THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums fo money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning and building regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by secret ballot.

You are also notified to meet on Friday, the thirteenth of March next at seven-thirty in the evening at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$928.18) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Six Thousand One Hundred Eighty Seven Dollars and Eighty Four Cents (\$6,187.84).
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$400.00) to the Fitts Museum for general maintenance. The money to be spent under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$1,200.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Newmarket Regional Health Center.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$2,250.00) to prepare the preliminary architectural drawings and cost estimates necessary to convert a portion of the original Moore School building for use as Town Office space and to consider plans for alternative sites. The money to be spent under the direction of the Town Building Study Committee.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$900.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund, Inc., to assist in defraying its expenses.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred and Twenty Four Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$1,324.00). to the Greater Raymond Community Action Program to help continue its services to Candia residents. The money to be spent under the direction of the Greater Raymond Community Action Program.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enlist the services of the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire to assist them in performing appraisal maintenance for the ensuing year and raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$4,000.00) to defray the expenses associated therewith.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Selectmen's salary as follows: Chairman from Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) to One Thousand Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$1,000.00), 2nd and 3rd Selectmen's salary from Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) to Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars and 00/100 cents (\$850.00).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$20,000.00) for general expenses and maintenance of fire apparatus and emergency equipment. The money will be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$6,750.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Planning Board to expend same for the purpose of completing the final phase of the soil survey, initiated in 1980 in conjunction with the Candia Comprehensive Plan. These funds will be used to contract with the Rockingham County Soil District to perform detailed soils mapping of the remaining 13,000 acres in the Town.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy One Dollars and 00/100 (\$2,971.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association and Home Health Care Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., to defray the costs of the Agency's activities in the Town.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$5,000.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds to be expended under the direction of the Candia Rescue Squad.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$1,780.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds to install a chain link fence around the property of the Town's Salt Shed to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$3,350.00) to raise and install a new roof and overhead door on the Town's Salt Shed. This work is necessary to make the shed suitable and safe for Town equipment. Money to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand One Hundred Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$14,100.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred and Twenty Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$4,620.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Association.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following bylaws governing the Town Incinerator (RSA 147:26-a):
- 1. Commercial Waste requiring excessive handling prior to treatment or disposal will not be accepted at the incinerator.
- 2. Matter which cannot be readily incinerated shall not be deposited or accepted at the incinerator.
- 3. Commercial Waste shall be subject to payment of $\,$ a reasonable fee as determined by the Board of Selectmen.
- 4. Selectmen may adopt such rules pertaining to separation of bottles and burnables.

The Selectmen are futher empowered to adopt such other regulations pertaining to the use of the incinerator which are reasonably necessary.

Such regulations to remain in effect until rescind by either the Board of Selectmen or Town Meeting.

 $\underline{\text{Violation of this bylaw}}$ - Any person violating this bylaw or any issue under this bylaw may loose privledges of depositing refuse at the Town Incinerator.

16. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent. - 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provision of the Municipal Budget Law (RSA 32). Submitted by petition from 33 registered voters of the Town of Candia.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to have the six (6) members-at-large of the Budget Committee appointed by the Town Moderator as provided for in RSA 32:2. Submitted by petition from 33 registered voters of the Town of Candia.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote on a recommendation of the Conservation Commission to exchange a 30 acre parcel of land (Map 60 lot 20) in the Kinnicum Pond area for a 10 acre parcel of land (Map 60 lot 26) which is landlocked in the Flint lot. Submitted by Hermann N. Sander, M.D.

22. To see if the Town will vote on the following article:

Since 1975 the New Hampshire Legislature has enacted three pieces of enabling legislation to provide local option property tax exemptions for alternative energy systems. The are: RSA 72:62 for solar heating or cooling systems; RSA 72:66 for wind powered energy systems, and; RSA 72:70 for central wood heating systems on wood stoves that function as a sole source of heat to a home. The intent of the legislation is to provide an incentive reward for those who invest in energy systems that do not use expensive oil or gas.

Application for exemption must be filed before April 15th of the first of the year in which it is claimed. Shall we adopt the provisions of the RSA article listed above?

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- $\,$ 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.
- 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.
- $\,$ 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1980 the Candia Volunteer Fire Department responded to 81 calls for a total of 1,416 hours. Building and equipment maintenance, formal fire fighting, fire prevention and the annual July 4th celebration for a total of 5,818 hours. The building of a new 3,400 gallon tanker for a total of 3,200 hours. With a total of 10,434 recorded man hours.

A major project completed during 1980 was the addition of a 3,500 gallon tanker. Being in a rural area this new tanker will greatly increase the capacity of the department.

The department responded to 18 chimney fires in 1980! An increase of 125% over 1979. The department would like to remind the people of Candia that the proper installation of wood stoves and chimneys is of great importance. The cleaning and inspection of your chimney on a regular basis is also of major importance when you burn wood.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

During the year of 1980, your Police Department responded to 1,808 calls for various types of assistance and problems, an increase of 481 calls from 1979

During 1980, 2,289 1/2 man hours were spent patrolling the Town. 2,074 3/4 man hours were spent answering calls. 91 1/4 man hours were spent for training.

I would like to bring to the attention of all the citizens of the Town of Candia, that all the officers of the Candia Police Department are part time and anyone noticing anything unusual or suspicious, please call the Police phone immediately. The Police phone is manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

A note of interest, two former members of the Candia Police Department have continued their careers in law enforcement. Robert Allfrey Sr. is currently the Chief of Police in the Town of Newton, New Hampshire. Russell Pallas Jr., is now a full time police officer for the Town of Raymond, New Hampshire.

Currently the Town has one State certified police officer and all the other members of the Department are currently at different phases of certification and all should be State certified by the end of the year. The certification consists of 36 hours of classes which are being taken as they become available.

The 1979 police cruiser which was purchased last year has 53,000 miles as of December 31, 1980 and is holding up very well.

In closing, I would like to thank the Townspeople for your cooperation shown to this Department in the past year and to my fellow officers for their many long devoted hours.

The 1980 Recreation Program began with the Pat's Peak Ski Program last January. Sixty students travelled up to Pat's Peak every Wednesday for six weeks for one hour of ski instruction and one hour of free ski time. The cost per student was \$35.00 which included transportation.

The summer recreation program, under the direction of Ed Sides, Moore School Physical Education Instructor, registered 167 youngsters for the playground program and 66 students for the Red Cross Swim Program. A varied program was offered the youngsters with activities such as sports, games, arts and crafts, and special event days.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission is a voluntary association of local governments acting together to address regional needs and priorities identified by your municipal representatives.

The Commission's member communities have many common concerns which can often be resolved more effectively and efficiently on a cooperative basis. The economies that are achieved by an areawide approach to these concerns, through Commission programs, produce substantial savings for local taxpayers by pooling their limited resources — providing members with material, data and professional services that few communities could easily afford on an individual basis.

Through the Commission's regional planning and transportation programs, a variety of reports and data are developed on an annual basis and made available to local officials to help them deal with some of their day-to-day responsibilities. Such material is often used to support locally-initiated public improvement projects, some of which can be financially assisted with State and Federal funds.

Included among the Commission's accomplishments during the past year, under our regional and transportation planning elements were:

- a "Catalog of Selected State and Local Development Permits". This document identifies the various permits that may be required, in addition to subdivision and site plan approval prior to undertaking construction in the communities;
- a draft "National Flood Insurance Program Adminstrative Handbook" recentely edited by officials of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Printing of the final draft is expected in 1981 to be followed by distribution to local officials;
- the review and comment on 195 funding applications, submitted by a variety of local, state and non-profit agencies and organizations, to provide or continue many projects and programs benefiting member communities and their residents;
- receipt of unconditional certification of the Commission's metropolitan area transportation planning program. This marked the first time in the 14-year history of the Commission that all prerequisites for continued federal financial assistance to implement recommended highway and public transit system improvements had been satisfied. The SNHPC is one of possibly three metropolitan planning organizations in all of New England to enjoy this distinction.

Statistical analyses undertaken as part of the metropolitan area transportation planning program, covering Manchester, Auburn, Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett and Londonderry, were compiled in the following reports:

- "Socio-Economic Data Disaggregation South Manchester/ Londonderry Sub-Area Study";

- "School Enrollment":
- "Employment Estimates"; and
- "Vehicle Travel Time" an analysis of street network efficiency.

Local Planning Assistance Services

A representative sampling of staff services provided to the Town of Candia during the year included:

- Provided the Planning Board with a listing of the types of industries that should be considered as potential sources of high levels of air pollution;
- Provided the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment and the Building Inspector with notices and schedules of the Municipal Law Lecture Series held during the fall;
- Provided copies of the Office of State Planning publication <u>Planning and Development Techniques</u>, <u>Options for Managing Growth in N.H.</u> for the Planning Board;
- Conducted a workshop on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant Program competition for fiscal year 1981 funding to which Town officials were invited;
- Provided the Planning Board with assistance regarding the development of a driveway permit system as a means of maintaining proper drainage and promoting highway safety;
- Provided the Planning Board with suggestions dealing with some zoning ordinances amendments and the development of updated "Nonresidential Site Plan Review Regulations";

- Loaned the following Commission-prepared reproducible maps to the Planning Board to assist them with the preparation of Master Plan maps:
 - soils associations
 - topography
 - soils overlay composite
 - steep slopes overlay
 - critical areas overlay
- Staff met with the following Master Plan subcommittees, providing them with material and guidance relative to their respective assignments:
 - Community Utilities and Facilities
 - Economic Base
 - Transportation
- Provided the Moore School and the Smyth Public Library with copies of Commission reports, newsletter, and a variety of state and federal agency publications;
- Prepared a statistical, socioeconomic and cultural profile of the Town of Candia including data on population, housing, land use, the economy, an inventory of transportation and community services available to residents, and pertinent planning and governmental information of interest to potential commercial and industrial developers and prospective residents; and
- Provided the Planning Board with information on the'

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business, Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

The State and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

Fairly regular open monthly meetings have been held at 8:30 AM the last Saturday of the month in the Bangs room of the Smyth Library to discuss and advise the Town on the disposition of lands owned by the Town, beautification programs, development of the conservation are on New Boston Road and problems incident providing fire wood from the Town Forest on Flint Road.

County foresters have marked circa 100 cords of potential fire wood of which circa 25 cords have been cut, at a cost of \$870.00 for which we have received \$895.00. This wood has been made available in three categories: 1) Free to those out of work and unable to pay; 2) \$30.00 a cord for those on welfare and; 3) \$50.00 a cord to all others after the 1st and 2nd groups have been taken care of. Anyone wanting wood should call the Selectmen's Office between 9-12 AM 483-8101. Or call 483-8042 or 483-2371 in any of the above categories giving their name, address and the number of cords needed.

Two field trips have been conducted, 1) to survey the Town Forest on Flint Road and 2) a nature trip through the Conservation Commission area.

The Candia Conservation Commission is anxious to have residents attend and participate in it's regular meetings, especially some of the younger folk.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION-HOME HEALTH AGENCY OF GREATER MANCHESTER, INC.

1980 REPORT OF SERVICES TO CANDIA

The Visiting Nurse Association-Home Health Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., continues to provide services as a certified Home Health Agency to the Greater Manchester area, covering Manchester and five towns--Auburn, Bedford, Candia, Goffstown, and Hooksett.

The Care of the Sick Program provides visits in the homes of Candia by visiting nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech therapists and homemaker/home health aides. Consultations with a social worker and a nutritionist are also available.

A Maternal and Child Health Program provides pre and post natal teaching and guidance to expectant mothers as well as instructions for child care following birth. The Teenage Pregnancy Program conducts classes at the Visiting Nurse Association office, 194 Concord Street, in Manchester in conjunction with the Home Visiting Program.

Immunization Clinics for children two months to six years are held in Candia periodically during the year.

The Long Term Care Program (Senior Outreach Program) provides assistance to the elderly living in Candia so that they may remain in their own homes by offering support through health assessment and home health care maintenance. Blood Pressure Screening and Health Guidance Clinics are also held on a periodic basis in Candia.

The Visiting Nurse Association-Home Health Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., is an accredited voluntary, non-profit agency. Anyone may request service by calling the office at 622-3781, Monday through Sunday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Services are provided as necessary from 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., and there is a 24-hour answering service for messages.

Also certified by the federal government to care for Medicare patients, many services are paid for through Medicaid, Medicare, and other health insurance plans. Fees are discussed on the initial visits with adjustments made if full fee cannot be paid.

Mrs. Helen Kendall is a resident of Candia and serves on the Board of Directors of the Association.

During the past year the Agency served 77 people, and made 618 nursing visits, 250 homemaker/home health aide visits, and 38 rehabilitation therapy and other visits. Sixteen Immunization and Blood Pressure Clinics were held.*

Total value of services rendered during 1980 approximately \$20,000.00.

Total value of non-reimbursed services rendered during 1980 approximately \$5,900.00.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

No momentous health changes or problems have occurred in Candia over the past year. Because of the increased incidence of deaths due to the "Flu", especially among the elderly, innoculations with Flu Vaccine in the Fall before December 1st is recommended. All females and pregnant women under three months pregnant should have measles vaccine innoculations, because of the recent increase in measles in nearby areas.

During cold weather, the incidence of colds, sore throats and upper respiratory infections is up. Mostly due to the fact that no effort is made to increase the humidity in the home. To keep the relative humidity between 20-40°, one needs to evaporate about one gallon of water per room per day, for a temperature of 68-72°. This helps to keep the mucous membranes of nose and throat moist and less subject to infection.

Candia is very fortunate to have two organizations contributing to the ongoing care of it's people. 1) the Newmarket Health Center, which visits here the 1st Monday of the month with a doctor in charge and 2) the Candia Rescue Squad, stationed in Candia and available 24 hours a day, under the excellent direction of Karl Berardi. REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

1980 was an active year for the Candia Planning Board in spite of generally sluggish economic conditions in southeastern New Hampshire. Increased procedural as well as long-range planning responsibilities mandated by law complemented the full regular schedule.

In the area of subdivision review, the board conducted 28 Preliminary and Abuttors Hearings and 6 Informational Hearings. 2 boundary line exchanges were executed and 3 perimeter surveys were approved. Site Plan Reviews for commercial development of 2 properties were considered and 1 approved. A bond guaranteeing performance for the removal of a structure of Depot Road was also reviewed and released.

5 applications for Dredge & Fill Permits were also reviewed by the board.

The planning board completed and adopted the community's first Comprehensive Town Plan, a project which began in 1978. In conjunciton with this, the first phase of a town-wide soil survey was also completed, by the Rockingham County Soil District, under the direction of the planning board using General Revenue Sharing Funds. Work on the Comprehensive Plan, the legal basis for the town's 4 By-laws (zoning, subdivision regulations, capital budget and program and official map), will continue in 1981 as additional sections will be considered for adoption and the zoning ordinance updated. Copes of the Candia Comprehensive Plan synopsis are on file at the Smyth Library or may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office. The board is also seeking to complete the soil survey in 1981.

With respect to changing land use in the community, in the fall of 1980, the planning board abserved the start of construction on the new Route 101 corridor which will pass through Candia nad Raymond. Changes in alignement of the corridor have virtually eliminated the viability of the town's present Industrial Zone, an issue which must be addressed by the community in 1981.

Two special studies were undertaken by the planning board in 1980 including a report to the Selectmen and Road Agent on alternatives for the rehabilitation of the historically significant Old Deerfield Road Bridge in Danida Village. In the area of promoting the town's economic base, Mr. James Laing furnished the board with a report concerning phusical elements required to attract light industrial development into the town. Additionally, a planning board member contined to serve as a representative on the long-range Town Office Building Study Committee.

1980 was also a transitional year for the Candia Planning Board. In August, distinguished senior member John G. Goodrich resigned after 10 years of wervice and 2 terms as Chairman. Dr. Alan Kaplan replaced Mr. Goodrich. Cynthia L. Nims Recording Secretary, resigned in October to pursue a new career in western Massachusetts. Elaine Lamarche of East Candia replace Ms. Nims. The board extends its gratitude to both former members for thier dedicated service. Christopher W. Closs was appointed by the Selectmen to fill John Goodrich's post for one year as one of the town's 2 representatives to the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

In spite of accomplishments, the continuing problem of rising work demands upon the voluteer membership, which serves without staff, limited progress. The board failed to appoint a representative to the Conservation Commission

and is now seeking to appoint altenate members to solve this and special project labor needs. An overhaul of the board's maps, records and filing system was begun and will continue but is limited by available office space. The problem of enforcement of the town's By-laws has also presented a continuing challenge this past year.

As the demands upon the volunteer form of government grow, the Candia Planning Board will continue to encourage greater public participation in the planning process to sustain its effectiveness in 1981.

NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER, INC.

The Newmarket Regional Health Center is a community health center offering general family care for all ages. It provides preventive, routine and emergency care as well as home visits. Use of health center services increased by 19% over the past year.

Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Michael Lewis, R.P.A., and Anne Fawcett, A.R.N.P., M.S.N. continue to provide care as members of the medical team. In addition, Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., joined the health center staff in November of 1980. Barbara is a recent graduate of the Yale University Family Nurse Practitioner Program. The medical team also includes registered nurses, a health aid and community health workers.

The community health workers coordinate preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards, hold informative workshops for the public and act as liaison between the medical providers and the patient. To make a medical appointment, call the center at 603-659-3106 or toll-free at 1-800-582-7279.

The Newmarket Regional Health Center also operates a senior citizen transportation service. Service utilization increased 19% area-wide to over 23,000 rides per year in 1980. The Transportation Program provides regularly scheduled bus services to the elderly of Candia and other area towns. The service enables seniors to remain independent, self-sufficient, and active by providing rides to needed services, including medical, shopping and recreational trips. The addition of a new van equipped with a hydraulic lift had increased our capability to transport the handicapped. This lift allow individuals confined to a wheelchair to use our service. (The amounts of money set forth for each program are estimated and the amount appropriated for any one program may be overexpended so long as the total amount expended for all of the above programs does not exceed Twenty Thousand and 00/100 (\$20,000.00) Dollars.)

- 3. If appropriate legislation is adopted at the 1981 legislative session, to see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meetin, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1981-1982 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure by made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other School District prior to accepting and spending such money.
- 4. To see if the District will vote to accept and expend Twenty Thousand and 00/100 (\$20,000.00) Dollars which may be made available to the District through Title III of the National Energy Act.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS' REPORT 1979-1980 Academic Year

In the Fall of 1977, the School Administrative Unit #15 Board appointed a committee to investigate the availability of office space for the school administrative unit office. This committee consisted of representative members from the Towns of Auburn, Candia, Hooksett and Raymond.

Previously, the administrative unit office contained an area of 1,200 square feet located on two levels. This provided inadequate storage facilities, insufficient operating space and was not in compliance with public housing codes. In essence, the building was much too small for the operating needs of a central office serving four growing communities, its associated employees, and equipment.

After extensive searching, it was found that much of the private and commercial real estate available which met our requirements was extremely expensive to lease. In addition to the cost of leasing, the price of utilities and maintenance was not included in the total outlay. It became apparent that the four communities could save money by employing an architect to draft plans for a building suitable for the successful operation of our organization. During this period of time, the Hooksett School District assumed leadership by providing the land and funds needed for the construction of our new office building. At the Annual Hooksett School District Meeting held in March 1980, the voters gave their approval to build an administrative office building on district owned land located on Farmer Road in Hooksett, New Hampshire. The School Administrative Unit #15 office presently leases this building from the Hooksett School District.

Construction began in June 1980, and was completed by November 1980. The lease arrangement is between the Hooksett School District and the four School Districts of Auburn, Candia, Hooksett and Raymond, each sharing in the cost of the lease agreement.

The new office building consists of approximately 1,900 square feet on the first level and another 1,200 square feet of storage on the second level. The building offers facilities for administrative offices, a secretarial work area, a large conference area for meetings, kitchenette, photocopying room and a financial office which houses the computer. An invitation is extended to members of the public who wish to visit this facility. Further information can be obtained by telephoning our office at 603-622-3731.

We wish to extend our sincere gratitude to members of the school boards for their support offered in this project. We are sure that this facility will provide a more efficient and cost effective operation of our administrative unit.

I would like to commend all personnel in our school systems for their meritorious efforts in conserving energy. Despite rising costs of fuels, their ability to reduce consumption has helped to maintain reasonable budget expenditure levels.

Also, school Accountability Committees have spent considerable work hours in developing minimum competencies for students. The first test units are scheduled to be given this spring.

I wish to thank school board members, administrative personnel and all other school staff members for their loyal support offered during the 1979-1980 academic year which made many accomplishments possible for the benefit of our students.

ESEA TITLE I PROGRAM

1979 - 1980

The purpose of the Title I Program is to improve children's reading through work in communication skills. The program focuses on the areas of listening, thinking, speaking and writing. These areas play an important part in reading and everyday school work.

One part time teacher and one full time aide met individually, or in groups of two or three with non-handicapped students in grades one through eight. The program serviced twenty five students who were seen from one to two hours weekly in half hour sessions. A variety of materials including tapes, worksheets, kits, games and books allowed students to learn and progress at a pace that was most comfortable for them. Lessons were designed to meet their individual needs.

During the 1979-1980 Title I Program, 79% of the students increased their reading skills significantly and all gained better self-esteem and confidence.

REPORT OF THE LEARNING DISABILITIES PROGRAM

1979 - 1980

The objective of the Learning Disabilities Program is to identify children with academic difficulties due to a learning problem. These children will then receive remediational instruction for their individual learning problem along with support services for other academic areas of difficulty.

Remediation is in the visual, perceptual or auditory areas. The Learning Disabilities teacher may also provide instruction in the academic areas of reading, mathematics, spelling, English, science and social studies. The Learning Disabilities teacher also provides materials and modifications for teaching the learning disabled student within the regular sclassroom.

The L.D. teacher is also involved with the screening and identification of learning disabled students. Once a child has been identified as learning disabled, an individual education plan is formed. This plan focuses on the individual student's strengths, weaknesses and academic areas of difficulty.

The Candia Evaluation/Placement Team reviews the child's program and progress periodically. The Team then determines the program which will be most beneficial for each student for the coming year.

SPEECH, HEARING AND LANGUAGE PROGRAM - 1979-80

The Speech, Hearing and Language Program currently serves children in grades one through eight who have been identified for remediation; both handicapped and special needs non-handicapped. It also serves pre-schoolers who have been identified as handicapped.

The program functions for purposes of:

- Identification of speech, language and auditory disorders by means of referrals and screenings.
- 2. Diagnostic evaluations and
- 3. Prscriptive remedial programs for inclass suggestions, parental support and for therapy.

Speech and language acquisition is a very improtant pre-requisite for communication skills of reading, writing and spelling. Therfore, a delay in this area could create difficulties in almost all subject.

Several types of speech and language areas are remediated in the program. These include: articulation disorders, stuttering, voice disorders, hearing impaired, and language disorders.

The breakdown of the 33 students currently enrolled in therapy are as follows:

- 2 Pre-school Speech and Language
- 1 Hard of Hearing
- 3 Learning Disabled
- 8 Speech and Language
- 1 Visually Impaired

- 13 Articulation
- 4 Language
- 1 Voice

In addition, the Speech and Language Therapist has been a consultant to at least 40 more children who are not receiving direct services.

RESOURCE ROOM PROGRAM

1979 - 1980

The Resource Room is a special education instructional setting to which children in grades one through eight come for specific periods of the day on a regularly scheduled basis for remedial instruction. The students attend the resource room on a part-time basis remaining for at least a portion of the day in the regular classroom. All students are mainstreamed to the greatest extent possible.

During the 1979-1980 school year, the resource room serviced 26 students (5 handicapped and 11 non-handicapped). These students were referred to the Pupil Placement Team and went through the proper staffing process. Diagnosis of these children were made through both educational and/or behavioral assessments. On the basis of the diagnosis, individual education plans were written and implemented. The resource room program made it possible for these students to receive the advantage of total remedial programs in the areas of math, reading, science, social studies, English, language development, and auditory and visual skill.

This year the resource room specialist and two aides provide services to twenty two students (18 handicapped and 4 non-handicapped) in grades one through eight, as well as pre-school. Each student enrolled in the resource room is given an evaluation in the Fall and Spring of each year to measure progress, detect areas of strenghts and weaknesses, as well as, to verify and/or probe the conclusions and recommendations that were based on initial screenings and staffings. For each student, and individual educational plan is designed and implemented to meet the specific needs of the child. Public law 94-142 and New Hampshire RSA 186 provide specifically for the education of the handicapped.

During this academic year, considerable time and effort have been spent on assessment, remediation, classroom observation, and teacher/parent consultation. In this way the resource room specialist is able to aid the classroom teacher and parent in terms of approaches, methods and materials that can be used with the special needs child.

In summary, the scope of the resource room does not seem to be diminishing. The resource room continues to have an increased handicapped student population receiving individual/small group instruction. Such an increase makes it necessary to continue enhancing the services offered by the resource room. It is a tremendous satisfaction to work in a school committed to its young people by supporting special programs so whole heartedly.

MINUTES OF THE 1980 CANDIA SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Annual School District Meeting was called to order by Moderator Ronald Thomas at 7:06 p.m. on March 5, 1980 in the Moore School Auditorium. Ground rules were first laid down regarding no smoking and participation in discussion. Only registered voters will be recognized by the chair with the exception of the following who will be recognized for informational purposes only: Assistant Superintendent Richard Thompson, Principal Timothy Sweeney, Attorney Louis Soule, and Special Services Director Carol Davis. Each article to be read and acted upon in order. Motions and amendments must be submitted in writing.

Explanation was given as to why voting took place from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.—In 1979 the General Court passed some regulations regarding the conduct of the meeting in that it is to be conducted the same as in a general election with polls open from 10:00 a.m. to at least 6:00 p.m. There should be an article in next year's warrant to make the election the same day as the Town election.

<u>Article 1</u> relative to reports of agents, tec. was read by the moderator. Motion made by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Russell Dann "I move that the reports of the officers of the Candia School District, as set forth in the annual report of the district, be accepted and placed on file." Motion carried.

Article 2 regarding proper use of the school land and buildings was read by the moderator. Motion made by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the District vote to adopt the following provisions relative to the Use of School Land and Buildings: Section I - No person shall consume a liquor or a beverage as these terms are defined in RSA 175:1 on land owned by the Candia School District except in a school building. Consumption in a school building of a liquor or a beverage as defined in RSA 175:1 may take place only with the written permission of the school board. The school board shall establish written guidelines and procedures determining the circumstances under which functions may be held on school land or in a school building between sunset and sunrise. Section III - The provisions hereof shall take effect immediately and shall continue in effect until the above provisions are modified." Mr. Dann explained that the Police Chief had requested cooperation to keep vandalism at a minimum. This article meets the legal requirements necessary. Put to a vote, the motion carried.

Article 3 relative to acceptance of Federal funds was read by the moderator. Motion by Marjorie Benz and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district vote to accept and expend up to \$22,500.00 for the Federal programs such as Career Education, Gifted and Talented, CETA, Title IV and other miscellaneous programs." Among those participating in the discussion were Steven Hogan, James Laing, Len Chase, John Geddes, Ruth Ann Boddy, Richard Gilbert, Jeffrey Carter, George Commenator, Loren Cole, Gerry Lavoie, Paul Price, and Joan Foquette. Many questions were raised as to whether or not these programs will eventually lead to extra teachers and extra costs out of our funds. It was explained that this would not be the case. Mrs. Benz explained the Federal programs involved and gave the new Spanish course as an example of the "Gifted and Talented". Miscellaneous includes Title I and special help for those not included in other areas. CETA and Title IV were included in last year's programs also. Asst. Supt. Thompson explained that the article is

legal and was written by our attorney. Mr. Dann stated that all the article is asking for is authorization to apply for these funds if they are available. Put to a vote, the motion carried.

Article 4 relative to accepting available money through the National Energy Act was read by the moderator. Motion by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district vote to accept and expend up to \$20,000.00 which may be made available through the National Energy Act." Mr. Uhlenhake explained that this article would authorize accepting Federal or National Energy Act funds if available. A complete energy analysis of the school has been made by Frank Marinais. The ceiling of the gym has been insulated. Recommendation has been made to put insulation in the old building and to replace some windows with insulating panels. Cost for oil per week is now at \$1,000.00. Motion carried.

<u>Article 5</u> regarding a supplemental for special education was read by the moderator. Motion made by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Marjorie Benz "I move that the school district vote to authorize a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$20,000.00 for the 1979-1980 school year for the purpose of providing special education to handicapped students." Mr. Uhlenhake explained that the state is to pay us \$20,000.00 but not until after July 1st. We need this money for the current year. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 6 relative to support of the Community Recreation Activity was read by the moderator. Motion by Russell Dann and seconded by Marjorie Benz "I move that the school district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to be expended towards the support of the Community Recreation Activity." It was explained that there are more and more requests for use of the school facilities and this would help to cover the expense incurred when a community activity takes place in the school when the school is closed and a custodian is not normally on duty. It was pointed out that the school board is responsible for the school. Participating in the lengthy discussion were Jeffrey Carter, Joseph Brox, Barbara Reczkowski, Daniel Jaskolka, Arlene Richter, Diane Cartier, Diane Chamberlain, and Paul Price. Put to a vote, motion carried.

At 8:00 p.m. Moderator Thomas declared the polls closed for voting.

Article 7 regarding spending the balance of the Capital Reserve building Fund was read by the moderator. Motion made by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,209.88 toward Energy Construction Improvements, such amount expended to be the balance of Capital Reserve Building Fund, including interest accrued to July 30, 1980." Mr. Dann stated that the money is doing no good where it is and should be moved to where it can do some good. Motion carried.

Article 8 relative to funding teachers' salaries and benefits, etc., was read by the moderator. Motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Russell Dann "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$319,480.00 to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1980-1981 school fiscal year, \$21,365.00 of such sum representing additional costs attributable to the latest Collective Bargaining Agreement entered into by the School Board and the Candia Federation of Teachers". This article is included in the warrant to show how much money is involved in negotiations with teachers. This is the second of a three year contract with teachers. After complete

explanation, put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 9 relative to the sum of money to be voted for the support of schools was read by the moderator. Motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Russell Dann "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$913,177.00 for the payment of salaries payable to teachers, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the school district". A printed explanation of the entire budget handed out early in the meeting was gone over item by item and explained by the board members. Participating in discussion were Jeffrey Carter, James Laing, Albert Richter, Len Chase, Linda Chase, Joan Tancrede, George Albert, and Joseph Hayden. In response to a question about revenue sharin money, Mr. Thompson indicated that we cannot directly receive revenue sharing funds as we are an independent school district. Put to a vote, motion carried.

The School Board and Administration were complemented on the excellence of education and appearance of the school. Results of the voting, with 134 votes cast, were: Moderator - Ronald Thomas; Treasurer - Arlene Richter; Clerk - Marguerite Swain; Auditors - Alice MacDonald and Shirley Erving; School Board Member - Dale Uhlenhake; all elected.

On a motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Russell Dann the meeting adjourned at $8:57~\mathrm{p.m.}$

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL 1979 - 1980

The school year 1979-1980 was a good year for the Henry W. Moore School. The school house doors opened on September 5, 1979 to receive a total of 418 pupils. Previous to the arrival of the pupils, teachers engaged in two days of inservice workshops dealing with such topice as prescriptive teaching, handicapped students, reading and mathematices instruction.

In the area of curriculum development, continued emphasis was placed upon the 3 R's along with social studies, physical education and music. In-service curriculum time enhanced by our released Wednesday program continued to play a significant factor in our efforts to provide a coordinated and unified curriculum.

Approximately halfway through the school year, we were able to expand our curriculum in grades seven and eight with the addition of Spanish. Through the able direction of Gertrude Dannis, the program proceeded successfully. The program was highlighted by an April vacation excursion to Mexico.

An energy awareness program was undertaken through the direction of the Energy Conservation Committee. The aim of this program was twofold: first, to acquaint students with various energy forms and ways to effectively conserve energy at school and within the homes; and secondly, through conservation measures to effectively reduce energy consumption and associated costs. Through close cooperation with Public Service Company, students became actively involved in the energy conservation program. Students in grade eight were selected to represent schools throughout New Hampshire along with Mr. Maurice Lamy of the Public Service Company to discuss energy awareness programs on radio station WFEA.

Students in grades six and right attended separate week long science camp excursions. The sixth grade attended the Nature's Classroom Science camp and grade eight attended the Ocean Park Environmental School. These experiences proved envaluable to the students. Mr. William McKay, grade six science teacher and Mr. Charles Miner, grade eight science teacher are to be commended for their fine effort with these programs.

The students in grades two, four, six and eight were adminstered the Stanford Achievement test. Each of the grade levels tested scored above the national average testscores. We are proud of the fine showing of our students. Our success in achieving these scores must be attributed to the committment of the part of the entire Moore School faculty. I would like to express my appreciation and congratulations to this fine group of professionals.

The special education needs of children at the Moore School were further met this year with the addition of a part-time learning disabilities teacher. This teacher was responsible for the education of students who would otherwise have been placed in schools outside the school district.

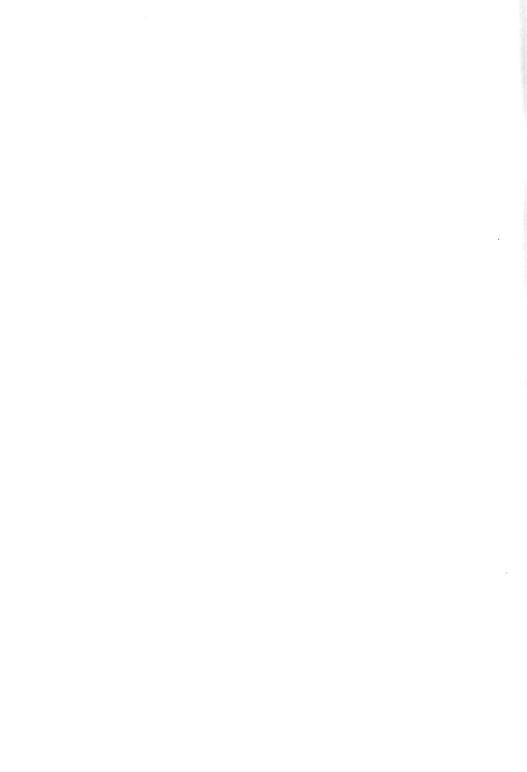
The pupil placement team comprised of the Resource Room teacher, Learning Disabilities teacher, Speech and Language therapist, Counselor and classroom teacher are responsible for the educational needs of all students between the ages of 3 and 21 years, residing in the town of Candia. Through careful testing, analysis and team review, individual education plans are developed for handicapped students. Continuous review of individual education plans and new client referrals provide for a very involved special services program.

The quality education offered to the students attending the Henry W. Moore School can be attributed to four major factors: students, parents, faculty and the citizens of Candia. The success or failure of any school or its programs rests firmly upon these factors. I am continuously impressed with the effort put forth by these groups to ensure a meaningful school experience. The residents of Candia can look with pride upon the Henry W. Moore School.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly express my appreciation to Superintendent of Schools, David Cawley, Assistant Superintendent, Richard Thompson for their continued support and cooperation and the dedicated faculty and staff of the Moore School. A special note of appreciation to Marjorie Benz, Russell Dann and Dale Uhlenhake for their dedication and willingness to serve on the Candia School Board.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Every dog owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, before April 30th, register it with the town clerk. The licensed dog must wear a collar and a tag around his neck with his registration number thereon. Annual fees are:

- (1) for an unneutered male \$6.00
- (2) for a neutered male or a spayed
 female \$3.50
- (3) for a female \$6.50

If fee is not paid by June 1st there is an added fee of \$1.00 per month.

Certificate of Rabies shot must be presented when registering dogs.

BURNING REGULATIONS State of New Hampshire IN CASE OF FIRE - PHONE 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless raining.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from Donald W. Seward, Forest Fire Warden, Candia. Tel. 483-8629.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department.
