THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning and building regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by secret ballot.

You are also notified to meet on Friday, the sixteenth of March next at seven-thirty in the evening at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Forty One Dollars (\$8,841.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the association.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for general expenses and maintenance of fire apparatus and emergency equipment. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to fund materials and equipment to install additional Dry Hydrants to the present system to include a Dry Hydrant in front of the Candia Moore Elementary School. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Ninety Six Dollars and Thirty Two Cents(\$996.32) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Six Thousand Six Hundred Forty Two Dollars and Nine Cents (\$6,642.09).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund Association, Inc., to assist in defraying its expenses.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the support of the Ray-Fre Senior Citizens Center. On petition of Doris Mitchell and ten registered voters.

12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enlist the services of the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire to assist them in performing appraisal maintenance for the ensuing year and raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to defray the expenses associated therewith.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$2,800.00) to fund materials, labor and equipment for the purpose of mosquito control measures, spraying and larviciding for the spring and summer of 1979.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from Anti-Recession Funds (Title II, Public Works Employment Act of 1976) the sum of One Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars and Ninety Six Cents (\$137.96) as a set-off against budgeted appropriation for Town Officers' Expenses.

15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Revenue Sharing Funds the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$3,400.00) the same to be made available for expenses incurred by the Candia Planning Board for development of the Master Plan for Candia, which must by statute be completed by 1980.

16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to accept a Five Hundred Dollar (\$500.00) planning grant from the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service, U. S. Department of Interior, and to match the same with an equal amount from Revenue Sharing Funds and to expend the resulting \$1,000 for the development of the Candia Master Plan.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) per day for each Selectman for their required attendance at the polls on local, state and national election days.

18. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Selectmen's salary as follows: Chairman from Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) to Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00), 2nd and 3rd Selectmen from Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$550.00) to Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$650.00)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the surveying and clearing of the title of a parcel of land south of the Holbrook Cemetery. The money to be spent under the direction of the Trustees of the Cemetery Trust Funds.

20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) from the 1979 general town revenue in support of the services of the Newmarket Regional Health Center. The Health Center in turn will use this sum as matching funds for the Center programs. On petition of Hattie L. Merrill and Eleven (11) registered voters.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon and authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same.

22. To see if the Town will vote to provide workmen's compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-funded Workers' Compensation Program and to authorize the selectmen to take such action in furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

23. To see if the Town will vote to designate Depot Road, from Langford Road to Patten Hill Road, as Scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 & 18 for the purposes of protecting the scenic beauty of Candia: on petition of Sigrid Byrd and eighteen (18) registered voters.

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize that the Conservation Commission be empowered to manage the town forests under the provisions of RSA (31:112(11), and that any proceeds as might accrue from said forests be placed in a separate conservation trust fund to be managed by said commission.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to set aside selected parcels of tax-defaulted lands to be used as town forests, under the provisions of RSA 31:110.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed.

29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1978, the 45 regular members and 20 associate members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department spent over 5,500 recorded man hours working for the department. 1,889 hours were spent fighting fires with the remaining hours spread among maintenance of building and equipment, formal fire training, fire prevention, and the annual July 4th celebration.

In 1978 the Fire Department responded to 93 calls, a 127% increase over the 41 calls in 1977. Included in this total are three mutual aid calls to neighboring towns.

Major projects during 1978 included the following:

- 1. Purchase and installation of an FM Radio network with a fire fighter paging system.
- 2. Acquisition of a 1969 International tank truck with a 2,100 gallon capacity.
- 3. Completion of a new radio room in the Fire Hall.
- 4. Continued fire prevention activities through programs at Moore School, emergency phone stickers, and window decals for sleeping rooms.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN

NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission is a voluntary organization of local governments serving a common region. Member communities have many common problems which affect each other and can more effectively be solved on a cooperative, areawide basis. Because of the economies of scale offered by areawide programs, many of these problems can be dealt with through the Commission at less cost to the taxpayers.

The Commission is established under state law and its Board is made up of Commissioners appointed by local elected officials from the member communities. These Commissioners control all decisions made by the Commission...decisions which are voluntarily implemented by the participating governments.

The Commission has accepted the challenge to look to the problem of coordinating the planning, and the development of many units of government within the region. In doing so, it does not usurp the function of the local planning boards, rather it supplements their work and efforts by serving as a "clearinghouse" agency, or a "ready alert" group that can warn local units of impending problems for all which may flow from a decision of a single municipality, the state or the federal government. We can provide advice on how a common problem might be met through joint action.

During the past year, the Commission published three major documents of areawide significance. The <u>Land Use Plan 2000</u>, <u>Southern New Hampshire</u> <u>Subregion</u> and <u>A Housing Plan For The Southern New Hampshire Subregion</u> have been, and will continue to be important references and resource materials for communities wrestling with growth and development problems.

<u>A Rural Transit Development Program For The Southern New Hampshire Sub-</u> region, published in September, could result in substantial savings for participating school districts that are currently paying dearly for special student transport services. This program is also designed to extend transit service to the rural transportation-disadvantaged, particularly the elderly and the handicapped.

A representative sampling of staff services provided to the Town of Candia during the year includes:

Provided Town officials with information regarding the Municipal Law Lecture Series, a Capital Improvements Program Seminar, and the Commission-sponsored Community Development Block Grant, Small Cities Program workshop:

Provided the Planning Board and the various Master Plan Study Committees with a variety of materials, including:

- * a reproducible mylar of the Town topographic map and ten (10) paper prints of same,
- * 1000' and 2000' scale Town base maps with street index,
- * referrals to appropriate sources for groundwater and mineral resource data,

Provided information regarding due process covering the transfer of highway maintenance responsibilities from the State to the Town;

Advised the Planning Board relative to the review of proposed subdivision activity on Class VI and Scenic Roads.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF

AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to 1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

Report of Service for 1978

NURSING

Skilled VNA nursing services are available in Candia homes, and are provided by Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses. Services include dressings, injections, special treatments, baths and rehabilitative nursing under the direction of the patient's physian. Homemaker Home Health Aides assist under the direction of nurses and therapists. Nurses are available daily between 1:30 - 3:00 P.M. at the Visiting Nurse Association office in Manchester, and locally at monthly drop-in centers to take blood pressure readings. An outreach program for elderly, lonely persons also is available to assess their unmet medical needs.

THERAPY

Registered physical, occupational and speech therapists are avail able for therapy at home. Social workers and nutritionist consultants are also available.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH

The Nurses are prepared to give advice and guidance to expectant mothers as well as instruction following birth. Immunization clinics for children are held periodically during the year.

A special program for adolescent pregnant girls has been added this year, with instruction classes held each Monday at 4:00 P.M. Follow-up sessions for these young mothers and their babies are held periodically at the VNA office.

POLICY

This voluntary, non-profit agency is certified to care for Medicare patients. Although many of the services are paid for through Medicaid, Medicare, and other health insurance, there is a fee which is discussed on the initial visit. Adjustments can be made. Anyone may request the service by calling the VNA office at 622-3781, Monday through Friday from 7:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Services are provided on weekends and holidays as necessary. There is a 24-hour answering service for messages. Visiting Nurse Association services are available to Candia residents at no cost to the town. Mrs. Frank Kendall represents Candia on the Board of Directors of the Association, and Mrs. Margaret Crawford is the nurse for the area.

CANDIA MOSQUITO CONTROL DISTRICT

During the year 1978 the Candia Mosquito Control District met two times with the Rockingham County Mosquito Control Commission for the purpose of coordinating mosquito control procedures.

Members of the County Mosquito Control Unit worked all summer spraying and larviciding the town. Spraying from a mobile unit was done four times during the summer.

All labor for the project was furnished by the county at no expense to the town. This was possible under a Federal grant and administered by Rockingham County. This grant has now expired and all expenses for labor and materials for 1979 will be borne by the town.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

During the past year the Planning Board, with the assistance of citizen volunteer subcommittees, has continued development of the Town's Comprehensive Plan. Approximately 25 volunteers have assisted in assembling background data in the areas of population and economic base, current land use, natural resources, cultural and landscape features, transportation and municipal facilities and utilities.

Preparation of an extensive attitude survey has been completed under the Board's auspices and will be circulated to residents in early 1979. Public educational outreach activities have included a slide presentation developed by the Cultural and Landscape Resources subcommittee which was shown to 14 different civic groups in 1978. Technical assistance and preparation of resource base maps is being provided by the Southern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

When completed, this data will be analyzed and recommendations formulated to create the basis for the Comprehensive Plan. The plan will serve as a policy guide for citizens and Town officials in implementing and coordinating public efforts toward achieving balanced management of community growth.

Progress in developing the plan has been slow because of the twin constraints of limited volunteers' time and budget. In order to accelerate progress the Board applied for a planning grant from the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service, U. S. Department of Interior, in 1978 to assist funding a portion of the plan. In February 1979, the Board was notified by the New Hampshire Preservation Office, the office in New Hampshire administering the program, that the Town was in receipt of a \$500 matching grant to be used in completing a cultural resources inventory in the community. The Board is continuing to explore supplementary sources of funding with which to complete the Comprehensive Plan.

In an effort to complete the plan this year, the Board has also applied for the services of a graduate planning intern through the Massachusetts Audubon Society. The intern would reside in the area and work full time on the plan, supervised by the Board, for three months. The Board anticipates having a draft of the Comprehensive Plan completed by the Fall of 1979.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Foremost among numerous issues that have been presented before the school district during the 1977-1978 academic year, the most gratifying experience for the community and school officials was the passage of a bond issue for an addition to the Moore School in Candia. Since March 1978, many, many hours have been devoted by the school board and administration in providing the students in the district with a much needed addition which will provide many new educational experiences heretofore denied them. The Candia School Board, the Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Richard Thompson, and the Principal, Mr. Timothy Sweeney, are to be commended for their efforts in bringing this project to fruition.

The district has taken the initiative to begin establishing goals for the school district. These goals are of a general nature and are in conjunction with the Accountability Plan as currently being formulated by the three communities of Auburn, Candia and Hooksett. This Accountability Plan will establish the minimum competencies necessary in the areas of reading, language and mathematics. This project will be in effect for three years and then will extend into other academic disciplines.

The Candia School District again, will be making special efforts to meet the needs of the physically, intellectually and emotionally handicapped students as required by State and Federal law. At present, thirty students have been identified to meet specifically designed programs. These students have been making full use of the special education resource room and the speech, reading and guidance services now offered. Several students whose needs are more diversified are receiving special attention at schools outside of the district, both public and private. The laws have stated that school districts are responsible for all handicapped students from the ages of three to twenty-one.

I would like to extend my sincere appreciation for the fine efforts made by the community, school board, administration and school personnel for their loyal support of the educational system as offered by the Candia Moore School.

Skin Disorders Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation

This year a three-year Fluoride Rinse Program was started. In addition to the fluoride rinse, students were taught proper use of toothbrush and dental floss. 248 students participated in the program.

A survey was conducted to determine how many of our students were immunized as required by law for school attendance. According to survey forms returned by parents, 94% of the students have had the required doses of DTP and Polio immunizations in infancy, between 82 and 88% have had the required boosters, 90% Measles Vaccine, 84% Rubella Vaccine and 47% Mumps Vaccine.

All of us who work with your children are looking forward to our new facilities. Hopefully, the School Health Office will be exclusively just that resulting in an expansion of services to the children.

THE SPEECH, HEARING AND LANGUAGE PROGRAM 1977-1978

The Speech, Hearing and Language Program currently serves children in grades 1 - 8 who have been identified for remediation: both handicapped and special needs non-handicapped

The breakdown for the 19 students currently enrolled in the program is as follows:

Handicapped (13)

Special Needs Non-Handicapped (6)

- 2 preschool 6 articulation
- 2 hard of hearing
- 1 mild MR
- 8 speech and language

All incoming first graders as well as those referred throughout the year were tested for speech and language. This resulted in approximately 30 children requiring direct services.

Language development has a direct effect on the child's ability to read. This has been taken into consideration by providing consultative services for classroom teachers and other specialists. Due to the limited time available, this type of preventative program has not been established.

THE TITLE I LEARNING ABILITIES PROGRAM 1977-1978

The purpose of the Title I Learning Abilities Program is to identify children who are having difficulty with their academic work because of a particular learning problem. Once identified, they work individually with an aide in a supportive atmosphere.

During the 1977-1978 academic year, the Title I L.A. Program met with great success. Of the children involved, 91% increased their self-concept, 91% increased in the area of their specific learning problem, and 60% increased their reading ability significantly. The program has helped many of these children function more easily in the classroom and feel better about school.

This year, there are two aides seeing approximately 25 children from grades two through eight on a one to one basis from three to five days a week. The tutoring sessions are one half hour long. During that time, the children work on remedial reading as well as auditory and visual perceptual skills. The tutoring is designed specifically for the individual.

The gains for this year will be compiled in the Title I Evaluation Report.

At this writing there are approximately 15 children who need the supplementary assistance but who are unable to attend due to time restrictions and lack of personnel.

This year the Title I Needs Assessment District Committee of Supervisory Union 15 meets to evaluate the program as it does every three years. By gathering widespread information, the committee is able to identify the target group and criterion for selection of the individual children for next year's program. In this way, the program can change for the community's needs.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1977-1978

The 1977-1978 school year brought significant change to the physical plant of the Moore Elementary School. A review of St. Paul's Church by the State Fire Marshall's office found that without major modifications, the facility was unacceptable for school children. As a result, the school was forced to renovate the stage area of the gymnasium to a classroom facility to accomodate the Special Education Program. As in previous years, space was at a premium with classes and programs sharing the available space of corridors and converted storage areas.

The adoption of a bond issue for a school addition in March 1978 brought the promise of improvement in the physical facilities. I am confident that this additional space, although providing for no significant pupil growth, will definitely lend to the improvement of the education offered to the students of the Moore Elementary School.

Our curriculum improvement was enhanced with the addition of a reading specialist. The reading specialist, with the combined efforts of the faculty, contributed significant improvement of our reading program by providing enrichment and remedial programs. The mathematics program added an algebra course for those students intending to take complementary courses in high school. The career and consumer education program culminated its activities with representatives from many fields of vocational interest addressing classes and meeting with students. Representatives from the medical profession, advertising, public relations, banking, airlines, sales, transportation industry, gave students an opportunity to learn first hand about careers.

Believing that students must be able to apply the knowledge of their education, the students in the eighth grade attended a week long excursion at the Ocean Park Conservation School in Maine. This experience provided students with the opportunity of utilizing their understanding of and awareness of the interdependence of the basic disciplines of mathematics, science, language arts and social studies. The program proved to be a very valuable experience. The students were given a commendation for their behavior and enthusiasm while at the school. Mr. Stephen Del Deo and Mr. Russell Marcoux are to be commended for their personal and professional efforts in this endeavor.

In an effort to provide an assessment of the school's success in providing for the education of the children at the Moore Elementary School, standardized achievement tests are administered. This year, students in grades 2, 4, 6, 8 were tested in the areas of language arts, reading, mathematics, science and social studies. Each class scored at or above the national level in all areas. The individual achievement test complemented by the observations of the professional staff, as well as, quarterly reports provide an awareness of each child's progress. When reviewed on an individual basis, it is important to keep in mind that these scores reflect how a student does on a particular test under given conditions. We anticipate revising our testing assessment program during the 1978-1979 school year in response to a national accountability movement. Education of the handicapped and special needs students continues to demand a great deal of time from the local education community. Complying with State and Federal laws, in providing a suitable education for all children between the ages of three and twenty one, requires much time on the part of the principal, specialists, and classroom teachers.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the dedicated faculty and staff of the Moore Elementary School, as well as, the support and cooperation extended by the Candia School Board, Superintendent of Schools Cawley, Assistant Superintendent Thompson, and the community's commitment to provide the best possible education for the children of Candia.
