds.

11. To see if the district will vote to appoint a building committee, consisting of three persons to be appointed by the moderator, to advise with the School Board in supervising the construction of said addition to said Moore School, providing that the plans and specifications shall be finally approved by the School Board acting alone as required by law, and to further authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction, equipping and furnishing of said school addition.

12. To see if the district will transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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February 1, 1953

*To the School Board of Candia:*

It is a privilege and a pleasure to present to you my sixth annual report of the educational system of the Town of Candia. May I take this opportunity to express my appreciation for your kindness, patience, courtesy, and honesty in conducting the affairs and problems of the district and hope they may be equally well-conducted in the coming year.

### *Teachers*

The teaching staff remained constant during the year except for one member who was called into the Marine Corps of the United States, Miss Nancy G. Duran of Manchester. We were very fortunate in securing Mrs. Martha Guinness of Derry to take her place for the remainder of the year and so far she is doing a very satisfactory piece of work. Mrs. Elizabeth Hadley, because of her experience with Mrs. Ford in the Candia lunch program, was engaged to organize and administer the lunch program at the George B. White School in Deerfield. She was replaced, upon the recommendation of Mrs. Ford, by Mrs. Clara Watson of Candia.

### *State Aid to Education*

As you will note, our district lost \$1500 in State Aid during the past year. Perhaps Candia was more fortunate than some of the other towns in this situation since her State Aid has been \$10,000 for the past two years. However, because of the new families still moving into town to live and send their children to school, this amount must be continued if we are to have the economic base for further development. You will understand very easily when you study the chart below showing a 100 per cent increase in school population in the last ten years, that unless more aid is forthcoming the education of the children of the town cannot help but suffer, especially when you compare the aid received from other states. Do you realize that Maine sets aside \$6,000,000 for state aid to education each year; Vermont, \$2,500,000; West Virginia, \$39,000,000; Virginia over a million dollars alone for visual aids; Washington State, \$150,000,000; but New

Hampshire, 47th on the list of states in the United States for aid to education, sets aside \$400,000 and rumor has it that we may get almost \$900,000 when this new legislature adjourns this summer. It would seem that we have now reached a point in the education of the children of New Hampshire where we must ask each and every representative to the General Court just where he stands in education.

### *The Budget*

In studying the budget for 1953-54 you will find that the greatest increases will be found in teachers' salaries and transportation. However, tuition may have to be changed if and when the result of the vote of the school boards where we send our high school children is increased. At the present time the amount for tuition is the same as this year. You will find other increases, but there are also a few decreases, which will help to hold the total to a reasonable figure. All in all the estimated increase over a year ago is \$8,425.53 and this will be found in salaries and transportation.

### *Expansion*

When a taxpayer sees an increase in the expenses of government he immediately tries to find the cause. And the cause of the increase in the budget for schools for 1953-54 can be readily traced to the direct increase in the number of children who are attending and will attend the schools.

The School Board, because of this increase, proposes the addition of another teacher to the staff for the next school year. This action is based not only on the enrollment for this year, but also on the census report as of September 1, 1952 and for the next five years. Again, in the chart below you will note that there is not a class in the school for next year which will be below 20 pupils or more than 45 pupils. You will note, also, that unless a teacher is added to divide grades 7 and 8 there will be at least 46 pupils next year and this number will increase every year as far as we are able to judge with the data at hand. There is no person in the town, in my judgment, who wishes to so handicap any child to this extent. At least, that has been the stand taken by the School Board and that is the reason for the added teacher.

There is another problem, however, which, in my opinion, will need to be watched very closely. This problem may call for a more radical change as well as the addition of the second teacher. Again you are referred to the chart below. This chart shows an expected and estimated 27 pupils in

Grade One in September 1953 and 45 pupils in Grade Two. Since there are about 40 pupils in Grade One at the present time, these figures for next year show that there are a few pupils not now in the school who will desire and demand to enter Grade Two when it begins in the fall. However, it would be very bad education as well as insulting to any teacher to expect her to even try to teach 45 pupils in one grade, especially in Grades 1, 2, or 3. Therefore, unless there is another or second teacher elected, it will be necessary to ask the teacher in Grade One next year to take those new pupils who are expecting to enter the room of the teacher who would usually take Grade Two youngsters. This Grade One teacher would then find herself teaching two grades mentally, so-called, but only one grade emotionally, physically, and socially. This would, without doubt, give each teacher about 36 pupils each which, according to all educational standards, are still too many for any one room or any one teacher. Parents are urged to think this matter over very carefully because unless something is done, your children will be the ones who will be as handicapped as the large group for children in Grades 7 and 8.

This expansion carries over also into the transportation of the children of the town. It has been necessary to increase the mileage this year and if you would ride around the town you would see quite a number of homes where parents will demand that their children be transported as was required of the School Board by the State Department of Education during the present school year.

It is not hard to understand why the schools in the State have increased in cost when you study the data showing the number of children coming to them every year.

Every taxpayer in the town knows how many rooms there are in the Moore School. We NEED at LEAST two more rooms. We have no assembly room so very essential to modern education. If addition is made to the present building other facilities must be changed to carry the load including heating, the kitchen and sewerage, and the toilet facilities. With the new air base to be constructed not too far away, perhaps a long range plan should be drawn up and developed as needed. Surely the present auditorium, basement space, and lunch facilities have been sacrificed in the educational process because somewhere, somehow, a definite plan has not been developed which has had vision and the future welfare of the children of the town as the paramount issue. This is your school and these are your chil-

dren. Unless some provision is made for the opening of school in September 1953, desks and chairs will be set up in the corridors with movable blackboards and teachers will be asked to do their best under those conditions.

I hope these problems involving increased enrollments will be studied carefully and very seriously because it means a decision vital to the future of the children of the town as well as the town itself.

May I again thank the School Board, parents, children, and citizens of the town for the help they have kindly extended to the educational growth of the school. May this help and understanding continue for the coming year.

NOTE: You will note that in estimating the number of children to come to the school, there is not a class for the next 10 to 15 years which will have less than 20 pupils. This means that if we double up with two classes for each teacher, the number for each will be over 40 pupils. This means that something must be done and done immediately. You will note, also that we must have another teacher beginning in September 1953. If this is not done the one teacher now will have at least 45 pupils. Then again, we are going to have a large second grade class for next year and this class will continue all through school. This will handicap this class very materially.
