



THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the sixth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- To see if the Town will vote to repeal the existing zoning ordinance and adopt a revised new ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. (These questions to be voted on the official ballot as required by RSA 31:63-a)

Polls will open at ten a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

You are also notified to meet on Saturday, the tenth day of March, next at two o'clock in the afternoon at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library and four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the purchase of books, a total of two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900.00) for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Association.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money to be expended under the direction of American Legion Post #91.

- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the maintenance and development of Moore Park.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the expense of the Red Phone Fire Alarm System. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for the expense and maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for care and maintenance of the Town Dump or take any other action relative thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Sixty Nine Dollars and Sixty Nine Cents (\$869.69) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Five Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety Seven Dollars and Ninety Four Cents (\$5,797.94).
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for Summer Roads and One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for General Expense of Highways.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund Association, Inc., to assist in defraying its expenses.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.
- 14. To see if the Town of Candia will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enlist the services of the Tax Commission of the State of New Hampshire to

revalue all of the taxable property in the Town and raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Three Dollars (\$10,553.00) in 1973 to defray approximately 60% of the expenses associated therewith, the balance to be raised and appropriated at the 1974 town meeting.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote, if Article 14 is adopted, to apply the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Three Dollars (\$10,553.00), received from Federal Revenue Sharing, toward the cost of the action proposed by Article 14.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, and to raise, appropriate and pay into such fund the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the purpose of defraying the cost of a police cruiser when replacement of the same is necessary.
- To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.
- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate by auction acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed.
- To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE POLICE CHIEF - 1972

This is the seventh annual report of the Candia Police Department that I am privileged to prepare.

Those of us who are privileged to serve in the law enforcement profession have become very aware of the increase in the challenge that is found in our society today.

In order to meet the many demands of his varied duties, the police officer must have an abundant amount of knowledge and intelligence concerning the new court rulings, and all other aspects in the field of law enforcement, he must also have an abundant measure of honesty, judgement, courage, and physical stamina.

Training is very important in helping the peace officer perform his duties well. We have periodic training sessions in each of the many predicaments every officer must be prepared to encounter. In August, I attended an advanced firearms training course in Peekskill, New York, which was conducted by the F.B.I. Training Academy. In October I attended a course in Forensic Medicine, conducted by the Office of the Attorney General, at the University

of New Hampshire. By attending these courses I was able to bring to my fellow officers valuable knowledge that I had received, therefore enabling them to be enlightened in each new phase of police training, which cannot be brought directly to each individual department.

There is another side to the police officer, a more gentle side of which we seldom hear. To see a police officer comfort the grief stricken, who he has to bring the news of the death of a loved one- to watch him selflessly risk his life to save another - to learn of his commitments to help the youth, rather than to submit them to the courts.

The addition of our new cruiser has been a great asset to this department. Having a vehicle complete with all necessary equipment for any situation which may arise, makes it easier for the officers in charge to perform their duties more efficiently.

I would like to pay special acknowledgement to the people who have donated articles, and equipment to this department in the past year, which has saved the town a considerable amount of money. In behalf of the department, I would like to express my sincere thanks to, Dr. & Mrs. Hermann N. Sander, Maiden's Funeral Home, Mr. & Mrs. Paul Sargeant, the East Candia Grange, The Candia Lions Club, Mr. & Mrs. John Klardie, Simano's Garage, and to those who have donated since this report has gone to the press. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

I would like to emphasize at this time, the sharp increase of burglaries in our town this past year. It would be extremely helpful if each property owner would take special precautions by having adequate locks installed on all doors and windows, then keep your home or apartment locked at night or when you are away. Ask a neighbor to keep an eye on your property, and to please report any suspicious persons or activities of any kind promptly to the police. Notify, Post Office, newspapers, etc., to stop services while you are away on vacation, an automatic light at night is also very helpful. If you value a bicycle, lawnmower, garden equipment, etc., lock them up. During the winter months that you are away, have someone clear a path or driveway to indicate that the house may be inhabited. Your cooperation in this matter would be of great value to this department, and would make our town a safer one. If the perpetrator is discouraged by the helpful, and watchful eye of the community, the burglaries could be reduced.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANDIA CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

The Conservation Commission for the Town of Candia was established by vote of the Town of Candia on the first Tuesday in March, 1972, pursuant to the enabling statute RSA: 36-A.

Pursuant to that vote an initial appointment of three members was made by the town selectmen and they were as follows:

Mr. Alden Couture, Acting Chairman Dr. Herman Sander Miss Elizabeth Nutt

The first meeting of the Commission was held in April whereat the three members compiled a list to be presented to the selectmen for nominations for the remaining positions.

From the list submitted by the Conservation members the selectmen appointed the following individuals as the Candia Conservation Commission, thereby bringing the total membership to the statutory maximum of seven:

Dr. Herman Sander Miss Elizabeth Nutt

Mr. Alden Couture

Mr. John Bean

Mr. Norman Maiden

Mr. Leonard Chace

Mr. Bruce Larson, Chairman

The Commission membership was finalized in September and all members had been sworn in by October.

The following is a list of meeting activities for the Commission's first year:

May: The meeting consisted of discussions of nominations to the Commission and organizational topics.

June: At the request of the Commission members Mr. Andrew Cannon, a representative of the New Hampshire State Fish and Game Department introduced and discussed the conservation commission statute RSA 36A, distributed several pamphlets concerning wildlife management and agreed to serve as advisor in these areas.

July and August: No meetings were held due to the inability of members to attend as a result of vacations, etc.

September: Mr. Parker, a member of the Greenland, New Hampshire Conservation Commission spoke to the commission and shared his views on problems their commission had encountered as a fledgling commission. He encouraged that the commission be farsighted with the theme "How do you want your town to look in 20 to 25 years."

October: The October meeting was addressed by Mr. Malcolm Taylor, Executive Secretary of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions. He emphasized the importance of working with other agencies of the town and gave the Commission additional guidelines that have been effective in other New Hampshire towns. Mr. Taylor was responsible for the first contribution to the Commission of \$75.00, \$50.00 of which was applied toward the Commission's membership in the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions and the remaining \$25.00 is a part of the Commission's trust fund. Membership in the Association enables the Conservation Commission to receive a monthly newsletter, invite speakers from Concord and have films shown to the townspeople. Also in October some of the Commission members attended the monthly meeting of the Rye, New Hampshire, Conservation Commission. The members received a warm reception and were able to discuss common problems with our membership. The Rye Commission stressed the value of obtaining soil survey maps and zoning maps.

November: Mr. James Hayden the representative of the State Soils Commission presented a soil condition and report to the Commission then gave an analysis of the types of soils in Candia. He demonstrated how soil conditions can and should affect zoning.

Also in November the annual meeting of conservations commissions was held in Conway. Through the use of films and "cracker-barrel sessions," town reports and a visit to the new Conway open-pit incinerator, those who attended became aware of the solid waste disposal problems on a regional as well as a local level. Although solid waste disposal was the theme of the annual meeting, other projects were described by the various town reports. Under the heading of "conservation" came such items as:

- (a) designation of scenic roads
- (b) recycling and town clean-up
- (c) maps of points of historical interest
- (d) participation of youth and service groups

- (e) sending a young person to conservation camp
- (f) acquiring various pieces of land for natural beauty.

December: At the December meeting of the Commission it was agreed that the Chairman speak to the Planning Board in an attempt to have the industrial zone reduced in size to confine the industrial zone to an area more consistent with the soil types found in the proposed general area.

The Commission's recommendation was a five-eighths mile long by three-eighths mile wide zone on the southeasterly side of Route 101 between the managed woodlands area and a brook just northerly of Tilo Inc.'s present location.

A letter from the Commission to the Planning Board concerning this site was sent in January.

January: In January of this year the Commission was invited to attend the first meeting of the Lamprey River project in Epping. Several towns are participating in the monthly study groups that will be concentrating on ways to clean up the embankments as well as the river itself. One member of the Commission has agreed to represent Candia at the monthly meetings and will be submitting progress reports.

The Commission members have been generous in donating funds for maps, water sample bottles, transportation, postage and telephoning, but feel that a budget is necessary if such expenses are to be met in the future. R.S.A. 35-A:5 authorizes appropriations for operating expenses and the Commission requests to be placed on a line item budget arrangement with an appropriation of \$100.00 for the second year's expenses.

The Commission plans to have two films shown in March and will publicize the date and time as soon as they are available. The Commission would like to encourage community participation in their projects and at their monthly meetings and will be publicizing their activities in the library, post offices and general store.

The Conservation Commission appreciates the help that has been given by various town officials from time to time and is looking forward to a close working relationship in the future.

Report of Civil Defense Unit

REPORT OF THE CANDIA CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR 1972

The Civil Defense Unit is still making a steady increase in its many phases. For 1973, we are planning to have refresher courses in Radiological Monitoring, Medical Self Help and First Aid, any resident interested in participating in these courses, please contact the Civil Defense Director. These courses are free of charge to ALL residents.

Our progress report for the Civil Defense Unit has been submitted and approved by the Department of the Army, Office of Civil Defense, which enables us to be eligible for the use of surplus property.

For all practical purposes our Auxiliary officers will be called Reserve officers.

WHAT IS A RESERVE OFFICER?

It is highly important that we establish the definition of a reserve officer. He is a volunteer, uniformed and trained to perform limited and temporary police functions under supervision of a regular officer. Although special attention shall be placed on the civilian defense concept of reserve police as distinct from the regular police officer.

Reserve officers serve all types of police duties, basically however their purpose is singular, to augment under emergency conditions the regular police force.

At best most police departments under emergency conditions are greatly under strength. For this reason a reserve police unit is essential to the plans of any Police Chief, provided, that he has given adequate time to selection, training and supervision of such personnel. To merely designate so many persons as reserve police to be called out in an emergency is not enough, and there is an inherent danger when such personnel are used.

A reserve unit can accomplish many things for your police department under the right climate:

- 1. It can release personnel from minor traffic duties to prevent and investigate crime.
- 2. Reserve personnel can strengthen the patrol units in depth by acting as additional uniformed riders during certain hours.
- 3. Reserve personnel can be used to increase needed personnel during an emergency such as accidents, fires, natural or man made disasters and this is their primary function.
- 4. Reserve personnel often are a pool where future full time personnel can be obtained as interest is developed in the profession.

The training and equipping of the reserve officer has been accomplished at no cost to the town.

At this time I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Board of Selectmen for their cooperation. I would also like to give special thanks to the reserve officers, the Civil Defense personnel, and the citizens of the town who assisted in the recent plane crash.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful took when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.



You are hereby notified to meet at the Moore School in said district on the 2nd day of March 1973, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
- 9. To see if the voters will authorize the School Board to accept on behalf of the District, any Federal or State funds designed to improve educational opportunities. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to elect its District Officers by separate ballot at the annual town meeting of the Town of Candia, commencing with the annual town meeting to be held in 1974, in accordance with R.S.A. 197:1-A.

Superintendent's Report

Today's schools are indeed becoming more and more complex. We see evidence of this here in Candia. The job of the teacher is ever more demanding and one that requires constant re-evaluation in terms of today's curriculum.

We now find the school curriculum has become everybody's business. Inside and outside education, there are forces that propose changes in our schools.

Some call for a return to "basic education," while still others want more emphasis on "creativity" and "individualized instruction." This is the dilemma facing your School Board.

At our town level, we realize that the curriculum is affected by the availability of materials, physical facilities, and community demands, including financial resources.

Teaching techniques previously have been geared toward drill and repetition. Today we find the stress on developing understanding and overall content, rather than studying isolated factual material.

There is great need to adjust the curriculum to the needs of the times. We might very well find in the near future, full-time teachers working on developing the curriculum when students are not in attendance.

Libraries or media centers will need to receive a high priority in our town budget if standards are to be maintained. Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 has helped us some but much more local effort is needed in the years to come.

We need and hopefully will see much stress in the future on Vocational Education. A school program is certainly needed that will enable every young person completing Grade 12 to be ready to enter higher education or to enter useful and rewarding employment. We are really talking about the capacity of our people to sustain and accelerate the pace of progress in this country during a lifetime of learning.

I appreciate the cooperation of the School Board and the community in our educational endeavors.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

- (1) for a male or a spayed female \$2.00
- (2) for a female \$5.00

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00.

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.

BURNING REGULATIONS

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In Case of Fire - Phone 483-2317

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from George W. Beane, Forest Fire Warden, Candia Tel. 483-8560.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Dept.
