THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H. in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

The following Articles to be taken up at 8:00 P.M.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year and the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for capital improvements. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Association.

4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate (And to raise by Notes or Bonds, upon such terms and at such interest as the Selectmen shall approve) a sum not to exceed Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for improvements

to and modernization of the Smyth Public Library, at such time and contingent upon the approval of an application filed by the Trustees of the Smyth Public Library Association with the State Librarian for such purposes. Said application has been made under provisions of Title II, Library Services and Construction Act, Public Laws 89-511 and 90-154 as amended and also laws of the State of New Hampshire pertinent thereto and provides for matching Federal funds in an amount not to exceed Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00). The sum of these funds is to be expended in accordance with procedures established by said Act identified above.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money is to be expended under the direction of the American Legion Post.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Fitts Museum. The money to be expended under the direction of the Trustees.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for the maintenance and development of Moore Park.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the expense of the Red Phone Fire Alarm and two thousand (\$2,000.00) for expense and maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to which the State will contribute twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to clear forest fire roads. The money to be expended under the direction of the Forest Fire Warden.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred ten dollars and thirty nine cents (\$110.39) to join the New Hampshire Municipal Association or take any other action relative thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for care and maintenance of the Town Dump, or take any other action relative thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred eighty seven dollars seventy two cents (\$887.72) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute five thousand nine hundred eighteen dollars and ten cents (\$5,918.10).

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand six hundred dollars (\$12,600.00) for summer roads and one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for general expense of highways.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund Association, Inc., to assist in defraying it's expenses.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to join the Merrimack Valley Regional Association, or take any other action relative thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing streets, or the widening thereof, or parks, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36, Sections 19-29, of the Revised Statutes Annotated (1955), as amended, and to direct the Town Clerk to file with he Register of Deeds of Rockingham County a certificate showing that the Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization.

18. To see if the Town will vote to choose a Chief of Police pursuant to the provisions of RSA 41:2.

19. If the preceding Article is accepted by the Town, to choose a police officer for the ensuing year who shall perform the duties prescribed by law and shall in addition serve as Chief of Police under the Selectmen and exercise authority over and supervise other police officers as provided in RSA 105:1, the compensation and expenses of said Chief of Police to be provided for in the Town Budget prepared by the Selectmen and voted by the Town.

20. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the zoning ordinance. The revised version to be voted on at a later date. The voting to be done by Australian ballot. Yes vote to abolish the present zoning. No vote to retain the present zoning Code. This to be placed in the Town Warrant to be voted on in March 1969 at Town Meeting. Maurice E. 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as have been received this past year.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate by auction acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the Budget not already acted upon, and authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Polls to close at 6 P.M. due to reopening at 8 P.M. to take action on remaining articles in the Warrant.

REPORT OF THE POLICE CHIEF

This is the fourth annual report of the Candia Police Department that I am privileged to prepare.

The year 1968 was by far the busiest of the past three due to the increase in almost every duty that the department is summoned to perform.

In order to broaden our knowledge, the men and women of the department have attended courses on all phases of law enforcement and it's duties. The Auxiliary, as well as the Regular police officers, hold diplomas from the Rockingham Law Enforcement Academy. These courses were taken at no expense whatsoever to the town. These men and women have donated their time and effort to attend these classes in order to bring to the people of Candia a better Police Department. To mention a few of the courses that were taken; Rules of Evidence; Law of Arrest; Uniform Traffic Code; Criminal Law; Narcotics; Finger Printing; In-Custody Interrogation; Criminal Investigation. These are just some of many courses that all the officers have taken in 1968.

Our Regular Police Force consists of five men and one woman. Our Civil Defense Auxiliary Force, at no expense to the town, consists of three men and one woman.

Many people have questioned the reason for having policewomen. A recent Supreme Court Ruling has made it a necessity to have a policewoman in the department in order to investigate cases which concern the involvement of females in search and seizure.

Our Radar has been most effective in 1968, it has shown a decrease in Motor Vehicle violations especially in fatal accidents. The primary objectives of this department are: (1) To bring police and members of the community together in a continuing relationship in order to reduce suspicion, misunderstanding, and hostility and to discover their mutuality of interest and responsibility; (2) to assist in the professional education of police officials with emphasis on the social, psychological, essentially human dimensions of police work; (3) to introduce citizens at large to police problems, the role of law enforcement agencies, and the total community's responsibility for law enforcement.

At this time I would like to express sincere appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, my fellow officers and especially to the citizens of Candia for their understanding and facilities that they have provided to make this department's job easier, thus making Your Town an orderly, safer and more enjoyable place to live in.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

AND DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted match is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result - escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn-

- a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. an 5:00 P.M.
- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE UNIT

The Civil Defense Unit in our town is still making steady progress.

A Radiological Monitoring Refresher Course has been conducted by the Department of Education out of Concord to keep us up to date on the latest Monitoring devices and procedures, thus making us qualified to receive our Radiological Monitoring Equipment consisting of fifteen pieces of electronic equipment that we are now using at no charge to the town. This equipment that we now have completes our Radiological Monitoring Group.

We are pleased to announce that our Civil Defense truck is fully equiped to cope with any Natural or Nuclear disaster should any occur.

The program papers and progress report for our local Civil Defense Unit have been submitted and approved by the Department of the Army, Office of Civil Defense. This enables us to receive surplus property from Concord.

We have completed a Personal and Family Survival Course for the public with a very good attendance record. Each person attending the full course received an Adult Education Certificate in Personal and Family Survival. We will continue to have these courses through the year at no cost to anyone.

During the past twelve months one warning exercise was received. The State-Wide and Nation-Wide CHECKER-BOARD test. Two warnings were exercised, although we received only one due to the breakdown in our communications link in October of 1968. I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all Civil Defense Personnel, the Board of Selectmen, the School, and the citizens that attended the classes, for volunteering their time and services for this worthy cause.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. REPORT OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

This is my last report. When it is read, I shall be attending to the affairs of life normally associated with retirement. However, one cannot give up a role easily which has been played for forty years without having a few thoughts about the past, present and future. While it is pleasant to reminisce, the fulfillment of tomorrow's dreams can only be realized through positive action taken today.

Through the years, the process of education has moved from the little red school house, which at that time met the needs of many, to a refinement and sophistication that can only be accommodated in a larger school. The child who completed the eighth grade yesterday now stays on until he finishes high school. In some areas of the country, the community provides an additional two years of education at public expense. The complexities of the modern world place a premium on education which can only involve greater expenditures as the years go by.

At one time, the local school district assumed full responsibility for financing its educational system. With the passing of time, the demands that have been placed on the community are taking an increasingly larger share of the tax dollar, to the point that the property owner is required to shoulder a proportionately larger burden. Whereas teachers would accept what a local district would pay, or move on, a mobile population has teamed up with modern means of communication to break down town boundaries. Teachers, with leadership provided through their associations, are acting in concert in the presentation of demands which tend to be uniform from district to district. As a consequence of this, school boards have been haunted with the specter of costs increasing more rapidly than ability to pay.

Basically, education is a state function, with school districts serving as political subdivisions of the state. The state board of education has powers of management, supervision and direction over all public schools and may make rules and regulations necessary to secure their efficient administration. From time to time, statutes have been enacted which also contribute to a framework within which local boards operate. The purpose of such regulation is to insure that all children living in the state receive an equality of educational opportunity. However, the scope of education today exceeds that which must be provided by law and while every child has the same opportunity in theory, in practice this is not the case.

The time is now at hand when, more than any other time in history, it is necessary for the state to extend itself to a greater degree than it has in order to promote educational opportunity. There is a wide discrepancy in the ability of towns to meet costs, and the town which is rural in character does not have the same resources as does the one with a broad tax base provided by business and industry. If the state is not to abdicate its responsibility, it would seem quite evident that it must at least fully implement those statutes which now exist so that the local taxpayer will not be called upon incessantly to make up the difference necessary to maintain an adequate educational program. In turn, it would seem appropriate to consider very seriously the methods of raising revenue required to implement these statutes. Unless these steps are taken, inequality of educational opportunity not only will continue, but it can only become greater in the years ahead.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

- (1) for a male or a spayed female \$2.00
- (2) for a female \$5.00

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00.

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.

BURNING REGULATIONS

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In Case of Fire - Phone 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc. must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from George W. Beane, Forest Fire Warden, Candia Tel. 483-8560.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Dept.
