



#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Odd Fellows Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for Memorial day.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for white pine blister rust control, the money to be spent in co-operation with and under the direction of the State Forestry Department
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollarc (\$500.00) to be used for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc., the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred ninety-nine dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$599.78) for town road aid, to which the state will contribute two thousand three hundred ninety-nine dollars and ten cents (\$2,399.10).

- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for summer maintenance of roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expenses of the highway departmenet.
- 9. To see what permanent repairs can be made on Dearborn Hill and how much will be appropriated for same by petition of Arthur M. Anderson, Ephraim C. Proulx, Charles Proulx, Beatrice A. Tuffey, R. G. Thompson, Alice Mahoney, Harry Purslow, Hazel Purslow, George Currier and Joe B. Robertson of Candia, N. H., and Charles B. Damory, Armand Maher, and John Towle of Raymond, N. H.
- 10. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the tax collector to make on poll taxes after October first.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see what action the town will take regarding the transfer of the World War H Memorial Town Hall Building Fund from the custody of the Selectmen and Treasurer to the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds as required by law.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to set aside the sum of three hundred four dollars (\$304.00) paid in for cemetery lots and additional monies that may be paid for the sale of lots in a separate fund for the maintenance of cemeteries in general.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing and

promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Merrimack Valley Region Associotion, the sum of fifty-nine dollars (\$59.00).

- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate approximately three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for 90 lb. roofing or approximately four hundred fifty dollars (\$450.00) for 6 ply guaranteed roofing to roof the machine shop in East Candia.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) to purchase a suitable truck for use on town roads.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon, and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## PREVENT FOREST FIRES—IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners, and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveals the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up the fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily precede a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on his guard. He should

- Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands,
- Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
  - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.

- b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
- c. Seeing that others comply with the requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting—that PAYS.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Candia:

This my sixteenth annual report is written not only as we enter upon a new year, but also as we enter a new era in the history of our country. After four years of world conflict we have emerged the most powerful nation of all time in the art of destruction. To win a peace that shall be just and permanent challenges not one generation but a score of generations to come. The hope of mutual understanding and cooperation among peoples at home and abroad springs from faith in the adaptability and resourcefulness of youth. There arises here a profound obligation upon every home and every school. There is reason to believe that your teachers and school officials are alert to this responsibility. Acceptance of responsibility by the home is manifested by the growth of your Parent-Teacher organization and by the program being sponsored by its executive committee.

During the present year only one change has been necessary in the staff of teachers. Following the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Ahern to accept a teaching position nearer her home. Miss Mary F. Mack of Auburn was elected to teach grades three and four. Miss Mack graduated from Keene Teachers College in 1945, and did her half-year of

practice teaching in grades one and four.

Mrs. Muriel P. Seavey resumed in October her position as teacher of grades one and two.

Not only the extreme scarcity of teachers, but also the lack of boarding places, conveniently near the school, render

it extremely difficult to maintain a complete staff.

Statistics, compiled in December and including the entire state, indicate that teachers' salaries in Candia now approach the average paid by towns similar in size of population and However, increases in teachers' in equalized valuation. salaries must be anticipated another year, if we are to operate schools without the use of emergency teachers.

The enrollment of pupils is now large in the primary grades, where we may anticipate a greater increase within the next few years. Following is the September 1945 report

The shortage of man power and equipment for both bus maintainance and operation, and for snow removal is destroying a good attendance record, particularly in the number of tardinesses. So far this year more than two hundred eighty bus tardinesses have been recorded in the four registers of the Moore School.

Through the medium of the "War Assets Corporation" and other agencies, buses are being made available for schools at a much reduced price, thus enabling a greater number of towns and cities to purchase and operate their

own school transportation equipment.

The restricted allotment of paper has made it impossible to obtain certain supplies, particularly paper towels. The same is true of some text books. However, the reading program in the first four grades has been enlarged and enriched by the addition of new basal readers and reading workbooks, and by the introduction of the "Alice and Jerry" readers in grades three and four. New geographical readers have been used extensively, and "Life in Early America" by Miss Kelty has been made available for the fourth grade.

Recently a large suspension globe was placed in the third

and fourth grade room.

To Mr. Charles W. Phillips we are indebted for a complete set of the Britanica Encyclopedia. This fills a definite need for complete reference material in the grammar grades.

To supplement the work in geography and current history

the weekly news sheets, known as "Weekly Readers," are supplied to grades three through six, and "Current Events" papers are provided in the seventh and eighth grades.

The medical inspection of all school children for the year 1944-1945 was made by your school nurse, Miss Margaret

Special Audiometer tests were given to 72 children. Of this number six have definite loss of hearing, three of whom would profit educationally by instruction in lip reading.

Your school lunch service was reopened in November

under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Ford.

This year in January alone 1601 lunches (including 3684 five-cent servings) were provided at a total food cost of \$227.35, which means an average meal at less than 15 cents per day. Donations of food materials are credited as well as money payments. Typical lunches served in December consisted of: Meat loaf, mashed potatoes, chocolate pudding, bread, butter and cocoa or fruit juice beverages. On other days creamed eggs or creamed salmon are substituted for the meat.

Mrs. Ford, who has taken a keen interest in this work, attended for a week in July the state conference for school lunch workers. This conference was held at the State University and was directed by Miss Elizabeth E. Ellis, Extension Nutritionist.

While the total estimated budget calls for a smaller appropriation than that of 1945, certain items exceed the sums called for a year ago. Among these are "teachers' salaries" and "other expenses of instruction." The salary of women teachers in some of the one-room schools in New Hampshire now amounts to \$1,600. Men teachers in small elementary schools are receiving as high as \$2,000.

The "Teacher Retirement Law" of 1945, Section 6: Chapter 136, provides that the school district share with the individual teacher in contributing annually to the state a specified per cent of his salary to be applied to the individual's

retirement fund.

High School tuition is another item greatly increased in cost.

The increasing scarcity of competent teachers and the mounting cost of schools are items of most serious consideration in all towns, particularly where the consolidation of schools has not been effected.

President Truman in his message to Congress on the 21st of last month emphasized the urgent need of federal aid, in addition to present local appropriations, to insure the maintenance of adequate educational facilities in the various states. The President wisely advocated the allotment of such aid without federal interference with local school control.

The element of local initiative has been fundamental in our social and industrial development, particularly in New England. The essence of local initiative has its source in a well informed and actively participating citizenship. The training of youth with this end in view is of increasing sgnificance to the welfare of individual and community. In it lies the answer to a new era.
