2014 TOWN OF CANDIA WARRANT State of New Hampshire

As Presented to the Board of Selectmen

First Session:

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in the said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in the said Candia, on Saturday, 1st, of February, 2014 at 9 a.m. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the Warrant Articles numbered 1 through - 25. The Warrant Articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on main motion as amended.

Second Session:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia on Tuesday the 11th of March, 2014. This session shall be the Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles, as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the "First Session". The Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 1.

To choose the following Town Officers for the year ensuing:

Superintendent of Cemeteries	1 year term	Vote for One

Library Trustee, (Public Rep.)	3 year term	Vote for One

ARTICLE 2.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an **operating budget**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling **\$2,377,975.00**. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be **\$2,369,061.00**, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Candia or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8-0)

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred and Seven Dollars **(\$6,807)** in support of the **Rockingham County Community Action**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8-0)

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) in continuation of its support of the **Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester and Southern New Hampshire**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7-1)

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$3,250) in continuation of its support of the **American Red Cross.** (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-2)

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-Four Dollars (\$1,854) in continuation of its support of the **Lamprey Health Care**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-2)

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1,250) in continuation of its support of the **Child Advocacy Center**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8-0)

ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) in continuation of its support of **Big Brother/Big Sister**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-1)

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) in continuation of its support of the **Child and Family Services.** (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-1)

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred and Two Dollars (\$702) in continuation of its support of the Rockingham County Nutrition and Meals on Wheels Program. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-1)

ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) in continuation of its support of the **Aids Response Seacoast**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 4-3)

ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) in continuation of its support of the CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-1)

ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$225) in continuation of its support of the **Retired and Senior Volunteer Program**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 5-2)

ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) to resurface Lane Rd., Green Rd. and portions of Depot Rd. Included in this project will be the replacement of the two four-foot round culverts at Ward Brook with a box culvert and address all other drainage problems that exist on Depot Road. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Submitted by the Road Agent) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-1)

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for excess winter road maintenance, these funds will not be used unless the operating winter maintenance funds are exhausted. This will be a non-transferable appropriation. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7-0)

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars **(\$20,000)** to be placed in the existing **Revaluation Capital Reserve** fund for the Future Revaluation of the municipality. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7-0)

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars **(\$50,000)** to be deposited in the **Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund**, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of the fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 4-2-1)

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty Three Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$133,880) for the operating expenses of the **Smyth Public Library**. Funds are to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association. (Submitted by the Smyth Public Library Trustees) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7-0)

ARTICLE 19.

to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four thousand, Six hundred and Fifty dollars **(\$4,650.00)** for the first phase of updating the **Candia Master Plan** per RSA 674:3. (Submitted by the Planning Board) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7-0)

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) for the operation and maintenance of the **Fitts Museum**. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Trustees of the Fitts Museum. (Submitted by the Trustees of the Fitts Museum) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7-0)

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to **reinstate**, in accordance with RSA 289:6, III, a five-member Board of **Cemetery Trustees**. If this article passes, a new board of cemetery trustees will be elected at the town meeting next following this vote. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2)

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to **establish** a five-member Board of Trustees for the **Old Smyth Memorial Building**. The Board of Selectmen will appoint the members for their first terms. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1)

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to **revoke** the **DARE car trust fund** pursuant to RSA 31:19-a. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0)

ARTICLE 24.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 to the Candia Youth Athletic Association for the specific expenses of providing youth recreation programs to the children of Candia. Said expenses to be expended under the direction of the Candia Youth Athletic Association Board of Directors in accordance with the approved budgets. Submitted by petition. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen 3-2) (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 3-3-1)

ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Thirty Seven Thousand Dollars (\$37,000) for the implementation of a **mosquito control program** designed to reduce the risk of exposure to mosquito-borne diseases such as EEE and West Nile Virus. Submitted by petition. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6-0-1)

The fire apparatus in Candia is on a twenty five year cycle because the apparatus has been well maintained. There were no questions. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 17 will be placed on the ballot as written..

Deb Spezzaferri, chair of the Library Trustees wished to amend the article to reduce the dollar amount to. \$132,680.00 Mrs. Spezzaferri explained the decrease was due to a reduction in health insurance. The amendment was seconded by Mr. Kelley. When voted on by a show of ballots, the amendment passes, There was no discussion on the amended article. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 18 will be placed on the ballot as amended.

By reducing the mosquito population in advance, we reduce the risk. He urged us to put this on the ballot. Russ Dann had a couple of questions. What was done a few years ago? Mr. Schifflett explained that part of this money would be used for bacterial control, which was done a few years ago, and the rest for spraying. What would be the outcome if Manchester Waterworks asks that no spraying occurs? Mr. Schifflett explained that Dragon Mosquito control would not treat certain bodies of water and people can have the water treated with bacteria and opt out for spraying. There is no additional cost for positions were filled: testing. People can opt in or out for spraying. Mr. Chivers explained that he had a problem with Dragon Mosquito Control, They should ask permission from the landowner to enter their property. Mr. Schifflett explained there are several levels of treatment. Mrs. Soares stated that people have to use bug spray, which is the first step. When the program was done three years ago, only the bacteria was used. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. The amended .Article 25 will be moved to the ballot as read.

Following the completion of the warrant articles, the traditional positions were filled: Reeve of Hogs, Robert Jones, Scaler of Timber, Sharon Dewitt, and Viewer of Fences, Robert Gagne

The carpeting will need to be replaced in the meeting room and town offices. Thanks to Selectman Soares, the inside of town hall was repainted and the new pictures look great.

He would like to thank the Board of Selectmen for a great year of working together. Sometimes it was tough but we worked through it. I'd say we did a great job in the year 2013 and look forward to 2014 to being as good.

Letter from the Town Clerk

Dear Candia Citizens,

In this, my annual letter to you, I am including items that may help you when you come to the Town Clerk's office to take care of your transactions. Please do not hesitate to call if you have questions or concerns, Cheryl and I will be happy to help you. In case of severe weather, if we have to close our office, it will always be posted on WZID, 95.7 FM and 96.5 FM The Mill, and also Chanel 9 WMUR.

When doing any transaction at our office, the State now is asking us to put your driver's license number on their copy of your registration as well as on the Title Application if we do one. Please have your license ready. When renewing your vehicle, or transferring your plates to a new vehicle, you must bring your most current registration. If you have lost the old registration, you will need to pay \$18.00 for a certified copy. When purchasing a new vehicle, please read over the dealer prepared title application very carefully. There have been many times when two names were supposed to be on the paperwork, but it was completed with only one. We cannot add any additional names to dealer prepared applications or make other corrections.

Our E-Reg program is becoming more popular every year. With this program, you can register your car on line as long as it is a renewal with no changes from the previous year's registration, and you lived in Candia. Remember to have your old registration next to you as you do your renewal on your computer, as you will have to insert information on the screen. If you have a vanity plate, use the letter O for any zeros that are in your plate number, otherwise you will not be able to process your registration by E-reg. The payment is by E-Check. Cheryl and I try to have a one or two day turnaround, so we can get your registration back to you promptly.

We also offer the E-Dog program, which allows you to license your dog on line as long as the rabies certificate has not expired. To use this feature you will put in last year's dog license number, but leave out the zeros. For example, if your license number was 13-0034, you would put 13-34 in the E-Dog screen. By State Law, all dogs must be licensed by April 30. Our 2013 Dog Licenses are now available!

Please remember that if you have more than six vehicles to register at a time, and there are many other customers waiting in line, you should make arrangements to pick them up later and leave two checks: one to the Town of Candia, and one to the State of NH-MV. We will process them when we are closed to the public, and phone you when they have been completed. You will receive a photocopy of your checks with the amounts as well as your new registrations. In order to keep the lines running smoothly and our customers happy, please make prior arrangements with us when you have many vehicles to register.

There will be three elections in Two Thousand Fourteen. The Town Election will be held on March 11, 2014, The State primary September 9, 2014, and the State general election on November 4, 2014. For the Town election, you will be voting on Town and School articles as well as Zoning. Remember the polls are always open from 6:00AM to 7:00PM. If you are going to be out of town before any election, please contact me. I will give you an application for

an absentee ballot which you will fill in and return to me. When the ballots come in, I will mail you one or you can apply for one in person,

FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 2013, the Candia Fire Department responded to 347 calls for assistance. In addition to the time required to resolve these incidents, the Department members devoted additional time for training, maintaining certifications and readiness, and maintaining the apparatus, equipment and the fire station. 2013 saw the Department double the number of fire training sessions, leading to a substantial increase in the number of fire training hours invested.

The Fire Department members want to thank the Candia residents who at the 2013 Town Meeting supported the Department's warrant article to add \$50,000 to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. The purpose of this Capital Reserve Fund is to allocate money annually so that when new apparatus or expensive equipment must be purchased, the required funds are available.

As we wrote in the 2012 Town Report, the Department needs to replace its ageing rescue vehicle and the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund is the means that will allow this to happen. Though we anticipated a year ago that the purchase of the new rescue would occur in 2013, it has taken longer as we have needed the additional time to analyze the many factors involved in making the decision from operational and cost perspectives on the best vehicle to purchase. This process is close to completion and we anticipate purchasing the new rescue in 2014.

In 2014 the Department must replace all of its breathing air units that are worn by firefighters when operating in smoky or hazardous air environments. Our current breathing air units are reaching the end of their life span and cannot be recertified for use beyond the end of 2014. Though we are pursuing grant funds to purchase the new breathing air units, if a grant is not available, funds from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund will need to be used.

In 2013, the Department continued its smoke detector drive where smoke detectors were available to town residents upon request. We will continue this effort in 2014 and we encourage residents who do not have smoke detectors to take advantage of this program. If you need smoke detectors, simply stop at the fire station or call us at 483-2202. Please check frequently that your smoke detectors work properly and change their batteries at least twice a year. We also recommend that residents have carbon monoxide detectors installed in their homes.

The Department continues to offer the Vial of Life program, a free service where you complete a Vial of Life form with your medical information. In an emergency, if you can't speak, the information emergency personnel need to assist you is available. The form remains in your home with a Vial of Life decal for your home's door to indicate your participation. The Fire Department encourages residents to use this important service. Vial of Life forms and decals are available at the fire station and Town Clerk's office. For more information, please call the fire station at 483-2202.

For 2014, we are submitting one warrant article for your consideration, again asking that you authorize adding \$50,000 to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. We need to continue to build the Capital Reserve Fund with annual contributions so that funds are available when needed. We ask that you please support this warrant article.

The members of the Fire Department look forward to serving the residents of Candia throughout 2014. We wish you and yours well and thank you for the support that you provide.

BURNING REGULATIONS

Written permits must still be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden or a Deputy Forest Fire Warden for all open fires at all times, except when the ground is completely covered with snow. However, it is illegal to burn anything except for brush and clean, untreated wood. The burning of any construction and demolition debris, household garbage, plastic, painted or stained wood, or any other material is strictly prohibited at any time of the year. Violation of this regulation or kindling a fire without a permit can result in fines up to \$200.00

Permits will not be issued for kindling or open fires between the hours of 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM unless it is raining <u>steadily</u> and the Fire Warden or Deputy Warden has issued a permit. Permits for properly constructed outdoor fireplaces may be obtained for the season. Fireplaces and/or campfires must meet the State of New Hampshire regulations and be inspected by a Warden prior to use. Please see the regulations at the fire department website at <u>www.candiavfd.org</u>.

Permits can be obtained by calling the Fire Department Duty Officer pager at 639-7179 and leaving a voice message with your name, address and call back number. Permits are normally issued between 4:00 and 6:00 PM daily. After 6:00 PM permits will not be issued.

No permits will be issued for any location unless the location has been issued a valid address and the number is posted with 4" reflective numbers on both sides of a mailbox or 4" post permanently installed at the entrance to the property. AN IMPORTANT REMINDER FROM THE FIRE DEPARTMENT SMOKE DETECTORS HELP SAVE LIVES

Properly installed and maintained smoke detectors can save your life in the event of a fire. Please remember to test and clean your smoke detectors at least annually. Batteries should be changed twice a year (such as when you change your clocks). If you have any questions or need a smoke detector and cannot afford one, please contact the fire department at 483-2202.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The winter of 2013 started out with plenty of snow to contend with. It seemed as though we had just cleaned up after one storm and another would come along. Aside from the blizzard on February 9th with 24 inches of snow, none were huge storms, just many of them. This many takes a toll on the highway crew and the budget. However, we were reimbursed by FEMA for the cost of the Feb. 9th blizzard. The rest of the year was relatively quiet weather wise, with no major windstorms, flooding, or hurricanes. This was welcomed after such a busy winter. Then in December when winter returned there were no major storms, just many ice and snow events that added up to one of the busiest Decembers ever for the highway department.

In 2013 we completed the sixth phase of the Patten Hill Road project with the final wearing course of asphalt over the entire length of the road. This is an important part of the project, as it serves to seal the binder course and provide the final layer on the roadway for a total of three inches of pavement. The Patten Hill Road project cost a total of \$900,000. The result is a road that should last for decades, only needing resurfacing every twelve to fifteen years. As with any road project, some inconvenience is likely. We try our best to keep this to a minimum and wish to thank all who live and travel on these roads for their patience. The guardrail replacement at the Abe Emerson Marsh will take place in the spring with encumbered funds from the warrant article and the operating budget.

We also worked on a section of Critchett Road from Island Road east for 4/10ths of a mile. The roadway was pulverized, rocks removed, culverts replaced, gravel added and repaved. Although it was not a full rebuild, this method will add years to the life of a lower volume road and is well worth the investment.

This year our road work got a very late start due to the establishment of the town's new purchasing policy which wasn't finalized until July. This gave us little time to create bid documents, post notices, and receive and then award bids before fall. However, now that the procedures are established, next year's projects can proceed in our usual manner.

Road projects for 2014 with warrant article funding, if passed, will be: Lane Road and Green Road resurfacing, drainage improvements to Depot Road at Ward Brook and near the 101 overpass. Anyone that travels on these roads knows they are in dire need of these improvements.

I would like to remind the residents of a few rules that can make the Highway Department's job more efficient and help keep our roads safer for all:

- Please reduce speed and yield to oncoming snowplows on the road.
- Do not follow too closely behind plow trucks, as they may back up at intersections, and we cannot see you there!
- Please do not plow your snow into the road and do not push it across the road.
- Do not park any type of vehicle within 10 feet of the roadside.
- Please note that all driveway culverts are the sole responsibility of the property owner to maintain, per RSA 236:13VI.

In closing, I wish to thank the various contractors, who through everyone's combined efforts, has made our projects reach completion on schedule and within budget, resulting in greater cost savings to the town. We hope to be able to do road reconstruction in this manner in the years to come.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department started off 2013 with the loss of Full-Time Officer Jake Deignan. Jake went to a larger police department and we wish him luck. With the support of the residents and Selectmen, we were able to fill the position with Thomas Terilli, who is now attending the Full-Time Police Academy in Concord. Tom will graduate in April.

We also lost Part-Time Officer Alan Wilson, who was hired full-time in Deerfield. We hope to work with the Board of Selectmen and residents to fill these positions. I will continue to stress the importance of retaining qualified and professional employees and hope to get the backing of our Town residents.

We were fortunate enough to have Stephen Bradley on board for our Animal Control Officer, but unfortunately lost him, also, due to his full time job. Kate Morrill was hired to replace Steve and we have received many kind comments on availability and knowledge of animal-related calls. Feel free to call her through the Police Department if you need assistance with animal-related issue.

I wanted to let the citizens know that I have requested an increase for additional funds in the police equipment line item of this year's budget. We have a couple of outdated radar units, two non-functioning laptops and two tasers that need to be replaced.

We came to a compromise with the Selectmen that we would forego purchasing a cruiser this year; however, request \$12,000 to put towards the purchase at a later date. Several of the Town's cruisers have over \$100,000 miles. We try to use the low mileage cruisers for emergency response and use the higher mileage cruisers for details and pass them on to other Town departments.

We are thankful for the new Irving Station at Exit 3 and have noticed how much traffic it's creating at that location. We've been able to assist the employees with gas drive offs and many other citizen assists.

A serious motor vehicle crash occurred on Raymond Road in August involving Ryan Marion and his wife, who is a volunteer Candia Firefighter. Charges are pending against the driver of the other vehicle involved. The Candia community came together, with the Fire Department holding many fundraisers for the family. We wish the Ryan family continued success for his recovery.

The year ended with many burglaries in surrounding towns and it was a matter of time before having our share. During the month of November, a residence on Chester Turnpike was burglarized and many firearms were taken. After a lengthy investigation involving several agencies, five individuals were charged. Out of these five, two were also charged with an October burglary on Old Manchester Road. Drugs continue to be a driving force behind these burglaries. Bordering towns are seeing an increase and we feel the drug epidemic will be affecting our community. We will continue to do our best to protect Candia's citizens.

Nixle, a free notification alert service, which is obtained through the Town web site, is an important tool for the Police Department to notify residents of suspicious activity and/or emergencies. We do, however, encourage residents to immediately call the Police regarding suspicious activity.

On behalf of the staff and officers of the Candia Police Department, we thank the Candia Residents for their continued support.

FITTS MUSEUM REPORT

In 2013, the Fitts Museum celebrated Candia's 250th anniversary with a special program reflecting what everyday life was like in 1763 – the year Candia was incorporated. A record number of visitors enjoyed special displays on cooking, candle making and general family life in Candia during Colonial times. Guests had the opportunity to see presentations by herbalist and basket makers, spinning and musket demonstrations, and try their skills at old fashioned games. Thank you to all the crafts people and volunteers who participated in this event.

In June, we hosted the Historical Society for a special presentation on the subject of "tramp houses" that were built to accommodate the thousands of itinerant men that travelled the railroad searching for work after the Civil War. We were fortunate to have local historian Matthew Thomas of the Fremont Historical Society share his research and photographs. It gave thought to the possibility that our own "brick room" in the museum may have been used for this purpose at one time. Sadly, we have no record and may never know for certain!

We continued our monthly Special Exhibits that included: Postcards from the Past; Flags, Flags, Flags; Strike up the Band: Candia Cornet Band Instruments on display; Early Maps of the Area and Planes, Trains and Automobiles: Mostly Trains

In spring 2013, the nine window sashes across the front of the building were completely restored, including the addition of storm windows. By opening day 2014, the remaining sash on the federal style part of the building will have been completed.

We extend sincere gratitude to all who volunteered in 2013 and helped in ways large and small. We would love to have more of you share your memories and stories with us. Our website has generated many requests for genealogical information, general inquiries and private tours, as well as participation from past residents. Please join in!

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The year 2014 is upon us now and I would like to wish everyone a safe and healthy year ahead.

The year 2013 went by fast and presented no major health issues for most of us. Only a few West Nile Virus or EEE cases were reported in the State of New Hampshire this year and we were fortunate in our community to not have any cases. We continue to file for a spraying application with the state in case of emergency however we have not had to implement this program. Always remember that when dealing with protection from mosquito bites, self defense IS the best defense. During the mosquito season anyone outside during the evening, nighttime, and dawn hours should wear protective clothing such as long pants, long-sleeved shirts, and socks. Consider the use of an effective insect repellent, such as one containing DEET. A repellent containing 30% or less DEET (N,N-diethyl-methyl-meta-toluamide) for children and adults. Use DEET according to the manufacturer's directions. Children should not apply DEET to themselves. Repellents that contain Picardin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR3535 have also been determined to be effective. Vitamin B, Ultrasonic devices, incense, and or bug zappers have not shown to be effective in preventing mosquito bites.

As your Health Department Officer, I will continue to work closely with the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Resources, The Department of Environmental Services, The Manchester Health Department along with other related agencies pertaining to any situations that may occur.

Your Health Department performs scheduled inspections of group homes, schools, daycare facilities and private homes for foster care, as well as inspections on any failed septic systems.

Our goal is to provide the local residents of Candia and the people that work or visit here a healthy and safe environment. We encourage anyone with questions to call or visit our office.

2013 Planning Board Report

Elections were held in March which brought a new member to the Planning Board as well as the re-election of a current member. The Board welcomed new member Kenneth Kustra who was elected to the Board in March. Albert Hall III was re-elected to the Board and was also appointed as one of our two representatives to the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) after long time representative Betsy Kruse's term ended. Al joins long time representative William Stergois on the SNHPC Board of Commissioners. We also welcomed back Fred Kelley as the Select board Representative with members Judi Lindsey, Ginny Clifford and alternate Mark Siemonsma serving in the remaining positions.

The Planning Board currently has two openings for alternates which have gone unfilled for some time now. Alternates are appointed by the Board and a great way for someone who may be interested in serving to learn more about what we do. Any Candia resident, 18 years or older, may become an alternate by submitting a letter of interest to the Board for consideration.

In 2013, like the past several years, we have continued to receive relatively few applications. Applications that were considered in 2013 included:

We have continued to take advantage of this relatively slow period to review and update the Town's Land Development and Earth Excavation Regulations and are working to combine them into a single document to clarify and reduce redundancy. This review takes place at Zoning Review and Revision Committee meetings on the third Wednesday of each month that anyone from Town is welcome to attend.

The Planning Board submitted a warrant article in 2013 to begin the process of updating the Town's Master Plan (MP) which was adopted in 2004. The MP is a planning tool for the long-term vision of our Town and is used by the PB to guide our initiatives. The warrant article was not approved and after much discussion, the Board has elected to re-submit the warrant for 2014 and to provide additional information to the Town regarding the need for and use of the MP.

Thank you to all the members of the Planning Board and Zoning Revision and Review Committee as wells as the volunteers who have assisted us. I would also like to thank our assistant Sharon who is a tremendous asset to the Town and who goes above and beyond on a daily basis.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT/CODE ENFORCEMENT

The year 2013 brought another significant increase of construction projects within our community. A total of 284 permits were issued in 2013 an increase of 16% over 2012 and a 26.5% increase from 2011. This increase resulted in 791 inspections being performed, an increase of 57% over 2012. Some of the larger projects require a series of various inspections while the smaller projects may only require one. For instance we have 4 commercial jobs being done as I write this letter and the inspection process for them is quite extensive. Candia Heritage Commission Annual Report - 2013

The Candia Heritage Commission, appointed by the Board of Selectmen, provides for the proper recognition, use and protection of Candia's historic and cultural resources.

The Commission developed a renovation plan for the Smyth Memorial Building and submitted it to the town as a warrant article that was defeated. The Commission continues to promote the project and pursue options for the reuse of this historic building. We recommend the appointment of a board of trustees to oversee maintenance and make decisions concerning the future of the building. The Smyth Building was open for visitors on the same Saturdays as the Fitts Museum, at Lights on the Hill and during the Celebrate Candia Day in September. An account has been established for donations to the renovation fund. The Commission welcomes others who wish to participate in the renovation effort.

Three historic markers were installed. An engraved granite stone now marks the location of the Frederick Smyth Schoolhouse at the corner of Podunk and New Boston Roads. A dedication ceremony was held. The State of New Hampshire installed a sign in the Langford/Depot Road triangle describing the uniqueness of East Candia. Dennis Lewis installed a duplicate of the historic High Street sign.

Semiquincentennial Committee Report

The year 2013 marked the 250th anniversary of the founding of Candia. The Semi Q Committee, under the auspices of the Heritage Commission, met monthly to coordinate three major activities for the celebration.

March 22rd marked the opening event held at the Congregational Church. A reenactment of events in New Hampshire leading up to the formation of the town was performed. Period music was provided by the Parkington Ensemble. The Candia Woman's Club provided refreshments based on recipes from the 1600s.

Celebrate Candia Day was held on September 20th. A bus tour of historic places in town was led by the Heritage Commission. The Fitts Museums hosted several activities both inside and outside the museum, including a muster and musket firing. The Historical Society was open with a streaming video of an 18th century classroom from School House #4, now located in Old Sturbridge Village. The Masons provided a supper and the evening was capped off with music at the gazebo and fireworks.

On December 13th, our reenactment concluded with the appearance of Governor Benning Wentworth and the first town meeting. Music was provided by the Philbrick family and the Meetinghouse Singers. The evening concluded with the firing of a cannon followed by more musket firing.

Funding for these events was raised by the sale of the calendar, the town ornament and by donation. The Fitts Museum Foundation, a private non-profit organization, acted as a pass through for the Semi Q Committee.

2013 CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Commission updated its Conservation Project Criteria and Procedures this year, helping to clarify with the Board of Selectmen how we communicate during the process of developing a conservation easement.

Eagle Scout candidate Patrick Mun constructed a new trail in the Deerfield Road Town Forest. It creates a circular route that connects the entrance on Deerfield Road with the end of the original trail, following along the southerly edge of the property. He and Commissioner Judi Lindsey led a walk on the property in conjunction with the September Candia Semiquincentennial celebration. Participants viewed Patrick's new footbridges and investigated signs of wildlife along the trails. Patrick has also updated the map of the property, which can be downloaded from the Conservation Commission web site (see below).

Commissioner Susan Wilderman and her Environmental Science class at Jesse Remington High School created wildlife-crossing signs, which they posted around town in late spring. It was hoped these signs would alert drivers to slow down, thus decreasing the number of animals killed or injured when crossing the roads to mate or lay eggs. Very small new hatchlings also attempt these deadly crossings later in the season. The Commission is grateful to Susan and her class for making the signs.

We are currently working on a conservation project on North Road. It is located one property away from Bear Brook State Park and will protect habitat for endangered species.

The Commission will publish its annual newsletter and include it in the Boy Scout packet along with this town report. It explains more about our activities this year. We also have a web site, www.candiaconservationcommission.org. Jim Dimaggio has again helped to maintain our site and we extend our thanks for his time and expertise.

We are hoping to create a scholarship for a deserving student to attend the Barry Conservation Camp in Berlin, NH during the summer of 2014. Please read our newsletter to learn more about this effort and how you can help support a student.

The Conservation Commission meets on the third Tuesday of every month at 7 p.m. in the Town Office Building. Anyone interested in the stewardship of our natural resources is invited to join us.

2013 Report of Candia Emergency Management

As we move from another year we reflect upon events from that year. Of notable review would be the blizzard of February 8th. This storm moved into the region with an intensity not seen often, leaving in its wake significant snow amounts which caused delays in travel, school closings and snow removal headaches. This storm was named Blizzard Nemo. The naming of winter storms is something recently started by the weather service. Hurricanes have been named for many years.

The intensity of Blizzard Nemo together with the amount of snow prompted a Disaster Declaration by the President of the United States. This declaration made FEMA funds available to state and local communities to recover some of the costs associated with emergency response and removal of snow. I need to emphasize the word "some". FEMA uses strict guidelines in determining what costs are eligible for reimbursement. Typically this relates to around 75% of costs deemed reasonable according to FEMA. It also takes time to recover these funds, usually several months. This particular reimbursement was delayed even longer due to the "government sequester".

This process takes time to compile documents, receipts and determine accurate material usage. Several town agencies are involved in the process, including the Road Agent, Police and Fire Departments, Town Office staff, and Emergency Management. The exact number of hours dedicated to compile this documentation is difficult to assess, as it is either by volunteer time or as part of daily operations. I feel safe in estimating the time spent to be 60 to 70 hours. That is just for this one declaration and does not include the hours spent actually responding to the emergency.

The operating budget for Candia Emergency Management is somewhat different than other budgets. The main focus is to have some funds available in the event of a disaster or unusual emergency. In many cases these funds may be allocated to reimburse local vendors for services provided during the emergency, such as food or fuel. Without some account to draw from many local vendors may not be willing to assist if they have to wait months for payment. Any unused portion of this budget reverts back to the town.

I would again like to thank the Town officials, Board of Selectman, Police and Fire Departments, Town Office staff, Road Agent, School officials and staff that continue to support the mission of Candia Emergency Management.

Recycling Center 2013

It has been a challenging 2013 for the Recycling Center. In the springtime, John Kebler, one our part time employees, lost his battle with Cancer. More recently, Roy Tomlin our long time part timer retired unexpectedly. So, it has been a very hectic time at the Recycling Center and we would like to thank everyone for their patience and understanding, we are looking forward to a better 2014.

The Recycling Center staff would like to take this opportunity to thank all residents who support our recycling efforts. The financial benefits from our recycling programs are demonstrated in physical revenues as well as reduced land-fill fees. Through our recycling programs, the Recycling Center generated \$43,866.30 which will be deposited into the Town's general fund. The Town also had approx. \$25,000 in avoided land-fill expenses due to your recycling efforts. These figures reflect hard work and a lot of dedicated recycling from both the residents and the staff.

The Recycling Center is open to all Candia residents and recycling is mandatory in order to use the facility. Recycling is something residents can do which has a direct effect on lowering taxes. Permits are available at the Recycling Center located at 29 Deer Run Road during normal business hours.

Household Hazardous Waste Day was held in September and was once again a success. This important event allows residents to properly and safely dispose of materials not normally accepted at the CRC. The funding is no longer a warrant article and is now part of our operating budget.

We would also take this opportunity to thank all of those folks who have volunteered at the swap shop. There is a group of dedicated individuals, who, all year long staff the swap shop in order to have it open for use by all of the residents. I encourage everyone to stop in say hello and 'take it or leave it'.

The Recycling Center staff is: Chuck Whitcher Facility Operator and Joe Lamarche recycling attendant. We are looking forward to a successful year in 2014, keep up the great work.

Smyth Public Library

During 2013, over 12,000 residents visited, and they borrowed almost 500 items per week--over 25,000 books, magazines, audiobooks and DVDs. The library now houses over 27,000 separate items, most of which can be borrowed. More than 2000 e-books and audiobooks were downloaded during the year. We are among a group of libraries who together purchase limited user rights to these books, and then offer them to our patrons, just like we've done over the years with regular books. The download program was funded by *The Friends of Smyth Library*. In March, residents overwhelmingly voted 767 to 319 (71%) to continue to fund another year of library services.

An average of 27 patrons per day enjoyed our special winter hours on Sundays from 1-4pm from January through April. In April, Lynn Chivers retired. Heidi Deacon was hired to manage the adult fiction collection and share duties as Circulation Librarian. In May, we offered an introduction to computers course in cooperation with the Moore School computer lab. We ran our fourth annual Food for Fines month during June, and donated cash and several boxes of food to the Candia Food Pantry. Also in June, librarian Michelle Elder initiated a book review incentive program for our teen and young adult readers, which rewards those submitting book reviews for our monthly newsletter, the Smythie. Thanks to Rick Mitchell for another year editing the Smythie. In July we replaced our 20 year old copier. During the year, we added a doorbell so that we can offer assistance to patrons in wheelchairs experiencing difficulty entering the building. In October, we replaced our automation system and redesigned our website. Among the new features is the ability of our patrons to renew their materials online. Our volunteers Ted Michalek and Marji Mason again provided hundreds of hours of free, cheerful help.

Our energy conservation program, begun in 2010, continued for fourth successful year. It involves leaving lights off in areas of the library not being used, and careful monitoring of room temperatures for both environmental and economic reasons. Patrons were fully supportive of the program and are in the habit of turning lights on and off as needed, with great savings for both the earth and our budget.

During July and August, we hosted the 3rd annual Summer Music Series on six consecutive Wednesday nights at the Pond Park gazebo behind the library, which featured a wide variety of popular music. Up to 75 people attended each of the events. The Friends of Smyth Library provided major funding. The Candia Woman's Club, the Candia Garden Club, Paul Vallee Construction, the Leavitt Family in memory of Win Leavitt, Kathleen & James Considine, Rick Mitchell Attorney at Law, Rene LeClerc Insurance, New England Duplicator, and carol@amazingloanlady.com also provided significant funding. More than 30 local families joined The Friends of the Concert Series and made additional critical cash contributions toward

expenses. No budget funds were used. We also celebrated the library's 125th birthday and the Town of Candia's 250th birthday with free cake and ice cream during the first concert.

The popular free pass to *Fuller Gardens* in Hampton was again provided by the *Candia Garden Club*. Resident Jack Beard hosted a 8th annual Beatles film and music program. Dayle Smyrl and Mary Caddy maintained the summer Reading Garden, and the library made its parking lot available to the Lights on the Hill event for a park-and-ride arrangement. Several avid readers made nice donations toward the book and audiobook collections. Lucinda Griswold and Al Hall made major donations to our capital fund.

We continued to offer our long-running regular Storytime, now serving 2-4 year olds, hosted by Pattie Davis. Gwen Paprocki again shared her Certified Therapy Dog Simon in the *Simon Says Read* Storytime sessions. Pattie also organized our 3rd annual Scarecrow Contest just prior to Halloween, which again featured several inventive scarecrows on our front lawn. She also hosted monthly 3rd, 4th and 5th grade Book Reading Clubs, which meet after school at the library. Our 6 week non-competitive Summer Reading Program was enjoyed by dozens of Candia children, and hundreds of books were read. We presented three special family programs during the year: Rick Goldin's Family Concert, Squam Lakes Science Center's Animal Program, and the Eyes On Owls Nature Program.

The *Friends of Smyth Library* annual Book & Bake Sale was held in October and raised more than \$1,000. All funds generated were used to pay for the Summer Concert Series, the Downloadable e-book and audio book program, several children's programs, the free monthly BookPage magazine, and free passes to the *Seacoast Science Center* and the *Currier*. We are again indebted to to the *Friends* for their critical financial support. Special thanks again to Friends George and Eileen Denoncourt for moving and storing all our Book Sale books, and to the co-presidents of the Friends, Wendy Ducharme and Pat Larkin for managing the sale.

We continued to offer free scanning, copier and fax services. Free 24/7 wireless internet access continues to be available, within the building during operating hours and outside all the time.

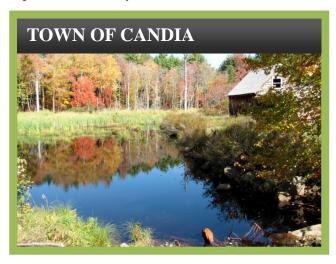

2013 Report of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission



The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of appointed representatives, the Commission's staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance mandated by New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local projects which pertain more exclusively to a specific community.



Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of the Planning Board and/or Board of Selectmen. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects of common interest and benefit to all member communities; keeps officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation; and in conjunction with the New Hampshire Municipal Association, offers annual training workshops for Planning Board and

Zoning Board members.

Services performed for the Town of Candia during the past year are as follows. Hours listed represent work for the Town only; in projects involving multiple municipalities the total hours spent by SNHPC staff is higher. For example, 2,364 hours were spent by SNHPC staff working on the Granite State Future project for the 14 municipalities in the region; equally dividing the total hours results in 169 hours of benefits that can be attributed to the Town.

ANNUAL DELIBERATIVE SESSION TOWN OF CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE FEBRUARY 2, 2013

Moderator H. Clark Thyng called the annual meeting to order at 9:01 AM. Invocation by Reverend Barbara Sanders. Presentation of the colors was made by the Candia Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Cub Scouts. The pledge of allegiance was led by Selectman Joe Duarte. The Moderator then introduced the Town Officers seated on the stage: Town Clerk Christine Dupere, Deputy Town Clerk Cheryl Bond, Chairman of the Selectmen Joe Duarte, Selectman Dick Snow, Selectman Dave DePuy, Selectman Amanda Soares, Selectman Fred Kelley, Selectmens' Assistant Cheryl Eastman, and Accounting and Payroll Clerk Donna Becker. Moderator Thyng also introduced the remaining Town officers and department heads. Ballot clerks were Robin Gray, Bob Panit, and Joanne Beckwith. Tom Giffen was Assistant Moderator. Non registered persons Police Chief Mike McGillen, Legal Counsel Matt Serge, and Senator David Boutin were allowed to speak since there was no objection from the floor. Rules of conduct were briefly reviewed by Moderator Thyng. Matt Serge, Town Counsel was recognized to explain the 10 percent rule to those assembled.

Moderator Clark Thyng then read the following:

FIRST SESSION:

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia, on Saturday, 2nd of February, 2013 at 9 a.m. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion and deliberation of the Warrant Articles numbered 1 through 34. The Warrant Articles may be amended subject to the following limitations: (a) Warrant Articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended, and (b) Warrant Articles that are amended shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on the main motion as amended.

SECOND SESSION:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Candia, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School in said Candia on Tuesday, the 12th of March, 2013. This session shall be the Voting Session to act on all Warrant Articles, as amended, including the proposed budget, as a result of the action of the "First Session". The Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 2.

Are you in favor of the following amendment:

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by petition to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To rezone Map 407, Lots 66 & 71 from residential zoning district to commercial zoning district. Section 4.03 Zoning District. These adjacent lots have existing access from Route 27 in Raymond. Rezoning will allow for rock quarrying, excavation and other commercial uses permitted in the commercial district, which may provide the Town will more tax revenue. (Submitted by petition).

Moderator Thyng explained that a Protest Petition had been received for Article 2 with the required number of registered voters' signatures. The petition read as follows: We, the undersigned, are submitting this petition in protest of the proposed amendment to the Candia Zoning Ordinance which will place lots 66 and 71 from residential zoning to commercial zoning. Rezoning will allow for rock quarrying, excavation and other commercial uses.

The area in question is next to a fairly dense residential neighborhood, is in very clos proximity to the North Branch of the Lamprey River, abuts the historic Bean Island Cemetery, as well as wetlands. We wish to have the area in Candia remain a residential zone.

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$163,500) for the renovation, septic, and well of the Smyth Memorial Building (the old library), to be used as a community center, and to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$163,500) of bonds and/or notes in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and/or notes and determine the rate of interest. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (3/5 ballot vote required). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1). Motion to accept the article as read was made by Amanda Soares, second Dick Snow. Diane Philbrick of the heritage Commission spoke to the article. The building was constructed in 1932 and dedicated as a memorial to Gov. Smyth a resident of Candia. It was erected to be a building of distinction for the community. The library was a very important part of the Town. It was built to be as

fireproof as possible. It was placed almost in the geographical center of the community amid many historic buildings. The Smyth memorial Building was recently placed on both the State and National Registers of Historic places. The building should be made available for multiple uses for the community, such as meetings, concerts, museum storage, etc. The Heritage Commission has worked with the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance to come up with a code compliant building. An architect was involved in the design plans. The Heritage Commission was able to get the bids for the work lower. The final figure will be dependent on how many donations can be received and how many community members can help. There is no water on the site, so the money also includes a well.

Amanda clarified that the Selectmen researched looking at a five year bond and would negotiate a loan with the bank, seeing the best rate and having the least impact on the taxpayers. An estimate of 40 cents per thousand had been made. The Commission felt the building is important and should not be torn down. Mr. Goekjian asked if there was any thought to costs of repairs of the building and was told not at this time. There was further discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **Article 3 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Two Million, Three Hundred Thirty Nine Thousand, Five Hundred Sixty Four Dollars (\$2,339,564). Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be Two Million, Three Hundred Thirty Six Thousand, Two Hundred Sixty Three Dollars (\$2,336,263) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Candia or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2) budget only. (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Dick Snow, seconded by Fred Kelley. Mr. Snow explained that the departments did a marvelous job keeping expenses down and there will be money coming back to the Town to lower the tax rate this year. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 4 will be placed on the ballot as read.

Mr. Snow requested that articles 5 through 17 be voted on as a block, seconded by Bob Bruce. There was no objection by the assembly. It was voted by a show of ballots to move the articles as a block..

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) in continuation of its support of the **Aids Response Seacoast**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1).

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Sixty-Nine Dollars (\$669) in continuation of its support of the **Rockingham County Nutrition and Meals on Wheels Program.** (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) in continuation of its support of the CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$225) in continuation of its support of the **Retired and Senior Volunteer Program**. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1)

Ken Goekjian asked why some members of the Budget Committee did not recommend these articles. Matt Broadhead, Budget Committee Chair, explained that they had not received information on any of the agencies except for Article 11, dealing with the Child Advocacy Center. Wendy Ducharme spoke for Child and Family Services. Donna DelRosso explained, as Welfare Director, how much these agencies assist the Town. Fred Colbrath Jr. representing the American Red Cross, asked for our continued support. explaining it is a vital mission to the State. Mark Hardy spoke in support of this block of articles. He stated these agencies have impacted his life as well, such as Visiting Nurses. They provide a lot of good for a small amount of money. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Articles 5 through 17 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

Paul LeBlond made a motion to consider article 31 before we consider Article 30 and to place Article 31 on the ballot immediately after Article 29 and before Article 30, renumbering the Articles as necessary. Seconded by Mr. Royer. Mr. Lewis stated he had no problem moving this article before the Currier Road article. Mrs. Soares stated there are many other private agencies that do not ask the Town for money. Mrs. Eastman explained the order of Articles on

the ballot is determined by order received. Mr. St. Martin urged the assembly to consider placing this article as requested. Tom Dimaggio stated this is a private organization and moving it up is not fair. Mr. Lewis explained if the Currier Road amount is reduced, the only thing would be the lack of a top coat. A call to question was received. A hand count was requested. Yes:46 No:44: Article 31 will be placed in the order requested.

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) for the sixth and final phase of Patten Hill Road. This phase will include the final one inch wearing course of asphalt from Main Street to the intersection of Lane, Depot, and Green Roads, and guard rail replacement at the Abe Emerson Marsh. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0). Motion was made by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman. Kelley. Dennis Lewis explained that this needs to be done to finish the project. There were no questions. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 18 will be moved to the ballot as read.

ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for excess winter road maintenance, these funds will not be used unless the operating winter maintenance funds are exhausted. This will be a non-transferable appropriation. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. Submitted by the Road Agent. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Mr. Snow, seconded by Mr. Kelley. There was no discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. Article will be placed on the ballot as read.19

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in the existing Revaluation Capital Reserve fund for the Future Revaluation of the municipality. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion by Fred Kelley, seconded by Dave DePuy. There was no discussion. Vote by show of ballots. Article 20 will be moved to the ballot as read.

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000) to cover the reimbursable costs associated with Police activities, including but not limited to **Police Special Details** and grant programs. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 9 to 0) Motion was made by Selectman Joe Duarte, seconded by Fred Kelley. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 21 will be moved to the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a revolving fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h for the purpose of Police Special Details. All of the revenue received from fees, charges, or other income derived from the Police Department providing public safety services outside of the ordinary detail of police officers including but not limited to public safety concerns in connection with special events, highway construction and other construction projects shall be placed in the fund and the money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year-to-year, and shall not be considered part of the Town's general surplus. The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the governing body and Police Chief and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Any surplus remaining in the fund, after the payment of the expenses associated with special details shall be used for the purchase of police vehicles and equipment. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1) Motion by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman Kelley. Chief McGillen spoke, stating he has been trying to establish this for the past two years. It will help with the future purchase of cruisers as well as other police equipment. Mr. Lazott feels the fund should have a cap on it so it would not be used on things that it should not be. Mr. Goekijan asked that if we passed the preceding article, would this be double dipping? Mrs. Eastman explained both needed to pass for this year only. Mrs. Penfield explained if we establish this fund, we would no longer know what the money will be used for and the Budget Committee would no longer have oversight over this account. Mr. Goekjian then proposed the following amendment: If this article is adopted, Article 21 would be reduced to \$5,000.00, seconded by Amanda Soares. Mr. Goekjian explained there should be a little money to start the fund. Todd Allen asked if this amount of \$5,000.00 would be adequate? Mrs. Eastman stated the \$5,000.00 should be enough to start the fund. Deb LaBlond asked would this be enough? Mrs. Eastman explained the revenue would be coming into the fund from special details. The fund would be self funding. Sharon Despathy asked how this would be affecting the 10% rule? Mr. Snow explained it would reduce the amount next year to be raised by taxes. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment by a show of ballots. Article 22 was amended.

Discussion then resumed on the amended article. Mrs. Penfield felt this would be a roundabout way to purchase a new cruiser without the Budget Committee's input. Mr. Lazott explained this would not accumulate a huge amount and it is necessary to replace cruisers. Mrs. Penfield pointed out other funds that have been established over which there would be no say. Mr. Goekjian explained the savings accounts are to keep the tax rate stabilized. There was no further discussion, therefore the amended article was moved to a vote by a show of ballots. **Article 22 will be placed on the ballot as amended.**

Moderator Thyng called for a brief recess until 11:00 AM

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be deposited in the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund, established under RSA 35:1 at the March 1991 Town Meeting, for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment with the Selectmen appointed as agents. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 6 to 3) Motion was made by Selectman Kelley, seconded by Selectman Soares. Janet Wilderman asked why is this listed apart from the Municipal Budget if the Department is part of the Town.

Mrs. Eastman stated this is for apparatus only and must be kept separate. It depends on the money being appropriated by the town. It is to save money for a future purchase. Selectman Duarte explained that by us putting money aside every year to purchase a very expensive piece of equipment. Chief Dean Young explained it would not create a huge spike in the tax rate. It is a way of saving money ahead of time. Mr. Goekjian explained this is lay-away. There was no further discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 23 will go to the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) to allow the Town to sponsor a **Household Hazardous Waste Day** for Candia residents. The event is to be scheduled for the fall, and is to allow residents the opportunity to properly and safely dispose of household hazardous waste materials that the Recycling Center does not normally accept. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5 to 0). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 7 to 2). Motion to adopt the article as read was made by Selectman DePuy, seconded by Selectman Snow. There was no additional discussion. Vote was by a show of ballots. **Article 24 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) for the completion of the closure plan for the New Boston Road Incinerator Site, with the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1) Motion was made by Selectman Snow, seconded by Selectman Duarte. Selectman Snow explained he had a handout available, which featured photos as well as the extent of the cap. He explained the Department of Environmental Services (DES) has mandated that we close the old incinerator site. There are costs associated with every dumpster that leaves the site. The material that in in the ash piles must be disposed of in the most cost effective manner. The buildings will be gone and the materials will be taken away. The Town will need to make a decision. Rick Lazott asked if the DES has given a completion date? Mr. Lazott stated that we have many local contractors that can remove the old buildings and the fencing. Selectman Soares explained we are not following procedures. We need a qualified engineering firm that does random testing to determine what is in those piles. Judy Szot explained she had attended the walk through. The ash pile must be removed, so it has to be tested. The tests are for metal and solubility of the material. If it does not pass the test, it is considered hazardous waste. Don't dig up the land fill. The issue is to determine what the extent of the ash pile and the content of the pile, it will then determine the final cost of the removal. We should do the testing this year. Mrs. Szot proposed the following amendment: to reduce the amount to \$1.00. The amendment was seconded by Mr. Bowman. Selectman Dave DePuy spoke in opposition of the amendment. Mr. Snow explained he had done a lot of work. Mr. Goekjian stated you cannot ask someone for a quote for something that is still unknown. We need a professional evaluation of what is contained at the site. Mrs. Penfield explained there are more choices. We need to know what we are dealing with and we do not have the information at the present time. The Towns always have responsibility for hazardous waste. Mr. Lazott feels the amendment is a good thing. Selectman Duarte explained there is a very reputable firm located in Epping. If we take this on ourselves, we have no idea how much this will cost us. There was no further discussion, so a vote was taken on the amendment to reduce the amount to \$1.00. Vote was taken by a count of hands. Yes: 46 No: 25 Article 25 is amended to \$1.00.

Vote was then taken on the amended article by a count of ballots. Yes: 50 No: 37 The amended Article 25 will be placed on the ballot.

A request to restrict reconsideration on article 25 was made by Rick Lazott, seconded by Amanda Soares. Reconsideration is restricted by vote of the assembly.

Dick Snow moved to restrict reconsideration of all the other articles we have voted on so far, seconded by Fred. Kelley. Vote was in the affirmative to restrict reconsideration.

ARTICLE 26.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$6,650) for the first phase of updating the Candia Master Plan per RSA 674:3. (Submitted by the Planning Board) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1). Motion was made by Fred Kelley, seconded by Amanda Soares. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots in the affirmative. Article 26 will be placed on the ballot as read.

ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$10,500) for the purchase of a new **copier/scanner/fax/printer** for the Selectmen's Office. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 4 to 1). (Not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 1). Motion by Mr. Snow, seconded by Mr. Kelley. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. **Article 27 will be placed on the ballot as read.**

ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$127,990) for the operating expenses of the Smyth Public Library. Funds are to be expended under the direction of the Smyth Public Library Association. The library has no default budget; a no vote means you favor closing the library. (Submitted by the Smyth Public Library Trustees) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 3 to 2). (Recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 8 to 0 with 1 abstaining). Motion by Selectman DePuy, seconded by Selectman Snow. There was no discussion. Vote was taken by a show of ballots. Article 28 will be placed on the ballot as read.

ARTICLE 29.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) for the operation and maintenance of the Fitts Museum. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, major funds, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Candia as of and for the year ended December 31, 2012, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Opinions

Other Matters

Management has omitted a Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America required to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by the missing information.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Candia's basic financial statements. The individual fund financial schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The individual fund financial schedules are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the individual fund financial schedules are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

CANDIA SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I am pleased to make my eighth annual report to the Candia School District. Having completed my eighth year as your Superintendent of Schools, I continue to be impressed with the commitment to excellence that is practiced daily by teachers, parents, support staff, the school administration and, most importantly, our children. In turn, I thank the Candia community for its support of public schooling and for the high expectations that are held for the school district.

The 2012-2013 school year was one highlighted by both changes and accomplishments in the areas of curriculum, instruction, and assessment. Our efforts focused on implementation of a new middle school Language Arts program, a comprehensive Mathematics review and program adoption, and preparation for the transition to new academic standards.

This year, the final phase of the Language Arts curriculum cycle was completed with the introduction of a new middle school program. Last spring the SAU 15 Grade 6-8 Language Arts teachers along with their administrators chose *Holt McDougal Literature*, the Common Core Edition. This series includes a strong balance of classic and contemporary literature and diverse informational texts that progressively develop and apply students' ELA skills. Students will practice reading, writing, and speaking/listening by analyzing and producing an array of literary media. Teachers report that student skills and outcomes are demonstrating improvement.

Our mathematics curriculum and programs were scheduled for review in 2012-2013 as well. Last summer, our teachers and administrators closely examined the requirements of the Common Core State Standards in relation to current mathematics programs. It was determined that these programs did not meet the content expectations or rigor of these new standards. An investigation into programs closely aligned to the standards and the required rigor yielded three programs to be piloted in selected classrooms throughout the school district.

After a thorough review of these programs and corresponding research, *Math In Focus* was chosen for adoption in Grades K-8 beginning in the 2013-2014 school year. This program is especially strong in developing conceptual understanding. Throughout the series, concepts are taught moving through a sequence of concrete to pictorial to abstract. It focuses on fewer topics but teaches them thoroughly so they need not be retaught continually. We look forward to providing this opportunity for our students and families during the 2013-14 school year.

Next year, our efforts will also be focused on the implementation of the Common Core State Standards. These standards, adopted by the NH State Board of Education in July 2010, define the knowledge and skills students should have within their K-12 English Language Arts and Mathematics education so that they will graduate from high school able to succeed in college and careers and to be internationally competitive.

The Candia School District is pleased to be able to provide support and training to faculty and staff in this important instructional transition. The position of Common Core Facilitator will be instituted for the 2013-2014 school year. This is a three-year position focusing on building staff capacity to help students successfully achieve at higher and more rigorous academic levels.

The 2012-2013 school year was a very important one for our early learners as well. This year, full day kindergarten was introduced in Candia. The academic achievement and social and emotional development of these youngsters is impressive. With this improved head start, the district looks forward to following the progress of these students as they progress through the grade levels.

Students in grades 3-8 have continued to participate in NECAP (New England Common Assessment Program) assessments in mathematics, reading, writing and science. This assessment will be administered for the last time in 2013 before the shift is made to the Smarter Balanced Assessment beginning in the 2014-2015 school year.

The Candia School District also uses NWEA, DIBELS, and other formative assessments to provide a more complete picture of student progress. Upon completion of each benchmark, teachers meet to analyze results, determine best instructional practices, and provide re-teaching or enrichment experiences.

On June 26, 2013, the New Hampshire Department of Education's request of the U. S. Department of Education for flexibility from certain requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 was granted. This request was based on principles related to standards, assessment and instruction; data to improve instruction; transforming struggling schools; and educator effectiveness. As a result, it is anticipated that we will explore administrator and teacher evaluation systems during the 2013-2014 school year.

Between the end of the 2011-2012 school year and the beginning of the 2012-2013 school year the boiler system was replaced at the Henry W. Moore School. This system was tested and calibrated once the heating season started and was a great improvement to the school as it now allows for night setbacks of temperature, which means a more efficient system. As with any project of this size, there were some issues but due to the due diligence of our Maintenance Director, Peter Barbuto, all issues were resolved in a satisfactory manner. In order to improve the aesthetics of the property several projects were completed; there was an extensive brush removal project done around the basketball court as well as other areas where it was needed, the storage trailer was removed, and a fence was installed around the dumpster area. The server room was relocated to an area where it is better suited.

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In closing, I have nothing but positive feelings about the Candia School District and our future. Thank you for allowing me to be your Superintendent. I am so proud of our teachers, our administrators, and most importantly our youngsters. A special thanks to Assistant Superintendent, Marge Polak and Business Administrator, Karen Lessard for bringing their unique talents to the District and to the Candia School Board for representing the community so well.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 2013–2014

As principal of Henry W. Moore School, together with the staff, we welcomed three hundred and seventy seven students in September of 2013. I am pleased to announce and welcome to the Moore School Community, the newest members of our professional staff for this school year. They are: Jamie Dina – 5th Grade, Elisabeth White—5th Grade and Lisa Jones—Reading Specialist.

Major efforts for our school district included the adoption of a new math program, a new teacher evaluation plan, the increased inclusion of community members at the Moore School and the implementation of periodic and yearly assessments.

Math

Over the course of the 2012-2013 school year, over fifty percent of the Moore School teachers agreed to be involved in the math pilot program. As a result, Candia, Auburn and Hooksett adopted a new math program known as Math in Focus. Math training and ongoing workshops began in August in preparation for the full implementation during the 2013-2014 school year. This program is based on the Singapore Mathematical Frameworks and includes a strong focus on problem solving, concepts, beliefs, attitudes, metacognition and process. This program complements our reading program with a strong language based platform.

Professional Accountability

New standards and professional accountability requirements based on the New Hampshire Waiver granted to several states by President Obama, created the need to study the process of teacher evaluation. Assessment results from the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) will be included as part of educator and administrator evaluations. It has been an honor to serve on the Teacher Evaluation Committee as members took hold of the charge from our Superintendent, Dr. Charles Littlefield, to provide a quality-updated instrument that measures improved student performance as an indicator of professional growth.

Community Members

One of our goals this year was to be more inclusive of our Candia Community. We have been offering technology classes to community members who wish to learn the basics of word processing, different media devices, web surfing and email. A team of eight students at the Moore School known as the "Techsperts" has offered an after hours course working individually with community members on a weekly basis. It has been rewarding to have community members in our building as they interact as teachers and learners. I would like to extend my gratitude to the Moore School Technology Committee for their dedication to the project.

Assessments

Students in grades kindergarten through eighth grade completed the Northwest Evaluation Assessment in September. A second round of testing is scheduled for May of this year, to record growth and create benchmarks for the fall of 2014. In October, students in grades three through eight participated in the New England Compact Assessment Program (NECAP). This year, the Common Core State Standards are being implemented in every grade level. Students' knowledge of the new Common Core State Standards will be measured using the Smarter Balanced Assessment System in 2015. This will replace the NECAP tests. The Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) have been administered to students in kindergarten through fifth grade three times a year. This assessment provides useful data to regular and special education teachers as a tool to inform instruction and identify patterns of growth.

I have the privilege of interacting with parents, students, and community members as the Principal of the Henry W. Moore School. I have a great deal of confidence in our staff, school board, administration and the community, to meet the individual needs of every Candia student.

Moderator H. Clark Thyng called the annual School District Meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. The Moderator then asked the School Board chair to lead in the Pledge of Allegiance.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT, IN THE TOWN OF CANDIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS:

First Session of Annual Meeting - Deliberative

You are hereby notified to meet at the Henry W. Moore School, 12 Deerfield Road, in said District, on the 11th day of February 2013, 6:00 p.m. This session shall consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of warrant articles number 2 through 8. Mr. Byrd asked how many signatures were on the petition - Judy Szot stated there were 99 signatures on the petition. Mr. Byrd does not think that there should be a greater number of signatures on the petiton than there are people here tonight to vote on this amendment and change the intent of what it was meant to do.

Sharon Dewitt stated that last week we brought down the \$ amount to one dollar for the dump article. This is what SB2 does. We are not voting on this just bringing it to the ballot to be voted on.

Judith Szot stated that last year this was submitted to the town in error and that is why it is here this year. The people wanted to vote on it last year and were unable to have their vote count because of this. You are taking a fundamental right away from the people. They have stated they want a half -day kindergarten. They have a right to have it on the ballot as originated. Moderator Thyng stated that at last years Town Deliberative Session he informed the body that the article was submitted to the town in error and placed on the wrong ballot and would not be counted. Mrs. Szot stated they have a fundamental right to petition their government.

Mrs. Szot also stated that on the petition two people wrote let me vote on this article, this is what we want. It sends a bad message when you cannot do this. Mrs. Szot also stated that after receiving legal counsel she thought that this would be binding if passed. Deb LeBlond stated that they understood what Mrs Szot wanted, but the school board members are the ones that make the final decision on what needs to be done when it comes to curriculum. Mrs. LaFlamme stated that this is would not be binding and that the RSA had changed. There does not have to be an article to put kindergarten in as half day that would be determined by the School Board. It would be the same as adding or making any other changes to the curriculum. At this point legal council was asked to explain to Mrs. Szot what the outcome would be if this article was accepted.

Council was asked to address the RSA. Attorney Leslie wanted to know what the exact question was. Mrs. Szot replied, explaining what their purpose was in asking for half -day kindergarten.

The legal council stated that if it goes on the ballot as written the school board would not be obligated to go by it. The only reason it was put on there the first time was so the school would be able to get funding. It was for an entirely different reason. By matter of law the school must have a kindergarten now and this would not be binding. Mrs. Szot stated they are not asking for kindergarten to go away just changed to half day as the voters expressed last year that they wanted. Attorney Leslie stated it is not a decision that the school board has to follow, it is advisory only, whether the amendment is put in or not. He suggested that having this added, may save on a future law suit being brought on the town. Deb LeBlond responded that it is better if those voting knew that it was non-binding and only for advisory purposes. Ingrid Byrd asked to move the question. A vote was taken on the amendment by a show of ballots. The article was amended. There was no further discussion. Vote on the amended article by a show of ballots.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board Candia School District Candia, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of the Candia School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, which collectively comprise the School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of Candia School District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As discussed in Note 11 to the financial statements, management has not recorded the long-term costs of retirement health care and obligations for other postemployment benefits in governmental activities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that those costs be recorded, which would increase the liabilities and expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the liabilities, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities is not reasonably determinable.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matter discussed in the preceding paragraph, the government-wide financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the governmental activities of the Candia School District as of June 30, 2012, or the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended.

In addition, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of each major fund of the Candia School District as of June 30, 2012, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended and the respective budgetary comparison for the general fund, grants fund and food service fund in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis (pages 3 through 11) be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Candia School District's basic financial statements. The individual fund financial schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. They are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional

procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the financial schedules themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.
