To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

The following Articles to be taken UP AT 8:00 P. M.

- 3. To see if the town will vote to adopt a Zoning Ordinance recommended by the Planning Board.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the use of Smyth Public Library. The money to be expended under the direction of the association.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money to be expended under the direction of the American Legion Post.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for maintenance of summer roads. The money to be spent as follows:

General expense of Highways	\$ 500.00
Maintenance of tarred roads	3,500.00
Maintenance of gravel roads	2,000.00

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the maintenance and development of Moore Park.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the erection of Road Name Signs.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to close the remainder of Abbott road, to the Patten Hill road.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and seventy five dollars (\$375.00) for the expense of the Red Phone fire alarm system. And six hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$625.00) for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be expended under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's association.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars, to which the State will contribute twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to clear Forest fire roads. The money to be expended under the direction of the Forest Fire Warden.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the care and maintenance of the town dump, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for plowing snow off the Mill Pond, for skating.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to purchase advertising space in the 1961 Guide of the Merrimack Region, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received in the past year.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and the treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

- 17. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the Budget not already acted upon, and authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Polls to close at 6:00 P. M. due to reopening at 8:00 P. M. to take action on the remaining articles in the Warrant.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Prevention Is Everybody's Business

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note 58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- Before buring, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home — Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Candia Qualified to Vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Moore School Auditorium in said District on the 5th day of March 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,000.00 for the purchase of a school bus.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of \$6,000 for a school bus under Article 6 in the following manner: (a) \$1,200.00 thereof by inclusion in the School Budget for the ensuing year; (b) the balance of \$4,800.00 by the issuance of serial notes covering a period not to exceed four years after the school year 1960-61, upon the credit of the District, and to authorize the School Board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the serial notes shall be issued, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, as amended.

- 8. To see if the District will vote to establish a capital reserve fund pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, and to raise, appropriate and pay into such fund the sum of \$850.00. The purpose of this fund (which will be held on interest by the Trustees of the Town of Candia Trust Funds) shall be to accumulate each year one-seventh of the cost of any school bus purchased, so that at the end of seven years this fund will be available to replace the worn-out bus. (This is similar to the commercial practice called "depreciation".)
- 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board, where school bus transportation of high school students is feasible, to make a charge of not exceeding \$1.50 per high school student per week to defray the cost of transportation furnished such student.
- 10. We the undersigned do hereby sign this petition to see if the town of Candia will vote to include in the school budget, prepared by the Candia School Board, the sum of \$4,500.00 to be used for the purpose of supplying transportation for students attending high school in Manchester, N. H.

Transportation — School Board Explanation

(Warrant, Articles 6-9; Budget, Item 16)

To avoid confusion, the following explanation is given of the School Board's proposal to handle the Moore School and high school transportation problem:

- (1) Total Cost \$10,400.00, the figure given in Item 16 of the Budget. The amounts stated in Articles 6-9 of the Warrant will NOT be added to the budget; they are already included in the Item 16 figure.
- (2) Transportation Provided This program will provide adequate, cheaper transportation to Moore School and

also transportation to high schools in Manchester within reasonable limits.

- (3) Increased Cost The added cost of this whole program, over what the District is paying now, should be only about \$790.00 and will not exceed \$1,500.00. After five years, when the new bus is paid for the total cost will actually be \$710.00 less than what we are paying now.
- (4) High School Cost There is nothing in the budget for high school transportation because the \$1.50 charge covers "extra" costs such as gas, oil, tires, driver. The fixed "over-head" costs (such as insurance) will be the same whether we use the bus for high school transportation or not.
- (5) How Possible A District owned and operated bus does not have to make a profit, is tax exempt, and operates at an estimated 21c a mile as against the standard contract price of 50c a mile.
- (6) Why NECESSARY In 1949, we had four classrooms, less than 100 pupils, and two buses, each making one run. Now we have ten classrooms, 300 pupils and still two buses. For Moore School only, we are now operating five (5) routes at maximum capacity and a cost of \$8,910.00. With only a few additional children, a sixth route will be necessary, costs could go to \$10,000.00, and children would be boarding the bus at 7:30 A. M. with school commencing at 9:15 A. M.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1960

To the School Board of Candia:

In presenting my thirteenth report of the Moore School, may I review some of those items which have seemed to me to be important to the educational growth of the boys and girls of the town.

The fall term opened with a full complement of teachers and 273 boys and girls in Grades 1-8. The staff is the same as a year ago, but on February 5, 1960 the school had registered 302 youngsters. So far this year the school has enrolled 21 more children up to date than during the entire vear which ended June 1959. Whether or not this will continue during the coming year is only conjecture, but the census reports show quite clearly that the school will not have less entering in the fall of 1960. In fact, a conservative estimate for the total enrollment next year would be over 300 children. May I go further and point out that we have 38 pupils enrolled in Grade One this year. This is too many especially in this particular grade if the fundamentals of reading are to be well-taught, regardless of the efficiency of the teacher. Authorities are constantly emphasizing the fact that no teacher of the primary grades should have more than 25 pupils for effective instruction. How long do you expect to hold good teachers, if these classes continue to increase in size each year? In Grades 4 and 5 we now have over 40 pupils each. These grades have been divided for enrollment reasons particularly and to good advantage. Another year undoubtedly there will be two groups in Grade 5 and two groups in Grade 6. My purpose in calling your attention to these figures is for you to look into the future three or four years and speculate as to how the housing problem is to be solved. According to reports and data from the State Department of Education, 30 elementary pupils should be the limit in your classrooms. We now have ten rooms being used for recitations and home rooms. This means that we have already reached the capacity of both buildings with 302 youngsters. How many of the rooms in the original building have 900 square feet of floor space which is the recommended size of elementary classrooms—and even more for the primary grades? So you can readily see that this enrollment situation poses a serious problem in the very near future if these increases continue.

Then there is the tuition problem which has skyrocketed in costs in the past few years. The following chart is selfexplanatory, since it shows the tuition costs for the years shown.

This means that since 1950-1951 tuition costs have increased over 70%. Why? There are at least three reasons. First, increase in the number of children going to high school; secondly, increase in the number of students remaining in high school; and thirdly, the increase in the cost of tuition by those schools to which we send our children. Do you know of any way we can reduce this item in next year's budget or in future budgets as long as children continue to go to secondary schools?

There is no doubt that teachers' salaries is the largest single item in the budget. This has been true for a number of years and the end is not yet in sight. Why? When is it going to stop? You have been reading the papers during the past month or two and you cannot help but become disturbed concerning the increase in the number of children entering our schools, cost of books and supplies, cost of living, educational requirements set up by the State Department of Education and other states and the cost to get a degree to be able to meet these requirements. You can think of many more. Candia does pay a fair wage and salary, but wage increases do not remain static, at least not in the teaching profession. However, do not misunderstand the situation. Teachers are still hard to find and as long as this condition exists we must face the salary issue. It is a simple case of supply and demand. Even more so now because our schools are becoming larger and larger requiring more and more teachers. We all know the answer. It is two-fold and very much to the point — less children or a base tax and the citizens of the town and country are the only ones who can decide.

There is no doubt that the highlight of the year thus far is the music program. For the first time we are now teaching the boys and girls the fundamentals of music according to the recommendation of the Department of Education. Teachers are cooperating in the project and continuing the work outlined and planned by the music supervisors. The instrumental music has developed to the point where our youngsters will be able to show what they can do in a short time now. However, music or art or any other of the fine arts must be encouraged at home just the same as reading, history, spelling or any other subject. Miracles cannot be accomplished over night, but it has been proved many times that children enjoy music and all they need is an opportunity with encouragement from the home as well as the school. What an opportunity for the modern child!

There have been headaches during the past year just as there are in any business or profession, but it has been my good fortune to have been able to work with you as members of the school board in your quest for a better education for every boy and girl in the community. This is the ultimate goal of any educational institution. May I express my appreciation for your advice and guidance as a policymaking body in this continued quest.
