

# TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Odd Fellows Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for Memorial Day.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for white pine blister rust control, the money to be spent in cooperation with and under the direction of the State Forestry Department
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be used for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc., the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) to purchase the "Good-Road" snowplow and wing model No. 20 EX SLU 11497, now leased by the town.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred forty dollars and thirty-three cents (\$540.33) for Town Road Aid, to which the state will contribute two thousand one hundred sixty-one dollars and thirty-two cents (\$2,161.32).
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for summer maintenance of roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expenses of the highway department.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175.00) for additional salaries per annum for the selectmen, to be divided as follows: Chairman of the board, seventy-five dollars (\$75.00); second selectman, fifty dollars (\$50.00); third selectman, fifty dollars (\$50.00).
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50,00) for additional salary per annum for the tax collector.
- 11. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the tax collector to make on poll taxes after October first.
- 12. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see what the town will vote to do relative to the Town Hall fire insurance fund, and to naming it for some specific purpose agreeable to the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160.

- 16. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon, and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The year 1944 was an extremely fortunate one in fire control. The public controls the answer to the 1945 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open, and comply fully with the permit.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Candia:

My fifteenth annual report finds your schools locally, as well as schools throughout our nation, confronted with the increasingly serious problem of obtaining adequately trained and experienced teachers. You have a right to know that as a nation (a) one teacher in seven is new to his position in 1944-45; (b) one in ten is holding an emergency certificate; (c) and one in five is paid less than \$1200 for the year's work.

In April of 1944, Mrs. Bessie S. Blake, who had taught since 1922 in Candia's rural schools and who in 1933 became the first principal of the Moore Consolidated School, requested release from her duties. Mrs. Blake, both as principal and teacher of grades seven and eight, justly shares much credit for the excellent scholarship records which Candia's graduates have attained in high schools during the past ten years.

Mr. William H. Rittenburg of Manchester served as acting principal from May first until the end of the school year in June, when he was elected principal and teacher of grades seven and eight for the current year. Mr. Rittenburg completed in 1931 his four-year training at Plymouth Teachers College. Previous to accepting the principalship in Candia he had been engaged for more than six years as assistant

teacher and later as principal in high schools.

In view of the resignation of Mrs. Angela Berube in June and the scarcity of teachers of her experience and qualifications, you were fortunate to open schools in September with substitute teachers in the third and fourth grades. Late in October Miss Elizabeth F. Ahern of Manchester, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, was elected to this position. Miss Ahern had taught previously in rural grades and had served as instructor for private pupils and physically handicapped children.

Mrs. Mabel E. Reed of Manchester, a graduate of the music course at Keene, succeeded as music supervisor Mrs. Martha F. Gale who resigned in June to accept a similar position near her home. Mrs. Reed also supervises the music instruction in the schools of Deerfield, Goffstown, Hooksett, Pembroke Academy, and Raymond.

None of your teachers are employed under emergency certificates. Your average salary of full-time teachers,

including man principal, is \$1250.

A recent survey of salaries now being paid in 173 teaching positions in the villages and rural communities of Southern New Hampshire indicates that 28.9 per cent command higher salaries than those paid your women teachers in Candia.

The report of the Enumeration Officer, submitted in September, shows the following age groups and placement.

Since the recent regulation, conforming with the admission age generally adopted throughout the state, requires that "Pupils entering school on and after September 1, 1945, must be at least six years of age before the first of January," it is to be hoped that the size of the primary grades may be at least temporarily reduced and the achievement of these children advanced.

In December standardized achievement tests were given to all pupils in grades three, four, and five. Following are the average scores attained in terms of the grade and month:

It is with regret that restricted transportation has necessitated the temporary abandonment of the annual spelling contest in which the elementary schools of the Union participated for several years. The number and extent of educational field trips have likewise been restricted.

As an alternative teachers and pupils have loyally contributed to the war effort. During last year War Stamp purchases and Bond sales by the school children exceeded three hundred dollars.

Last fall the Moore School contributed more than twentyfive bushels of dried milkweek floss for the making of life jackets for our armed forces. The total contribution from the schools of this Union was 162 bushels. Proceeds from the sales were divided among the pupils or deposited with the school's club funds.

In the salvage drive, recently sponsored by the schools, Candia more than doubled its quota by the collection and sale of 8,900 pounds of scrap paper. Proceeds from the sale, amounting to \$66.75, have been deposited in the bank. This with other funds will be applied towards the purchase of a new 16 m.m. sound-on-film projector.

in dental defects and 72 per cent decrease in dental treatments.

A brighter feature of your health program is the excellent lunch service now being continued under the efficient management of Mrs. Dorothy E. Ford. The average number of individual servings totals daily 148. This number includes seconds and in a few cases even thirds. For several years the number of Candia's school children who were underweight has been comparatively small. However, within the last year this number was reduced 40 percent. This is a definite contribution to the health and vigor of a coming generation.

In my report of last year attention was called to a marked reduction in the number of pupils who are attending high school. Where Candia formerly had approximately forty pupils in secondary schools, you now have twenty-five. This reduction is due to several factors, influenced by war-time conditions. Among these there is the lack of adequate transportation.

The slower pupil is being transported to elementary school until he is sixteen years of age or even older. This arouses a growing feeling throughout the state that we are thus placing a premium on "slowness"; because at the same time, the fourteen-year-old graduate from the elementary schools, in districts not maintaining a high school, must find his own transportation to further schooling. In a few districts this inequality of age opportunity is eliminated by a special district appropriation for the transportation of its high school pupils. It appears that the time may not be long before such transportation will be required by act of the legislature.

The recent organization of your Parent-Teacher Association and the interest manifested by its members are characteristics of a closer cooperation between the homes and the schools. Your Superintendent and teachers welcome the opportunity that such association affords to better compre-

hend and serve the needs of your children.

During the past year bus drivers, parents, teachers, and pupils have contributed in giving Moore School the highest per cent of attendance attained by any school in the Union.

It may be of interest to note that the Moore school building and architect's plans are included in a recent publication by the State Board of Education, prepared as a part of the program of the Public Works Committee of the State Council on Postwar Planning and Rehabilitation. The publication is designed to assist officials who are seeking more adequate school buildings.

The Superintendent wishes to express his appreciation of the uniformly neat and orderly care given by your janitor to the building and grounds. Co-operation between principal, teachers, and janitor characterizes the atmosphere of

the school.

### VACCINATION LAW

Extract from Chapter 123, Public Laws of N. H. Section 1. No child shall attend a public or private school in this state unless he has been vaccinated; or has had the smallpox; or has submitted not less than three times to the process of vaccination, or holds a certificate of the local board of health that he is an unfit subject for vaccination. The local board of health shall issue such a certificate on the advice of a registered physician of the state and practicing in the town in which the child resides.
