

The Polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday the 13th day of March next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt changes in zoning and building regulations proposed by the Planning Board to be voted by secret ballot.

You are hereby also notified to meet on Friday the 16th of March next at 7:30 in the evening at Moore School Auditorium to consider the following articles:

1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred dollars and no cents (\$1,400.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Newmarket Regional Health Center.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand dollars and no cents (\$2,000.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Raymond Ambulance, Inc.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Ninety dollars and no cents (\$1,290.00) to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private non-profit, anti-poverty agency.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Three dollars and no cents (\$3,953.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association and Home Health Care Agency of Greater Manchester Inc., to defray the Agency's activities in the Town.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$3,700.00) for operating expenses of the Candia Recreation Association.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred and Fifty dollars and no cents (\$7,550.00) to the Candia Rescue. Such funds to be expended in total under the direction of Candia Rescue and to be disbursed to the Candia Rescue by April 30, 1984.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-seven Thousand dollars and no cents (\$27,000.00) for fire suppression and prevention for the Town of Candia. These moneys to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Fireman's Association, Inc., and to be received in full on or before April 30, 1984.

8. To see if the voters of the Town of Candia will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Eighty Thousand dollars and no cents (\$80,000.00) for the purchase of a new cab, chassis, body, front-mount pump and associated equipment for the Town of Candia. These moneys to be spent under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Fireman's Association, Inc., and received in two installments of Forty Thousand (\$40,000) each, at ten days after the chassis is received and five days after the accessory package arrives.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand dollars and no cents (\$16,000.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Board of Selectmen to expend the same for paving of the parking lot at Moore Park.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Board of Selectmen to expend the same for tree removal.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand dollars and no cents (\$7,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Board of Selectmen to expend the same to purchase a spreader.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand dollars and no cents (\$8,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Board of Selectmen to expend the same for a Computer.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Board of Selectmen to expend the same for a Town Office Building Study.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Five Dollars and no cents (\$407,725.00) which is that portion of the Budget not already acted upon.

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 41:32-a providing for a Board of Three (3) Auditors to be elected to staggered terms of Office in accordance therewith.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept and expend such funds as are made available to Candia Forest Fire Warden under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, moneys from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1984 fiscal year, provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a Town may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other Town funds.

21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

**TOWN MEETING
TOWN OF CANDIA, NH
MARCH 11, 1983**

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator James Nevins at 7:30 p.m. on March 11, 1983 in the Moore School Auditorium. Mr. Nevins read the ground rules and stated that only registered voters would be allowed to speak and only one person was to speak at a time.

Article 1 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Nineteen Dollars and Nineteen cents (\$919.19) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute Six Thousand One Hundred Twenty-Seven Dollars and Ninety-Three cents (\$6,127.93)" was motioned by Richard Gilbert and seconded by James Laing. Article 1 was put to a vote and the motion carried.

Article 2 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred and Fifty Dollars and no cents (\$1,350.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Newmarket Regional Health Center" was motioned by George Albert and seconded by Joe Mroz. A question was asked on what does the Newmarket Regional Health Center do. George Albert explained that the Newmarket Regional Health Center is a non-profit community agency that handles prenatal visits and deliveries; nutritional and health services; clinics for hypertension, diabetes, glaucoma, blood pressure, immunization, and blood screening; and transportation for the elderly. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 3 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$1,000.00) in continuation of its support for the services of the Raymond Ambulance, Inc." was motioned by Robert Baker and seconded by George Albert. Put to a vote, motion carried.

Article 4 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-Nine Dollars and no cents (\$1,279.00) to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. This amount represents 2.5% of \$51,188.00 (Fifty-One Thousand, One Hundred Eighty-eight Dollars), the value of services rendered to Candia residents from September 1, 1981 through August 31, 1982." was moved by George Albert and seconded by Richard Gilbert. Put to a vote, Article 4 passes.

Article 5 "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Three Thousand, Five Hundred, Ninety-Four Dollars and no cents (\$3,594.00) to be paid to the Visiting Nurse Association and Home Health Care Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc., to defray the costs of the Agency's activities in the Town" was moved by Helen Kendall and seconded by James Laing. Helen Kendall explained what the program provides: bathing of patients, speech therapy, light housekeeping, social work, nutritionists, blood pressure, immunization, teenage parent program, pregnancy, and care of infants. There were 720 home visits in Candia last year. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 6 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$3,500.00) for operating ex-

penses of the Candia Recreation Association. The money to be spent under the direction of the Candia Recreation Association. Submitted by petition from 12 registered voters of the Town of Candia” was moved by Betty Thomson and seconded by Diane Cartier. Put to a vote, Article 6 passes.

Article 7 “To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Forty Dollars and no cents (\$8,440.00) to purchase a 1983 Police Cruiser, equipped with a spot light and emergency roof lights. The money to be expended under the direction of the Chief of Police, and the money be available by April 30, 1983. Submitted by petition from 12 registered voters of the Town of Candia” was amended by Normand H. St. Onge Sr., Chief of Police, to read “To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$4,000.00) to rebuild the present 1979 cruiser owned by the Town of Candia. The money to be expended under the direction of the Chief of Police,” and seconded by Mrs. Wilson. Joe Mroz feels that the Chief of Police should be commended for trying to save money, therefore working for the town. Bill Stuart questioned why the article was amended when for \$4,000.00 more, we could buy a 1983 vehicle. Normand St. Onge explained that the car will last another 2 years if the car is rebuilt. The police car has 133,000 miles on this engine so the vehicle needs work. Elizabeth Stanos asked if Goff Chevrolet did the repairs. Normand St. Onge answered that they do. A question was asked on what kind of repairs the 1979 vehicle needed. Mr. St. Onge stated that the car needs a new motor, transmission, steering box, 2 tires, idle arm, seats, and it needs to be painted, estimated at \$3500. He also stated that the motor would not be guaranteed. A motion was made to amend the article, seconded by Joe Mroz, Article 7 was amended. Amended article was put to a vote, article passes.

Article 8 “To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Eight Dollars and no cents (\$1,678.00) to purchase a six channel, two way mobile radio. The money to be expended under the direction of the Chief of Police, and the money to be available by April 30, 1983. Submitted by petition from 12 registered voters of the Town of Candia.” was moved by Normand St. Onge and seconded by Jim Wilson. Kevin Chalbeck asked if it is an additional radio or a replacement. Mr. St. Onge stated that it would be a replacement. The old radio was manufactured in 1955. The new radio would have two extra stations. The new radio would have one channel for fire and two to Hooksett. Richard Gilbert stated that the radio was not manufactured in 1955 but in 1973, and suggested that the old radio could be reconditioned by the Sheriff’s department. Joe Mroz asked if the new radio would have more capability. Police chief Normand St. Onge answered that the present radio has 4 channels but the new radio would have 6 with a capability of 8 or 10. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 9 “To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$5,000.00) to the Candia Rescue. Such funds to be expended in total under the direction of Candia Rescue, and to be disbursed to the Candia Rescue Squad by April 30, 1983.” was moved by Mrs. Seavey and seconded by Mrs. Stuart. William Stuart spoke for the article explaining what the rescue squad does when needed. He explained that the continuing education needed every year were paid by rescue people, but money is needed for communications, portable radios, insurance, medical supplies, and additional oxygen units. James Laing praised the rescue squad but referred to page 41 of the Town Report where figures were higher. Bill Stuart explained about the workman’s

compensation, the need for more radios, replacement of disposable medical equipment, and equipment borrowed by the ambulance attendants to transport patients that is not returned. Some discussion by John Ferguson and Mr. Larson about how the funds are spent and why the rescue squad would not submit to an audit. Robert Baker and James Laing asked if there were any plans to bill people or the Raymond Ambulance. Bill Stuart replied no, the Candia Rescue Squad does get donations, but cannot charge. Article put to a vote, article passes.

Article 10 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$14,000.00) for operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library for the ensuing year. These funds to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association." was motioned by Mrs. thomas. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 11 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$25,000.00) for fire suppression and fire prevention for the Town of Candia, NH. The money to be expended under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. by April 30, 1983." was changed to read "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$25,000.00) for fire suppression and fire prevention for the Town of Candia, NH. The money to be expended under the direction of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. and to be delivered in full to the Candia Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. by April 30, 1983. Motion was made by Lenny Wilson, Clayton Cady, seconded. Lenny Wilson explained that the fire department has requested an extra \$5,000.00 over last year's budget. The building had to be painted and a hose tower needs to be constructed, \$1,900.00 was put aside but \$2,500.00 is needed. Communications equipment (radio) is needed and the Raymond dispatch has increased from \$.50 per head to \$1.00 per head. Candia Rescue would contribute \$1,500.00 while the fire department would contribute \$1,700.00. Insurance for the building increased \$1,000.00. A question was put to the Town Council, Mr. Larson, about Article 17. Mr. Larson explained that Candia fights fires with other towns. A portion of the budget will be used for Article 17. Candia may expend gas and equipment to other towns, it does not violate any legal precedent. Shirley Erving question why everyone needs the funds by April 30. Mr. Wilson explained that to meet their expenses, the money has to be invested. The interest on the money invested helps with other expenses. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 12 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$18,000.00) from General Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the Candia Board of Selectmen to expend same for a Town Office." was motioned by Robert Baker, seconded by Richard Gilbert. Richard Gilbert explained that the building would be 28 x 40. The \$10,000.00 would cover materials, insulation, wiring, toilets. Labor would consist of volunteer help. The building would be constructed near the salt shed, near Moore Park. Dayle Smyrl asked what the maintenance cost would be. Richard Gilbert explained that presently the maintenance cost of the Selectmen's Office is being buried in the school budget, so there is no way to know. Judy Szot questioned the 28 x 40 building being too small. Richard Gilbert explained that the building could be used for everything but a town meeting hall. Judy Szot said there had been a problem previously with federal regulations about using the Park. Robert Baker explained that there would not be a problem unless we were using federal funds. Mr. Larson explained the provisions of the deed from 1926. Mr. Fletcher

asked why the land at the incinerator couldn't be used instead of Moore Park. Robert Baker explained that the Town Hall would sink. Moore Park would be the most logical place where the town owns no land. John Coleman asked what the building would look like. Richard Gilbert said it would look something like a ranch but there are no plans drawn as of yet. Mr. Blevens asked if the Town would have to go before the Zoning Board because the Park is in a residential area. Mr. Larson answered yes. A question was raised on what would happen to the \$18,000.00 if the article did not pass. Richard Gilbert explained that the money would stay where it is until we find something to spend it on. A motion was made to table the article until a future date. Put to a vote, Article 12 is tabled.

Article 13 "To see if the Town will vote to accept that portion of the Budget not already acted upon and raise the sum of Three Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand Six Hundred Ninety-Five Dollars and Forty-Three cents (\$363,695.43)." The sum was amended to (\$363,845.43). Motion was made by Richard Gilbert, seconded by Joe Mroz. Doctor Sanders fee was raised from \$50.00 to \$200.00 per year. A motion was made to amend Article 13 by Richard Gilbert, seconded by Joe Mroz. Put to a vote, article was amended. Susan Young made a motion to go over budget in categories. Moderator, James Nevins, suggested it would be easier to raise questions rather than go over the entire budget. Susan Young questioned if there would be any pay raises for office help, and how much per mile the Selectmen were receiving. James Laing answered that the office salaries might be increased by \$500.00 to \$1,000.00 per individual. Susan Young stated that Police Officers make \$5.35 per hour and wanted to know how much the girls in the office make. James Laing answered that one makes \$5.00 per hour and one makes \$5.25 per hour. They have not been given a raise but probably would be. The Selectmen receive \$.30 to \$.50 per mile but stopped putting mileage in in October. Judy Szot asked where the Selectmen went to put in for mileage. James Laing explained that trips were made to Solid Waste meetings, Highway Division and other places in town. Judy Szot asked if mileage was charged to go from home to the office. James Laing answered yes, on an emergency basis. Mr. Fletcher asked if there were liabilities in 1982 reflected in 1983-1984 budget. The Selectmen said not that they were aware of. Mrs. Mroz stated that Henry Mowles makes \$2,095.98 for collecting taxes, the Selectmen deserve the money they receive. Joan Tancrede suggested that the Selectmen should cut down the \$.30 per mile and questioned the Health Inspector's increase of \$150.00. Richard Gilbert explained that the Health Inspector was given more money. Article 13 put to a vote, article passes.

Article 14 "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, to appoint a Deputy Treasurer. Said Deputy shall be sworn, shall have the powers of the Treasurer, and may be removed at the pleasure of the Treasurer. Pursuant to RSA 41:29a." Motioned by Richard Gilbert, seconded by Robert Baker. Mr. Price made a motion to remove the Deputy Treasurer at the pleasure of the Selectmen. Mr. Larson stated that according to the statute the article must be as written. Richard Gilbert explained that when the Treasurer is out of town, there should be a bonded person to take over. The Deputy Treasurer would be bonded under the Treasurer. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 15 "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to accept and expend such funds as are made available to Candia Forest Fire Warden under the Rural Development Act of 1972, Title IV." was motioned by Don Seward, seconded by Joe Mroz. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 16 “To see if the Town will vote to establish a permit program concerning the sale, distribution and use of unvented space heaters, pursuant to RSA31:60a. Said program to be established and administered by the Chief of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department.” Motioned by Lenny Wilson, seconded by Mrs. Mroz. Mr. Blevens asked what the opinion of the Fire Chief was on this article. The fire department feels that unvented heaters are dangerous but the State says they can be sold. Joe Mroz asked if this article would keep space heaters out or would it just make people aware of the dangers. Lenny Wilson explained that the Fire Department can not prevent people from having them, but the Fire Department will caution them and make it as safe as possible. Any heaters bought before January 1980, nothing can be done about it. George Albert commented on the fact that some people don’t know what they buy and some do not read the instructions. Unvented heaters burn up all the oxygen and a window should be open 2”. Lenny Wilson stated that unvented heaters give off dangerous gases and that these heaters kill house plants. Jan Paquette stated that unvented heaters should not be used by people with heart problems. Mrs. Galanis explained that she was brought up with Kerosene heaters but the problem now is that new houses are airtight. Mrs. Wilson asked if heating systems have to be inspected before approved. Mrs. Galanis stated that she operated a shop with these heaters, but the state inspector never showed up to inspect them. The state inspector is suppose to show up yearly. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 17 “To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Candia Volunteer Fire Department to go to the aid of other towns, villages or fire districts for purposes of extinguishing fires therein, and on a reciprocal basis all pursuant to RSA154:24 and 154:30-d.” was motioned by Lenny Wilson, seconded by Mr. Richardson. Mrs. Galanis asked if we haven’t been able to go to neighboring towns. Lenny Wilson answered yes, there are mutual aid agreements to pool resources and equipment, there are no laws governing mutual aid. The Fire Department has to get town authorization to go help other towns and receive help from other towns. Joe Mroz asked if Candia would be covered while responding to other towns. Lenny Wilson explained that at no time would Candia be put in jeopardy. Minimum equipment and men are sent out of town. A question was raised if the insurance covers men on out of town fires. Lenny Wilson answered yes. Rank officers have authorization to send men to other towns. Other towns are responsible for their men coming here. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 18 “To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.” was motioned by James Laing, seconded by Robert Baker. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 19 “To see if the Town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received this past year.” was motioned by Richard Gilbert, Seconded by Robert Baker. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 20 “To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of by auction, any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector’s Deed.” was motioned by Robert Baker, seconded by Richard Gilbert. Joe Mroz asked how it would be posted and what procedure would be used. Bruce Larson explained it would be posted in 2 public places and in the newspaper the site and time of public auction. Put to a vote, article passes.

Article 21 “To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.” was motioned by Richard Gilbert and seconded by Robert Baker. Mrs. Wilson stated that the County Tax has dropped this year. Move to a vote, article passes.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This report is an attempt to revive a practice of an annual report by the Board of Selectmen. It should be continued only as long as the citizens of the Town feel that it is of some value to them.

PARKS & RECREATION — In the past year improvements have been made at Moore Park. This has been done at a very modest cost to the Town. Bob Baker has worked very closely with CETA to ensure a clean-up of the Park. He is currently negotiating with the Army Battallion, to improve it even more. In 1984, we hope to improve what was formerly a picnic area, so that the Town will be able to schedule private and public events as has been done in the past. The possible use of other areas in Town, including the former Town Dump area, will be investigated.

ROADS & HIGHWAYS — Even though it will probably be 1985 before construction work starts on the new bridge on New Boston Road, preliminary work was started in February of 1984.

Work started on North Road in 1983. Additional work will be done in 1984.

Work will be started on Brown Road in 1984. We will contact residents on both roads before any work is done.

The brand new Route 101 has created some situations which we consider to be hazardous. We are now working on solutions to problems at Depot Road, Patten Hill Road and South Road. We hope to be able to work them out with State and Federal engineers.

POLICE DEPARTMENT — The Police Department phone now rings simultaneously at the Chief's home and at the Brentwood dispatch center. If the local phone does not answer, Brentwood will. They should be able to answer your questions, and dispatch assistance when we have a patrol out.

ANIMAL CONTROL — The animal control officer, Terry Page is not a part of the Police Department. His phone number is 483-2583.

We have arranged to have permanent phones for certain Town Offices. These phones will be moved to or stay at the home of the Elected Official.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

A wide range of services, resources and technical assistance is made available to your municipal officials through the Town's membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. A professional staff having diverse planning and engineering skills, backgrounds and experiences works under the direction of your representatives developing and carrying out a cost-effective planning program to help meet the development needs of your community.

Staff services provided under the Commission's local assistance program are largely decided by the planning board and/or board of selectmen according what they determine are their Town's planning and community's development priorities.

Local assistance services provided during the year included:

- "Provided Supervisory School Union #15 with 1980 Census information;
- Provided the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen with a suggested schedule for public notices and hearing pertaining to zoning and/or building code amendments, if any, to be considered by the March, 1984 annual Town Meeting;
- Provided members of the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Board of Selectmen, and the Building Inspector with the schedule of the Fall, 1983 Municipal Law Lecture Series;
- Counseled the Board of Selectmen regarding the preparation of their response to the Federal Highway Administration's proposal to include N.H. Route 101 in a national network of highways on which tandem trailer trucks (up to a gross weight of 80,000 lbs.) would be allowed unrestricted daily use;
- In the Town's interest, testified at Legislative hearings relative to the re-codification of the State's planning and zoning statutes, and was successful in securing necessary amendments prior to the legislation's passage. As a follow-up submitted written comments, questions, and suggestions to the N.H. House Committee on Municipal and County Government in an effort to further improve this important legislation during the next session;
- On the basis of field investigations conducted this past summer, mapped locations of structures and developable lands potentially subject to the affects of a 100-year flood situation. Met with Selectmen and the Planning Board Chairman to discuss the requirements for voluntarily establishing eligibility to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program, and prepared a news release to promote public awareness of the benefits available;
- Prepared suggested amendments to the Subdivision Regulations at the request of the Planning Board.

Regional Planning programs and special studies, which can vary from year-to-year, are carried out on a contractual basis depending upon the availability of other funds which are allocated for specific projects or designated geographical areas. The sources of these funds may include other municipal appropriations, the Federal Highway Administration, the Urban Mass Transportation Administration, the Department of the Interior, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, etc.

ROCKINGHAM COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM INC. — 1983 REPORT

During the past year, the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. has provided a wide range of services to residents of your community in order to assist them through periods of financial hardships. From September 1, 1982 through August 31, 1983, Candia residents received a total of \$51,624.00 in services from Community Action.

In order for us to continue to serve those in need, we are again asking every community in Rockingham County to make a financial contribution to our agency. Our request to each town is based upon 2.5% of the services rendered to its residents during the previous year, a rate which has remained constant over the past four years. We are therefore requesting the town of Candia to contribute \$1,290.00, an amount representing 2.5% of the services rendered to Candia residents during the past twelve months.

THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION-HOME HEALTH AGENCY OF GREATER MANCHESTER, INC.

The Visiting Nurse Association-Home Health Agency of Greater Manchester, Inc. founded in 1897 has a history of many years of providing health care at home and in the community to those who need services. The agency is a voluntary, non-profit agency committed to the community and the people we serve. Services are provided to Auburn, Bedford, Candia, Goffstown, Hooksett, Manchester and limited services to Amherst, Milford and Mont Vernon. The agency is nationally accredited by the National League for Nursing of American Public Health Association. It is Medicare and Medicaid certified and also a United Way Agency. During this past year Mrs. Helen Kendall of Candia served on the Board of Directors.

The Agency provides home care services 7 days a week, 24 hours a day and other agency services are regularly scheduled. Services are provided within its funding resources of the Agency. The agency works hard to provide necessary services to people who are unable to pay for them and rely on town appropriations to assist with these services. The Town appropriations are vital to the continuation of services to the residents of Candia. Fees are usually discussed at the initial visit and adjustments to the fee are made on an individual basis.

The Home Care Program, which includes Hospice Services, continues to be the largest program in the agency. Residents of the area receive high quality care from the staff in the privacy and comfort of their home. It is believed that this contributes significantly to a person's rate of recovery from illness and one's happiness.

During 1982 and 1983, the elderly and chronically ill have been faced with increased Medicare and Medicaid denials for reimbursement of services. This has been a major factor, along with the increasing number of elders, in the agency's continued need to rely heavily on town appropriations.

The Agency has also continued to provide Immunization clinics, adult health screening programs, including Blood Pressure screening, Foot Care Clinics to the community. Other programs include the Occupational Health Services Program and the Parent Child Health Program which includes the Teenage Pregnancy Program. Walk-in Blood pressure Screening, health counseling and teaching are provided Monday-Friday from 1-4 at the Office at 194 Concord Street, Manchester.

During this past year in Candia the Agency served 38 residents with 953 home visits. Four hours of clinics were held in the Candia area.

The total value of services rendered to Candia residents during 1983 was \$32,484. The value of services rendered without direct payment from third party insurance and patients fees was \$13,223. These services were covered by town appropriations of \$3,594., agency acquired grants, United Way, donations and other solicitations.

REPORT OF THE CANDIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the 1983 year the Candia Volunteer Fire Department responded to 77 calls, represented as follows: 17 Vehicular Accidents, 13 Chimney Fires, 12 Brush Fires, 7 Electrical Wires Fires, 5 Building Fires, 5 Service Calls, 5 Vehicle Fires, 4 Smoke Investigations, 3 Bomb Threats, 2 Mutual Aid Calls, 1 Assist Rescue, 1 Training Drill, 1 Gas Grill Fire, and 1 Search for Missing Person.

In 1983 the 77 calls the fire department responded to represent 1,244 man hours, coupled with 558 man hours in building the hose tower and 792 man hours on building maintenance along with 1036 man hours on equipment maintenance and 3,164 man hours on fund raising projects, also to include 1,350 man hours in fire fighting training which totals to be a conservative 8,144 man hours which the officers and members of the fire department put in at their own expense and is all absolutely free time put in to benefit the Candia Volunteer Fire Department and most importantly the people of the Town of Candia for which there is no expense for time consumed in man hours.

Of the 1350 man hours put in for firefighter training, the fire department is proud to announce that eleven Candia Firefighters have completed the 96 hour New Hampshire State Certified Firefighter I Course and are now awaiting final examination by the New Hampshire Fire Standards and Training Commission. The completion of this certification by these people is most definitely an asset to both the fire department and the people of the Town of Candia for whom the Candia Fire Department exists to serve and protect.

As you the voter, have most likely already read in the warrant articles to be voted on at the March 1984 meeting, the Candia Volunteer Fire Department is asking the voters of the Town of Candia to vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$80,000.00 for the purchase of a new pumper and associated equipment. This was not a hasty decision on the part of just a few people but a well thought out project by an eight man truck committee working with the officers of the fire department which started over a year ago. The first objective of the committee was to establish the direction in which the Candia Fire Department was to head in regards to upgrading fire protection for the Town of Candia. The fire department presently depends on a Tanker Shuttle Operation for water supply because water sources are far and few between requiring water to be trucked from source to the fire. This operation consists of two 750 gallon per minute pumpers assigned to the structure involved. The reason for committing two pumpers to the structure is because a Fold-A-Tank set up used in the Tanker Shuttle Operation can not be set up just anywhere. We need a fairly large area in which to dump and turn the tankers around to go for refill. One pumper goes as close to the structure as is safe and the second pumper lays hose lines from the first pumper to an area large enough to set up for the Tanker Shuttle and pumps from the Fold-A-Tanks to the first pumper. Tankers in turn travel between the Fold-A-Tank set-up and the water source which brings us to the subject at hand. A pumper is needed at the water source to fill the tankers. The fire department presently depends upon a 1948 truck with a 500 gallon per minute pump to do this work. This pumper is now too small in regards to output and too old to sustain long periods of pumping. The truck committee looked into rebuilding this piece of apparatus and decided it was economically unfeasible. The committee then looked into used pumpers and again decided that because of reconditioning costs

this would not be a wise move. The committee then decided that a new pumper was the best move all around, for the fire department and the Town of Candia alike. The committee then started to design a pumper to do all that the fire department felt it should do to complete the Tanker Shuttle Operation now and in the future. Many hours were spent on drawing up specifications and listening to manufactures of fire apparatus. Twelve manufactures were contacted to bid on this pumper and at this writing no decision has been made as to whose bid will be proposed at town meeting.

You the voters of the Town of Candia will make the final decision as to the purchase of this new piece of apparatus, so please come to town meeting and exercise your right to vote on this matter. The Candia Fire Department respectfully asks for your support for this project that we feel is very necessary for upgrading fire protection for the Town of Candia.

The officers and members of the Candia Volunteer Fire Department wish to express their most sincere thanks to the people of the Town of Candia for their continuing support and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit when one is required is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000.00 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only you can prevent forest fires!"

REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center completed its twelfth year of service in 1983. The Health Center operates two medical offices, one in Newmarket and the other in Raymond, the Lamprey Rivier Clinic. Both facilities provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services, and short term counseling with referral to area mental health agencies.

In 1983, Joseph Fuller, M.D., a family practitioner, joined the staff. The Health Center offers a Prenatal Program, under the director of Maude Guerin, M.D., which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care. In addition, the Health Center offers nutritional counseling and prenatal classes.

Other members of the medical staff include Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Michael Lewis, P.A.-C., Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P., and Anne Fawcett, A.R.N.P. The medical team also includes registered nurses, medical assistants and community health workers. For more information, or to make a medical appointment, call 659-3106 in Newmarket, 895-3351 in Raymond, or toll-free in Newmarket at 1-800-582-7279.

The community health workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaisons between the medical providers and patients.

In November, 1982, the Newmarket Regional Health Center initiated a Self-Care Program for the Elderly in conjunction with the Occupational Therapy Department of the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this program is to enable the elderly to stay in their home setting as well as to maintain a quality of life and independent status within their community. The focus of the program is to provide self-care skills before disability occurs and to anticipate problems with functional activities. The Newmarket Regional Health Center continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. Three of the four busses are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. The transportation service enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. You are hereby notified to meet at the Candia Moore School in said District, on the seventh day of March, 1984, at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following articles.

1. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers of the District.

2. To see if the District will vote to accept and expend funds in the amounts set forth below which may be made available to the District through the following federal programs.

ECIA Block Grants	\$5,000.00
Energy Conservation Grants	2,500.00
Miscellaneous	2,500.00

(The amounts of money set forth for each program are estimated and amounts appropriated for any one program may be overexpended so long as the total amount expended for all of the above programs does not exceed Ten Thousand and 00/100 (\$10,000.00) Dollars.)

3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district meeting money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1984-85 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

4. To see if the District will vote to raise, appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred and 00/100 (\$1,200.00) Dollars to be expended towards the support of community activity at the Moore School.

5. To see if the District will vote to raise, appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Four Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty Four and 00/100 (\$404,864.00) Dollars to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1984-85 school year. Forty Thousand Three Hundred Eleven and 00/100 (\$40,311.00) Dollars of such sum representing additional salaries and benefits attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable for the first year of the Collective Bargaining Agreement entered into by the School Board and the Candia Federation of Teachers. (This is the first year of a two year contract.)

6. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents other than benefits and salaries payable to teachers, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

1983-1984 SCHOOL YEAR

This year saw many changes to the Candia School Board. With the March elections, the number of members was increased from three to five. A note of particular interest to the community was that all five members were women.

The Board decided to change the format it would use to conduct its business. Thus, several new committees were set up to divide up the work that needed to be done by the Board. The new committees include Policy and Educational Improvement; Curriculum; Personnel & Finance and Communications.

The Policy Committee has formulated some new policies and revised some old ones for Board approval. New policies which have been approved include Instructional Policy on Sensitive Areas, Field Trips, Textbook & Library Resource Selection and Adoption, and Community Use of Grounds. Old policies revised include Budget Implementation and School District Goals.

The Curriculum Committee was set up to coordinate a curriculum review process. Presently the teachers are reviewing the science curriculum and writing curriculum guides that will provide continuity throughout the eight grades. Later this school year, the teachers will also be working on a uniform spelling curriculum and a handwriting curriculum.

Through the Personnel & Finance Committee, the board has become involved in the hiring of teachers. This committee screens candidates with the administration and then the full Board interviews candidates.

The Communications Committee has been meeting regularly on the first Wednesday evening of each month to hear peoples' problems, questions and comments.

Capital improvement projects have been undertaken this year. New windows, sashes and screens were installed in the front building for energy conservation. A new tile flooring was installed in the basement hallway of the front building. A backstop was purchased for the ball field. The Board is now discussing renovations to the bathrooms in the front building.

The Board revised the schedule for Nature's Classroom so the sixth grade children will not miss so much school time. This five-day session is now the sixth grade field trip.

At this writing, the Board is negotiating a new teaching contract with the professional staff.

The Board removed the Me/Me and Ombudsman Drug Prevention Programs and has set up a committee to find a more suitable alternative.

Each School Board Meeting finds your representatives taking a close look at bills and expenditures for the month, as they keep a watchful eye on the budget.

The Middle School Concept in grades 5 through 8 was reviewed and changes were made in its administration.

The Gifted and Talented Program is in place, with direction from the Board that within the next couple of years, it will become a part of classroom activities, as much as possible.

The Board spent \$1,500.00 in extra monies for library books last May to enhance the school library's capabilities.

A full music program (including instrumental) is now in full swing at the school. Maybe in the not too distant future our community will have a band to enjoy again.

The Chapter I federal grant this year was large enough to include a remedial math program, as well as the remedial reading program.

As this year comes to an end, we feel much has been accomplished. However, not all goals have been met and next year looks to be just as challenging.

Cawley, Superintendent; Alan Rich, Principal; Donald Beaudette, Assistant Superintendent; Edward Donovan, Assistant Superintendent; Carol Davis, Special Services Director; Robert Leslie, Attorney; and Mario Jeannotte, Custodian.

Article 1 relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Linda Brock and seconded by Valeda Millette "I move that the reports of the officers of the Candia School District as set forth in the annual report of the district, be accepted and placed on file". Motion carried.

Article 2 regarding Federal funds was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Dale Uhlenhake and seconded by Linda Brock "I move that the school district vote to accept and expend up to \$10,000.00 for the federal programs such as ECIA Block Grants, Energy Conservation Grants, and other miscellaneous programs; with the amounts sets forth for each program estimated so that the amounts for any one program may be overexpended so long as the total amount for all the programs does not exceed \$10,000.00". Joe Mroz asked if the \$10,000.00 was included in the budget under revenue and if it is and Candia does not receive it, will the taxpayers have to make up for it. Mr. Uhlenhake explained that the money was included in the budget, but the money could not be spent if Candia does not receive the federal funds. Article 2 was put to a vote and the motion carried.

Article 3 on accepting whatever monies may become available was read by the Moderator. Motion by Valeda Millette and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake "I move that the school district authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1983-84 school fiscal year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money". Val Millette explained that this article asks permission to accept funds. Put to a vote. motion carried.

Article 4 relative to raising, appropriating, and expending funds for the gifted and talented program was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Paul Shagoury and seconded by John Gaydos "I move that the district raise and appropriate and expend the amount of \$7,826.00 to maintain funding for the gifted and talented program; such funds to be expended for teacher salary, benefits, workshops, supplies and books". Questions were raised on what the program involved and how it would help the children. Linda Brock explained what the children learned and how other schools in Category 2 let the teachers and librarians handle gifted and talented children, during or after school. Mrs. Brock recommended that teachers here handle gifted and talented children. Dale Uhlenhake feels that children who are gifted are not being challenged to the extent that they could be if a program does not exist. Elizabeth Shadid stated that the

program would be beneficial due to the one-to-one relationship with the teacher, reading abilities would improve, but perhaps an alternative could be found. Bob Claver questioned if it is possible for the school board to spend money on a category that is not in the budget. Attorney Robert Leslie replied if there is money in the budget for a teaching program some money left over could be appropriated at a later date. If we vote no to the article, money could not be expended later for this program. Because it would raise taxes if the article passed, Susan Young suggested the possibility of assigning the next level text for gifted children. Ingrid Byrd asked why the Resource Room could not handle the program. Special Service Director Carol Davis explained that the Resource Room does not have the capability. Among others participating were Leonard Drew, Judy Szot, Susan Boynton, Pat Uhlenhake, John Coleman, and Dayle Smyrl. Val Millette read some information from the Accountability Program regarding the negative effects of pulling children out of regular classes for special classes. Edward Donovan, Assistant Superintendent, explained that it is hard to access a gifted and talented program taught by a special teacher after only one year. Motion made to vote on this article was made by Ray Lansing and seconded by Susan Young, motion carried.

Article 5 relative to raising, appropriating and expending monies for co-curricular activities was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Steve Shubert, seconded by John Ferguson "I move that the district raise, appropriate and expend the amount of \$4,568.00 to maintain current funding levels of co-curricular activities." Mr. Ferguson spoke on the importance of having co-curricular activities because it teaches human values, educates through athletics and helps create responsible adults. Of the 232 5th through 8th grades, 79% participate in some form of athletic activity. Val Millette suggested an alternative to cutting the co-curricular budget to 50% of last year by charging each student \$23.00 to participate in basketball and soccer to pay for uniforms and other equipment. Deborah Cole stated that not all parents could afford \$23.00 per sport for basketball and soccer. Mr. Uhlenhake said that Mrs. Millette did the study on her own and he did not know what the school board would do if it is cut. Susan Young questioned why \$250.00 was expended and \$1533.00 was spent in the 1981-1982 budget. Mr. Uhlenhake said he would try to find out why more was spent than expended. Discussion by Paul Low, Mrs. Galinas and John Gaydos concerning the importance of co-curricular activities to children at Moore School. Pam Lefebre was asked what the money in the budget represents. Val Millette explained that the amount would not cover student council, cross-country skiing and intramural sports. Mr. Uhlenhake stated the proposed budget would eliminate half of the programs and it would be up to the school board to determine which program would be cut. Move to a vote, Article 5 passes.

Article 6 relative to raising, appropriating and expending monies for a full time guidance counselor was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Donald Coleman seconded by Patricia Silverstein. "I move that the district vote to raise, appropriate and expend the amount of \$6,678.00 to maintain funding as at current level for a full time guidance counselor. Monies to be expended for counselor salary and benefits, supplies and materials, books, dues, fees and mileage." Mr. Coleman spoke on the importance of maintaining a full time guidance counselor to be there when needed and to give as much help to students as needed. Also that Auburn, Raymond, and Goffstown all have full time guidance counselors. Linda Brock spoke of her survey of the Manchester schools

saying that only 3 schools have full time counselors, the other schools have counselors 2½ days per week. She also stated that children need more parenting in the home, not counseling in the school. Robert Lord questioned Linda Brock's information saying that not all of the schools in Manchester had 500 students, and that one Junior High School had 1 full and 1 part time guidance counselor. Mr. Pitman spoke against returning the counselor to a full time position saying that parents are the best counselors. Judith Szot stated it would be unrealistic if we assumed that every child came from a loving home, children and home situations have changed. Some children come from broken homes and the school is then responsible to reach them to function in society. Question by Mrs. Bowman was what other responsibilities does the guidance counselor have. Mr. Rich gave a number of functions such as Direct Service, parent consultations, testing program, observation of students in class, curriculum for children entering high school (and also older high school students). One to two days is spent on staffing of "special students", community groups, and reports to welfare on child abuse, neglect and depression. Betty Thomson explained that this program is a place where we can not do things for our children, that this school is their environment where they are exposed to peer pressure, and that there are things that go on within the classrooms that would call for counseling. A question was asked to the Board regarding what the guidance counselor was paid yearly. Mr. Uhlenhake explained that \$6,678.00 would bring the counselor to a full time position. Mr. Rich was asked for his professional opinion on whether Moore School needs a full time counselor. Mr. Rich explained that the program would not be able to provide the same services of time that is available now if cut to 3 days. A question was raised on the high school students being helped in high school. Mr. Uhlenhake explained that those students have developed a rapport with Mr. Baroody. Paul Shagoury asked how many years Moore School has had a full time counselor. (5 years). A discussion by Dottie Kurtz, Paul Boynton, Elizabeth Shadid, and Nancy Evans on the importance of a full time Guidance Counselor. Mr. Pitman asked what the feelings of the School Board Members were. Mr. Ohlenhake said he is in favor of a full time counselor, because problems exist (alcohol, drugs, smoking) and we need all the help we can get. Mrs. Millette said she is in favor of a 3/5 position. Mrs. Brock stated she is also in favor of a 3/5 position and that she felt the program is creating problems. A question was raised on whether or not Mr. Baroody would accept a 3/5 position. Mr. Uhlenhake said he did not know if he would remain at Moore School or if any one else would accept a 3/5 position. Mrs. Davis stated that it costs \$5,000.00 to \$35,000.00 to educate a disturbed child. Move to a vote by secret ballot. In favor 109, opposed 108 votes. Article 6 passes.

Article 7 relative to raising, appropriating and expending monies for funding for maintenance was read by the moderator. Motion was made by Mr. Hayden, seconded by Russ Dann, "I move that the district vote to raise, appropriate and expend the amount of \$8,955.00 in replacement funding for the maintenance account. Monies to be expended in the following manner: \$4,205.00 Custodial salary, \$1,250.00 Summer maintenance, \$500.00 Overtime pay, \$2,000.00 Supply purchases, \$750.00 Grounds maintenance, \$250.00 Equipment replacement." Mr. Hayden spoke on the need for money to restore grounds and daily maintenance that is needed inside. The building will not be able to be cleaned daily if the budget is cut. Val Millette said she appreciated the importance of maintaining the building but one part time position could be cut leaving 2 full time positions. John Coleman asked who cleans after Planning Board meetings. It was answered that the Planning Board cleans the room. Mrs. Warren asked what the

hours are of the night custodian. (2:00 - 10:00 pm) Susan Young asked if the head maintenance man hands in an inventory form. Mr. Rich explained that yes, there is an inventory kept. Russ Dann and Joe Simon asked if the town could hold down the number of meetings they have and if the custodial help could be charged to the town. Mr. Uhlenhake stated that the cost would still have to be included in the school budget. Jerry Lavoie explained that the night maintenance man works from 2:30 - 10:30 p.m. in the new building with ½ hour for supper. In the old building, a part time person works from 2:30 - 6:30 p.m. A question was raised on what the value of the building is in respect to the article, the amount being \$1,460,200.00. Petition for a secret ballot. In favor of 106 votes, opposed 74 votes. Article 7 passes.

Article 8 relative to raising and appropriating monies for community activities was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Linda Brock, seconded by Val Millette, "I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be expended towards the support of community activity at the Moore School." Mr. Uhlenhake explained that the money is to pay for the school for summer programs. Move to a vote by Mr. Thomas, article passes.

Article 9 relative to raising and appropriating monies for a new fire alarm control panel was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Leonard Wilson, seconded by Jim Wilson, "I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for the purpose of installing a new Master Fire Alarm Control Panel and otherwise improving the fire alarm system at the Candia Moore School." Leonard Wilson explained that the alarm panel in the office is no longer capable of expansion, that the fire department would replace the panel with a 24 zone instead of the 6 zone that is there now. The battery back-up that is there now costs \$1300.00 each for replacement. The new back-up would cost \$350.00 each for replacement. Leonard Wilson also stated that there is nothing wrong with the system the way it is but there is a need to make provisions to protect the building when it is empty. Paul Low suggested the possibility of contacting the insurance company to see if they would take part of the cost. Judith Szot suggested the possibility that the insurance might be cheaper with a new alarm system. Leonard Wilson explained that the school is on a regular inspection system as far as fire alarms. The new panel will not do anything except improve capabilities to expand. Move to a vote, article passes.

Article 10 relative to selecting one Candia voter to serve as a member on the Staff Development Committee for two years was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Dale Uhlenhake, seconded by Linda Brock, "I move that the Candia School District choose one Candia voter to serve as a member of the Auburn-Candia-Hooksett Staff Development Committee for a two year term." Motion was made by Val Millette to nominate Betty Sabean, seconded by Dale Uhlenhake, "I nominate Betty Sabean to serve as a member of the Auburn-Candia-Hooksett Staff Development Committee for two years." Linda Brock made a motion to have the nominations closed, seconded by Dale Uhlenhake, "I move that the nominations be closed." Article passes.

Article 11 relative to teachers salaries and benefits for the 1983-84 school year was read by the moderator. Motion was made by Dale Uhlenhake, seconded by Linda Brock, "I move that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$355,352.00 to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1983-84 school year; \$25,327.00 of such sum representing additional

salaries and benefits attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable under the first year of the Collective bargaining Agreement, this being the second year of a two-year contract.” Dale Uhlenhake explained that this is the second year of the contract and that the cost of collective bargaining for the second year is \$25,327.00. If the article is defeated, we would have to open up negotiations with the teachers. Put to a vote, Article 11 passes.

Article 12 relative to the school budget was read by the Moderator. Motion was made by Val Millette, seconded by Dale Uhlenhake, “I move that the school district raise and appropriate \$1,096,501.10 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents other than benefits and salaries payable to teachers; and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the school district.” Some discussion of what amount of increase to the taxes this budget would involve. A motion was made by Dan Jaskolka, seconded by Mr. Low to cut the budget by \$35,000. Dan Jaskolka explained heating costs and electricity costs were lower. Judy Szot stated we need to look at priorities, we need education for our children. John Coleman stated that we need to reinstate funds in the level that we had last year. A question was asked on where Val Millette would cut because of the warrant articles. Val stated that only if the budget passed would she hold to articles. Some discussion by Paul Shagoury, Diane LaCombe, Dick Snow, and Robert Claver. Dale Uhlenhake moved the question. A vote on the amendment by Susan Young, Dean Young, Diane LaCombe, and Leonard Wilson to cut the funding in Article 12 by \$35,000.00 to \$1,061,501.10. In Favor Of 56, Opposed 100. Article 12 passes.

On a motion by Linda Brock and seconded by Dale Uhlenhake the meeting adjourned at 11:02 p.m.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1982-1983

This report marks the completion of my first year as Principal of the Henry W. Moore School. It has been a very rewarding year for me personally and a positive educational one for the students. The residents of Candia can be proud of the students, staff and the Henry W. Moore School and the education provided for the students. Although there have been controversial issues and budgetary disputes during the year, student programs and activities have functioned in a very positive direction.

The Accountability Program is in full operation and we have seen some significant gains although we did not meet all of our original goals. There is currently much more awareness by students, teachers and parents of a total and continuing commitment to the plan. June, 1985 is the target date that the minimum competencies must be mastered for promotion to grade 5 and graduation from grade 8. With continued cooperation and progress we should meet that deadline without too much apprehension and any final deadline crisis situations.

The results of the Stanford Achievement Tests at grades 1, 3, 5, and 7 continue to emphasize that Candia students continue to score above the national averages.

Several supplemental programs have contributed to providing a well rounded student program. The Challenge Program, designed to take students beyond the regular required academic expectancies has provided students with an opportunity to expand their creative awareness and individual talents.

The Young Authors Project under the guidance of the Reading Specialist was once again very successful with one of our winners participating in the State Conference.

Some of the middle school house group activities worthy of note were the community service projects and the two outstanding "Scholastic Scrimmage" competitions.

Other highlights of the year were the Nature's Classroom week for the sixth graders at West Swanzey, N.H. and the Patchwork Productions Activities to help defray the cost of the science camp.

Class field trips were to such places as the Boston Museum of Science, New England Aquarium, Plimoth Plantation, Odiorne Point, Friendly Farm, Squam Lake Science Center, and the annual Whale Watch.

The annual Science Fair this year for grades 5-8 had more than 150 separate entries with some outstanding student projects.

There were three major music related productions during the year; The Christmas Concert, Midyear Choral Production, and the annual Spring Concert.

The special education needs of Candia children are being met after individual evaluation and analysis and review by the pupil placement team. Individual Education Plans are written for each child to be carried out either at the Moore School or if necessary at an out of district placement which can provide the least restrictive alternative.

The Resource Room Program is a Special Education setting that continues to serve students in grades one through eight as well as identified pre-school handicapped children. Students involved in the resource room receive remedial instruction individually or in small groups with emphasis placed upon teaching specific skills that the child needs. At the end of the lesson(s) the student returns to the regular classroom. This way the student only leaves the mainstream for

specific periods of the school day. All students are mainstreamed to the greatest extent possible as dictated by public law 94-142 and do not spend more than 50% of their day in the program. The program is non-categorical and is designed to provide services to students with mild and moderate educational handicapping conditions. Students coded as Learning Disabled, Speech and Language handicapped and Emotionally handicapped have received services from the Resource Room this year.

During the 1982-83 school year the resource room student population, enrollment and staff remained basically the same. We began the school year in September with 33 identified students enrolled in the program, some who were scheduled to attend for up to three academic subjects plus support. We are ending the year with 37 students receiving services. Three students will be discharged from the program and two are graduating from Moore School. Many students who began the 1982-83 school year receiving most of their academic instruction in the resource room were able to be mainstreamed for more of their school day.

The self contained class is a Special Education Program that provides services for the more severely learning disabled and intellectual handicapped students in grades one through seven. These services are provided in a supportive setting which places emphasis on individualized instruction by teaching and utilizing each child's strengths and remediating weaker areas. These students join their peers for academic periods of which they can achieve at the same level and non-academic periods to promote social growth and development.

The Speech, Hearing and Language Program is a school related service that provides diagnostic, consultant and direct remediation services to children ages 3 through 21. Most of the children served are in grades one through eight. These children have been identified through screenings or teacher referrals. Pre-school children served are referred by parents or community services. Children served are both educationally handicapped and special needs non-handicapped students.

Speech and Language skills, including auditory skills, are important skills for success both in academics and social participation. Most academic instruction is language based. Difficulty in speech, language or hearing (listening) could create difficulties in most subjects.

Our program serves the needs of children with various disorders. They are as follows:

1. Language disorders and delays
2. Articular disorders
3. Hearing impaired and auditory perceptual disorders
4. Stuttering and fluency disorders
5. Voice disorders related to vocal hygiene

During this school year, the Speech and Language Program has served 29 students directly. Students previously discharged or with difficulties that can be addressed in the classroom receive services through consultation. Of these students, 6 have been discharged this year. The remaining students consist of seventeen educationally handicapped (speech and language needs) and six non-handicapped students.

The Chapter I Program, formerly known as the Title I program, is a federally funded program designed to meet the needs of educationally disadvantaged students. These students do not meet the criteria for identification as handicapped, but still need assistance in order to succeed in school.

The Candia Chapter I Program has been designed to improve student's reading through remediation in the communication skill areas of listening,

thinking, speaking and writing. Children need skill in these areas, not only to succeed in school, but also in every day life.

One part-time specialist and one full time tutor met individually or in groups with over twenty students in grades one through eight. Students were seen for half hour sessions between two and five times per week.

The commitment of time and effort by the staff members at the Moore School has been outstanding and is the real strength and backbone of the educational program.

Two major goals for the 1983-1984 school year are:

1. Make significant gains in our Accountability Test Results
2. Evaluate and review our current curriculum and develop updated curriculum guides.

On behalf of the students and staff, I extend our thanks and appreciation to the many organizations and individual's who have contributed so very much to make the year a successful one.

BURNING REGULATIONS

State of New Hampshire

IN CASE OF FIRE — PHONE 483-2311

Written permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times, when the ground is not covered with snow.

Permits will not be issued for the kindling of open fires between the hours of 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM, unless raining.

Permits for grass, brush, campfires, etc., must be obtained on the day burning is to be done.

Permits for screened incinerators and properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season.

There is no charge for permits which may be obtained from Donald W. Seward, Forest Fire Warden, Candia. Tel. 483-8629.

All fires seen and reported by the fire lookout tower are checked with these permits and any person found to be burning without first obtaining a permit is subject to a fine up to \$200.

Any person found to be burning after being refused a permit because of unsuitable weather is subject to a fine up to \$500.

These regulations are set up by the State of New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department.
