#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, New Hampshire, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Odd Fellows Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the use of the Smyth Public Library Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred and twenty-one dollars and five cents (\$621.05) for Town Road Aid to which the State will contribute four thousand one hundred and forty dollars and thirty-five cents (\$4,140.35).
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for summer maintenance for roads and bridges and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), for general expense of the highway department.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 8. To see what additional charges the town will instruct the Tax Collector to make on poll taxes after October first.

- 9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds or otherwise.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received the past year.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be added to the World War II Memorial Town Hall Building Fund agreeable to the Laws of 1943, chapter 160 and the Session Laws of 1947, chapter 8.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for maintenance and improvements to cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the selectmen and superintendent of cemeteries.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for improvements to Moore's Park.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for white pine blister rust control, the money to be spent in co-operation with and under the direction of the State Forestry Department.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) (1/100th of one percent of the Town's valuation based on the 1951 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in co-operation with the 37 other communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for painting and repairs to the Fitts Museum.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title 11 of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's

Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately twenty-four dollars (\$24.00) to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

- 19. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 20. To see whether the voters of the Town of Candia will appropriate sufficient funds to construct a black top road on Patten Hill Road from the point where the black top road ends, in front of the Harold E. Mullen residence, to the point where the blacktop road begins again at the summit of Patten Hill, and from the bottom of Patten Hill to the Candia-Raymond town line. On petition of Ernest J. Patten and eighteen (18) others.
- 21. We the undersigned residents, commercial users and other users of Brown Road in the town of Candia, N. H., do hereby petition the town of Candia, N. H., to install a proper asphalt top on said Brown Road and to raise and appropriate monies for same. The length of said road, which is approximately one and one-half miles long, extends from the residence of Mrs. Etta Brown to the State Highway, Route No. 101. There are twelve occupied dwellings on said Brown Road and seventeen children which are or will use the facilities of the town school bus.

We submit the following reasons:

- 1. To give the doctors access to the residents of said road.
- 2. To insure accessibility of the Fire Department to said road, at all times.
- 3. To facilitate continuous function of the town school bus on said road.
- 4. To insure delivery of the United States Mail on said road.
- 5. To avoid the constant overflow of water and washouts at various parts of said road.
  - 6. To make the road passable to commercial users.

7. To reduce undue expense to privately owned motor vehicles of persons who reside on said road.

On petition of Walter E. Pitman and twenty-nine (29) others.

22. The undersigned citizens of the town of Candia respectfully petition the selectmen of Candia to insert the following article in the town warrant for the March 1952 Town Meeting "To see if the town will vote to build a Town Road Aid road from the Smyth schoolhouse over the Merrill Road to Trunk line road 101B.

"The State to provide \$4,146.35 and the Town \$621.05 for the year 1952." On petition of Stanley Morse and twenty-seven (27) others.

- 23. To appropriate \$250, to repair road in bad shape: Island Road to the top of 4th hill, heavy rains makes a river out of it. On petition of Joe Cronin.
- 24. To see that the town will authorize the selectmen to see that the Road Agent plows out the churches and the public halls. On petition of Grace Hodge and eleven (11) others.
- 25. To see if the town will vote to increase the compensation for certain town officers; raise and appropriate funds for the same or take any other action relative thereto. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and ten (10) others.
- 26. To see if the town will vote to establish a Board of Tax Assessors for the purpose of assessing all properties of the town and to perform all other duties of a Board of Assessors that are required of them according to the Law, or take any other action relative thereto. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and eleven (11) others.
- 27. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure a greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessement of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and ten (10) others.
- 28. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town

through tax collector's deeds or otherwise. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and eleven (11) others.

- 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the care, maintenance, and improvement of the Town Dump or take any other action relative thereto. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and ten (10) others.
- 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) for the purpose of providing more adequate police protection for persons and property. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and eleven (11) others.
- 31. To see if the town will vote to direct the dog officer to collect a fee of fifty cents (50c) for each call he is required to make for the purpose of collecting delinquent dog taxes. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and eleven (11) others.
- 32. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100.00) to complete the Tar Mac surface on Diamond Hill Road, so called. On petition of Robert S. Dinsmore and sixteen (16) others.

Polls to close at 6 P. M., unless otherwise voted at the meeting.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1952

To the School Board of Candia:

May I present to you my fifth annual report of the educational development and growth in the Town of Candia. May I express my thanks and appreciation for the children of the town for your understanding in trying to solve the many problems involved in education in a modern and changing world.

#### Teachers

Two members were added to the staff beginning in September, 1951, because of the increase in enrollment. This brings the total number of regular teachers to seven.

#### State Aid to Education

After the legislature adjourned for the summer and after the State Aid for schools had finally been passed into law, the formula was worked out which allowed many towns in the State to get some much needed help. Candia was one of the fortunate ones and was the recipient of \$10,662.88. These receipts were based on the 1950 adjusted valuation.

According to the best advice we are able to get, it would seem that this amount will be forthcoming next year since the amount was raised each year for that purpose and barring any unforeseen emergencies. In view of the increase in tuitions for high school students, this will prove a great help to the district.

#### Enrollments

The following chart shows briefly the total enrollment of pupils in the Moore School from 1946-47 to 1951-52. Because of the census report we are able to estimate quite closely the number which will be enrolled next year, 1952-53. The last column on the chart gives that estimate.

With the construction of two new classrooms and the electing of two more teachers, the so-called assembly hall downstairs has been eliminated except for a small space where visual education and the school lunches are in evidence. Every class now has its own or separate teacher varying in size from 22 pupils to 32 pupils except in grades seven and eight which are in combination. If you will note from the chart you will find that there are 34 pupils in these combined seventh and eighth grades. This has been a temporary measure only since next year there will be 36 in this combination; the following year 44; after that for each year will be 48, 58, 54, 46, and 52 pupils. On the strength of what was done this year in construction, it becomes necessary to call your attention to the fact that in the summer of 1953-54 arrangements must be made to enlarge the present school building and elect another teacher if the pattern of distribution is to continue as at the present time. No teacher regardless of efficiency and understanding can possibly do justice to from 48 to 58 boys and girls in one room.

That is the picture as it looks today concerning the housing problem in the Candia School.

#### The Budget

After studying the proposed budget in comparison with the budget for this year and that for 1950-51 together with the expenditures, you will undoubtedly recognize the fact that new construction, tuition, and teachers' salaries overshadow all other items. Of course, these items are more or less interdependent and when one changes the others will also. However, probably the one item in the modern school budget which should cause the School Boards and taxpayers the gravest concern is that of tuition.

In the past five years tuition rates have advanced from about \$125 per pupil to Manchester where the bulk of the Candia youth attend high school, to an amount of \$275 per pupil for the next school year—1952-53—120 percent. And, of course, with the increase in enrollments this means more graduating from the elementary school requiring an increase in the number of teachers, books, supplies, health supervision, per capita tax, and many other items.

The time is not too far distant when Manchester and other secondary schools in the vicinity are going to refuse to take any more boys and girls from towns like Candia, Hooksett, Auburn, and others unless, maybe, they are in the upper 20 percent of their classes and have attained an average "rank" of 85 percent or better. Many colleges are still doing just that and have been for years.

This would mean, then, that 80 percent of all graduates from the elementary schools of the smaller towns would have to forego the chance to receive a high school education.

Already it has been projected into the minds of school boards and citizens of the State that the only solution to the present philosophy that in America education is for all the children of all the people is consolidation of school districts; consolidation of school districts would mean the building of secondary or high schools with the burden of financial costs distributed throughout the consolidated area.

This is really the first time this matter has been called seriously to your attention and probably nothing can or will be done about it until the financial burden becomes too great to bear or your children are refused the right of a high school education because of inadequate housing in your own or nearby secondary schools.

The State Department of Education is more than willing to help each and every district solve its problems and especially this grave problem of a high school education for the boys and girls of the State. Arrangements may be made for public hearings and special meetings to discuss and explain consolidation of school districts. It is a very important problem in education in the State of New Hampshire today and warrants your immediate thought.

May I thank the members of the School Board, the citizens of the town, the teachers, the children, and any others connected in any way with the educational growth of the boys and girls of the community for their help and guidance in trying to solve the many problems involving the organization, administration, and maintenance of the school.

Let us hope that the coming year will bring a permanent peace to the world and to our American way of life.
