During the month of June 2016 the Candia Recycling Center land-filled 64.73 tons of Municipal solid waste (MSW). The CRC also disposed of 50.52 tons of C&D debris during the Month of June 2016. The total amount of waste processed in June of 2016 was 115.25 tons.

Officer Gray has been with the Candia Police Department since February, 2000. During his time here, he has been responsible for managing the evidence and other property, in charge of the police evidence room, has organized various community classes to include a recent women's safety clinic. He's is the lead Field Training Officer. He offers and assists other officers in investigations and often officers will asked him to do the interview. He has shown leadership qualities at criminal and crash scenes.

Based on seniority, merit, and work performance, I recommend that Candia Police Officer Daniel Gray be promoted to the rank of Corporal effective immediately. His current rate of pay is \$26.86hr. I would suggest an increase of \$0.30hr, bringing him to \$27.16hr. The Sergeant is currently at \$28.58hr., and this should be evaluated due to there not being enough disparity between the positions.

I would like to take this opportunity to let the Board know that there have been no organizational changes at the Candia Police Department for over 20 years (see attached organizational chart). With the change in the school (Pinkerton) I see more development within the Town thus more demands on the Department. It's time to update our Department and be prepared for today and for the future. This community deserves that.

Ideally I would like to have a Lieutenant's position, Sergeant, corporal, and master patrolman. Realistically these changes could be made over a period of time without having a significant impact on the budget.

At this point I would like to start off with a corporal position. The benefits of having a corporal position (supervisor) for the Town of Candia are as follows: The Corporal position is needed as we don't have an evening supervisor. The Sergeant is primarily around during the day. We have part time officers working evenings that don't have the experience of a full time officer and they need guidance. In addition we also need to have a dedicated position so if the Sergeant is absent or injured there will be an identified chain of command.

- This position will be a first line supervisory position overseeing the management of all investigations. The Corporal may be assigned to investigate any case.
- This position will also be responsible for managing the training for the Department.
- This position will assist in managing the part time officers to include scheduling.
- This position will potentially decrease liability. Police Agencies have been sued for lack of training and lack of Supervision.
- This position will answer to the Sergeant as well as the Chief in the chain of command.
- I have attached a job description for review.

Candia Police Department compared to some communities:

Candia Police Department: (Pop. 3909) (6 full time officers) 1 Chief, 1 Sergeant, 4 full-time officers, 4 part time officers.


Nottingham Police Dept.: (Pop. 4785) 1 Chief, 1 Lieutenant, 1 Sergeant, 1 Investigator-Sgt. (7 officers including Chief).

Auburn Police Dept: (Pop. 4935) (8 full-time officers), 1 Chief, 1 Captain, 1 Lieutenant, 1 Detective Sergeant, 2 Sergeants, and 1 master patrolman.

Deerfield Police: (Pop. 4300) (8 Full time officers) including 1 Chief, 1 Lieutenant, 1 Sergeant, 1 Patrolman first class, 4 Full-time officers., 2 part time officers.



CHAPTER 40 GOVERNMENT OF TOWN MEETING

Optional Form of Meeting--Official Ballot Referenda

Section 40:13

40:13 Use of Official Ballot. -

I. Notwithstanding RSA 39:3-d, RSA 40:4-e, or any other provision of law, any local political subdivision as defined in RSA 40:12 which has adopted this subdivision shall utilize the official ballot for voting on all issues before the voters.

II. The warrant for any annual meeting shall prescribe the place, day and hour for each of 2 separate sessions of the meeting, and notice shall be given as otherwise provided in this section. Final budgets and ballot questions shall be printed in the annual report made available to the legislative body at least one week before the date of the second session of the annual meeting.

II-a. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all local political subdivisions which adopt this subdivision, who have not adopted an April or May election date under RSA 40:14, X, shall comply with the following schedule pertaining to notice, petitioned articles, hearings, and warrants for the annual meeting:

- (a) The final date for posting notice of budget hearings under RSA 32:5 and RSA 195:12 and hearings under RSA 33:8-a shall be the second Tuesday in January.
- (b) The "budget submission date" as defined in RSA 273-A:1, III and the final date for submission of petitioned articles under RSA 39:3 and RSA 197:6 shall be the second Tuesday in January, provided however, that if a petitioned article proposes a bond governed by RSA 33:8-a, the deadline shall be the preceding Friday.
- (c) Budget hearings under RSA 32:5 and RSA 195:12 and hearings under RSA 33:8-a shall be held on or before the third Tuesday in January. One or more supplemental budget hearings may be held at any time before the first session of the annual meeting, subject to the 7-day notice requirement in RSA 32:5. If the first hearing or any supplemental hearing is recessed to a later date or time, additional notice shall not be required for a supplemental session if the date, time, and place of the supplemental session are made known at the original hearing. In a political subdivision that has adopted a municipal budget committee pursuant to RSA 32:14, the last day for the budget committee to deliver copies of the final budget and recommendations to the governing body pursuant to RSA 32:16, IV shall be the Thursday before the last Monday in January.

- II-d. The voter checklist shall be updated in accordance with RSA 669:5 for each session of the annual meeting.
- III. The first session of the annual meeting, which shall be for the transaction of all business other than voting by official ballot, shall be held between the first and second Saturdays following the last Monday in January, inclusive of those Saturdays) between the first and second Saturdays following the last Monday in February, inclusive of those Saturdays; or between the first and second Saturdays following the last Monday in March, inclusive of those Saturdays at a time prescribed by the local political subdivision's governing body.
- IV. The first session of the meeting, governed by the provisions of RSA 40:4, 40:4-a, 40:4-b, 40:4-f, and 40:6-40:10, shall consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each warrant article. A vote to restrict reconsideration shall be deemed to prohibit any further action on the restricted article until the second session, and RSA 40:10, II shall not apply. Warrant articles may be amended at the first session, subject to the following limitations:
