To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H. in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:
(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

The following Articles to be taken up at 8:00 P.M.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year and the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for capital improvements. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money to be expended under the direction of the American Legion Post.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00 for Fitts Museum. The money to be expended under the direction of the Trustees.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the maintenance and development of Moore Park.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the expense of the Red Phone Fire Alarm and two thousand (\$2,000.00) for expense and maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to which the State will contribute twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to clear forest fire roads. The money to be expended under the direction of the Forest Fire Warden.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to plow off Mill Pond for skating.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty four dollars and forty five cents (\$84.45) to join the New Hampshire Municipal Association or take any other action relative thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred dollars (\$1,100.00) for care and maintenance of the Town Dump, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for summer roads and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for general expense of highways.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund Association, Inc., to assist in defraying it's expenses.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) for the purchase and installation of one (1) dry fire hydrant.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the purchase of a police cruiser.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred fifty seven dollars and sixty five cents (\$1,257.65) to purchase radar equipment for the Police Department.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as have been received this past year.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate by auction acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the Budget not already acted upon, and authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Polls to close at 7 P.M. due to reopening at 8 P.M. to take action on remaining articles in the Warrant.



REPORT OF THE POLICE CHIEF

Again this year, as in the past, we have found a tremendous increase in the activities in this department.

Law enforcement has experienced many changes, especially in the past year. These changes have come about as a result of court decisions in certain civic problems and by the interpretation by the courts in regard to civil rights. There are very few basic changes in the individual right in relation to the constitution. It has, however, become the obligation of the law enforcement officials to teach and make certain that individuals understand and have all the benefits of these rights. This can be extremely difficult for the officer as he then assumes in part the defender as well as the enforcer.

The number of motor vehicle accidents and complaints have increased more than any other phase of this department. Accidents in 1967 increased 40% over 1966. It is safe to assume that with the increase in motor vehicles each year this will continue to be a problem.

In comparing our town with many of the neighboring cities and towns, we feel grateful that we have experienced very little vandalism and major crimes. We did have a problem of this nature during the fall, at Halloween time, consisting of broken windows, pumpkins, etc., but this was corrected by the investigation and restrictions of certain juveniles through the cooperation of their parents.

To broaden our knowledge of good law enforcement, the members of this department are continuing to receive training at St. Anselm's College and attending the classes made available to us through the Rockingham County Police Training Academy.

In concluding this report, I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen, my officers, and the citizens of Candia for their cooperation in making the job of this department an easier one.

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE UNIT

The Civil Defense Unit of our town has made steady progress during the past year. A Radiological Monitoring class was conducted by an instructor from the New Hampshire Department of Education designed to inform and instruct CD Personnel and members of the public in the perils and protection from the results of a nuclear attack. This course has qualified us to receive, free of charge, Radiological Monitoring equipment for the Town of Candia.

I am pleased to report that, should the occasion arise, we could fully man with qualified operators and instruments four Radiological reporting groups.

The program paper and progress report for our local CD Unit has been submitted and approved by the Department of the Army, Office of Civil Defense for fiscal year 1968. The program consists of additional training in the following units: Rescue and Engineering, Transportation, Welfare, First Aid, Public Information, Administration, Communications, and Warning Systems. These are our objectives and activities for the fiscal year 1968.

During the past twelve months two warning exercises have been carried out, one state-wide, the other a nation-wide CHECKERBOARD Test. Although we received our message fairly quick, it is planned to have this communication link improved in the near future.

Sundry small items of equipment have been purchased, mostly from government surplus sources, items that, for the most part, are of current use to the Police Department. Of particular note was the acquisition of a 30 KW portable gasoline driven electric generator in "as new" condition, an item that would be valuable in maintaining essential electrical services in the event of a major power failure.

We have purchased a truck through the Federal Surplus Supply. This is now being equipped for all emergencies. This office will continue to take advantage of the Federal Surplus Supply Program made available to our Civil Defense Unit.

With sincere thanks to all Civil Defense Personnel, the Board of Selectmen, the Police Department, the Fire Department, the School, and the citizens that attended the classes, for volunteering their time and services for this worthy cause.

In Candia, Mrs. Ethel Partan, R.N., and now Miss Ann Wagner, R.N., admitted 13 new cases during 1967, 6 of whom were on Medicare.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The average membership of Candia's school has increased from 268.6 to 359.0 in a 10 year period. This shows a relatively slow but steady growth and needs to be watched carefully for any increase in rate. As it is, another classroom will be needed for the fall of 1969. This is an oversimplification of Candia's needs however, which must be given more consideration.

State Foundation Aid this year is \$76,465.37, which is \$6,479.43 more than last year. To offset this is the loss of \$8,005 of the "most needy aid" and \$3,174 in sweepstakes funds. In 1964-65 sweeps money was \$10,307.88 and this year is \$3,827.01. It can be seen that this is not a stable source of funds. Foundation aid for 68-69 is estimated at \$83,134, or \$6,669 more than for the current year. Once again I urge the people of Candia to support actively in the legislature and in legislative hearings all forms of state support of education. Property tax support of education in Candia will not be able easily to maintain the present level of education with increasing costs inevitable, to say nothing about desirable improvements in facilities and program.

Candia's estimated per pupil cost is \$338.04 compared to the state average of \$440. It can be seen that no money is wasted and that other school systems are offering wider programs. Candia's average teacher's salary is next to the bottom in this supervisory union and about \$800 less than the state average. Everything, including the spiral of inflation of 3 to 5%, points to increased costs of education in Candia as well as everywhere else.

The state average teacher's salary for 1967-68 is \$6325, an increase of \$241 over last year's. We are often asked by board members and others, "When is this going to end?" The only thing, in my opinion, which would stop this upward

trend is a major recession. Factors working for continual increases are; 1, A critical shortage of qualified teachers which will continue in part due to small graduating classes 2, An increasing school population in New Hampshire which also affects No. 1; 3, Better minimums and maximums in the states immediately south of us; 4, A slow but continuous spiral of inflation from 3 to 5 per cent a year; 5, Bigger retirement and social security deductions making take-home pay relatively, if not actually, smaller; 6, A more militant attitude and, in some cases, action on the part of the younger teachers particularly. A change of one or two of these factors will not be felt to any great extent. It will take big changes in most, if not all, of the above factors to materially alter the upward trends.

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

With an ever-increasing number of pupils to be accommodated, local school districts are confronted with the problem of trying to provide quality education in the face of a teacher shortage destined to continue for at least a few more years. Because it is nation-wide, the matter of attracting competent teachers to a community has had to assume a new dimension in recruiting. Compared with an era when teachers applied directly for a position, the school superintendent now must spend much time and energy in directing a campaign designed to focus the attention of teachers on a particular community. Failure to go to sources of supply leaves a town with little choice but to fill its classrooms with individuals who are teachers in name only.

In the spring of 1967, the superintendents of New Hampshire were in the process of attempting to fill nearly 1900 vacancies, over 800 of which were at the elementary level. These vacancies represented a 44% increase over 1965, when it already was apparent that the supply of teachers was critical. The problem was further compounded with relatively small classes of teachers being graduated from New Hampshire colleges; only 132 elementary teachers were granted degrees by the state colleges at Keene and Plymouth in 1967.

Never before has it been as imperative that an entire town bend its efforts in the quest for capable teachers. School boards and administrators need sympathetic support in staffing, equipping and maintaining schools. Additionally, teachers are sensitive to community attitude; they have little inclination to seek employment in a district where there is only minor regard for education. In the final analysis, all of the inhabitants of a community exert a direct influence on the kind of an educational program that is offered. Failure to render support will lead to inferior instruction in the school system. Ultimately, society in general will be the real loser, for those children who have been short-changed in school will be unable to make contributions in keeping with what was their potential.



NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

- (1) for a male or a spayed female \$2.00
- (2) for a female \$5.00

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00.

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.

BURNING REGULATIONS

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In Case of Fire - Phone 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc. must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from George W. Beane, Forest Fire Warden, Candia Tel. 483-8560.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Dept.
