ABOUT THE COVER

The Candia Historical Society, upon learning the Town did not have an official seal, sponsored a contest limited to Candia residents. The winning entry, which appears on the front cover and drawn by Charles Baroody, was presented to the Town by the Historical Society in the hope that it be accepted as the official seal for the Town of Candia.

The seal depicts the first meetinghouse and the deer symbolizes the origin of the Town's first name "Charmingfare." Tradition says the name Charmingfare arose from an exclamation, "This is charming fare," made when men from Chester, first visiting the locality, had killed a deer, and were partaking of the venison. The Town's name was changed from Charmingfare to Candia upon incorporation in 1763.

On October 3, 1977 this seal was officially adopted by the Board of Selectmen.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning and building regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by secret ballot.

You are also notified to meet on Friday, the seventeenth of March, next at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy One Dollars (\$8,971.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Association.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$550.00) for the Red Phone Fire Alarm System. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for general expenses and maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Seventy Four Dollars and Eighty Eight Cents (\$874.88) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Five Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Two Dollars and Fifty Two Cents (\$5,832.52).

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund Association, Inc., to assist in defraying its expenses.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Associations. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Ordinance Regulating the Use of Fublic Parks, Cemeteries and other Public Property as follows:

- All public parks, cemeteries, conservation areas and other public lands are closed to the public from nine o'clock in the evening (9:00 P.M.) until sunrise.
- (2) Consumption of alcoholic beverages thereon is prohibited except when a liquor permit is issued by the Selectmen.
- (3) Fires thereon are prohibited except when a fire permit is issued by the Fire Warden.
- (4) Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a penalty of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each violation, the same to enure to the general fund of the Town.
- (5) The Police Department, under the direction of the Selectmen, are appointed to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the support of the Ray-Fre Senior Citizens Center. On petition of:

12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enlist the services of the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire to assist them in performing appraisal maintenance for the ensuing year and raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to defray the expenses associated therewith.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept and expend such funds as are made available to Candia under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Twenty Five Dollars (\$825.00) to fund materials and equipment for mosquito control measures, spraying and larviciding for the summer of 1978. Labor will be provided by the County at no expense to the Town. The above funds would be part of the town budget.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Planning Board to limit subdivision approval to three (3) lots or less for each lot of record, show on the 1975 Candia Tax Map as amended in August 1977, for a period of or rear commencing March 14, 1978, to allow the Planning Board to implement a Master Plan for the planned and orderly growth of the $T_{\rm OWN}$. And also to temporarily minimize and control the impact on the increased cost of Town services including schools, road maintenance, fire and police protection and health services, thereby preventing an undue financial burden on the inhabitants of the Town, and to enable Town officials to formulate and propose for consideration by the Townspeople ordinances designed to protect and preserve the rural character, ecological and scenic values, financial stability and public health and welfare of the Town.

16. To see if the Town will vote to enlarge the Planning Board membership from five to seven members.

17. To see if the Town of Candia will vote to appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Eighty Eight Dollars and Thirty Cents (\$888.30) to renew the Town's membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission which will allow us to draw upon their expertise during the development of a Master Plan for Candia.

18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from Anti-Recession Funds (Title II, Public Works Employment Act of 1976) the sum of One Hundred Seventy Four Dollars (\$174.00) as a set-off against budgeted appropriation for Town Officers' Expenses.

19. "Shall we adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43-c relative to expanded exemptions on real estate for the elderly, changing the eligibility requirement that a person may own no more than \$35,000 in assets of any kind to a requirement that a person may own no more than \$50,000 in assets of any kind?" 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) for Incinerator Equipment.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Federal Revenue Sharing monies the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500.00) to fund an FM Radio Communications and Firefighter Tone Alert Call System. 24. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to Chapter 35 of RSA and to raise and appropriate and pay into such fund the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the purpose of defraying the cost of a police cruiser when replacement of the same is necessary.

25. Be it resolved by the Town of Candia that the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Candia, in the State of New Hampshire, that said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, for elderly persons under Section 8 of the U. S. 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same. 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1977, the 42 regular members and 18 associate members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department spent over 2,200 recorded manhours working for the department. This expenditure of time breaks down as follows:

614 man-hours - maintenance of vehicles and fire fighting equipment 75 man-hours - repair of boiler and heating system 592 man-hours - formal fire fighting training programs 422 man-hours - responding to calls 520 man-hours - July 4th celebration

During 1977, we responded to 41 calls, a 59.5 per cent increase over the 25 calls we received in 1976. We were particularly fortunate again this year to have outstanding support from our fellow townspeople.

We are also grateful for the continuing efforts of the Ladies' Auxiliary. President, Mrs. Beatrice Young, reports that the Auxiliary presently has 2 charter members, 10 honorary members and 32 regular members.

We ask for continued support from the people of Candia during 1978.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

This department responded to 1,812 calls during 1977. Some calls were minor, others more serious in nature.

The calls most prevalent were for larceny and burlary. In the past, we have listed several ways to deter and discourage the perpetrators and I would like to emphasize them once more. Engrave or mark your valuables in a way that they may be identified should they be taken during a burglary. Install adequate locks on all doors and windows and be sure that they are all secured before leaving your home, even for just a short while.

If you are going to be away on vacation, inform the police department. Tell them how long you will be away and where you can be reached should it be necessary. Notify the post office, newspapers. etc. Stop all deliveries until you return. Ask a neighbor to look after your property and have them report promptly any suspicious persons or activities of any kind to the police. Especially during the winter months, have someone clear a path or driveway to indicate the house is inhabited. An automatic switch that turns lights and/or radios on and off is a helpful deterrent. Many homes are now equipped with an electric safety alarm device which is set off when anyone attempts to enter the home. Be sure to put away and lock up bicycles, lawnmowers, garden equipment, snow machines, etc. Your cooperation in these matters could be of great value to you and this department. Remember the harder it is for a burglar to enter any house, the chance of his being caught is much greater. Please remember our "OPERATION CRIME STOP." If you see it, report it!

I would like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere thanks to all the citizens of Candia, the Board of Selectmen, and my fellow officers for their support and cooperation.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of 1/4 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

Report of Service

NURS ING

Skilled Nursing is available in the home by Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses which includes dressings, injections, special treatments, baths and rehabilitative nursing under the direction of the patient's physician. Homemaker-Home Health Aides assist under the direction of the nurses and therapists.

THERA PY

Registered physical, occupational and speech therapists are available for therapy at home. Social worker and nutritionist consultants are also available.

PRE AND POST NATAL ADVICE

The nurse is prepared to give advice and guidance to expectant mothers as well as instructions after the baby is born.

A special program for adolescent pregnant mothers has been added this year. Classes are held for instruction each Monday at 4 P.M.

Immunization clinics are held periodically during the year and nurses are available daily between 1:30 - 3 P.M. at the Visiting Nurse Association office and at monthly drop in centers to take blood pressure readings.

POLICY

This agency is voluntary and non profit and is certified to care for Medicare patients. Although many of the services are paid for through Medicaid, Medicare and other health insurances, there is, a fee which is discussed in the initial visit. Adjustments can be made. There is no charge for maternal and child health visits made by the nurses. Anyone may request the service by calling the Visiting Nurse office at 622-3781, Monday through Friday from 7:30 A.M. to 5 P.M. Necessary services are provided on weekends and holidays. There is 24 hour answering service available for messages.

Visiting Nurse Association services are available to Candia residents at no cost to the town. Mrs. Paul Sargeant represents Candia on the Board of Directors of the Association. Mrs. Margaret Crawford, R.N. is replacing Mrs. Denise Sargeant, R.N. as the nurse in the Candia area.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

On June 11, 1969, the New Hampshire State Board approved the following:

- 1. <u>September 1, 1972 as the effective date</u> for local schools to begin implementation of "Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Elementary Schools for School Approval, K-8."
- 2. July 1, 1969 as the effective date for space requirements for <u>new</u> school facilities, <u>additions</u> and <u>renovations</u>.

PURPOSE OF MINIMUM STANDARDS

The major reasons for planning, organizing and establishing a minimum standards program for public elementary education are to: (1) improve the quality of learning and teaching in New Hampshire, and (2) see that each child has an equal opportunity for learning.

PROJECT GOALS

To Require:

Fublic elementary schools to develop a written statement of philosophy. Schools to develop organizational patterns that best meet the needs of all children.

Sound administration and supervision in the elementary school.

A broad well-balanced elementary school curriculum.

Well-qualified and sufficient teaching personnel to meet adequately the needs of all the children.

Sound in-service education programs for all teachers.

Good library facilities and services in all public elementary schools. Good guidance and counseling services in all public elementary schools. Functional modern elementary school facilities.

This past fall, Mr. John G. Economopoulos, Assistant Chief and elementary education advisor, spent approximately a week in Supervisory Union #15 evaluating the status of all the elementary schools in the area of minimum standards.

With his permission, I am incorporating in this report his findings.

"Commend:

- 1. The superintendent of schools and the Supervisory Union #15 staff for the outstanding leadership provided to all the elementary schools.
- 2. The assistant superintendent for his leadership role.

- 3. The school principals for the leadership they express with their respective staffs and for the excellent staff morale and school discipline that was evident in my visitations.
- 4. The teachers for the "control" and positive behavior of the children; as well as their work in curriculum and staff development.
- 5. The children for their school behavior especially in the crowded school situations, such as Candia.
- 6. The local school boards in Supervisory Union #15 for their realistic support of the Minimum Standards policy. The local school board support is outstanding.

A special commendation is extended to the local school boards for the significant improvements made in the elementary schools prior to this visitation.

Also, your high quality expectations from staff and children is highly commendable. The general morale appeared high and reflected a spirit of cooperation with parents, especially in those schools where there was an active P. T. O.

The school principals reflected a variety of administrative styles and this could be a very encouraging element because they reflected a supportive and helpful attitude toward parents, staff and children."

School Status

The Candia Moore School met 90% or more of the present standards, therefore, the recommendation to the Commissioner of Education will be made as follows:

> "To approve the Candia Moore public elementary school in Supervisory Union #15 and place them in Category II."

Of the five categories developed and through the 18 major areas of consideration, it has been found that the local school boards had initiated meeting these minimum standards as early as 1969. It is, therefore, appropriate to commend board members who admirably served during this time:

Mabel Brock, Laurence Partan, James Winslow, Mona Price, William Fongeallaz, Walter Rand, Jr., Bruce Larson, Robert Cooke, Russell Dann, Mrs. Arlene Dewolf and Dale Uhlenhake.

Attention should be given to those students who attend high school outside the district. Our responsibility does not end with the tuition charge that is found within the framework of the school district's budget. The school board and its administration does get involved with the high school not only in terms of programs but also in other related areas such as transportation, education of handicapped and special needs students, along with the coordination of curriculum and guidance. Mr. Sweeney, the Principal, should be commended for his efforts in the coordination of those students from the Moore School attending the high school.

I would, therefore, like to extend my sincere thanks to the community, the administration and the staff for the support given to your school.

Each year the job of school nursing has become more involved and time-consuming.

With the addition of new programs to the educational process, the nurse becomes involved as a team member in the referral and follow-up if there is any problem of a medical nature.

In the screening process, instead of ideally adding to it, lack of time and available space has contributed to a slowingup or elimination of some part of the process. For instance, hearing tests are now only done in grades 1, 4, and 7 unless a direct referral is made by another staff member or parent.

The nurse's responsibilities also include handling the free and reduced lunch program, attending conferences and workshops, conducting health surveys of various natures, involvement in dental and other health-educational programs.

It continues to be my pleasure to serve you and your children as school nurse.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

With the growth of the Candia population comes an increase in town health problems along with an increase in the strictness of state health laws. The one acre lot for a home is no longer practical but some still exist by way of the "grandfather clause."

Because of the nature of the terrain, especially on one acre lots, there may be spillage from one septic system to a neighbor's land and if the number of persons is doubled or tripled, this is bound to cause an increased demand on the septic system resulting in complaints. The two acre lot requirement has helped to correct this in new homes.

Before one buys a home in Candia on one or less acre of land, he should check with the local Health Officer to make sure that a satisfactory septic system, adequate for the new family, is present.

Another problem is garbage disposal. The town has a facility for this purpose and it should be used. No garbage or trash should be dumped on the ground about a home or along a road for obvious reasons: the breeding of flies and mosquitoes; making an unsightly mess; producing disagreeable odors; all giving the town a bad name. This is especially bad if the garbage is near a source of water, brooks or ponds.

The cooperation of all citizens in these matters would be greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

Regional Planning Agencies, such as, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission are responsible for basic planning activities throughout New Hampshire. Each agency has a specific area for which it is responsible.

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission is responsible for preparing coordinated regional plans of its region for land use, transportation, water supply, sewerage, public buildings and the like. Regional plans to be effective <u>must provide for future</u> <u>growth</u> in those areas where such growth can most efficiently occur. The regional planning process <u>must</u> include an objective evaluation of differing proposals and <u>must</u> include public consideration of unpopular or minority viewpoints.

Regional planning provides up-to-date data needed by local officials to make decisions regarding zoning amendments, street and road improvements, sewer locations, and location of public facilities, to name a few.

Candia Representatives

Mrs. Emma K. Hall and Mr. John Goodrich represent Candia as voting members of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

Technical Assistance

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission provided these direct services to Candia last year as part of their Local Technical Assistance Program:

- Presented expanded list of basic and contract Commission services.
- Provided updated list of State planning legislation changes.
- Prepared and presented to the Planning Board a detailed outline regarding the preparation of a Town Master Plan.
- Provided information on the Section 8 Housing Assistance Program.
- Provided Planning Board with 1000' scale soils and steep slope maps to assist them with evaluation of development proposals.

Regional Planning

Regional planning studies conducted by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission over the past year include:

Land Use - Completion of Land Use Flan 2000, a long range plan to assist communities in their land use planning efforts. Citizen involvement in Candia played a major role in shaping the plan's recommendations and policies. Housing - The Regional Housing Plan was completed.

Transportation - Reports generated include:

- . Land Use Update FY 1977, MMPS Area
- . Population and Land Use Projections 1985 & 2000, MMPS Area
- . Population Estimates FY 1977, MMPS Area

The Coming Year

During the coming year, member communities will receive detailed assistance relative to recommended procedures for implementation of the regional land use and housing plans. Local technical assistance will include the development of model ordinances; modernization of subdivision regulations and identification of area where growth should and should not occur.

THE SPEECH, HEARING AND LANGUAGE PROGRAM 1976-1977

In September 1976, the Speech, Hearing and Language Program began with a screening of all incoming first graders, all new students, those participating in the program in 1975-1976, and those referred for an evaluation by teachers. Those having difficulty with the screening were given a full evaluation. In addition to the first graders, 49 children were tested at this time. Of the 49 tested, 22 required immediate Speech or Language therapy, 14 were placed on a waiting list and 13 showed adequate speech and Language abilities for their age level.

The addition of a second day of therapy enabled 22 children to receive therapy. The breakdown for the 22 grade school children is as follows:

- 9 strictly articulation cases
- 9 articulation and language cases
- 3 strictly language cases
- 1 stutterer

One pre-schooler was referred and tested and was enrolled in the speech and language program. These children were placed on the program and grouped according to the nature and severity of the disorder, age, grade and maturity level. Students were placed in groups or seen individually according to their needs, giving consideration to the length and time of each session so as not to interfere with important classroom work.

In January 1977, all students participating in the program were re-evaluated. At this time, four were dismissed and four were moved from the waiting list to enrollment in the program. Evaluations were done upon receipt of a teacher referral or when a new student entered school. This procedure continued throughout the year.

Also in January, listening skills groups were established with the assistance of Mrs. Betty Thomson. This program involved 18 first grade children and was designed to help them in classroom skills.

Progress reports were sent home at the second and fourth marking periods. Some parent conferences were scheduled at the end of the second term. In June, parent conferences were scheduled with all who had children participating in the Speech, Hearing and Language Program to discuss progress and future therapy placement. At that time, eight more students were recommended for dismissal, nine were recommended for a re-evaluation in September 1977 and six were recommended to continue therapy for the next school year.

THE TITLE I LEARNING ABILITIES PROGRAM 1976-1977

The Title I Learning Abilities Program seeks to identify students who are having difficulties in their academic work because of a particular learning problem. Once identified, they work individually or in a small group with an aide for short remedial sessions. Individual programs are planned by the Learning Abilities Specialist based on each child's learning strengths and weaknesses as determined by diagnostic tests administered.

During the 1976-1977 school year, 46 children from grades 1 - 6 received assistance from the Title I Learning Abilities Program. Twenty-four of these students were seen 3 - 5 days a week receiving assistance in the areas of visual and auditory perception, language development, reading, mathematics and spelling. Eleven of these students also received assistance to aid in the development of gross motor coordination. In addition to these students, 22 were seen solely for help with gross motor development.

End of the year evaluations measure each child's growth in the following areas: reading comprehension, level of functioning in the area of their specific learning problem, and self-concept. These results are then compiled in the Title I evaluation report.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1976-1977

Moore Elementary School opened the 1976-1977 academic year with all seventeen classrooms fully occupied. In addition, the Special Education program, was housed at St. Paul's Church.

The physical plant was utilized to the fullest extent with band and chorus classes conducted on the stage and corridors. A converted custodial storeroom served as a meeting place and counselor's office. The Physical Education program was reorganized to include classroom instructors so as to accommodate the use of the gym as a serving area for the lunch program. The Learning Abilities program continued to work in close quarters, as well as utilizing the corridors to accommodate all children involved in the Title I program. The Health Room was shared by the School Nurse and Speech and Language Therapist. A shortage of space forced the library to move many volumns to the hallway and limit the use of the library by the students.

This year's energies were directed toward developing high scholastic and social standards. In order to meet these goals, emphasis was placed on reading, mathematics, social development and an enjoyment of school.

We continued to review our curriculum with major revisions occuring in the area of 7th and 8th grade mathematics. Our reading program was improved to provide enrichment materials for all grades to provide for individual needs. In grade 8, the social studies curriculum was enhanced with the addition of a career and consumer education program.

Musical and Physical Education continued to play important roles in the development of our students. Several outstanding musical productions were offered to parents and were very well received.

The Drama Club was formed under the direction of Mrs. Betty Thomson and produced outstanding plays.

The school tries to provide relevant tools to evaluate a child's progress. One of the most important means of evaluation is the day to day observation by the teacher. These observations coupled with the report card provide a good overview of the child's progress. Each year standardized achievement testing is conducted to provide an overview of a child's individual achievement and overall program effectiveness. It is important to keep in mind that these scores only reflect how a student does on a particular test under given conditions.

Once again field trips played an important role in the education of the children. Excursions to the Museum of Science, Strawberry Banke, and other areas of interest provided an opportunity for students to apply their knowledge to everyday experiences. The counseling position has greatly aided in dealing with special needs and handicapped children, as well as providing direct services to elementary and high school students.

One of the continuing goals at the Moore Elementary School has been to provide an optimum education for all children. This goal will be achieved through continued improvement of the curriculum and the addition to the physical plant.

A great strength of Candia's school is its dedicated staff. The faculty continues to improve itself through in-service training, curriculum committees and staff-development programs.

I have had a rewarding year in Candia and would like to express my appreciation to Superintendent Cawley, Assistant Superintendent Thompson and Staff and community for their continued support.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

(1) for an unneutered male - \$6.00

(2) for a neutered male or a spayed female - \$3.50

(3) for a female \$6.50

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00 per month.

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.

BURNING REGULATIONS STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE In Case of Fire - Phone 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless raining.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from Donald W. Seward, Forest Fire Warden, Candia. Tel. 483-8629.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department.
