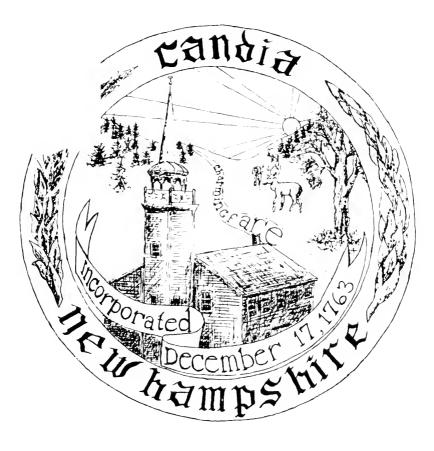

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CANDIA, IN THE COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning and building regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by secret ballot.

You are hereby also notified to meet on Friday, the twelfth of March next at seven-thirty in the evening at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Twenty Three Dollars and Sixty Four cents (\$923.64) for the Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Six Thousand One Hundred Fifty Seven Dollars and Sixty cents (\$6,157.60).

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred and no cents (\$4,400.00) to the Fitts Museum for a new roof. The money to be spent under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$1,250.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Newmarket Regional Health Center.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$900.00) as a donation to the Raymond Ambulance Fund, Inc., to assist in defraying its expenses.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Eighty Six Dollars and no cents (\$1,286.00) to the Greater Raymond Community Action Program to help continue its services to Candia residents. The money to be spent under the direction of the Greater Raymond Community Action Program.

6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enlist the services of the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire to assist them in performing appraisal maintenance for the ensuing year and raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) to defray the expenses associated therewith.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$20,000.00) for fire supression and fire prevention for the Town of Candia, N.H. The money to be expended under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc.

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy One Dollars and no cents (\$2,971.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association and Home Health Care Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., to defray the costs of the Agency's activities in the Town.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) for services rendered to the Town by Candia Rescue. All equipment purchased shall become the property of the Town if and when the Candia Rescue is disbanded or ceases operations.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$14,000.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$3,000.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Forty Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$42,600.00) as its share of the cost of a new bridge on New Boston Road over the North Branch River. Twenty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$20,000.00) to be paid from Revenue Sharing Funds and Twenty Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$22,600.00) to be paid from the General Fund.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the Budget not already acted upon and raise the sum of Three Hundred Thirty Two Thousand Six Hundred Ninety Three Dollars and no cents (\$332,693.00).

14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provision of the Municipal Budget Law (RSA 32). Submitted by petition from 10 registered voters of the Town of Candia.

15. To see if the Town will vote to have a Budget Committee composed of six (6) members-at-large to be elected by the Town Meeting as provided in RSA 32:2. Submitted by petition from 10 registered voters of the Town of Candia.

16. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a N.H. resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence.''

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1981 the Candia Volunteer Fire Department responded to 65 calls representing 845 man hours. Man hours spent on building and truck maintenance, formal fire fighting and training, fire prevention and special projects represents 3,408 hours. Time spent of the July 4th celebration and other fund raising projects comes to 2,098 hours for a total of 6,351 man hours.

Two projects completed during 1981 were a truck fuel system where as we installed our own fuel tank and pump at the fire station enabling us to buy fuel in bulk and have 24 hour access. The other project completed was a portable generator and lighting system installed on Engine I to provide the department with lighting for several applications.

Although our total number of response calls in 1981 is down by 16 from 1980, the department responded to the same number of chimney fires for both years (18). This year that number represents nearly one third of our total calls. The fire department cannot impress nearly enough upon the people of Candia who are using solid fuel heating appliances, the extreme importance of proper installation, use and maintenance of this equipment which includes chimneys. The time and expense taken by the homeowner of existing as well as new equipment will more than pay for itself in longer life of that equipment and of most importance, reducing the possible loss of life and/or property by fire.

The Candia Volunteer Fire Department wishes to express their most sincere thanks to the residents of Candia for their continued support and cooperation.

At this time we would like to express our sincere thanks to the officers and men of the department whose long and devoted 100% volunteer time has made the Candia Fire Department as successful as it is today and will be in the future. Thank You.

There has been a steady increase in library use over the years with the greatest increase this past year. A circulation figure of 13,240 books as compared with 11,296 in 1980.

This constant growth of your library in its use and collection of material has resulted in a squeeze on space—to such an extent that it is impossible to shelve all the books. We need to think in terms of an addition.

With this in mind, a Smyth Public Library Building Fund has been established at the Derry Bank in Candia. Just the first drop in the bucket. It is our fond hope that all citizens and organizations of this town will beat a path to the Derry Bank and donate a few drops every now and then.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

Since the Commission's last report to the Town, Federal budget reductions and recissions have hampered efforts to sustain the level of staffing and the varied work program to which our member communities have become accustomed over the past fifteen years.

Budget constraints have forced the Board of Commissioners (your appointed representatives) to eliminate one technician position, reduce the combination bookkeeper and secretarial position to a part-time bookkeeper status, and most recently, to leave the vacated graphic artist slot open. Thus far, the program area most affected has been the previously HUD-State supported regional planning element. A severe reduction in HUD '701' funding, and elimination of the State match to help support the Commission's Fiscal 1982 work program, forced the adoption of a much-abbreviated regional planning component.

Despite these problems, the Commission has attempted to balance the needs of the outlying towns with those of the central city, Manchester, and has been able, through its regional, transportation and local planning assistance programs, to continue services to local officials. In the form of various reports, special studies, technical assistance, etc., member communities have had important concerns addressed and been able to receive help on a wide range of issues. Several have been able to initiate public improvement projects which are eligible for State and Federal financial assistance.

During the past year, some of the work accomplished under the regional and transportation planning elements has included:

- An evaluation of progress made, by the Commission, toward the implementation of previously-adopted regional land use and housing plans (parts of the regional comprehensive plan);
- Publication and wide distribution of our newsletter, "Project", through which timely articles and news items on a wide variety of subjects ranging from recent court decisions on planning and zoning matters, community tax base analysis, and the use of performance standards for new development evaluation, to water quality management have been brought to the attention of municipal officials and concerned citizens;
- A seminar for General Court members representing the Commission's communities, during which they had an opportunity to informally discuss our responsibilities, programs, services and relationship with the towns with Commissioners and staff;
- A workshop on the National Flood Insurance Program conducted for the benefit of areawide selectmen, building inspectors, planning board members and the general public;
- A workshop conducted by representatives of the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways on the Department's "5-Year Highway Improvement Program, 1981-1985 for the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission Subregion". Municipal officials and the public were invited to obtain a briefing on projects in their respective communities and to become familiarized with the project qualification and selection process;

- The completion of a "Community Recreation Survey" of facilities, programs, financing, staffing, and issues through interviews with officials in each community. The results are expected to be published by the Office of State Planning during the Spring of 1982;
- Extensive work, by Commissioners and staff, with area-wide Boards of Selectmen and members of the New Hampshire Legislature in an effort to correct numerous inequities in RSA Chapter 566 which will seriously impact local tax rates resulting from implementation of the State Solid Waste Plan. (Details were reported in the December, 1981 issue of "Project"); and
- Co-sponsored, with the Nashua Regional Planning Commission, a workshop on interpretation of the provisions of RSA 31:118 and 119 regarding zoning for mobile homes. Staff also worked with the legal counsel of the New Hampshire Municipal Association drafting proposed amendments on behalf of our member communities.

Studies undertaken by Commission staff, or for the Commission by consultants, or by the State of New Hampshire in conjunction with the annual update of the Metropolitan Manchester Transportation Planning Study (area coverage includes the City of Manchester and the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett, and Londonderry) include:

- "Urban Goods Movement Study FY 1981, Central Business District Manchester, New Hampshire" (April, 1981);
- "Land Use Update FY 1981 Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study Area" (May, 1981);
- "Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study Area employment Estimates" (June, 1981);
- "Urban Impact Analysis FY 1981 Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study Area" (June, 1981);
- "A Preliminary Evaluation of Reasonably Available Transportation Control Measures for the Reduction of Carbon Monoxide Emissions in the Manchester, New Hampshire Metropolitan Area" (June, 1981) by C. E. McGuire, Inc.;
- "South Manchester-Londonderry Sub-Area Transportation Study" (June, 1981) by the COMSIS Corp.; and
- "Metropolitan Manchester Planning Area Long Range Highway Plan" (December, 1981).

- Provided the Board of Selectmen, Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the Planning Board with notices and scheduled of the Municipal Law Lecture Series held in the Fall, 1981.
- Advised the Planning Board on the statutory provisions regarding the appointment of regular members and alternates to the Planning Board.
- Provided the Planning Board with a written opinion regarding interpretation of the Candia Zoning Ordinance and Map with respect to a specific development proposal.
- Provided the Board of Selectmen with requested information regarding zoning provisions for condominiums and cluster development.
- Provided the Board of Selectmen with copies of proposed legislation being considered by the 1981 session of the New Hampshire General Court.
- Provided the Planning Board with assistance regarding highway access approvals under the non-residential site plan review process.
- Provided the Planning Board with model "By-Laws" to cover their operating procedures.
- Provided the Planning Board with an assessment of the projected impact of major industrial development proposals, being considered in Manchester, upon rural communities such as Candia.
- Provided the Planning Board with a sample "shared planner" agreement under which professional staff assistance could be made available to the Town.
- Prepared various proposed Zoning Ordinance amendments for the consideration of the 1982 Annual Town Meeting at the request of the Planning Board.
- Began work on major elements of the Candia Master Plan.

CANDIA CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Candia Conservation Commission has met fairly regularly during the past year at 8:00 AM, the last Saturday of the month, in Governor Smyth Library. These meetings are open to everyone interested in the disposition and improvement of Town properties, including the Town forest, the Conservation area on New Boston Road. The members are appointed, two every year for three years. Total membership may be six to seven but associate members may be appointed without voting powers and serve on committees working on various projects.

Part of the Town forest on Flint Road was marked in 1980, and thirty (30) cord have been cut and sold or given to those in need. A County Forester has agreed to mark another section as soon as possible.

The Commission has reviewed and approved the State Plan for the Pike Industry land fill, on the new Rt. 101 Highway.

The Commission sponsored a Gypsy Moth informational meeting at the Moore School, in September, to which some two hundred (200) people attended. The decision on how to combat this problem has not been finalized. Spraying could be dangerous and costly, hopefully a cold winter and virus plus small insects which are now working on the eggs, may solve the problem. Recent information on a nonpesticide in the form of Bactostine (a clone of Bacillus Thuringiensis) reveals that this can be used as a spray on the early developing Gypsy caterpillar before they leave the site of development, at a cost of about \$5.00 to \$6.00 per acre. There is no danger to other animal wild life. This could be purchased from the Candia Conservation Commission, by individual land owners.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION-HOME HEALTH AGENCY OF GREATER MANCHESTER, INC.

1981 ANNUAL REPORT

The Visiting Nurse Association-Home Health Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., continues to provide services as a certified Home Health Agency to the greater Manchester area, covering Manchester and five towns —Auburn, Bedford, Candia, Goffstown and Hooksett.

The agency is a voluntary, non-profit home health agency. It is nationally accredited by National League for Nursing/American Public Health Association, Medicare and Medicaid certified and a United Way Agency. The agency provides 24-hour home care services, with service between 9:00 p.m. and 7:30 a.m. on a selective and necessary basis. Anyone may request services by calling the office at 622-3781 from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Mrs. Helen Kendall and Mrs. Emma Hall, residents of Candia serve on the Board of Directors of the Association.

The agency is supported by various funding sources. Home health services are provided within the resources of the agency. Attempts are made to provide necessary services without regard to ability to pay. Fees are discussed on the initial visit with a sliding scale used if full fee payment is not possible.

Home health services are provided by the following staff members: licensed professional nurses, registered physical therapist, registered occupational therapists, registered speech therapist, registered nutritionist, social worker, certified homemaker/home health aides.

Adult health screening programs, occupational health services and immunization clinics are also provided by the agency. Walk-in blood pressure screening and health counseling/teaching is provided Monday-Friday from 1:30 p.m. - 3:30 p.m. at the office, 194 Concord St. Manchester.

During the past year in Candia, the agency served 54 people and made 807 nursing visits, 194 Homemaker/Home health aide visits and 50 rehabilitation therapy and other visits. Immunization and Adult Health Clinics were also held.

Total value of services rendered to Candia during 1981 was \$28,447.

Total value of services rendered without direct payment from third party insurers or private pay was \$6,715.

These services were covered by town appropriations, agency acquired grants, donations and other solicitations.

MOSQUITO COMMISSION REPORT

Recent information reveals that a nonpesticide is available as Bactimos - W.P. - really Bacillus Thuringiensis, as a liquid or powder - used as a spray, at a cost of about \$3.00 per acre. It is applied to the water where mosquito larvae are found - its duration of action is about 24 hours and there is no danger to wild life or fish.

This could be bought from the Town Mosquito Control Commission, if the Town voted for this program.

REPORT OF THE DOG OFFICER

1981 was the first year a "Leash Law" was in effect in the Town of Candia. During the year some thirty (30) dogs were picked up and taken to a kennel. The boarding charges to the owners was \$245.25. This may seem to be a large sum of money, but most of it was spent in the first four (4) months. During the last six (6) months only six (6) dogs were taken to the kennel, costing about \$25.00.

A record of dogs killed by automobiles yearly has been started. We would expect to see a reduction as time goes on.

One hundred and thirteen (113) road calls on complaints were made. This number would have doubled if road calls could be made when the complainant refuses to identify himself on the telephone. No road calls can be made without the complainant's name.

The "Leash Law" has been a great help in controlling dogs running at large. The increased cost to the Town was \$542.00.

For some years the license fees and penalties have been printed on the inside back cover of the Town Report. The printing will continue this year.

I must thank the Townspeople for their cooperation during this first ten (10) months of the "Leash Law".

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

1982 was a watershed year for community and land use planning legislation in New Hampshire, which will influence or redirect, in all probability, the pattern of local taxation and land development for the foreseeable decade of the 1980s. In Candia 1981 was characterized by the approval of fewer than a dozen new subdivisions, reflecting the still-sluggish interest rates of the home mortgage market and the high cost of construction financing money. As the recession of 1981 deepened, new subdivision activity which did occur in the town was limited to single lot "daughter and son," family-owned parcels. While two new small businesses opened in 1981, this did not significantly offset the high proportion of Candia's property tax revenue base which is dependent upon residential properties (approximately 75%). Early returns from the 1980 U.S. Census demonstrated that the town's population however, grew by 49.7% between 1970 (1,997) and 1980 (2,989).

The membership of the Candia Planning Board, which is an appointed body, serving without compensation, changed significantly in 1981. Three vacancies were left on the board with the retirement of distinguished senior member Charles Bowman and the resignation of William Donovan, who became Town Counsel. C. Jeffrey Carpenter, chairman of the board in 1979, also resigned. Bowman served for nearly a decade on the planning board and was considered an expert in the areas of zoning interpretation and sub-division procedures. The board extends its gratitude to all of the former members for their dedicated service. Longtime residents Mrs. Edwin (Mabel) Brock and Robert Baker, Sr. were appointed to fill the vacancies. In seeking to broaden the board's base of public participation and to attract more women to serve, alternate members were authorized for the first time, Mrs. Donald (Linda) Coleman receiving the first appointment. Mrs. Coleman was subsequently appointed to fill the slot vacated by Mr. Carpenter.

In the area of administration, the planning board acknowledged school district and town budget austerity measures and responded with submission of a 1982-83 budget which was 3% below that for 1981-82. However, additional monies from General Revenue Sharing were requested to offset rising costs for professional planning, clerical services, printing and postage. The planning board generates about 14% of its budget through application fees and legal notice revenues which is returned to the General Fund. To supplement its 1981 budget, the planning board also applied for and received over \$1000 of professional services for zoning revisions and bridge engineering evaluations from the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission and the New Hampshire Historic Preservation Office. In the future, if the planning board's long-range planning effectiveness is to be sustained, additional funds from the town budget must be appropriated or new sources of revenue developed.

As part of the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways transportation plan for the relocation of Route 101 in Candia and Raymond, the board observed the start of the easternmost interchange of the new 4-lane corridor, located near Old Manchester Road. To be completed in 1985, the project includes relocation/reconstruction of a portion of Brown Road. In a related move, the Boston & Maine Railroad filed for abandonment of its Manchester to Newfields section of the Portsmouth Branch. The line, which served Candia since 1848, was a major determinant of land use patterns and commerce in the 19th century and once provided the town with three railroad stations. The railroad right-of-way passes through Candia's present Industrial Zone and may provide a much-needed future access to the area, which was severed by the alignment of the new Route 101 corridor.

As part of its on-going long-range planning responsibilities, the board contracted for additional work on the Candia Comprehensive Plan. Sections on emergency services/facilities (Police and Fire Protection) and Transportation were completed and prepared for adoption. Several elements of the plan still remain to be completed in 1982. The Soil Survey, underway for two years in conjunction with the comprehensive plan and representing an investment of nearly \$10,000, was completed by the USDA-Soil Conservation Service (Rockingham County Soil District) and is a milestone for the community. This data, along with detailed maps, will now enable further revision of the zoning ordinance to conform with state law by allowing analysis of appropriate densities and various land uses which are consistent with the land's carrying capacity. For the first time, identification of all prime agricultural lands will be possible, permitting a plan to be formulated to manage and protect this dwindling resource. Additionally, the planning board completed the second phase of its engineering evaluation of the feasibility of rehabilitation of the Old Deerfield Road Bridge, reporting to the selectmen, the road agent and neighborhood residents. Graton Associates of Ashland, N.H., renowned covered bridge builders, was retained to assess the condition, cost and approach to repairing the historically significant structure, one of two remaining in the town. Finally, the board hosted two special public presentations concerning the topic(s) of private and public forest management and the town's declining forestry resources; and cluster development as an alternative in enlarging and conserving the community's property tax base.

As mentioned above, far-reaching state enabling legislation was passed in 1981 which will affect all New Hampshire communities. Legislation creating compulsory solid waste management districts, to be composed of member communities was enacted along with a new manufactured housing law. This law, following recent national precedents, is also compulsory and ends the exclusionary treatment of all types of manufactured housing, including mobile homes and parks, through the zoning power. Communities have alternatives: they may elect to designate certain areas of the town for siting of manufactured homes on single family lots or they may vote to designate areas for mobile home subdivisions or mobile home parks. If a town rejects these alternatives at Town Meeting, the law requires that the town must accept manufactured homes anywhere in the municipality. The Candia Planning Board recommended the second alternative to the town; to permit manufactured homes in mobile home subdivisions or in a mobile home park, designated in certain areas. Still another farsighted legislative act permitted towns to enact "innovative zoning" which enables communities to implement a range of new planning and development tools such as Performance Standards, Transferable Development Rights, Cluster and Condominium Development and Planned Unit Developments (PUD) which will substantially reduce both housing construction costs and financial burdens for community services. Perhaps of more immediate interest to some is new legislation which clarifies subdivision procedures, permitting expedited review, which may require only one public hearing.

To the extent of its volunteer capacity, the Candia Planning Board responded to these new opportunities in an effort to redress the widening gap between the residential and commercial and industrial sectors of the local property tax base. A cluster development provision was proposed for the Residential and Commercial Zoning Districts in an effort to provide incentives for quality new development, which would minimize town service costs while increasing tax revenues. Under the auspices of the selectmen and in conjunction with the planning board, an economic development sub-committee was formed in late 1981 to investigate the potential for additional commercial and industrial development. Additionally, a "Right to Farm" amendment, which eliminates red tape, was proposed for the zoning ordinance which is intended to stimulate increased utilization of idle or underutilized farms and agricultural lands for commercial purposes.

In response to considerable public criticism, the most comprehensive revision of the zoning ordinance since its inception was undertaken. The subdivision regulations are scheduled for a similar overhaul in 1982 and an experimental system of "advisors," composed of individual board members assigned to aid potential sub-dividers unfamiliar with the planning process, will be initiated. In order to find qualified new members, the planning board initiated a screening process in 1981, requiring preliminary and final interviews of prospective members. Because of the increasing complexity of planning law and the attendant liability for the town, compulsory training for planning board members through lecture series and workshops is also under consideration. The board also voted to join the American Planning Association and the New Hampshire Planners Association in 1982 to become better informed in the field.

The planning board wishes to channel all constructive public criticism into positive action which will benefit the town. However, the board faces continuing obstacles of limited funding, lack of professional staff, and no permanent meeting and office space for hearings, files and storage, clerical services and on-going projects. Continued or increased reliance on the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission without compensation, is not a realistic alternative. As a result, the planning board and the town, as beneficiary, risk suffering the loss of many gains made in the last five years, particularly in the area of long-range planning. Unless these problems can be addressed and solved in the near-term, the planning board may be reduced to serving only as a review body, considering solely day to day concerns. Improving the property tax base ratio, providing for affordable family housing and maintaining Candia's rural environmental quality however, will require the efforts and coordination of all town boards and officials — and citizens.

REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

In 1981, the Newmarket Regional Health Center celebrated its 10th anniversary and opened a new medical facility, the Lamprey River Clinic, in Raymond, New Hampshire. At both facilities, a medical program is operated, providing general medical care, preventive health services and an extensive community outreach program, which includes preventive screening clinics, health education and social services. In 1981, the health center initiated a mental health linkage program. Ann Bliss, a counselor, was hired to provide mental health services which consist of initial intake and assessment, short-term counseling linkage and referral to area medical health agencies.

Medical services are provided by Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Michael Lewis, R.P.A., and Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P. In July, Peter Friedensohn, M.D. joined the staff. Dr. Friedensohn is a graduate of Dartmouth Medical School. The medical team includes registered nurses, medical assistants and community health workers. For more information or to make a medical appointment, call 659-3106 in Newmarket, 895-5531 in Raymond, or toll-free in Newmarket at 1-800-582-7279.

The Community Health Workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaison between the medical providers and the patient.

The Newmarket Regional Health Center also operates a Senior Citizen Transportation Program. In 1981, two new 18-passenger busses (with hydraulic lifts) were purchased, increasing our fleet to three vehicles equipped to provide services to individuals confined to a wheelchair. The transportation service enables seniors to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing rides to needed services, including medical, shopping and recreational trips. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

This past year has seen significant changes in the organizational structure of School Administrative Unit #15, comprising the school districts of Auburn, Candia, Hooksett and Raymond.

Mr. Richard F. Thompson, who had served as Assistant Superintendent since 1974, resigned in September to accept a position as Superintendent of Schools in Ipswich, Massachusetts. The S.A.U. #15 Board then reviewed the administrative structure with several goals in mind, primarily to maintain an effective and efficient management system.

The directive given to me as Superintendent by the Board was to draft a job description for each professional staff member within S.A.U. #15. The results of the structural changes were:

1.) Superintendent to oversee and manage all personnel within S.A.U. #15.

2.) Mr. Edward Donovan, former principal of the Raymond Lamprey River Elementary School, will assume all responsibilities for instruction in Auburn, Candia, Hooksett and Raymond.

3.) Mr. Donald Beaudette, former principal of Hooksett Memorial Junior High School, will be assigned to all the business affairs of the four districts.

4.) Mrs. Carol Davis, Director of Special Services, will continue overseeing all special education and special needs students in the four districts.

As a management team for the four local school boards the pursuit of education has become extremely complicated, inasmuch as the federal and state governments have curtailed funding, but have left local school boards with statutes and state board directives in the operation of the schools. Some areas these mandates include are staff development, accountability/minimum competency, collective bargaining, the new revised Handbook II (State of New Hampshire new accounting process), Right to Know Law, and handicapped education.

Without question, the most important increase in costs to the district has been in energy. All schools have cooperated fully to keep the usage of utilities at a minimum without jeopardizing valuable educational programs.

The Candia School Board, has through the use of a Technical Assistance grant along with Energy Conservation Measures seen a decrease over the past several years in the consumption of oil and kilowatt hours.

Through the efforts of this new re-organization several advantages are already observed. We have been able to bulk purchase oil, coordinate contractual obligations for busing across four districts, and during the course of the 1982-83 school year there will be a new process for bidding on school supplies, textbooks, and atheltic equipment, which will alleviate the cost to the taxpayers.

The second increase in costs have been in the area of special services to the district.

Students who are physically, intellectually or emotionally disabled require specialized programs in order to benefit from school and become productive citizens. The Candia School District continues to meet its responsibility toward these students in the most cost effective way possible. The 1980-81 school year saw the reorganization of Special Education Services into two separate "Resource" Programs, one for students who require almost full time in special classes and the other for students who are able to spend most, but not all, of their day in regular classes. Having special programs available in Candia means that many students with mild to moderate handicaps can receive appropriate educational opportunities in their local school rather than being assigned to costly out-of-district programs. The Resource classes meet the needs of these students by providing alternative curriculum options, smaller groupings and specialized remedial work for those students who require it.

Handicapped students of high school age and those who require even more specialized programs can be assigned to programs sponsored by other school districts or private agencies. Candia students regularly attend the Easter Seal School, the Moore Center, classes sponsored by the Raymond, Manchester, Merrimack and Derry School Districts, and area public high schools. Transportation costs are typically high so the Candia School District participates in a shared bus-routing plan with other S.A.U. #15 Districts to keep costs as low as possible. A large portion of educationally related expenses (including transportation) of special students is contributed by the State of New Hampshire.

I wish to thank all Candia School Board members, the citizens of the community of Candia, local school administrators, and all school staff members for their support during the past year.

This year in addition to the customary eye and ear screening, scoliosis and blood pressure checks were done. Health screenings are done at the beginning of the school year on all students and repeated on some at the request of a parent, staff member or by the student himself if it is suspected a problem has developed.

ESEA TITLE I PROGRAM 1980 - 1981

The Title I program is a federally funded program designed to improve children's reading through work in communication skills. The program focuses on the areas of listening, thinking, speaking and writing. These areas play an important part in reading and everyday school work.

One part-time specialist and two full-time tutors met individually or in small groups with non-handicapped students in grades one through eight. The program serviced thirty students who were seen from one to two hours weekly in half hour sessions. A variety of materials including tapes, worksheets, kits, games and books allowed students to learn and progress at their own pace. Lessons were designed to meet their individual needs.

During the 1980-81 school year, 89% of the students in the Title I program increased their reading skills significantly.

REPORT OF SPECIAL SERVICES 1980-1981

The 1980-1981 school year has been a successful one in the area of special services. I am pleased to offer this summary of special services made available to the students, staff and parents of the Candia School District.

The Pupil Placement Team of the Candia School District has served a total of 287 students in grades K-12 through referrals, evaluations, retentions, and pre-school screenings.

As well as serving the students, the specialists have acted as consultants to teachers and parents to provide methods, materials, and strategies to use with special needs children. This has proven to be a successful way to deal with the larger numbers of students who need varying amounts of special programming and/or classroom modifications.

To date our Pupil Placement Team consists of a resource room specialist, L.D. teacher, part-time speech therapist, counselor, reading specialist, part-time Title I teacher, and part-time associate psychologist. Since increased numbers of handicapped students were identified, it was necessary to add additional psychological therapy time for emotionally handicapped students, a teacher assistant to the resource room and a part-time aide for the learning disabled class. Without the addition of this position, these children would have required out-of-district placement at a much greater cost to the District.

At this time we see growing program needs for the 1982-83 school year in the areas of serving educationally handicapped students. This means that we should carefully assess our resources and plan appropriately. A primary goal, therefore, must be to maximize our programming effectiveness while still providing the needed services required by the law.

As a final note I am pleased to report that all special programs ran smoothly and effectively during the 1980-81 school year. We have skilled and dedicated professional teams of specialists who work well together to provide services for both handicapped and non-handicapped students.

I feel confident facing the challenges of the 1982-83 school year knowing that the school staff, school board and community are concerned about providing the best services for our students. I especially appreciate the support the principal and teachers have given the specialists this year and look forward to providing continued fine programming for Candia's youngsters.

SPEECH, HEARING AND LANGUAGE PROGRAM 1980-1981

The Speech, Hearing and Language Program currently serves children in grades one through eight who have been identified for remediation; both handicapped and children with other special needs who are not considered handicapped. It also serves pre-schoolers who have been identified as handicapped.

The program functions for purpose of:

- 1. Identification of speech, language and auditory disorders by means of referrals and screenings.
- 2. Diagnostic evaluations and
- 3. Prescriptive remedial programs for the classroom, parental support, and for therapy.

Speech and language acquisition is a very important pre-requisite for communication skills of reading, writing and spelling. Therefore, a delay in this area could create difficulties in almost all subjects.

Several types of speech and language areas are remediated in the program. These include: articulation disorders, stuttering, voice disorders, hearing impairments, and language disorders.

The breakdown of the 29 students currently enrolled in therapy is as follows:

In addition, the speech and language therapist has been a consultant to at least 25 more children who are not receiving direct services, besides preschool screenings.

It is important to note that even though the speech and language case load has only decreased by four from last year, 12 students have met all their goals and have been discharged.

RESOURCE ROOM PROGRAM 1980-1981

The Resource Room is a special education instructional setting that services students in grades one through eight, as well as, identified handicapped pre-school children. Services provided by the resource room permit students to receive remedial instruction individually or in small groups with emphasis placed on teaching specific skills that the individual child needs. At the end of the lesson(s) the student returns to the regular classroom and continues his/her education there. In this way the student is based in the regular classroom and leaves for only specific periods of the school day. All students are mainstreamed to the greatest extent possible.

During the 1980-81 school year the Resource Room specialists and staff serviced twenty-nine students (25 handicapped, 4 non-handicapped) with various learning problems including mild retardation, learning disabilities, emotional problems, to speech impaired and language disordered, health impaired, and visually impaired. All of these students were referred to the pupil placement team by teachers and/or parents and the proper staffing process was carried out. Diagnosis of these handicapping conditions was determined after completion of extensive educational and/or psychological assessments. On the basis of these evaluations, individual education plan (I.E.P.) were written and implemented by the resource room staff.

This year the scope of the resource room program has changed significantly as we serve a population of 63 students in grades K-8 (59 handicapped and 4 non-handicapped). We have embraced mainstreaming to the extent that some students from out-of-district placements are now being serviced at the Henry W. Moore School in the resource room. In this way their needs are being accommodated in the least restrictive environment. For each of these students, I.E.P.'s are designed to meet the specific needs of each child. Public Law 94-142 and New Hampshire R.S.A. 186 provide specifically for the education of the handicapped children.

To summarize, it is important to remember the various aspects of the resource room program and the population it serves. The resource room staff spends considerable time and effort providing remedial instruction to special needs students and in addition the resource room specialist conducts assessments, designs and implements I.E.P.'s, performs classroom observations and is available for teacher and parent consultation. In this way, the resource room is able to extend its services to the regular classroom setting and to parents.

In closing, I would like to extend my appreciation to the dedicated teacher assistant and aides in the resource room for their support and outstanding professionalism that enhances the services afforded by the resource room program.

CANDIA SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING – 1981

Polls were declared open at 10:00 a.m. on March 4, 1981 by Moderator Ronald Thomas in the Moore School Auditorium for the purpose of voting for School District Officers, Articles 1 through 5 of separate School District Warrant. Polls to close no sooner than 8:00 p.m.

The Annual School District Meeting was called to order by Moderator Ronald Thomas at 7:32 p.m. on March 4, 1981 in the Moore School Auditorium. The meeting is to be conducted in a modified form of Roberts Rules of Order with only registered voters to participate. Exceptions will be David Cawley, Superintendent; Richard Thompson, Assistant Superintendent; Timothy Sweeney, Principal; Carol Davis, Special Services Director; Robert Leslie from the attorney's office.

Article 1 relative to the reports of agents, officers, etc. was read by the Moderator. Russell Dann spoke on the school budget for 7/1/81-6/30/82, the responsibilities and goal to maintain the present programs, staff, and transportation, mentioning that the bus leases are due to expire in the next few years. Presently there are 449 students at Moore School with a cost per child of \$1120.00 which is below the state average cost. There are 182 high school students. Moore School has 49 employees. Moore School students are above the national average in STAT tests.

Auditor's report was omitted from the Annual Report and was read by Alice MacDonald stating that the Treasurer's records had been audited and found to be correct.

Motion made by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the reports of the officers of the Candia School District as set forth in the annual report of the district, be accepted and placed on file." Motion carried.

Article 2 regarding Federal funds was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Marjorie Benz and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "1 move that the school district vote to accept and expend up to \$20,000. for the federal programs such as Career Education, Gifted & Talented, CETA, Title IV and other miscellaneous programs." Mrs. Benz spoke on the various categories, explaining that with federal funds unsure, we must budget the funds in case they become available. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 3 on accepting whatever monies may become available was read by the Moderator. Motion by Marjorie Benz and seconded by Russell Dann "I move, conditional upon the adoption of appropriate legislation, that the school district authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1981-1982 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money." Mrs. Benz explained that this article merely asks permission to accept funds. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 4 relative to Title III of the National Energy Act was read by the Moderator. Motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Russell Dann "1 move that the school district vote to accept and expend \$20,000. which may be made available to the school district through Title III of the National

Energy Act." In answer to questions by Robert Claver and James Laing, the board explained that insulation has been put in the front of the old building; gas tanks have been installed; gym has been insulated; automatic temperature controls installed. An energy audit has been done by a professional. There is a cost estimate of \$27,000. to make the windows in both buildings more energy efficient. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 5 regarding installation of an automatic dialer and improvements to the fire alarm system in the school was read by the Moderator. Motion by Fire Chief Leonard Wilson and seconded by Russell Dann "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. for the purpose of installing an automatic dialer and otherwise improving the fire alarm system at the Candia Moore School". Mr. Wilson stated that an inspection has been made of the alarm system and the dialer is recommended because if a fire started when school is not in session there is no way of knowing in time. The dialer would automatically dial direct to the Rockingham County Sheriff's Department and the dispatcher. Among those participating in discussion were William Stewart, Daniel Jaskolka, Robert Baker, and Thomas DiMaggio. In answer to a question on the original cost of the present alarm system, Principal Timothy Sweeney advised that the cost was \$14,000. and the total project meets state fire requirements. Further, we have a sizable investment to protect in the physical plant in addition to the lives of the students and staff.

The time now being 8:00 p.m. the polls were declared closed for voting.

Article 5 was put to a vote and motion carried.

Article 6 on the expected deficit in Special Education Tuition was read by the Moderator. Motion by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,900, to fund an expected deficit in special education tuition during the 1980-1981 school year." Mr. Dann explained the deficit as follows: State supplied figure for elementary level per student was \$2782. Actual cost was \$3052. We expected 5 students and have 13. At the middle school level the state figure is \$3046. Actual cost is \$3306. We expected 2 and have 2 students. At the high school level the state figure is \$3326. Actual cost is \$3708. per student. We expected 10 and have 15. Robert Claver asked for a ruling on what would happen if the deficit does not occur and the article has been passed. Richard Thompson, Assistant Superintendent, advised that the money could be spent or turned back at the end of the year. The board stated that we are committed by law to provide this education and that cuts would have to be made elsewhere to compensate. Further discussion was entered into by William Stewart, Bert Binette, Diane LaCombe and Helen Donaldson. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 7 regarding Secondary Education Cooperative Study Group was read by Moderator. Motion by George Commenator and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district approve the formation of a Secondary Education Cooperative Study Group, appointed by the school board, to investigate the feasibility of the school districts of Auburn, Bow, Candia and Hooksett with respect to secondary education (grades 9 through 12) and to report back to their respective school boards with their findings on or before December 31, 1981." It was explained that this is a volunteer effort and does not cost us money. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 8 relative to a suit against the State of New Hampshire regarding equalization of funds and opportunities was read by the Moderator. Motion

by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district authorize the school board to take such action on behalf of the school district as may be required to join as party plaintiff in a suit against the State of New Hampshire and proper officials thereof to compel the state to provide funds to the school districts for the purpose of more nearly equalizing the opportunities for the children to receive a basic education and to see if the school district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 for this purpose." Among those participating in discussion were Richard Snow, Bert Binette, Carole Nevins, Thomas DiMaggio, and James Nevins. In answer to questions, the board pointed out that richer districts get more than poorer ones, Candia being in the latter category. There are 12 districts involved in the suit representing over 40,000 students. The process will take approximately two years so results will not be known until after the school meeting in 1984. It is hoped that we can get a better percentage of funds. Put to vote, motion carried.

Article 9 relative to teachers' salaries and benefits was read by the Moderator. Motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Marjorie Benz "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$343,739. to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1981-1982 school fiscal year, \$22,679. of such sum representing additional costs attributable to the latest Collective Bargaining Agreement entered into by the school board and the Candia Federation of Teachers." Mr. Uhlenhake advised that we are in the third year of a three year contract entered into with the teachers. In answer to a question by William Stewart as to why every other Wednesday is an early release day, Mr. Sweeney explained that the in service released planning time is used to work on specific issues, this year being the Accountability program. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 10 regarding the sum of money to be raised for the support of schools, etc. was read by the Moderator. Motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Marjorie Benz "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,052,930. for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents other than benefits and salaries payable to teachers, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the school district." Copies of the budget were given out to all and an explanation was given for each category. After some discussion James Laing made a motion to "amend the remainder appropriation figure presented by Mr. Uhlenhake by crossing out \$1,052,930. and substituting \$1,005,930." This was seconded by Karl Berardi. Entering into the discussion which followed were Betty Thomson, Joseph Mroz, Eric Brown, Robert Claver and members of the board. Moved to a standing vote, the amendment was defeated.

The original Article 10 was then read again. Put to a vote, the motion carried in its original form.

Article 11 relative to Handicapped Student Programs for 18-21 year olds was read by the Moderator. Motion by Russell Dann and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district vote to terminate its handicapped student programs for the age group 18-21 if the State of New Hampshire no longer mandates such programs." There being no discussion, the motion was put to a vote and carried.

Moderator read the results of the election indicating the following officers were elected:

Moderator, Ronald Thomas, 197 votes Clerk, Marguerite Swain, 42 write in votes Treasurer, Arlene Richter, 194 votes Auditor, Alice MacDonald, 193 votes Auditor, Shirley Erving, 17 write in votes School Board member, Marjorie Benz, 153 votes defeating Richard Ostresh who received 41 votes.

On a motion by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Russell Dann the meeting adjourned at 10:23 p.m.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL 1980-1981

Each year the faculty and staff of the Henry W. Moore School meet prior to the arrival of students to review goals for the coming year. This year a major goal for the faculty was the exploration of the middle school concept. The middle school concept concerns itself with the learning styles of the adolescent with respect to his cognitive, affective and physiological needs and abilities. Through greater awareness of the learning requirements of the 10-14 year old group, we hope to become more productive with their education.

As part of our inservice training program, faculty members participated in a course dealing with middle school education, conducted by Dr. James Garvin and Mr. Henry Christ from Gordon College. As an extension of this course, Dr. Garvin conducted two evening programs for parents. They were enthusiastically received.

The Accountability Program for the Candia School District continued with our first testing sessions conducted in the Spring of 1981. An accountability handbook was distributed to parents to explain the program and acquaint parents with the instructional objectives that will be tested. In addition to the Accountability Program, the students in grades 1, 3, 5, 7 were administered the Stanford Achievement Test. I am pleased to say that the students of the Moore School scored above the national average in each of the areas tested. Our success in achieving these scores must be attributed to the committment on the part of the entire Moore School faculty. I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation and congratulations to this fine group of professionals.

Once again, students in grades six and eight attended separate week-long science camp excursions. The sixth grade attended Nature's Classroom science camp while eighth graders travelled to the Maine coast to attend the Ocean Park Environmental School. These programs give students the unique opportunity of experiencing first hand the relationship between acquired knowledge and life. Teachers spend considerable time preparing students for this experience. We are most fortunate to have dedicated faculty willing to give of their personal time to make this experience possible. Funds for this activity are raised entirely by the students and their parents.

In compliance with Federal Law P.L. 94-142 and State Statute R.S.A. 186, the special education needs of children ages 3-21 were provided for through the pupil placement team. Through careful testing, analysis and team review, individual educational plans are developed for handicapped students. Continuous review of individual educational plans and new client referrals provide for a very involved special services program. A diligent effort is made to educate handicapped students whose needs permit, at the Moore School. However, considering the extreme needs of some of the students involved, this was not always possible. Out-district placements included schools located in Derry, Manchester, Hooksett, Merrimack and Allenstown.

Extra-curricular activities in the areas of soccer, baseball, drama, crosscountry skiing and others have contributed significantly to our students' growth. With increased fuel costs limiting access to Manchester programs, the faculty and staff have provided a strong and comprehensive program for the students. Education is a joint effort shared by the school, community, parent and student. The relative success of the education process is dependent upon how well each group member functions. I believe that the success of Candia's school system is due to the fact that there has been a cooperative and supportive effort of the Community, Candia School Board, Parents, Students, Faculty and Staff.

My appreciation is extended to the Candia School Board for their support and dedication, to Superintendent of Schools, David R. Cawley and Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Richard F. Thompson and once again, to the citizens of Candia who have committed themselves to providing the best education possible for their children.

BURNING REGULATIONS State of New Hampshire

IN CASE OF FIRE — PHONE 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times, when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM, unless raining.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from Donald W. Seward, Forest Fire Warden, Candia. Tel. 483-8629.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department.
