

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Odd Fellows' Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be used for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc., the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred twelve dollars and twenty-five cents (\$612.25) for Town Road Aid, to which the state will contribute two thousand four hundred forty-eight dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$2,448.99).
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for summer maintenance of roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of the highway department.

- 8. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the tax collector to make on poll taxes after October first.
- 9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund, agreeable to the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160 and the Session Laws of 1947, Chapter 8.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to purchase a snowplow and pass a vote relative to financing the cost and also to provide funds for the proper housing of same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollas (\$300.00) for maintenance and improvements to cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen and superintendent of cemeteries.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for improvement of the baseball park, the money to be expended under the direction of the Candia Baseball Club. On petition of George H. Perkins and others.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for the purchase of a tract of land on the New Boston Road now being rented for use as a town dump.
- 17. To see if the town will vote an annual increase in Town Officer's salaries, i. e., Chairman of Board of Selectmen, one hundred dollars (\$100.00), second and third members of the Board of Selectmen, fifty dollars (\$50.00) each and Tax Collector one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding sixty-two dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$62.88) (1/100 of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1947 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon, and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 21. This warrant may be incomplete. Polls to close at 7 P. M. unless otherwise voted at the meeting.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Candia:

In accordance with the rules of the School Board and the laws of the State of New Hampshire, I am pleased to submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the Town of Candia.

Since my election, my time has been spent chiefly in studying the problems of the entire Union, watching the schools in action in each district, becoming acquainted with the teachers, children, and citizens, attending meetings of the school board both regular and special, checking equipment, books, and supplies, trying to discover the strong and weak points of each system so that a thorough understanding of the needs of your boys and girls may be emphasized, and gathering data which will be necessary for future reference.

It is, then fairly apparent that any recommendations made at this time would be somewhat superficial and would not present the best picture of what should be done. Therefore, during the coming year advice will be suggested only after careful consideration and study of the available material and the educational welfare of the children of the town.

#### APPRECIATION

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board for the confidence it has shown toward me since July, 1947. The patience and courteous consideration you have expressed in my behalf and for the children of the town is received humbly and I shall endeavor to merit your continued confidence in my efforts as your educational advisor and executive officer.

I wish also to express my appreciation to the pupils, teachers, employees of the school, and citizens of the town who have so generously helped to make the schools what we all hope they should become in the educational process and development of learning.

#### ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Since taking office as Superintendent of the Candia Schools, I have been impressed by the seriousness and desirability of the School Board to develop and complete the projects necessary, in my opinion, to insure good schools. The co-operation of its members in all emergencies as well as regular routine matters has been frank, earnest, and constructive. I am thoroughly convinced the board as well as the public want the best schools possible. In keeping with this desire, I am bringing to the attention of the town the following items of commendable accomplishments:

#### Tests and Testing

Testing is very important in the development of modern youth in his educational growth. Although much time must be spent to administer such a program, the results have proved worthwhile and desirable. It has been the custom in the past to test the boys and girls at the close of the school year to determine in part whether or not a youngster should be promoted to the next grade or graduated. After discussing the project at considerable length, achievement tests were administered to all pupils in the fall. After correcting and tabulating, teachers were able to concentrate upon the weaknesses of their pupils with the entire year to work out individual problems. This innovation in the schools of the town has been a challenge to every teacher and a decided aid to the educational growth and development of the pupil. The co-operation of the teachers was excellent even though it meant extra work in the correction, tabulation and study of the tests:

#### Marking System and Report Cards

Probably one of the most important changes since September was the simplification of the report card and the introduction of a new marking system.

Evaluation of the work of the boys and girls in the school is a subjective matter at best and considerable time is spent every six weeks in order that a fair and reasonably accurate report may be made to the parent of the classroom activities of the child. Many educators have opposed this type of report because of its subjectiveness stating that it does not measure the whole child. However, as long as the colleges and the State Department require some form of report of

pupil progress. New Hampshire schools must continue to keep such records. It has always been the intention of the present administration, however, to make such a summary as brief as possible yet to advise the parent of the child's progress in its simplest form. It is my opinion that the new system has met widespread approval in the community.

#### STANDARDIZATION OF PERMANENT RECORDS

The permanent records of the pupils and the school have been standardized. This method of permanent record-keeping in the school is in use all over the country and should prove an asset to pupils, teachers, parents, and future administrators.

#### School Lunch

The continuation of the school lunch program is a vital phase in the educational development of the school. Although this program requires the right supervision which consumes considerable time, the board has never questioned its need. We have been very fortunate in securing, free of charge, a number of items which have been helpful in extending the quality of the meals. These food articles will continue to be received as the year progresses. To add to these donations, the school is financially reimbursed for the type of meal served—nine cents for every twenty-five cent charge. Since the program is non-profit making, the children who avail themselves of this service, which is balanced to meet State and Federal requirements, receive the full value of the meal in better food cooked to meet every taste. This program is not only a step in the right direction for healthful living, but the supervision of this noon lunch in right attitudes at the table should have far-reaching results. The Board is to be commended for this program.

## TEXTBOOKS, SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT

Many textbooks, supplies, and equipment have been brought up to date. Readers, both basic and supplementary, as well as other textbooks and supplies have been purchased. This has put quite some strain on the budget, but the results, in my opinion, where the boys and girls of the town are concerned, have justified the means.

#### REPAIRS

The test of a good school board is the interest it takes in keeping the plant repaired and in good working condition. The board and town are fortunate in having a custodian of the building who takes pride in having it clean and sanitary. The wear and tear on any school plant requires constant repair. The School Board has met this duty with economy and dispatch.

#### TEACHERS

Your teachers are conscientious and are making every effort to give the best possible services to the children of the town. You are fortunate in securing teachers of such calibre especially when many youngsters in this state are unable to receive the rights of good instruction to which they are entitled because of the shortage of understanding leaders in the classroom. Surely their co-operation and patience with the superintendent and school board have been on a high plane. There have been some administrative changes in the supervision which seem to have brought the school, the board, and the citizens a little closer to the education of the youth of the town.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

The foregoing achievements have been the highlights of your school since September and as the year progresses there will, undoubtedly, be other matters which will have the attention of the School Board, teachers, and pupils.

Since it is very necessary to look into the future and try to determine what is best for education in Candia, I should like to make a few recommendations which should have your consideration, if not immediately, at least in the near future.

#### Tuitions

This item in the 1947-48 budget claimed about 36 per cent of the entire amount raised and appropriated. The 1948-49 budget calls for an even greater amount. This item is set by the State Department and based on the average cost of education for secondary schools in the state. The tuition rate was increased from \$123.79 in 1946-47 to \$138.89 in 1947-48 and without doubt will be increased to nearly \$150 for 1948-49. It is, therefore, very important that provision be made for the next school year for Tuitions.

#### HEALTH SUPERVISION

Your nurse, Miss Margaret E. Cronin, receives \$2,400.00 a year from six districts distributed as follows: Raymond \$715.05, Candia \$316.02, Deerfield \$223.60, Auburn \$377.45, Merrimack \$640.47, Litchfield \$127.41. Her salary is based upon the number of pupils (average membership) in each district for the previous year. This means that her salary includes her traveling expenses from her home in Manchester to the various schools in the above districts. It also includes her trips to Concord, Manchester, Boston, Hanover, Laconia and wherever it is necessary to transport a child or a group of children. She is on call at all times and through her generosity makes many special trips in connection with her work. The time has come to realize the great part the school nurse plays in your school system and the personal interest she takes in each and every child regardless of expense. Therefore, I recommend that an adequate amount be set aside in the budget for reasonable expenses of traveling for the district.

#### SUPPLIES AND TEXTBOOKS

According to data in my possession gathered from the supply houses, these items have been advanced from 10 to 40 per cent since October, 1946. Only recently I have received notice that a further increase can be expected by March first. Provision must be made for this increase in prices in the budget for 1948-49 if your children are to be adequately supplied with material to continue the work of the school.

#### School Lunches

The time is not far distant when every child in the school will be given a noon lunch at the expense of the taxpayer. It is part of the education of every boy and girl. Many cannot afford even the small cost of such a lunch at the present time. It is, then, a question of the generosity of the taxpayer as well as his responsibility as to whether an appropriation of sufficient amount will be made available. I was impressed by the supervision at the table during the lunch period. The district is to be commended in having teachers who take their duties and responsibilities so seriously during the noon lunch period. The district is to be commended

also for the excellent meals served to its youngsters by Mrs. Ford.

#### TEACHERS

It is necessary to call your immediate attention to the item of Teachers' Salaries. This item should be carefully studied. Graduates of the colleges all over the country have set their own minimum wage scale which will exceed the New Hampshire State Board minimum. Living costs continue to rise and a contented teacher means better instruction for the boys and girls of the town.

#### Manual Training

This is a long range problem. It is looking into the future when the district has stopped to realize that the boys of the seventh and eighth grades could become much more useful to themselves, their parents, and the town in future planning if some course in the use of tools and the use of the hands could be introduced into the school. There is space for this very important function of education in your building and surely it would be an asset to the growth of these boys for both present and future development. I hope the School Board and the citizens of the community will spend some time to study and discuss this matter.

May I, at this time, express my thanks to Mr. George H. Harmon for his kindness and instruction in my behalf. May he enjoy the fruits of a full and useful life during his retirement.

May I again thank the individual members of the School Board for the assistance and advice so generously given in my behalf and in the interests of the citizens, teachers, and pupils of the Candia School.
