To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:
(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

The following articles to be taken up at 8 P.M.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,250.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. The money to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money to be expended under the direction of the American Legion Post.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Fitts Museum. The money to be expended under the direction of the Trustees.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the maintenance and development of Moore Park.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred seventy five dollars (\$375.00) for the expense of the Red Phone Fire Alarm and one thousand five hundred twenty five dollars (\$1,525.00) for expense and maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred twenty five dollars (\$625.00) to purchase an additional two-way radio for the Police Department.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ninety two dollars and eighty eight cents (\$92.88) per year to install and maintain one (1) Lumen Mercury Vapor 3500 watt light on Public Service Co. pole #9130/3 at the corner of Olde Mill Rd. and Hemlock Drive in Olde Mill Estates and two (2) Lumen Incandescent 1000 watt lights to be located on Public Service Co. poles #3 and #5 on Hemlock Drive in Olde Mill Estates. - 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to which the State will contribute twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to clear forest fire roads. The money to be expended under the direction of the Forest Fire Warden.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to plow off Mill Pond for skating.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty seven dollars and fifty six cents (\$67.56) to join the New Hampshire Municipal Association or take any other action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for care and maintenance of the Town Dump, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00 for summer roads and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of highways.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to improve Baker Road so that it is passable for motor vehicles from South Road to land of John Goode (approximately 3/4 mile), said improvement to progress in accordance with the construction and occupation of houses on said Goode land and to appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) therefore. ### REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

1965 was a year of transitions for the Candia Police Department. This developed through the labors of the Police Department, the excellent cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, and most important, the desire of the citizens of Candia to have at their disposal an efficient, up-to-date police department.

Working conditions were improved considerably by furnishing adequate equipment and by providing co-ordination and definite policies within the department. With a complement of three special officers, we have been able to furnish more coverage.

I have received my training at St. Anselm's College in January. Members of the department received their first formal training in February with a school conducted by the Assistant Attorney General pertaining to the complex requirements of modern law enforcement and the New Implied Consent Law.

There will be a school conducted during May 1966 in Candia for the police officers. The school will consist of firearms training under conditions similar to those encountered by law enforcement officers. This course is known as the Practical Pistol Course.

Equipment has been purchased which now enables the officers to perform their duties efficiently and in a proper manner. Report and filing systems have been instituted. A simple accounting system has been devised to keep an up-to-date watch on each dollar of the department's budget, thus insuring the taxpayers of getting maximum value for their tax dollar, and to provide the best possible assurance of staying within the budget. There is still need for improvement in several areas. However, these are being studied and will be presented for future consideration.

A police department is only as good as the people of the community want it to be. It is my aim to provide the maximum quality of police service, consistent with the requirements of the town, at the lowest possible cost. It is the policy of this department to enforce all laws in a strict, but fair, manner, with equal consideration for all. The Candia Police Department is YOUR police department. It is the desire of every member of the department that each citizen avail himself of our services whenever necessary.

In closing, I wish to thank the people of Candia for the wholehearted cooperation they have extended the department.

True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

### WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never diseard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
  - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
  - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
  - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to

the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. #### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Candia again faces the need of another classroom for next fall, making a need of 15 all together. This should hold until our present 5th grade leaves us in 1969 when another room will be necessary, if all 8 grades remain in Candia. With grades 7 and 8 attending a co-operative school, we would have expansion room for grades 1-6 for a number of years.

We have other building needs in Candia. Our lunch facilities are woefully inadequate. Everyone connected with this program deserves a world of credit for doing a fine job under most difficult conditions. For a school of its size, Candia has a fine start towards a good elementary library but is limited by space. We are hearing much about the need of good elementary libraries. If and when we have classrooms enough, careful thought should be given to a new kitchen, and cafeteria, a library room, and a teachers' room and office unit!

Total state aid for the current year is \$80,877.00. This does not include an estimated \$2000 anticipated under Federal Law No. 874, the Impacted Area Aid Law. It is possible that we may lose this aid as Pease Air Base and Portsmouth Naval Base are "phased out" and we do not have pupils enough to qualify. Although all the aid received has not been enough to absorb the increase in the budget, it certainly has softened the tax burden considerably.

A brief summary of the newer aspects of Federal aid may be in order. This attempt will be inadequate at best, but may help to understand the basic ideas involved.

Title I gives most districts funds to improve educational opportunities for the "educationally deprived" pupil. The money available depends on economically deprived youngsters as determined from the 1960 census. In theory, there is a great variety of possible projects; in practice, only time will tell!

Title II allocates money to each supervisory union for library books and resources, and audio-visual supplies. This union has \$6500 for these purposes. All of these materials must be deposited in a central place and circulated among school districts as requested, much as a single book may be, but with longer loan periods permissible.

Title III is designed to encourage new ideas in education, to allow for experimental projects, and to encompass large areas. Some of these funds this year will be used for planning grants. Word has just been received that such a grant has been made to the Derry Co-operative School District to plan for a Psychological Service Center for Pre-School and Primary Grade Children for Rockingham County. Assistant Superintendents Ira Stickney of the Derry Union and Roland Schoepf of our office deserve credit for doing the lion's share of the work in preparing the application for this grant. We hope to see this planning grant fully implemented, and such a center established.

The funds under these three titles are "free and clear", and not matched by local funds.

Besides the above, Headstart Projects are still possible under the Office of Economic Opportunity. The planning for these is now at the county level. At the moment, we do not know whether or not we will have any pre-school projects this summer.

There are still funds under the National Defense Education Act for science, mathematics, language, and guidance. These funds must be matched by the local districts.

In the trials and tribulations of working with Federal funds, we are apt to forget that, under PL 89-10, they must be used in addition to regular budgetary funds to do things which would not be otherwise done, and to increase the learning opportunities of children. As in all things human, not all plans will produce results, but who is to say that the effort should not be made? As can be seen from the brief descriptions above, the primary purpose of Federal aid is to make possible a variety of projects and approaches to increase the educational opportunities of all children, with special projects

designed for the educationally deprived. In our anxieties of various kinds, we must not overlook the pupils and what may be done to improve their learning opportunities.

We have spent much time and effort in studying these titles, attending meetings, preparing projects, etc. Paper work varies from title to title, with Title III requiring 30 copies of the application! After all is said and done, we are in education to do the best we can for our pupils; this we have done, and will continue to do.

There continues to be a graet shortage of teachers qualified both by training and proven experience. With expected minimums of \$4800-\$5000 prevailing this spring, the hiring of teachers will become even more critical unless funds allow for considerable leeway. In spite of all "modern methods", various new schemes, techniques, and equipment, there is, and never will be, anything to take the place of a skillful teacher.

Your fine support of your schools is appreciated.

#### COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY REPORT

The Cooperative School Study Boards of Candia, Epping and Raymond, after many months of study, are approaching their final report. During the past months we have found many more reasons why we should work together in a Cooperative School District than reasons to go our separate ways.

Candia, Epping and Raymond are tied together by Highway 101, the busiest East-West road in the state. They are in an area of growth and opportunity and, as the chart below indicates, have very much in common.

The school population in each town is nearly the same. The school tax per \$1,000 based on equalized valuation is very close. The net worth in present schools is also comparable. In fact, the three towns are so nearly equal in this study that the Cooperative Study Group has voted that a future Cooperative School Board would have three members from each town to form a nine member School Board. Each town would then have an equal voice in a new Cooperative School District. In method of apportionment of school costs the study group voted to base it on one-half Equalized Valuation and one-half of Average Daily Membership.

The study group has sifted and evaluated information of all kinds and types furnished by local, state, and out-of-state sources. The one large over-riding issue, in studying all this data, has been the common desire of this board, and the people they represent, to make available to the children of this region an educational system that will develop the child academically, physically, emotionally and socially. This system to be modern and efficient and still to fit within the present tax structure of New Hampshire.

The voters of Candia, Epping and Raymond will be asked at Special School Meetings late in April or May, after hearing the plans of this study group, to vote on forming a Cooperative School District. This school district to pool the resources of all three towns into a joint venture in better schools.

# NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

- (1) for a male or a spayed female \$2.00
- (2) for a female \$5.00

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00.

# BURNING REGULATIONS

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## In Case of Fire - Phone 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc. must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from George W. Beane, Forest Fire Warden, Candia, Tel. 483-8560.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Dept.
