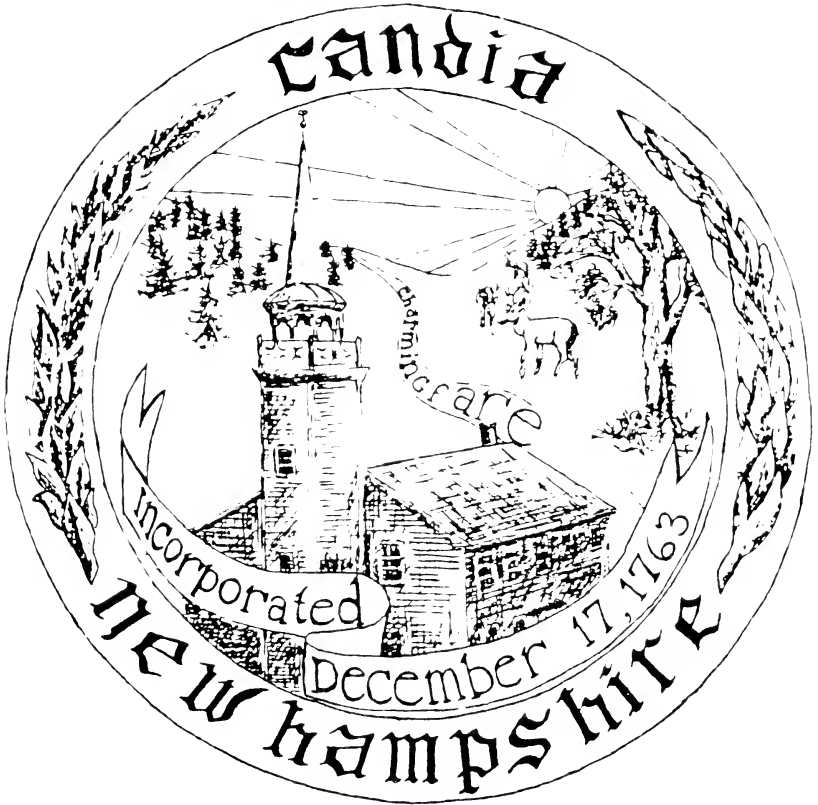

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning and building regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by secret ballot.

You are hereby notified to meet on Friday the fourteenth of March next at seven thirty in the evening at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$1,700.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Newmarket Regional Health Center.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty-Three Dollars and no cents (\$3,953.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association and Home Health Care Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., to defray the Agency's activities in the Town.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Raymond Ambulance, Inc.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand, Seven Hundred Eighty-Two Dollars (\$1,782.00) to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote and raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$500.00) to be paid to the Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit, social service agency.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$4,000.00) for the operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Recreation Association.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$7,000.00) to Candia Rescue. Such funds to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue and to be disbursed to Candia Rescue by April 30, 1986.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$30,000.00) to the Smyth Public Library Association of Candia. Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$22,000.00) of these funds to be used for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library, and Eight Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) of these funds to be used for repairs to the roof of the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be expended under the direction of the trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association of Candia.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$30,000.00) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. These monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1986.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$16,000.00) for the purchase of firefighting protective clothing for the members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department. These monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association and paid on receipt of the protective clothing.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Fifteen Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$15,800.00) for a complete 1986 Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) for a new Highway Wing and Plow and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Two Thousand Two Hundred, Fifty-Five Dollars and no cents (\$2,255.00) for the reconditioning and preservation of Candia's Town Record, Volume #1 and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$20,000.00) to be deposited into the Town Office Capital Reserve Fund. Said monies to remain in the Capital Reserve Fund until a Town Office Building Plan is approved by the Town.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$13,000.00) for the purpose of assigning and installing numbers for structures in the Town of Candia. The

monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Board of Selectmen and the committee formed for this purpose.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to pave Currier Road from New Boston Road to Deerfield-Candia line approximately three quarters (3/4) of a mile at a cost, not to exceed Forty-Nine Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$49,000.00). Submitted by petition from the following registered voters of the Town of Candia:

Article 17. We, the undersigned, in compliance with RSA 231:157 Scenic Road; Designation and RSA 231:158 Effect of Designation as Scenic Roads, hereby petition to see if the Town of Candia will vote to designate PATTEN HILL ROAD (beginning at Main Street traveling approximately 6/10 of a mile southeasterly up to and including The Audobon Society and Abe Emerson Marsh) as a Scenic Road for the purpose of prohibiting the removal of ornamental and shade trees in order to protect the natural scenic beauty and character of the Town of Candia. Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment to appoint alternate members pursuant to RSA 673:6.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare and amend a recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects in accordance with the provisions of RSA 674:5 and 674:8. Said program will classify projects according to the urgency and need for realization; will recommend a time sequence for their implementation; and contain estimates of costs, possible revenue and source of existing and additional funds needed for each project.

Article 20. To see if the Town will adopt an ordinance waving the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who was captured and incarcerated for thirty (30) days or more while serving in a qualifying war or armed conflict as defined in RSA 72:28, IV, and who was honorably discharged, provided the person has provided the City or Town Clerk with satisfactory proof of these circumstances.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to change the manner by which the position of Auditor is filled from election to authorizing the Board of Selectmen to employ a Certified Public Accountant to carefully examine the accounts of the Town Candia pursuant to RSA 41:31-1.

Article 22. To see if the Town is in favor of a Three year term (3) for the Town Clerk of Candia, term to begin in March of 1987. By petition of eleven registered voters:

Article 23. To see if the Town is in favor of a three year term (3) for the Treasurer of the Town of Candia, term to begin in March of 1988.

Article 24. To see if the Town is in favor of a three year term (3) for the Tax Collector of the Town of Candia, term to begin in March 1989.

Article 25. To see if the Town will adopt written Welfare Guidelines as approved by the Board of Selectmen. Chapter 380 of the New Hampshire Laws of 1985 requires the Town to adopt written Welfare Guidelines prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of proposed text of guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk.)

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, pursuant to RSA 31:95-b.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board, pursuant to RSA 674:43 I, to review and approve or disapprove site plan for the development of tracts for nonresidential uses or for multi-family dwelling units. It shall be the duty of the Town Clerk, pursuant to RSA 674:43 II, to file with the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds, a certificate of notice showing that the Planning Board has been so authorized and giving the date of such authorization.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless any employee, or board member or officer of the Town for loss or damage to him or her while acting within the scope of his or her employment or office, all as provided in RSA 31:105.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and raise the sum of Four Hundred Ninety-Seven Thousand One Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$497,100.00).

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept such funds as are made available to the Candia Forest Fire Warden, under the Rural

Development Act of 1972, Title IV.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed.

Article 35. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

CANDIA TOWN MEETING MARCH 15, 1985

Moderator A. Ronald Thomas called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm in the Moore School Auditorium. Mr. Thomas discussed the ground rules for the meeting, stating that no smoking would be allowed in the hall, the meeting was a public meeting, and therefore open to all who wished to attend, however only registered voters would be allowed to take part in the discussion. Mr. Richard Lahr would be allowed to speak on behalf of the Raymond Ambulance Inc. if there were no objections. The meeting was also being video taped as a student project. A modified form of Robert's Rules of Order would be followed.

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) in continuation of its support of the Newmarket Regional Health Center. Motion was made by Marietta Binette and seconded by Don Coleman to accept the article as read. Mrs. Binette spoke briefly to the article, explaining some of the services of the Lamprey River Clinic, which is affiliated with the Newmarket Regional Health Center. There was no further discussion, and when put to a vote, Article 1 was passed.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand dollars and no cents (\$4,000.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Raymond Ambulance, Inc. Motion was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Richard Gilbert to accept the article as read. Richard Lahr, president of Raymond Ambulance, Inc. was invited to speak to the article. Mr. Lahr explained that the cost of each run the ambulance makes costs approximately \$75.00. At this time, the money that Raymond ambulance was receiving from the town only covered about \$23.00 of that amount. In order not to have to charge the patient for this service, they were requesting that the town contribute a greater portion towards their share. No further discussion was held on Article 2, and when put to a vote, it was passed.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Three dollars and no cents (\$3,953.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association and Home Health Care Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., to defray the Agency's activities in the Town. The motion was made by Janet Manter and seconded by Linda Thomas to accept the article as read. Janet Manter then spoke to the article. There was no discussion, and when put to a vote, Article 3 was passed.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Three dollars and no cents (\$1,463.00) to be paid to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. Motion was made by Helen Wilson and seconded by Irvine Whitcomb to accept the article as read. Mrs. Wilson then spoke to the article, explaining the role of the Community Action Program. She stated that in the past year 69 households in Candia received fuel assistance, 4 households were weatherized, 1 home received

help with a furnace, 1 home was repaired to prepare it for weatherization, 29 children received meals, and 10 women were involved in the WIC Program to help pregnant and nursing mothers and children under five receive proper nutrition. Mrs. Wilson stated that this program helps to reduce welfare, and is devoted to helping people. 2½% of the services provided to the Town is what is asked for as a contribution from the Town. When put to a vote, Article 4 was passed.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred dollars and no cents (\$3,500.00) for operating expenses of Candia Recreation Association. Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Candia Recreation Association. Motion was made by Betty Thompson and seconded by Don Coleman. Mrs. Thompson spoke for the article, stating the money was used for the summer program as well as to help with the winter ski program. Mrs. Brock wished to know what would happen to the program this summer when the school parking lot was being re-paved. Mrs. Thompson stated that the children did not use that portion of the school yard. There was no further discussion, and when put to a vote, Article 5 was passed.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00) to the Fitts Museum. The money to be spent under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. Motion was made by Mabel Brock and seconded by Richard Gilbert to accept the article as read. Mrs. Brock spoke to the article, explaining that the Museum is open to the public Saturdays from 2-5 pm in July and August, and also will open for special requests. The money requested will be spent to repair the windows on the front of the building and install storm windows. The cost of this work will be \$750.00. In addition, the remaining \$250.00 will be spent for cleaning miscellaneous supplies, and consultations. Mrs. Briand wished to know if the cold affects the items, as the building is not heated. Mrs. Brock answered that it does to some extent, however it is better for most of the items than being exposed to extremes of temperature and dry heat. There was no further discussion on Article 6, and when put to a vote, it was passed.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Six dollars and Fifty cents (\$1,466.50) for the purchase of a DUKANE 16/35 Rollfilm Reader, motorized, with spare lamp and dust cover; to be used by the Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, and Town Tax Collector, and based in the Town Clerk's office for the reading of Vital Records. Motion was made by Christine Dupere and seconded by Richard Gilbert to accept the article as read. Mrs. Dupere then spoke for the article, explaining that the microfilming of all permanent records is required by law. The original Town Records dating from 1763 were being stored at the Town Clerk's Office, and many of these were in very poor condition. The Town Clerk has to use their books for information searches and Geneology requests, and because of their condition and historical significance to the Town, these should not be handled. These documents are one-of-a-kind, and some are deteriorating to the point where soon they won't be able to be reproduced. Microfilming has already been done for the permanent records of the Town Treasurer and Tax Collector, as well as some of the Selectmen's records. We now need a reader to be able to use this material and avoid

further damage to the original Town records. There was no further discussion, and when put to a vote Article 7 was passed.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred dollars (\$100.00) and no cents for the development of a comprehensive long range plan, including estimated costs and schedules, for the repair and refurbishment of the roads in Candia. Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen. Motion was made by Don Coleman to accept the article as read and seconded by Charles Bowman. Mr. Coleman spoke to the article, outlining the method to be used to take care of the Candia roads. On the preliminary study, the roads had been segregated by their condition. The basic plan to upgrade the roads was one that would enable persons residing on a poorer road to get onto a good road and then reach a main artery as easily as possible. The \$100.00 would cover the costs of the committee so that a long range plan could be brought before the Town at the next Town Meeting. No further discussion took place on this article, and when put to a vote, Article 8 was passed.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand dollars and no cents (\$6,000.00) to the Candia Rescue. Such funds to be expended under the direction of Candia Rescue and to be disbursed to the Candia Rescue by April 30, 1985. Motion was made by Bill Stewart and seconded by Len Wilson to accept the article as read. Mr. Stewart then spoke to the article, and as there was no further discussion, Article 9 was put to a vote and passed.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand dollars and no cents (\$20,000.00) to the Smyth Public Library. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association. Motion was made by Richard Hobbs and seconded by Linda Thomas to accept the article as read. Mr. Hobbs then spoke to the article, citing the report of the library Trustees on pages 45 and 46 of the 1984 annual Town Report. There was no discussion on this article, and when put to a vote, Article 10 passed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Nine Thousand Four Hundred dollars and no cents (\$29,400.00) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. These monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Fireman's Association, Inc., and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1985. Motion was made by Len Wilson and seconded by James Wilson. Len Wilson then made a motion to amend Article 11 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Nine Thousand dollars and no cents (\$29,000.00) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. These monies to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc., and be received in full on or before April 30, 1985. His ammendment to Article 11 was seconded by James Wilson. Leonard Wilson then spoke for the ammendment. He stated that the Department had changed from Raymond to County dispatch, which was the reason for the \$400.00 decrease. The ammendment was then voted on and passed. Leonard Wilson then spoke to the ammended article. He stated that there was a \$2,000.00 increase in insurance, due in part to the new fire truck, there was also an increase in

maintenance costs and utilities. Mabel Brock wished to know why the Town had to pay these monies in full by April 30, 1985. She was told that the Firemen's Association then invests it to earn interest which in turn is used to defray expenses. Mr. DiMaggio wished to know what the equipment costs were incurred on, and was told that these included Communications Equipment, such as the radio, firefighting equipment, gear, hoses, and nozzels. Mr. Godfrey also wished clarification on the April 30th cut-off point for the monies. Chief Wilson then referred to page 39 of the 1984 Town Report, and said that the Firemen's Association asks for operating costs, and the interest the money earns is equal to what would have to be requested from the Town in additional revenue. There was no further discussion, and the ammended Article 11 was put to a vote and passed.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand dollars and no cents (\$14,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds to purchase a 1985 Police Cruiser. Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Chief of Police. Motion was made by Normand St. Onge and seconded by Dennise Wilson to accept the article as read. Chief of Police St. Onge then spoke to the article, stating that the cruiser now in operation had well over 200,000 miles on it and was constantly needing repair. He stated that the cost of the new cruiser would be \$11,963.00, with the balance to be spent for new lights and siren. Mrs. Wilson wished to know how much in Revenue Sharing Funds we could be assured of, especially since President Reagan had cut that portion of his budget. Mr. Coleman replied that we now had \$38,655.40 in our account, and we had already been allotted \$5,410.00 from this year's share of our funds. Mr. Coleman also stated that a Public Hearing had been held November 19, 1984 to discuss options and uses of Revenue Sharing Funds for the coming year. Article 12 was then put to a vote and passed.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Seven dollars and no cents (\$2,107.00) from the General Revenue Sharing Funds to purchase monitor pager receivers, with chargers and carrying cases, for the Police Department. Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Chief of Police. Motion was made by Normand St. Onge and seconded by Sue Young to accept the article as read. Mr. St. Onge then ammended the article to read: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Four dollars and no cents (\$2,464.00) from the General Revenue Sharing Funds to purchase monitor pager receivers, with chargers and carrying cases, for the Police Department. Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Chief of Police. This ammendment was seconded by Sue Young. Chief St. Onge explained the increase was due to an increase in the cost of the equipment. The vote on the ammendment passed. Chief St. Onge then stated that because we have a part-time Police Department, the pagers were needed to reach the officers in an emergency situation. The ammended Article 13 was then voted on and passed.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand dollars and no cents (\$2,000.00) from the General Revenue Sharing Funds for the purchase and construction of Playground Equipment at Moore Park.

Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen. Motion was made by Roger Leavitt and seconded by Helen Wilson. Mr. Leavitt then spoke to the article stating that there was a real need for a safe playground area. Mrs. Galanis stated that she would like to see Moore Park cleaned up. She also wished to know how decisions are made regarding the park. Mr. Dimaggio stated tht the Boy Scouts have cleaned up the park at least twice this year, and there is a real problem with beer drinking and keeping lights in operation. Christine Fonda wanted dumping at the park to be discontinued. Shirley Erving wished to know what had happened to the light since we were being charged for the electricity. Mr. Gilbert explained that someone had shot it out, and the new bulb has been purchased and should be replaced this week. Mrs. Paquette wished to know what was the status of the fill operation from Brown Road, and what about the illegal dumping-is it being cleaned up? Mr. Gilbert replied that it had been cleaned up and they were waiting for the State Inspectors. Mr. Gilbert also explained that the Little League field would be moved back so that other groups could use the other portion of the park. Article 14 was put to a vote and passed.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand dollars and no cents from General Revenue Sharing Funds for a Town Office Building. Said monies to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen. Motion was made by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Helen Wilson to table the article indefinitely. A vote was then taken and Article 15 was then tabled.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand dollars and no cents (\$3,000.00) from the General Revenue Sharing Funds to be deposited into a Capital Reserve Fund for a Town Office Building. Said monies to remain in the Capital Reserve Fund until a Town Office building plan is approved by the Town. Motion was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Helen Wilson. Mr. Coleman then ammended the article to read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee of seven to study the proposed location for a town office complex to be presented to the 1986 Town Meeting. The committee to consist of one member of the Board of Selectmen, a member from the Planning Board, one member from the Fire Department, Conservation Commission, Police Department, and two members from the general public. Also the first portion of the article to read: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand dollars and no cents (\$20,000.00) from the General Revenue Sharing Funds to be deposited into a Capital Reserve Fund for a Town Office Building. Said monies to remain in the Capital Reserve Fund until a Town Office building plan is approved by the Town. This ammendment was seconded by Sue Young. Mr. Coleman explained that the reason for this ammendment was that the details were not clear enough for a definite plan. With a committee made up of various individuals and public meetings, a definite plan could then be presented at the next Town Meeting, Mr. Closs wished to know whether the committe would be funded in any way. The answer was no, it would not be necessary. Mrs. Erving wished to know whether this money could be used to build a new building or remodel an existing structure, and was told it could be used for either. Mrs. Manter wished to know whether these monies could be used to buy land and was also told yes. Mrs.

Brock expressed the urgent need for a Town Office Building and wants a time limit set as to when the committee would report back to the Town. Mr. Coleman stated that they must work to present sound plans to the Town. Mrs. Fonda wished to know whether land obtained for non-payment of taxes could be used for the building. The answer to this question was also yes. Mrs. Wilson wished to have a special Town Meeting called, and also would like to see a published report in three or four months on the progress of the committee. Shirley Erving said this should be done no later than 1986. Richard Snow said to get it done this year. Mrs. Galanis pointed out that she was sure the Selectmen would be able to obtain community help in this project. Mr. Coleman also stated that no monies would be spent before coming to Town Meeting again. He also suggested defeating this amendment so that one with clearer intent could be proposed. When put to a vote this amendment was defeated.

Mr. Coleman then made the following amendment to the amendment, so that Article 16 would read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand dollars and no cents (\$20,000.00) from the General Revenue Sharing Funds to be deposited into a Capital Reserve Fund for a Town Office Building. Said monies to remain in the Capital Reserve Fund until a Town Office building plan is approved by the Town. In addition; to see if the Town will vote to establish a committee of seven to prepare the Town Office building plan to be presented at a Town Meeting no later than the 1986 Town Meeting. The committee to consist of one member from the Board of Selectmen, a member from the Planning Board, one member from the Fire Department, Conservation Commission, Police Department and two members from the general public. This was seconded by Sue Young. Mr. Closs wished to know if there would be additional funding needed. The answer was no, as the committee would be coming up with a schematic plan. There was no further discussion, and the vote taken on the amendment to the amendment was passed. A vote was then taken on the amended Article 16, and this also was passed.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the election format for Town elections from non-partisan to partisan. Submitted by petition:

Motion was made by George Albert and seconded by Janet Manter for an indefinite postponement on Article 17. The article was postponed indefinitely.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to systematically assign street addresses by number throughout the Town. The committee to consist of the Postmaster of Candia, a member of the Police Department, a member of the Fire Department, a member of the Candia Rescue, a member of the Planning Board and a member of the Board of Selectmen. Motion was made by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Linda Thomas to accept the article as read. Mr. Gilbert explained that the numbering system would make it easier to find people. Mr. DiMaggio also stated that this was a project which was being undertaken by a candidate for Eagle Scout. Len Wilson also said that this

project was not intended to straighten out the mail in Candia, but to number each individual house, which could be a great time saver in an emergency situation. Mrs. Briand stated that there seemed to be ambiguity in the article, and people might get the idea that it was designed to improve the postal system, and that this was not the case. Several other people spoke in favor of the house numbering system. When put to a vote, Article 18 passed..

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an increase in the annual salary of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen from One Thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to One Thousand Two Hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) and to raise the annual salary of the other two Selectmen from Eight Hundred Fifty dollars (\$850.00) to One Thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each. Motion was made by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Don Coleman to accept Article 19 as read. Mr. Gilbert explained why he felt the Selectmen needed a raise. Mrs. Cartier wished to know approximately how many hours were spent on business each week, and was told around 20 hours. Mr. Coleman felt that it was necessary to review the salary of all Town Officials. Mrs. Galanis stated that she wouldn't be a Selectman for all the money they could pay her! The Article was then put to a vote. Article 19 failed.

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Fifty Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty dollars and no cents (\$450,960.00) which is the portion of the budget not already acted upon. Motion was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Albert Hall III to accept the article as read. Mr. Coleman explained what the remainder of the budget consisted of and referred to pages 15 and 16 in the 1984 Town Report. Mr. Snow amended the article to read: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Fifty Thousand Four Hundred Sixty dollars and no cents (\$450,460.00) which is the portion of the budget not already acted upon. This amendment was seconded by Shirley Erving. Mr. Snow then went on to say that this was the amount saved when the previous article, Article # 19, was not passed. Mr. Claver wished to know why \$20,000.00 dollars in legal fees was projected for next year. Mr. Larson replied that in part, this was due to the lawsuit that the Town was now involved in with Mr. Robert Marier of Granite State Refuse. Mr. Stewart asked if the suit was an insured loss. Mr. Larson replied that if no malice is shown, the insurance company will represent them, however, if malice is shown then the burden will fall to the Town. Mr. Soha wished to know what the building fees reflect. Mr. Gilbert replied that the Building Inspector is paid by turning in Issued Occupancy Permits at \$25.00 each, which is the fee for inspection. The inspection occurs in three stages: the foundation is inspected, then the raised structure with rough wiring and plumbing, and finally when the building is finished. Mr. Claver wished to know how the \$12,000.00 was to be spent for the Master Plan. Mrs. Brock replied that most of the work would be hopefully done by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. What was the increase in incinerator costs? Mr. Gilbert stated this was due to trucking our ashes to Rochester. Russ Dann asked what happens to the money from the glass collected at the dump? Mr. Gilbert replied that the money goes to the incinerator operator, and that this amounts to approximately fifty cents per barrel or \$140.00 for a dumpster load, Mrs. Byrd stated that far more revenue is received from the recycling of aluminum cans. Mr. Snow felt that the monies collected from the sale of these items should go back to

the Town. Article 20 was put to a vote and passed.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept or expend such funds as are made available to the Candia Forest Fire Warden under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV. Motion was made by Kendall Brock and seconded by Sue Young to accept the article as read. Mr. Brock then spoke to the motion explaining that this money would be used to maintain and repair forest fire equipment. Article 21 was put to a vote and passed.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes. Motion was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Shirley Erving to accept the article as read. Mr. Coleman spoke to the article. Mr. Godfrey wished to know what the interest rate was and was told it came somewhere between five and six percent. Mr. Archambault wished to know the type of investments which were made. Mrs. Erving explained that the type of investments a Town can make are regulated by law, and these include Certificates of Deposit and Money Market Accounts. Article 22 was put to a vote and passed.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year. Motion was made by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Don Coleman. Mr. Gilbert spoke to the article. There was no discussion, and when put to a vote, Article 23 passed.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. Motion was made by Don Coleman and seconded by Richard Gilbert to accept the article as read. Mr. Coleman explained that this would enable the Selectmen to accept grants, etc. without having a special Town Meeting. There was no discussion, and when put to a vote Article 24 was passed.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed. Motion was made by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Don Coleman to accept the article as read. Mr. Gilbert spoke to the article and was asked by Mr. Claver if any property had been involved this past year. None had been. Many of the lands acquired in this way are kept for conservation purposes. Mrs. Hall stated that many times it is very difficult to get clear title to a piece of property. There was no further discussion, and when put to a vote Article 25 passed.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Moderator Ron Thomas then decreed it was time to appoint the customary and traditional positions of Viewers of Fences and Scaler of Timber. Once again by unanimous vote (except for Mr. Young!), Sue and Dean Young were appointed Viewers of Fences. Also unanimously Alfred Brown was appointed as Scaler of Timber.

Mr. Gilbert told the assembly that a ceremony is being planned for Henry Mowles, who served as Tax Collector for forty-one years, in appreciation for what he has done for the Town.

Mr. Wilson proposed a resolution that the Town Clerk compose a letter from the Townspeople of Candia, thanking Mr. Mowles for his many years of service to the Town.

Mr. House wished to also thank the Selectmen for their entertainment of this past year!

The meeting was adjourned at 10:26 pm.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year of 1985 has seen a renewed spirit of cooperation in our town. Thanks to many, many hours of volunteer effort, our ongoing school and municipal programs have been strengthened and new beginnings have been made possible.

While the Town Hall Committee works on proposals for a new facility, the Board of Selectmen has taken steps to increase the efficiency of the present Selectmen's Office located in the school building. The office has been repainted and rearranged, and storage shelves have been added. A new plexi-glass enclosed case in which to post town notices was provided completely by donated materials and labor. A computerized payroll system allows better access to current information and reduces the possibility of error. The hiring of two part-time secretaries has allowed us to keep the Selectmen's Office open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, beginning in January 1986.

Policies and procedures are being developed for all departments to improve record-keeping practices, fairness in hiring and making appointments, cooperation between departments, and communication with the public.

At Moore Park, the Army Corps of Engineers continued to help improve the area beyond the ballfield. The Candia Youth Athletic Association is working to develop a plan for improved sports facilities. After careful organization and with funds approved at Town Meeting, community volunteers installed a new playground at the park in one day.

The town roads continue to present a challenge. Repair and paving was completed on North Road. The Selectmen met with Hook Road residents and began work to widen and improve it. The new Route 101 was opened in December, creating new patterns of traffic flow. The outline of a Long Range Road Plan presented at Town Meeting in March needs to be researched more fully in the coming year, so that we may begin to upgrade, repair and maintain the town road system in an informed, comprehensive manner.

1985 saw the retirement of Henry Mowles, who served our town as Tax Collector for many years. On behalf of the townspeople, the Selectmen would like to express our appreciation for his dedication to Candia.

The Board of Selectmen welcomes your involvement in Candia's town government. Candia faces complex challenges in the coming years, as we strive to keep pace with the anticipated record growth in our population while preserving our town's friendly, rural character.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Candia Volunteer Fire Department responded to 117 calls in 1985, this is a 60% increase over 1984. These responses are broken down as follows: 33 vehicular accidents, 17 brush fires, 12 chimney fires, 10 smoke investigations, 8 structure fires, 8 service calls, 7 mutual aid calls, 7 vehicle fires, 4 stove fires, 4 wires fires, 2 bulldozer fires, 2 dumpster fires, 1 television fire, 1 bomb threat and one full scale drill including mutual aid.

The Candia Volunteer Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to discuss Smoke Detectors. Home fires are a serious threat to your family's safety. More than 6,000 people die and over 300,000 are injured each year by fire in residences. Many of these fire injuries and deaths are caused by smoke not flames. A closer look gives an important clue to a way that those frightening numbers can be reduced. Many deaths and injuries occur in fires that happen at night, while victims are asleep. A Smoke Detector is a reliable way to awaken these sleepers before the smoke becomes unbearably dense and would help more people escape uninjured.

If you're not certain, maybe you share some of the misconceptions that make many people underestimate the danger of death from night-time fires. For example: "The smell of smoke will wake me." It might, if acrid-smelling smoke were the only thing produced by a household fire. Unfortunately, many home fires smolder for hours before they burst into open flames. And while this incomplete combustion is taking place, large quantities of toxic gases, including carbon monoxide, are produced. Carbon monoxide is the same odorless, tasteless and colorless gas that causes death when people breathe automobile exhausts in a closed garage or because of a leak in a car's muffler. If you're awake, you may feel a headache and dizziness. If you're asleep when the gas enters your room, you probably will never wake up. "There's usually plenty of time to get out." Possibly, if you're awake and if you have time to round up the family and if none of them inhaled too much smoke or carbon monoxide before you woke up. The spread of toxic gases long before flames become visible and noisy may not give you enough time. "Fires only happen to other people." This is perhaps the most dangerous idea of all. And it's probably just what all those "other people" thought before their fire occurred. Well, just how effective are they." They won't prevent fires, they won't protect your property (especially if you're not home), and they won't put the fire out for you. But they will increase your chances of getting up, getting out and calling the fire department. If anyone has any questions about smoke detectors such as how they work, which type to buy, how many to buy, where they should be placed or how to maintain them please feel free to call on a member of the fire department to answer your questions.

The officers and members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department wish to express their sincerest thanks to the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Ladies Auxillary for their continuing support, again from all of us thank you very much.

INFORMATION NEEDED BEFORE ISSUING A FIRE PERMIT

1. What is going to be burned? Brush cannot exceed 5" in diameter.
2. Where is it going to be burned? How far from nearest structure, trees, and dead vegetation or overhead phone or power lines?
3. When do you want to burn? Date and time of day.
4. Is material to be burned material resulting from the demolition of buildings? Air Pollution approval required.
5. What do you have for fire protection?
6. How much help will you have during the burn?
7. Do you own the land where you plan to burn? If not, do you have the landowners approval?
8. If your fire is declared a nuisance, will you be able to extinguish same? Air Pollution officials could require fire to be extinguished if smoke is a nuisance.
9. Are there any tires or tubes in the material to be burned? Non are allowed.
10. Notice! Permits issued during rain are void if the rain stops. Your fire must be extinguished at that time.
11. Be sure your fire is completely and totally extinguished.
A buried fire is not an extinguished fire.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last 50. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulations is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulation; however your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectman for timber tax forms.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

The past year has been a time of change for the library. Edna Brown retired in April, after more than 23 years of service as librarian. Her contributions to the growth of the library over the years will be long remembered. Also retiring this year, after many long years of service to the library association, were trustees Leonard Chace and Irvine Whitcomb. Their dedication and expertise will be missed.

The Smyth Public Library Association originated in 1888 "for the purpose of caring for the preserving the Library donated to said association by Ex-Gov. Smyth, for the use of the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, NH", and was chartered by the State of New Hampshire in 1933 as a private, not-for-profit corporation. The library's collection of books, reference material, and other educational material has been housed since 1935 in the present 1200 sq. ft. facility located at the intersection of High Street, South Road, and Healy Road. This handsome, colonial brick building was the gift of Marion Smyth, the widow of Ex-Governor Smyth.

In the years since the dedication of the building, the town has grown and the material being housed in the library has also grown. Where fully half of the available space was once dedicated to a reading room, almost all the present floor space is dedicated to storing reading material. In recognition of this overcrowded condition, the trustees, with the help of a generous donation from the late Mrs. Francis Sargeant, obtained the services of an architect and a library consultant, to begin to develop a concept for an addition to the present facility and to get some architectural sketches and cost estimates. This effort is now complete, and we expect to begin the task of raising the necessary funds immediately. Donations can be made to the Smyth Public Library Building Fund at the library or at the Derry Bank and Trust Company in Candia.

The Smyth Public Library is open twenty-five hours each week, during the following hours:

Tuesday	1:00 PM to 8:00 PM
Wednesday	1:00 PM to 8:00 PM
Thursday	1:00 PM to 5:00 PM
Friday	9:00 AM to 12:30 PM
Saturday	9:00 AM to 12:30 PM

Story hours for preschool children is held on Saturday mornings at 10:00 AM. Volunteers to help with this program, are welcome and appreciated. Contact your librarian, Joyce Snow, or your assistant librarian, Claire Zarges, at the library (483-8245). A special note of gratitude goes to the Friends of the Library for their continuing support and assistance to the library. Contact Mrs. Dorothy Martin, president of the Friends, if you want to help.

The following inventory and circulation figures for the last three years serve to highlight the direction of the use of the library and its growth. Total circulation has increased over 50% in the last ten years, from just under 8,000 volumes in 1975 to almost 12,700 volumes this year. Circulation is showing a consistently modest decline among the adult population as people no longer have time to read, while the juvenile circulation is exploding as more and more

young families move into town. From the beginning of 1983 thru the end of 1985, the total number of volumes available in the library has grown 15.5%, in response to the changing needs of the population.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

A wide variety of services, resources and technical assistance is made available to your town through the dues-paying membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. A professional planning staff, assisted by consultants in certain disciplines for which the Commission does not employ a full-time staff, work under the overall direction of your representatives in developing and carrying out planning programs that are deemed important for your community as well as for the region.

Staff services provided under the Commission's local assistance program are mostly decided by the communities themselves. However certain general studies, notifications or acquisition of resources which are deemed useful to all member-municipalities are also made under this program with a directive of the Commission.

Local Assistance services provided to the Town of Candia during the past year were as follows:

1. At the request of the Board of Selectmen, provided a copy of "A Community Addressing System";
2. Met with the Planning Board to discuss the possibility of Candia's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program;
3. Updated the town's base map showing the new alignment of NH 101;
4. Purchased the 1981 aerial photos for the Town of Candia, in the scale of 1" = 400', from the U.S. Department of Agriculture;
5. Provided the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen with a suggested schedule for public notices and hearings pertaining to zoning and/or building code amendments to be considered at the March 1986 annual town meeting; and
6. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series to which Candia town officials were invited.

THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION of MANCHESTER and SOUTHERN, N.H.

Founded in 1897 the Visiting Nurse Association has an 89 year history of providing home health services to the greater Manchester community. The service area includes Auburn, Bedford, Candia, Goffstown, Hooksett, Manchester, Amherst, Milford, Mont Vernon, and other towns by arrangement. VNA is accredited jointly by the National League for Nursing and the American Public Health Association. It carries Medicare and Medicaid certification and receives partial program funding from the Greater Manchester United Way.

VNA Home Health Services provides nursing and aide services 7 days a week and 24 hours a day, with other services and therapies provided on a regular service schedule. These services also include comprehensive care for terminally ill and continue to be the program serving the largest number of residents.

VNA is committed to providing necessary services to people who are financially unable to pay the usual fees. Therefore, fees are explained to our patients at the first visit to the home and adjustments are made on an individual basis.

VNA Community Services continues to provide Immunization Clinics, Adult Health Screening Programs, including Blood Pressure Screening and Foot Care Clinics monthly throughout the community. Other programs include the Occupational Health Services Program and the Parent Child Health Programs which includes the Teenage Pregnancy Program. Walk-in Blood Pressure Screening, health counseling and education are provided Monday - Friday from 1:30 - 4 p.m. at the 194 Concord Street, Manchester office.

Town appropriations, grants, United Way and donations are a vital part of the funds which make these services possible for residents who are unable to pay. The town of Candia is represented on the VNA Board of Directors by Mrs. Janet Manter.

REPORT OF THE ROCKINGHAM COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM, INC.

The Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. (RCCAP) is a private, non-profit anti-poverty agency which has served residents of Rockingham County since 1965. The Greater Raymond Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCCAP which serves 15 towns in the central part of the county, including the town of Candia.

In the 15 towns served by the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, well over 1,200 households are experiencing financial problems serious enough to leave them without the means to provide basic necessities. Of these, nearly 40% are elderly individuals or couples living on fixed incomes. The remaining 60% include the disabled, the unemployed, the underemployed, single parent families and the working poor. Regardless of their particular situations, all of these people are forced to seek outside assistance to meet their most essential needs.

Community Action plays an important role in meeting these needs by offering direct service programs as well as the help and guidance of our agency's staff. Of the major direct service programs offered by Community Action, the following were provided to eligible residents of Candia during the past year:

- 66 households received Fuel Assistance, a program which provides a financial grant of up to \$500.00 to assist with energy-related expenses.
- 4 homes were weatherized through our Weatherization Program, which provides quality materials and labor to weatherize homes in order to reduce heating costs and conserve energy.
- 1 household received help through the Heat Source Repair Program, which provides for the repair or replacement of furnaces and heating units for low-income homeowners.
- 10 children were provided meals from a private day care homes which participate on our Rockingham Family Day Care Program.
- 15 women, infants and children received help through the WIC Program, which offers supplemental nutritious food to pregnant women, nursing mothers and children up to the age of 5 who are nutritionally at risk.

In addition to these major programs, much of our staff time is devoted to working with people who came to us seeking help. During the past year, we received 299 calls or visits from Candia residents, many of which were crisis calls involving fuel and utility problems, the lack of food or clothing or general financial needs. By working closely together with local, county and state welfare administrators, fuel and utility companies, other human service agencies and interested church and civil groups, we are able to link those in need with the services available to them.

Since the services we offer greatly relieve the towns we serve from full burden of providing for the needs of their low-income residents, we ask every community we serve to make a financial contribution to our agency based upon the 3½ percent of the total dollar value of services provided during the previous fiscal year, which means that we request \$3.50 for every \$100.00 we provide in direct services.

From September 1, 1984 through August 31, 1985, Community Action provided \$50,900.00 in services to Candia residents. We are therefore requesting the town of Candia to contribute 3½ percent of this amount, or \$1,782.00. The town of Candia has contributed to our agency each year we have requested funds, and we extend our appreciation to you for your continued support.

REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center will complete its fifteenth year of service in the Spring of 1986. The Newmarket Regional Health Center operates two medical offices, one in Newmarket and the other in Raymond, the Lamprey River Clinic. Both facilities provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services and short-term counseling with referral to area mental health agencies.

In January the new facility of the Lamprey River Clinic opened on Route 27 in Raymond. The new 6,200 sq. ft. facility will allow the Health Center to provide more services in a spacious and modern facility to the residents of the Raymond area. The renovation and expansion of the Newmarket center is scheduled to begin in the Spring of 1986.

In 1985, Edward Benoit, M.D., a family practitioner, joined the staff as did Cynthia Rasmussen, M.D., an obstetrician/gynecologist. Other members of the medical staff include Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Karen Brainard, M.D., Michael Lewis, PA-C., Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P. and Anne Fawcett A.R.N.P. The medical team also includes registered nurses, medical assistants, and community health workers. The Health Center is affiliated with the Exeter Hospital where patients needing hospital care are admitted.

The Health Center offers a Prenatal Program under the direction of Dr. Rasmussen, which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care. In addition, the Health Center offers nutritional counseling and prenatal classes.

The community health workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaisons between the medical providers and patients.

The Newmarket Regional Health Center also operates a Self-Care Program for the Elderly in conjunction with the Occupational Therapy Department of the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this program is to enable the elderly to stay in their home setting as well as to maintain a quality of life and independent status within their community. The focus of the program is to provide self-care skills before disability occurs and to anticipate problems with functional activities. The Newmarket Regional Health Center continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. Three of the five buses are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. The transportation service enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the means to needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. Dear Citizens of Candia:

I am including the following information as a preface to the pages regarding the Vital Records for the past year in the Town of Candia. This is an attempt to clarify the confusion regarding the duties of the Town Clerk when recording and reporting Vital Records, (births, marriages, and deaths), for the Town Report. According to the Bureau of Vital Records of the State of New Hampshire, the Town Clerk is required to record only those which actually occur in his or her town.

For example, if a resident or non-resident dies in the Town of Candia, I must record the death, issue copies of the death certificate, and send a copy of the certificate to the State. However, if the person, even if he or she has been a life-long resident of Candia, dies in another town, then it is the responsibility of the clerk of that town to send me an informational copy of that death for my records, but she is the only person that may issue certified copies in that instance.

Many times, if the death occurs outside the Town of Candia, the clerk in the town of occurrence will send me that informational copy for my records. There are times, however, when this does not occur, and unless I am informed by a family member or another person who has knowledge of that death, I am unaware of it and the name will not appear in the Town Report. It is especially difficult to receive death reports when the person has died out of state.

I hope this information may help you better understand the situation, and I apologize if I have omitted someone in this year's Vital Records for the Town Report. If an omission has occurred, please contact me, and I will make certain that the information is included in next year's report.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT, IN THE TOWN OF CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Candia Moore School in said District, on the seventh day of March, 1986, at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following article:

1. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money up to Three Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$350,000.00) Dollars for constructing an addition to the Moore School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character in connection therewith; to determine whether all or a portion of such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; to authorize the School Board to spend any income derived from the temporary investment of bond or note proceeds for the project; or to take any other action relative thereto.
2. To see if the District will vote to direct the School Board to expend whatever surplus the District may have in the 1985/86 school fiscal year for the purpose of constructing an addition to the Moore School. Such vote to become null and void in the event that warrant article No. 1 is not adopted by the District.
3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers of the District.
4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1986/87 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purpose for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.
5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to furnish high school transportation to Candia students.
6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-Three and 00/100 (\$600,663.00) Dollars to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1986/87 school year. One Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Ninety-Five and 00/100 (\$127,095.00) Dollars of such sum representing additional salaries and benefits attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable under the previous year of the Collective Bargaining Agreement entered

into by the School Board and the Candia Federation of Teachers. (This is the first year of a three year contract.)

7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents other than benefits and salaries payable to teachers, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

CANDIA SCHOOL BOARD REPORT 1984/85 SCHOOL YEAR

Your Candia School Board has spent another busy year planning and completing various projects for the improvement of the Moore School facilities and curriculum.

The Board approved newly written curriculums for first grade, readiness, music (grades 1-8), and science (grades 1-8). The Curriculum Committee recommended and the Board approved the purchase of new textbooks in science (grades 1-4), spelling (grades 2-6), and handwriting (grades 1-6) for the 1985/86 school year. This committee also devised a cycle approach to reviewing curriculums each year. This method assures that each curriculum will be reviewed and updated at least every 6-7 years and new textbooks purchased where necessary.

The Board through its Policy Committee has continued on a monthly basis to update old policies and add new ones to the school's policy manual as needed.

A Report Card Study Committee spent the 1984/85 school year revising the school's reporting system to parents. The result has been a more uniform report card to be used throughout the eight grades. It will be printed on NCR paper and introduced for the 1985/86 school year.

A warrant article was placed on the March 1985 School District meeting to repave the Moore School driveways and parking lot and was approved by the voters. The Board spent the next three months making preparations to have this project successfully completed during the summer of 1985.

Another area of concern to the Board has been insurance coverage. We have worked with the administration and our insurance agent to review, update and consolidate our insurance coverage for the school to be sure we have adequate coverage.

In April a Long Range Planning Committee was formed to assess population growth in town as it relates to the needs of the school. This Committee will have a recommendation in the fall of 1985 for accommodating the expected increasing enrollments the school will have in the next few years. Right now the school is filled to capacity with students and could use more storage area.

A majority of the Board members approved the formation of readiness classes beginning with the 1985/86 school year. These classes will consist of students who are not quite ready to handle the first grade situation. The determination about whether a child is placed in a first grade or readiness class will be discussed and mutually agreed to by the parents and administration after a pre-school screening test is given.

In June the Board began to explore the rental of a portable classroom for the 1985/86 school year. The large incoming first grade class will require an additional classroom. Also the creation of the readiness classes made an additional classroom necessary. It will be used for music classes.

The Board gave unanimous support to a new special education class called the LIFE program (Learning Independence From Essentials) that will meet the needs of some students and be able to keep them in the school district at a greatly reduced cost to the taxpayers.

These highlights give you, the citizens, an idea of the many issues your Board has dealt with this past year. We have tried to make the best decisions on all the issues and we have tried to improve the education provided for Candia's children at the Moore School.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

At their meeting in April 1985 the SAU #15 Board approved the following objectives for the 1985/86 school year:

- (a) To extract from the extensive classified employees' handbook written primarily for all principals and supervisors in SAU #15, and to write a mini-handbook for classified employees.
- (b) To develop a guide which would detail procedures to be followed in the recruitment and employment of teachers in SAU #15.
- (c) To complement the Annual School District Meeting Guide by working in conjunction with the State Department of Education, the New Hampshire School Administrators Association, and the New Hampshire Association of Educational Secretaries to complete the revision of the Annual School District Meeting Handbook for the State of New Hampshire.
- (d) To develop a revised budget format for use on an SAU #15 wide level

Due to Raymond's withdrawal from SAU #15 effective July 1, 1986, the operation of SAU #15 is going through a transitional phase, which will cover a two year period (1985/86) and (1986/87). The Board has already set in place the finalization of the objectives as previously mentioned to be completed this year.

Educational improvements deserving recognition this past year were:

- Rising costs associated with transportation and placement of special education students out of the district have been significantly contained by implementing the new L.I.F.E. program. Developed by Ms. Jane Bergeron in her capacity as Special Education Coordinator, this program provides an appropriate educational program at the Candia Moore School for those students who participate.
- In an effort to appropriately provide for the education of six year old children who are developmentally young, a new Readiness program has been developed. Children who have need of additional time to mature, are no longer over placed into the traditional first grade classroom.
- Funding for ECIA Chapter I services is provided in an effort to improve the reading and math skills of children from grades 1-8. While a one-to-one tutorial approach to instruction provides much assistance to children who participate, a high degree of parent involvement experienced by this program is a key ingredient to its continued success.

During the past year there were changes made to upgrade the physical facility as cited below:

- A used portable classroom which is used to conduct music classes was purchased to relieve the overcrowding at the Moore School.
- A most significant improvement took place when all of the road surface and a large section of the parking space around the Moore School were re-paved.
- Additional smoke and heat detectors were installed in the school at the recommendation of Fire Chief Leonard Wilson.

An immediate need of the district is to look toward the future growth of their elementary school population in providing the space needed to house these children for the 1986/87 school year. In previous reports this growth has been a major concern.

I wish to extend thanks to the Candia School Board members, citizens of the community, administration and all staff at the Candia Moore School for their continued cooperation and support throughout the past school year.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT/1984-85 SCHOOL YEAR

It is with a sense of pride and accomplishment that I report to the citizens of Candia. The 1984-85 school year represents a great deal of effort and dedication by the entire staff at the Henry W. Moore School. Several major program changes have occurred which continue to enhance the educational climate for all the children of Candia.

A major effort continues in the area of curriculum development. The science curriculum is complete for grades Readiness through eight, and new text books have been purchased to fulfill the expectations of the new curriculum. Along with the completion of science, an updated Math Curriculum has been developed for Readiness through eighth grade with a textbook selection anticipated for the 1986 school year.

In preparation for the Readiness Program adopted for the 1985-86 school year the staff reviewed and revised the first grade curriculum in the major subject areas of Math, Reading, Writing, Phonics and Social Studies. This program will begin in September and provide a viable program for a significant group of youngsters.

In addition to the curriculum development, the Moore School continues to offer programs to meet a variety of student needs. The Reading Program under the direction of Judith Larose continues to make a major impact on student achievement in Reading. Services are provided on one to one basis, small group and entire classroom situations. Students have been involved with programs such as "I love to Read and Write," Young Authors and a Paperback Book Exchange.

The "Challenge Program" also afforded to a group of youngsters approximately 155 in grades 1-5, an opportunity to become involved in enriching and challenging activities. This program under the direction of Wendi Harrison met twice a week during school hours. After school students participated in Olympics of the Mind competitions and at the New Hampshire School Board Exposition. The students, coaches and parents who were involved deserve a great deal of credit for their efforts.

A satellite of the Challenge Program was an Art Enrichment Program for grades 1-8. Students participated on a weekly basis under the excellent tutelage of a group of volunteers from the community. The children found this to be an **extremely enjoyable experience.**

The Chapter I program which is federally funded provided remediation in Math and Reading for grades 1-8. Elizabeth Woodbury was the Coordinator for this program and provided a multitude of activities to help students reach their potential.

The Athletic Program was well attended throughout the year. Under the direction of Ed Sides, the Athletic Director, students were afforded the **opportunity of participating in many activities.**

There was an intramural program for all students as well as a varsity sports program for all students in grades 5-8. I truly appreciate the efforts of all the athletic teams and their coaches for representing the Henry W. Moore School.

with fine sportsmanship and character.

Students with special educational needs continue to receive specific instructions to overcome their particular disability. Programs are offered to assist students with Learning Disabilities, speech and language disorders, emotional handicaps, physical disabilities, and other learning problems. Jane Bergeron's leadership and direction for these programs has been superb. At the Moore School we continue to keep pace with the needs of our youngsters in offering them the necessary programs with the least restrictive environment.

For the 1985-86 school year a new program, L.I.F.E. will meet the needs of another segment of our school population. Students who may have been placed in an educational setting outside of the Candia School District will have an opportunity to attend a self contained resource program in the fall.

During the course of the year children are involved in two testing programs, a nationally normed test, Stanford Achievement Test and a criterion reference test, Accountability. Results from Accountability testing also indicate that students have achieved basic skills in Language Arts, Math and Social Studies. test. Accountability. Results from the Stanford Achievement Test indicate that our students continue to score above the national norm. Results from Accountability testing also indicate that students have achieved basic skills in Language Arts, Math and Social Studies.

Every school should be as fortunate as we are in Candia to have such an active P.T.O. Under the very able leadership of Dayle Smryl and the entire membership, several programs were made available to the youngsters. There were no tasks too large for this ambitious group. I deeply appreciate their dedication and efforts in helping to create the necessary school environment for all the children.

In closing I feel that it is quite important to comment on the importance of the entire staff. No organization is successful without dedicated, motivated and enthusiastic people. We are quite fortunate to have an abundance of these people working with youngsters and I wish to publicly thank them for their efforts.

I also want to thank the members of the Candia School Board, Supervisory Office, Mr. Cawley, Superintendent, Mr. Carl Batchelder and Dr. Kenneth Severson, Assistant Superintendents for their help and guidance during the year.

To Mrs. Thomson and Mrs. Swain who work so diligently throughout the year, my sincere thanks for a job well done.

Finally I would like to commend Jane Bergeron for her work as Special Education Coordinator and as the Assistant Principal. Her enthusiasm, knowledge and dedication has added much to the overall success at the Moore School during the 1984/85 school year.

My first year in Candia has been wonderful. The children are a joy to be with and the citizens can be quite proud of their endeavors. I look forward to the upcoming school year with anticipation toward the continuation of the fine programs, warm environment and quality relationships.

ACCOUNTABILITY MANAGEMENT
COMMITTEE REPORT
1984/85

Throughout the 1984/85 school year, students in grades four and eight were tested in basic skills. Student accountability was measured in Language Arts, Mathematics and Social Studies.

In grade 4 - of the 40 students who participated in the testing program 95% received an 80% or better on all the subtests administered.

In grade 8 - of the 56 students who participated, 81% of the students received an 80% or better in all the subtests administered.

The results indicate that our students continue to do well in basic skills. During the 1985/86 school year, the school staff will devote curriculum work in the area of Social Studies. Through a block grant, monies will be designated to provide instructional materials to reinforce the curriculum.

The Management Committee wished to acknowledge and commend Mrs. Gertrude Dannis and Mrs. Lorraine Dufresne for the many years of service to the Accountability Program.

ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 8, 1985

The Annual School District Meeting of the Town of Candia, New Hampshire was called to order at 7:05, by Moderator Ronald Thomas, on March 8, 1985, in the Candia Moore School Auditorium. Mr. Thomas opened the meeting by stating it would follow a modified Robert's Rules procedure, no smoking was to be allowed in the hall, and only registered voters in the town of Candia were allowed to vote on the articles. Additional persons who were not registered voters in Candia, but would be allowed to speak to the assembly included: David Cawley, Superintendent of Schools; Carl Batchelder, Assistant Superintendent; **Ken Severson, Assistant Superintendent; Robert Leslie,** School District Attorney; and Kathleen Murphy, Moore School Principal.

Before voting on the following articles, Sandra Minnick, School Board Chairman, spoke to the assembly in regards to the end of the term for School Board Member, Linda Brock. Mrs. Brock was presented a certificate of appreciation for her service to the board as well as the gift of a planter.

Article 1 - To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers of the District. Motion was read by Sandra Minnick: "I move that the reports of the agents, auditors, committees, and/or officers of the Candia School District as set forth in the annual report of the district, be accepted and placed on file." Motion was seconded by Linda Brock. There was no discussion on this article, and when put to a vote, Article 1 passed.

Article 2 - To see if the District will vote to accept and expend funds in the amounts set forth below which may be made available to the district through the following federal programs:

ECIA Block Grants	\$5,000
Energy Conservation Grants	\$2,500
Miscellaneous	\$2,500

(The amounts of money set forth for each program are estimated, and amounts appropriated for any one program may be overexpended so long as the total amount expended for all of the above programs does not exceed Ten Thousand and 00/100 (\$10,000.00) Dollars.) Motion was made by Linda Brock: "I move that the School District vote to accept and expend up to \$10,000.00 for the federal programs such as ECIA Block Grants, Energy Conservation Grants, and other Miscellaneous programs; with the amounts set forth for each program estimated so that the amounts for any one program may be overexpended so long as the total amount for all the programs does not exceed \$10,000.00. The motion was seconded by Roger Leavitt. No discussion followed, and when put to a vote, Article 2 was passed.

Article 3 - To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district meeting, money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit or a private

source which becomes available during the 1985/86 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. Motion was made by Caryl Jarres. "I move that the school district authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1985/86 school fiscal year provided that such expenditures be made for the purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. Motion was seconded by Robert Claver. There was no discussion on Article 3. When put to a vote, the article passed.

Article 4 - To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred and 00/100 (\$1,200.00) Dollars to be expended towards the support of community activity at the Moore School. Robert Claver made the motion: "I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to be expended towards the support of community activity at the Moore School." The motion was seconded by Sandra Minnick. There was no discussion on Article 4, and when put to a vote, the article passed.

Article 5-To choose one Candia voter to serve as member of the Auburn-Candia-Hooksett School Districts Staff Development Committee for two years. Sandra Minnick made the motion: "I move that the Candia School District choose one Candia voter to serve as a member of the Auburn-Candia-Hooksett Staff Development Committee for a two year term. The motion was seconded by Roger Leavitt. Mrs. Minnick then spoke for the motion, explaining what staff development consists of, and the duties of the staff development committee. There was no discussion, and the motion passed..

The floor was then open for nominations. Sandra Minnick nominated Christina Nelson, and this was seconded by Roger Leavitt. There were no further nominations from the floor, so Roger Leavit moved that nominations be closed: this was seconded by Sandra Minnick. The nomination of Christina Nelson to serve for a two year term on the Staff Development Committee was then put to a vote, and passed.

Article 6-To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Five Dollars (\$3,655.00) for the installation of smoke detectors in the Moore School. Roger Leavitt made the motion: "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,655.00 for the installation of smoke detectors in the Moore School. The motion was then seconded by Linda Brock. Mr. Leavitt then spoke for the article, stating that this was the third phase of improvements in the school aimed at better fire protection.

Mr. Hoyt wished to know how many would be installed.

Fire Chief, Leonard Wilson addressed Mr. Hoyt and the assembly, answering that the improvements to the school safety system had been spread

into three phases. Phase One, which was complete, was the installation of an automatic dialer. Phase Two, which was also complete, was the installation of a panel. The Third Phase, which was the one under discussion in this article would include the following: In the new building, there would be 10 combination smoke and heat detectors, there would be 5 rate-of-rise detectors in the gym and back stage. In the old building, there would be 5 combination detectors in the hallways, 14 rate-of-rise detectors in the classrooms, and 2 fixed temperature detectors in the attic, as well as one additional zone card. This would complete the third and final phase of improvements to the Moore School concerning fire safety.

Mr. Hoyt was concerned whether the new detectors would be tied into the panel. Mr. Wilson assured him that they would be.

The amount of money appropriated in article 6 would include the installation, testing, and certification of new equipment. There was no further discussion on article 6, and when put to a vote, the article was passed.

Article 7-To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) to be expended towards the reconstruction of the roadway and parking area at the Candia Moore School. Motion was made by Caryl Jarres, and read as follows: "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 to be expended toward the reconstruction of the roadway and parking area at the Candia Moore School. The motion was seconded by Sandra Minnick. Mrs. Jarres then spoke to the article, giving the following information: The area to be paved encompasses 3230 square yards. \$4,000.00 of the total \$70,000.00 would be used to hire a civil engineer, who would design a proper plan for drainage, supervise the contractor, and make sure the work was being done to specifications. Before any excavating or work would begin, test borings of the site would be taken. \$66,000.00 would be the amount set aside for a contractor, and work could not go over that amount. The driveway would be excavated to a depth of 24". 12" of bank run gravel would be placed at the bottom, then 12" of crushed bank run gravel would be placed on top of this for proper drainage. 2" of asphalt base would be laid, and a 1" wearing course of asphalt paving would be placed on top of this. The depth figures could vary depending on the findings of the civil engineer. The construction work would then be put out to bid. The construction would be scheduled to begin at the close of school for summer vacation, and would be completed before the start of school near Labor Day.

Russ Dann wished to know if drainage plans had been drawn up. He was told this would be done by the civil engineer. He also wished to know if Revenue Sharing Funds had been looked into as a possibility of helping to pay for a portion of the construction. This could be looked into by the Selectman.

Because it was difficult to determine the vote, a standing vote was taken on this article. 49 were in favor, 32 were opposed. The article passed.

Article 8-To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Seventy Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Three and 00/100 (\$470,333.00) Dollars to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1985-86 school year. Forty-Five Thousand Two Hundred

Seventy Four and 00/000 (\$45,274.00) Dollars of such sum represents additional salaries and benefits payable in 1985/86. (This is the second year of a two year contract.) The motion was made by Roger Leavitt: "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$470,333.00 to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1985/86 school year; \$45,274.00 of such sum representing additional salaries and benefits attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable under the first year of the Collective Bargaining Agreement, this being the second year of a two year contract." Caryl Jarres seconded the motion. There was no discussion from the floor, and when put to a vote, Article 8 passed.

Article 9-To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents other than benefits payable to teachers, and for the payment of the Statutory obligations of the District. The motion was made by **Robert Claver:** "I move that the school district raise and appropriate \$1,434,698.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for the school district officials and agents other than benefits and salaries payable to teachers; and for the payment of statutory obligations of the school district." The motion was seconded by Sandra Minnick.

Mr. Claver then spoke for the article, explaining how the monies had been divided to arrive at this figure and the increases in the tax rate which would result. Regular instructional costs had risen to \$171,389.00, an increase due to salary and high school tuition rises. High school tuition alone had risen \$121,710.00. Paving the parking lot resulted in an increase of \$70,000. Federal Programs a \$43,887.00 increase. Special Education Transportation rose \$19,734.00, and plant operation was \$8,224.00. These figures will result in a \$4.58 increase in the tax rate.

Present enrollment at the elementary level is 412 students, next year's projected figure is 407 students. At the high school level, the present enrollment is 162 students. This figure includes students attending Manchester, Raymond and Pinkerton Academy. Next year's projected enrollment will be 191 students. These figures do not include Out of District placement for Special Education students. At this time in public schools, there are 3 students at the elementary level and 16 at the high school level. The projected figures for next year are 0 at the elementary level and 19 at the high school level. There are currently 7 Special Education students at the elementary level placed in Private schools, and 1 at the high school level. Next year the projected enrollment will be 5 students in elementary and 2 at the high school level. After Mr. Claver had presented these figures, the Moderator then allowed questions from the floor.

Mr. Depass wished to know if we were looking into a cooperative school with Raymond, for example. Mr. Claver answered stating we had not been invited to participate with Raymond in these discussions, however, we were discussing options with Auburn, Hooksett, and Deerfield.

Mr. Gillis wished to know who would take the place of Epping, which will be in a different supervisory union.

Mrs. Galanis suggested busing the children to Memorial. She also voiced

concern over whether our curriculum was meeting the needs of our students once they attended Manchester schools, and if they would be able to compete with the Manchester students on an academic basis. Mrs. Minnick stated that our curriculum is much improved, we are working on curriculum guidelines, and buying next texts where needed. She was also asked the reason why the School Board had so many committees. Mrs. Minnick stated it was to have involvement from more townspeople, so they could have community input on decisions.

Mr. Garfield wished to know why there was such a difference in options between the high school in Raymond and that in Manchester. Mrs. Jarres replied, stating that the attendance of the two schools was a matter of personal choice with the student. Raymond is rapidly becoming overcrowded, but so far they have been willing to accommodate those Candia students who wished to attend. If there were a large increase in the number of students desiring to go to Raymond, however, they might not be able to accommodate us. Mrs. Jarres also stated that in Raymond, the cost per student had risen to \$2,785.00 and in Manchester the tuition was up to \$2,900.00.

Mr. Brock wished to have the total amount repeated that we would be voting on. The figure was \$1,434,698.00.

Mrs. Dares wished to know why our students could not elect to attend Trinity High School, since the cost of tuition for the school was substantially less than either Raymond or Manchester. The legal counsel for the school district replied that it was because Trinity was a parochial school, and we could therefore not use public funds to send our students there.

Mr. Mignault also raised the question of whether our students could compete with the curriculum they were being taught in the Candia school, once they went into the Manchester schools. The reply was that the teachers at Manchester Central were very pleased with the Candia students.

Mrs. Keezer stated she had a child attending Moore School, who was unable to participate in a special volunteer taught art program which was being taught this year. She wished to know if there would be an art program which would benefit all the children in all the grades. Mrs. Minnick replied that there was a position for a part-time art specialist included in the budget, and all the students at Moore School would have art once per week.

Mrs. Young wished to know why there was such a large increase in transportation, since we had obtained a van last year in an effort to reduce these costs. Mrs. Minnick explained that there was a \$20,000.00 increase in operating costs projected for next year. We also now had a radio monitor, who monitored the busses while they were on the road. There was a real need for a bus monitor.

Moderator Ronald Thomas asked if there were any additional questions from the floor, and since there were none, Article 9 was put to a vote and passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

BURNING REGULATIONS

State of New Hampshire

IN CASE OF FIRE - PHONE 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times, when the ground is not completely covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., unless raining and the Forest Fire Warden is notified and grants permission to burn in the rain.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day the burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from the Candia Forest Fire Warden or a Deputy Forest Fire Warden. Permits may be obtained between the hours of 3:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M. on the day the burning is to be done.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit are subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department and the Town of Candia Forest Fire Department.
