TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at town hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Smyth Public Library.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges including snow removal and general expense.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to appropriate (\$546.54) five hundred forty-six dollars and fifty-four cents for the improvement of class V roads to which the state will contribute (\$2,186.14) two thousand one hundred eighty-six dollars and fourteen cents.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of money sufficient to maintain the street lights for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

- 8. To see what action the town will take relative to renewing long term notes.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$250.00) two hundred and fifty dollars to be used for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Firemen's Association, Inc., the money to be expended under the direction of said Firemen's Association.
- 10. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on poll taxes after October first.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes and if so to fix the time and rate.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise (\$200.00) two hundred dollars for white pine blister rust control as a relief measure to be spent in co-operation and under the supervision of the state forestry department.
- 14. To see if the voters consider it expedient to revise the constitution.
- 15. To see if the town will amend its previous vote relative to the use of the income of the Henry W. Moore fund by appropriating only a part of such income each year to retire the Chester Road construction note.
 - 16. To see if the town will vote to dispose of the hearse.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to negotiate another five year contract with the Electric Light Company for additional extensions.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the west branch of the Merrill road so-called at its High street end.
- 19. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to establish a scale of prices for lots in the Holbrook Ceme-

tery that may in their judgment more properly reflect the value as indicated by their size and location.

- 20. To see if the town will vote to remove the belfry from the town hall and dispose of the bell, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- 21. To see if the town will authorize improvements to be made in and around the town hall and pass any vote relative thereto.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to discharge the duties and have the powers of overseers of the poor, as provided by Chapter 47, Section 44 of the Public Laws.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon, and appropriate money for the same.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF RELIEF AGENT

The following report indicates the various types of aid with which your relief agent has been concerned the past year. Preparation of papers and investigation of tax records to establish the question of eligibility and settlements is involved in all of them. Candia has been very fortunate to have had the full co-operation of the officials in charge of the Bear Brook project which has made it possible to place a large number of men at work. Until recently openings have been found there for all whose eligibility could be certified to by the W. P. A. officials. With respect to old age assistance, checks are now sent out by the County Commissioners, the town being charged for 52½ percent of the grants made to those recipients who have town settlements.

Reimbursements by the state on account of direct relief has varied during the year. No funds were available from February 1 to June 30, from July 1 to December 31 there was a 50 per cent reimbursement, and for January 1937 this was reduced to 33 1-3 per cent. An audit of relief expenditures is made each month by the state comptroller's office which forms the basis upon which the town is reimbursed. Aid rendered to persons not having a town settlement is paid for directly by those who are responsible.
