REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

In accordance with the requirements of the law, the annual report of the school board for the year ending February 15, 1895, is herewith submitted:

It will be seen by referring to the statistical table that we had nine schools in the spring and ten in the fill, and at the present time a high school at the corner is being held with twenty-nire pupils, taught by Daniel D. Ladd of New Hampton. It will close March 8th. For this reason a financial report cannot be made in tull until the annual school meeting. The whole number of pupils enrolled being 174, the average daily attendance 132.

No school was held at Patten Hill in the spring, for the geed reason that we could not obtain a suitable room in which to hold a school. We have at the present time a new house of which we shall speak of further on in this report.

TEACHERS.

We have employed during the year eleven different teachers at d the average monthly wages paid has been some more than \$26. In two of our largest schools we found it necessary to pay higher wages in order to secure teachers competent for the task before them. It should be remembered that the adjoining towns pay high wages, and to retain our best teachers we must pay them nearly as much or they will go elsewhere.

NEW SCHOOL HOUSE AT PATTEN HILL.

Agreeable to vote of the town a new school house was erected at Patten Hill by the building committee.

The selectmen located a lot 100 ft. square a few rods east of the old one. The house was contracted and built by Frank E. Fifield.

This beautiful house is erected between two large shade trees. It is the best, nicest and most pleasantly situated of any house in town. We feel it right to speak in praise of Mr. Fifield for the faithful performance of his word and work. His work was done to the full acceptance of the building 23 committee. We also erected and partially finished a wood shed.

OPENING OF THE NEW HOUSE.

On Sunday, August 19, 1894, the Young Men's Christian association held religious services conducted by Rev. Mr. Pratt, Dea. W. J. Dudley and assisted by others. It was set apart for the cluse of education and hoping that the fear and love of the Lord might always be held in high esteem.

The memory of our beloved brother, Dea. Woodbury J. Dudley, who has since passed away, is and will ever be held in high esteem by the scholars in Caudia. The mottoes he gave and helped place upon the walls of the school rooms, tell of the interest he had in education and religion.

REPAIRS.

No very extensive reprins have been made on the school buildings the past year, the purchase and walling of the ground and furnishing of the house at Patten Hill having absorbed nearly all of the funds allowed for that purpose.

CONCLUSION.

The school year that h is just closed h is been one of prosperity and success, nearly unspotted by disturbance or petty troubles which frequently enter our schools. In closing this report it affords us much ple is are to look back over the year and see the advancement that h is been made in all of our schools. It is a prominent feature that the teachers have labored earnestly and conscientiously in all departments of their work, and an earnestness on the part of most of the pupils to go thorough in all of their studies. We will here make mention of two or three instances of lessons well learned. At West Candia, Jennie M. Colby, to years old, wrote during the fall term 1920 words in her spelling blank, and did not misspell a single word.

Fred Lillis wrote 1680 words, misspelled one. Mabel Colby wrote 1560, misspellel one. Had we room we could name several nearly as good.

We should be well pleased if we could report a better daily attendance.

This is not a fault of the teachers. This neglect lies mostly at the door of parents and guardians. Let us that have the matter in hard be awake to our daty, then we shall see our registers look much better.
